HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE CONVENING OF A TASK FORCE TO EXAMINE CANCER IN THE FIREFIGHTING PROFESSION.

WHEREAS, protective equipment used by firefighters has improved considerably in recent years, and fire departments have instituted best practice procedures for the cleaning of protective clothing and breathing apparatuses; and

WHEREAS, despite protections and procedures, firefighters

are exposed to multiple carcinogens and toxicants through incident exposure as residential and vehicle fires release highly concentrated toxicants from plastics and synthetics; and

WHEREAS, exposure to toxicants during the course of a firefighters' career may not result in cancer symptoms or diagnosis until several years after retirement; and

WHEREAS, according to a three-year study by the University of Cincinnati completed in 2005, firefighters have a higher risk than the general population of being diagnosed with cancer; and

WHEREAS, this study showed that, when compared to the general population, firefighters have a:

- (1) 102 percent higher risk for testicular cancer;
- (2) 53 percent higher risk for multiple myeloma;
- (3) 51 percent higher risk for non-Hodgkin's lymphoma;
- (4) 39 percent higher risk for skin cancer;
- (5) 32 percent higher risk for brain and malignant melanoma;

- (8) 24 percent higher risk for buccal cavity and pharynx cancer:
- (9) 22 percent higher risk for stomach cancer;
- (10)21 percent higher risk for colon cancer; and
- (11) 14 percent higher risk for leukemia; and

WHEREAS, firefighters also face a greater risk of ntracting infectious diseases and illnesses associated with posure to patient care and biochemical substances due to oterrorism than the general population; and

WHEREAS, the impact on the families of firefighters agnosed with cancer include emotional toil, financial burdens, me commitments, and decreased quality of life for each family mber; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the enty-eighth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular ssion of 2016, the Senate concurring, that the Legislature is quested to convene a task force to examine issues relating to ncer in the firefighting profession; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chairperson of the Senate Standing Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health and the Chairperson of the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Health are requested to serve as the Chairpersons of the task force and to invite interested parties to be members of the task force, including:

- (1) One member representing the Department of Health;
- (2) One member representing the Department of Human Resources Development;
