

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE JUDICIARY TO CONVENE A TASK FORCE TO CONSIDER BODY AND DASH CAMERA IMPLEMENTATION WITHIN HAWAII LAW ENFORCEMENT STATEWIDE.

1 WHEREAS, trust between law enforcement agencies and the 2 citizens they serve is essential to the stability of 3 communities, the integrity of the criminal justice system, and a 4 safe and effective delivery of public safety services; and 5

6 WHEREAS, in order to safeguard the public and peace 7 officers of this State, it is vital for local peace officers and 8 the communities they protect to have strong, collaborative 9 relationships; and

MHEREAS, implementing the use of body cameras by all law enforcement agencies in the State could assist in preventing and resolving complaints brought by members of the public against peace officers; strengthening law enforcement transparency, performance, and accountability; and the documentation of evidence; and

18 WHEREAS, the use of video footage might discourage citizens 19 from filing unfounded complaints against officers, which could 20 save state agencies a significant amount of time and funds that 21 would otherwise be spent on lengthy investigations and lawsuits; 22 and

WHEREAS, body cameras and dash cameras may assist law enforcement agencies in identifying and correcting problems within those agencies by using footage from the cameras to provide scenario-based training, evaluate the performance of new officers in the field, and identify new areas in which training is needed; and

1 WHEREAS, use of body and dash cameras by law enforcement in 2 other regions has been shown to placate officer-civilian 3 conflict and reduce the use of force by officers in the field, 4 either due to changes in civilian behavior in response to the 5 cameras' presence or to changes in that of the officers; now, 6 therefore, 7

8 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 9 Twenty-eighth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 10 Session of 2016, the Senate concurring, that the Judiciary is 11 requested to convene a law enforcement body camera and dash 12 camera implementation task force to:

- 14 (1) Conduct a feasibility study to examine the scope and
 15 cost of developing and implementing best procedures
 16 and usage of body and dash cameras by law enforcement
 17 agencies throughout the State;
- 19 (2) Determine rules for access to and use of camera
 20 recordings by law enforcement agencies in this State,
 21 addressing privacy issues in relation to recorded
 22 footage as well as benefits, drawbacks, and concerns
 23 about the implementation of its use;
 - (3) Identify the resources necessary to effectuate the task force's recommendations; and
 - (4) Conduct any other business deemed necessary to carry out the purpose of this measure; and

31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force be comprised of 32 the following members representing the diversity of the State:

- 34 (1) The chair of the House Committee on Judiciary;
- 36 (2) The chair of the Senate Committee on Judiciary and37 Labor;
 - (3) The Attorney General or the Attorney General's designee;

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- General guidelines for the proper use, maintenance, and storage of body and dash cameras, which shall include recommendations on procedures for when body and dash cameras shall be in recording mode;
- (2) Any limitations on which law enforcement entities are permitted to use body and dash cameras, and whether there are situations where camera footage obtained encroaches upon civil liberties;
 - (3) General guidelines for the proper storage, retention, and release of audio and video data recorded by body and dash cameras;
- (4) General guidelines regarding law enforcement training relative to each law enforcement agency's policies and procedures on the use of body and dash cameras; and
- (5) Legislation needed, if any, to authorize the use of body cameras by law enforcement in this State; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 22 23 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Attorney General, 24 the State Public Defender, the Prosecuting Attorney for the City and County of Honolulu, the Executive Director of the Hawaii 25 State Sheriff's Association, the Chief of the Honolulu Police 26 Department, the Chief of the Kauai County Police Department, the 27 28 Chief of the Maui County Police Department, the Chief of the Hawaii County Police Department, the President of the Hawaii 29 30 State Bar Association, the head of the University of Hawaii Criminal Justice Department, the Chair of the Access to Justice 31 Commission, the President of the State of Hawaii Organization of 32 Police Officers, the Executive Director of the American Civil 33 Liberties Union of Hawaii, the Chief Justice, and the Director 34 35 of Public Safety.
