A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII CHILD WELFARE EDUCATION COLLABORATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the department of
2 human services has lost a large portion of its child welfare
3 services staff since 2009 and is still working to rebuild with
4 suitable experienced social workers. 21 per cent of the
5 department's child welfare services positions were eliminated
6 during the 2009-2010 reduction in force. By nature, child
7 welfare services also experience attrition of its valuable
8 workforce due to the intense and difficult circumstances under
9 which child welfare services employees work. As of December
10 2013, the child welfare services branch had sixty-four vacant
11 positions.

12 The legislature also finds that the department will face a
13 critical shortage of experienced child welfare services workers
14 and leaders in the coming five years. As of 2012, 36 per cent
15 of the child welfare services workforce had twenty-one or more
16 years of experience. However, there is concern about impending
17 retirements as more than 36 per cent of staff is fifty years of



1 age or older, and almost 30 per cent of staff is in their
2 forties.

3 The legislature further finds that between 1998 and 2008,
4 the department of human services, child welfare services branch,
5 and the University of Hawaii, Myron B. Thompson school of social
6 work, successfully ran the Hawaii child welfare education
7 collaboration. The Hawaii child welfare education collaboration
8 was a successful workforce recruitment and training program that
9 provided a continuous stream of qualified social workers to fill
10 vacant child welfare positions. Each year, full-time and part-
11 time students entered the program and received a specialized
12 child welfare services curriculum, field integration seminars,
13 and practicum placement in child welfare settings. The program
14 admitted one hundred nine students, one hundred of whom
15 completed the program and twenty-five of whom are still employed
16 at the department in child welfare services positions.

17 The legislature finds that restoration of the Hawaii child
18 welfare education collaboration is needed to help fill the
19 current child welfare services position vacancies and establish
20 a future workforce of experienced child welfare workers. In
21 return for reimbursement of tuition, fees, and required



1 educational expenses, participants of the program would agree to
2 become employed in child welfare services for a minimum of three
3 years after graduation. The program will help keep Hawaii's
4 children safe and increase the level of services for Hawaii's
5 families as well as meet federal and state authority mandates
6 and avoid financial penalties.

7 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:

8 (1) Build a workforce of highly qualified social workers
9 who will increase the level of child welfare services
10 in Hawaii and improve outcomes for Hawaii's children;
11 and

12 (2) Make an appropriation to the University of Hawaii to
13 restore the Hawaii child welfare education
14 collaboration between child welfare services and the
15 University of Hawaii Myron B. Thompson school of
16 social work.

17 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
18 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$250,000 or so much
19 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and the
20 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
21 2016-2017 for the Hawaii child welfare education collaboration

1 between the child welfare services branch of the department of
2 human services and the University of Hawaii Myron B. Thompson
3 school of social work.

4 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the University
5 of Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.

6 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2015.
