A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HIGHWAY SAFETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the prevalence of
3	drivers violating Hawaii's traffic laws, especially on the
4	island of Oahu, has become intolerable, particularly drivers who
5	run red lights. These violations endanger the lives of
6	motorists and pedestrians and compound the already hazardous
7	conditions on Hawaii's roads and highways. It has become
8	increasingly common to hear reports of hit-and-run drivers who
9	have run over children or the elderly. Disregarding traffic
10	signals has also been the common denominator in recent highly-
11	publicized motor vehicle crashes that have claimed lives.
12	The legislature further finds that in other jurisdictions
13	in the United States, Canada, Europe, and other countries
14	throughout the world, a technological innovation, the photo red
15	light imaging detector system, has already demonstrated its
16	reliability, efficiency, and effectiveness in identifying and
17	deterring those who run red lights.

1 Photo red light imaging detector systems are safe, quick, 2 cost-effective, and efficient. No traffic stop is involved, and 3 a police officer is not at risk from passing traffic or 4 violators who are armed or dangerous. Photo red light imaging 5 detector systems use a camera positioned at intersections where 6 red-light violations are a major cause of collisions. The 7 system serves as a twenty-four-hour deterrent. Sensors are 8 buried under a crosswalk and lead to a self-contained camera 9 system mounted on a nearby structure. When a vehicle enters the 10 intersection and the traffic light is red, the camera takes a 11 telephoto color picture of the rear of the car, capturing an 12 image of the license plate. A second wide-angle photograph 13 takes in the entire intersection, including other traffic. Photo red light imaging detector systems provide numerous 14 benefits. Not only are streets safer, but police officers are 15 16 freed from time-consuming traffic enforcement activities and 17 have more time to respond to priority calls. A violator is less 18 likely to go to court, since the color photograph of the 19 violation, imprinted with the time, date, and location of the 20 violation, and the number of seconds the light had been red 21 before the violator entered the intersection, can be used as

1 evidence in court. Few cases are contested in jurisdictions 2 using this system, and officers make fewer court appearances, 3 saving court, overtime, and other costs. 4 The system may also result in lower insurance costs for 5 safe drivers through an overall reduction in crashes and 6 injuries. System costs are placed on the violators who have 7 created the need for the program, rather than law-abiding 8 taxpayers. Traffic laws are enforced without partiality, and 9 safety and efficiency are increased by reducing the number of 10 motor vehicle chases and the number of personnel required for 11 traffic accident clean-up, investigation, and court testimony. 12 The legislature additionally finds that the photo speed 13 imaging detector system created by Act 234, Session Laws of 14 Hawaii 1998, and implemented in December 2001, generated intense 15 public opposition to this program. As a result of this 16 opposition, the legislature repealed Act 234 in its entirety by 17 Act 58, Session Laws of Hawaii 2002. However, the majority of 18 the opposition to this program resulted from the method in which 19 the program was implemented. The public perceived that the 20 program operated more to maximize revenue for the vendor

administering the program, rather than to improve traffic

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- 1 safety. In particular, vans in which the cameras were mounted
- 2 were often placed at locations that did not necessarily have a
- 3 history of speed-related accidents and instead were used to
- 4 monitor locations with heavy traffic flow at lower speeds. This
- 5 situation permitted the vendor to issue the maximum number of
- 6 citations in the shortest period of time and at the least cost,
- 7 thereby maximizing the potential return to the vendor without
- 8 necessarily maximizing traffic safety.
- 9 The purpose of this Act is to:
- 10 (1) Establish a three-year pilot photo red light imaging
- 11 detector system program to improve enforcement of the
- traffic signal laws in all counties; and
- 13 (2) Make other amendments regarding highway safety.
- 14 PART II
- 15 SECTION 2. Definitions. As used in this Act, unless the
- 16 context otherwise requires:
- "County highway" has the same meaning as used in section
- 18 264-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- 19 "Department" means the department of transportation.
- 20 "Motor vehicle" has the same meaning as defined in section
- 21 291C-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

- 2 traffic enforcement that includes a vehicle sensor that works in
- 3 conjunction with a traffic-control signal and a camera or
- 4 similar device to automatically produce a photographic, digital,
- 5 or other visual image of a motor vehicle that has disregarded a
- 6 steady red traffic-control signal in violation of section
- 7 291C-32(a)(3), Hawaii Revised Statutes, and a photographic,
- 8 digital, or other visual image of the driver of the motor
- 9 vehicle.
- 10 "State highway" has the same meaning as used in section
- 11 264-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- 12 "Traffic-control signal" has the same meaning as defined in
- 13 section 291C-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- "Truck" means any motor vehicle with a maximum gross
- 15 vehicle weight rating of no less than sixteen thousand pounds.
- 16 SECTION 3. Photo red light imaging detector system
- 17 program; established. (a) There is established a pilot photo
- 18 red light imaging detector system program, which may be
- 19 implemented by any county on state or county highways within the
- 20 respective county to enforce the traffic-control signal laws of
- 21 the State. The program shall cease to operate on July 1, 2018.

- 1 (b) The photo red light imaging detector system program
- 2 shall begin at three locations to be selected by the department
- 3 of transportation based on data relating to violations and
- 4 accidents.
- 5 SECTION 4. County powers and duties. Each county may
- 6 establish and implement, in accordance with this Act, a photo
- 7 red light imaging detector system program imposing monetary
- 8 liability on the registered owner of a motor vehicle for failure
- 9 to comply with traffic-control signal laws. Each county may
- 10 provide for the procurement, location, installation, operation,
- 11 maintenance, and repair of the photo red light imaging detector
- 12 system within the program. Where the photo red light imaging
- 13 detector system affects state property, the department shall
- 14 cooperate with and assist the county as needed to install,
- 15 maintain, and repair the photo red light imaging detector system
- 16 established pursuant to this Act.
- 17 SECTION 5. Photo red light imaging detector system
- 18 program; requirements. (a) Photo red light imaging detector
- 19 system program equipment shall be operated from a fixed pole,
- 20 post, or other fixed structure on a state or county highway.

- 1 (b) Signs and other official traffic-control devices
- 2 indicating that traffic-signal laws are enforced by a photo red
- 3 light imaging detector system shall be posted on all major
- 4 routes entering the area where the system is in operation to
- 5 provide, as far as practicable, notice to drivers of the
- 6 existence and operation of the system.
- 7 (c) Proof of a traffic-control signal violation shall be as
- 8 evidenced by information obtained from the photo red light
- 9 imaging detector system authorized pursuant to this Act. A
- 10 certificate, sworn to or affirmed by the county's agent or
- 11 employee, or a facsimile thereof, based upon inspection of
- 12 photographs, microphotographs, videotape, or other recorded
- 13 images produced by the system, shall be prima facie evidence of
- 14 the facts contained therein. Any photographs, microphotographs,
- 15 videotape, or other recorded images evidencing a violation shall
- 16 be available for inspection in any proceeding to adjudicate the
- 17 liability for that violation.
- 18 (d) No summons or citation issued pursuant to the photo
- 19 red light imaging detector system program shall be issued unless
- 20 it contains a clear and unobstructed photographic, digital, or
- 21 other visual image of the driver of the motor vehicle.

- 1 (e) This section shall not apply to information gathered
- 2 for highway safety research or to issue warning citations not
- 3 involving a fine, court appearance, or a person's driving
- 4 record.
- 5 SECTION 6. Summons or citations; form and content;
- 6 issuance. (a) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary,
- 7 whenever any motor vehicle operator is determined to have
- 8 disregarded a steady red traffic-control signal in violation of
- 9 section 291C-32(a)(3), Hawaii Revised Statutes, by a photo red
- 10 light imaging detector system, a county police officer shall
- 11 issue or send a summons or citation, as described in this
- 12 section, to the registered owner of the motor vehicle at the
- 13 address on record at the vehicle licensing division, by
- 14 certified or registered mail with a return receipt that is
- 15 postmarked within seventy-two hours of the time of the incident.
- 16 If the end of the seventy-two-hour period falls on a Saturday,
- 17 Sunday, or holiday, then the end of the period shall run until
- 18 the end of the next day that is not a Saturday, Sunday, or
- 19 holiday.
- (b) The form and content of the summons or citation shall
- 21 be as adopted or prescribed by the administrative judge of the

- 1 district courts and shall be printed on a form identical with
- 2 the form of other summonses or citations used in modern methods
- 3 of arrest, so designed to include all necessary information to
- 4 make the summons or citation valid within the laws of the State;
- 5 provided that any summons or citation pursuant to the photo red
- 6 light imaging detector system program shall contain a clear and
- 7 unobstructed photographic, digital, or other visual image of the
- 8 driver of the motor vehicle that is to be used as evidence of
- 9 the violation.
- 10 (c) Every citation shall be consecutively numbered and
- 11 each copy thereof shall bear the number of its respective
- 12 original.
- (d) Upon receipt of the summons or citation, the
- 14 registered owner shall respond as provided for in chapter 291D,
- 15 Hawaii Revised Statutes. A mail receipt signed by the
- 16 registered owner is prima facie evidence of notification. The
- 17 registered owner shall be determined by the identification of
- 18 the vehicle's registration plates.
- (e) The county, or the county's agent or employee, shall
- 20 be available to testify as to the authenticity of the

- 1 information relating to the traffic-control signal violation
- 2 that is provided pursuant to this section.
- 3 SECTION 7. Summons or citation; evidence of violation. In
- 4 any proceeding for a violation of this Act, the information
- 5 contained in the summons or citation mailed in accordance with
- 6 section 6 shall be deemed evidence that the registered motor
- 7 vehicle was operated in violation of section 291C-32(a)(3),
- 8 Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- 9 SECTION 8. Prima facie evidence of registered owner's
- 10 responsibility. (a) Whenever the photo red light imaging
- 11 detector system determines a motor vehicle to have been operated
- 12 in violation of section 291C-32(a)(3), Hawaii Revised Statutes,
- 13 evidence that the motor vehicle described in the citation or
- 14 summons issued pursuant to this Act was operated in violation of
- 15 that section, together with proof that the person to whom the
- 16 summons or citation was sent was the registered owner of the
- 17 motor vehicle at the time of the violation, shall constitute
- 18 prima facie evidence that the registered owner of the motor
- 19 vehicle was the person who committed the violation.
- 20 (b) The registered owner of the motor vehicle may rebut
- 21 the evidence in subsection (a) by:

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1	(1)	Submitting a written statement as provided in section
2		291D-6(b)(2), Hawaii Revised Statutes;
3	(2)	Testifying in open court under oath that the
4		registered owner was not the person operating the
5		motor vehicle at the time of the alleged violation;
6	(3)	Calling witnesses to testify in open court under oath
7		that the registered owner was not the person operating
8		the motor vehicle at the time of the alleged
9		violation;
10	(4)	Submitting extrinsic evidence that the registered
11		owner was not the person operating the motor vehicle
12		at the time of the alleged violation; or
13	(5)	Presenting to the court adjudicating the alleged
14		violation, prior to the return date established on the
15		citation or summons issued pursuant to this Act, a
16		letter of verification of loss from the police
17		department indicating the motor vehicle had been
18		reported stolen.
19	SECT	TION 9. Failure to comply with summons or citation;
20	rebuttal	of identification of operator. (a) If the registered
21	owner of	the motor vehicle does not return an answer in response



- 1 to a summons or citation within a period of thirty days upon
- 2 receipt of the summons or citation, the district court shall
- 3 issue, pursuant to section 291D-7(e), Hawaii Revised Statutes, a
- 4 notice of entry of default judgment to the registered owner of
- 5 the vehicle, except if the registered owner rebuts the
- 6 identification of the operator of the vehicle.
- 7 (b) The registered owner shall be given an opportunity by
- 8 the district court to rebut the identification of the operator
- 9 of the motor vehicle as provided in section 8(b).
- 10 SECTION 10. Liability for rental or U-drive motor vehicle.
- 11 Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, if the registered owner
- 12 of record is the lessor of a rental or U-drive motor vehicle, as
- 13 defined in section 286-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, pursuant to a
- 14 written lease agreement, the lessee at the time of the violation
- 15 shall be responsible for the summons or citation; provided:
- 16 (1) The lessor shall be responsible for the summons or
- 17 citation if the lessor does not provide the court
- having jurisdiction over the summons or citation with
- the name and address of the lessee within thirty days
- after a notice containing the date, time, and location

1	of the violation and the license number of the motor
2	vehicle is sent to the lessor; and
3	(2) The administrative judge of the court having
4	jurisdiction over the summons or citation may waive
5	the requirement of providing the name and address of
6	the lessee and impose on the lessor an administrative
7	fee of \$50 per citation.
8	SECTION 11. Penalty. The penalties for all consequences
9	of a violation for disregarding a steady red traffic-control
10	signal initiated by the use of a photo red light imaging
11	detector system shall be as provided in section 291C-161, Hawai:
12	Revised Statutes.
13	SECTION 12. Fines for unauthorized disclosure. (a) The
14	information obtained by a photo red light imaging detector
15	system, and any other information arising therefrom, shall be
16	kept confidential and used exclusively for purposes of law
17	enforcement, including highway safety research, and court
18	proceedings.
19	(b) Any officer, employee, or agent of a county who
20	intentionally discloses or provides a copy of personal and
21	confidential information obtained from a photo red light imaging

- 1 detector system to any person or agency, with actual knowledge
- 2 that disclosure is prohibited by this Act or any other law,
- 3 shall be fined up to \$1,000; provided that the fine shall not
- 4 preclude the application of penalties or fines otherwise
- 5 provided for by law.
- 6 SECTION 13. Photo red light imaging detector system
- 7 program; revenue from fines. Revenue derived from fines
- 8 pursuant to this Act shall be deposited into the general fund.
- 9 SECTION 14. Rules. The department shall adopt rules
- 10 pursuant to chapter 91, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as may be
- 11 necessary to implement this Act.
- 12 SECTION 15. Vendor. The pilot photo red light imaging
- 13 detector system program shall be administered by a nonprofit
- 14 organization that is organized and operated in accordance with
- 15 section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as
- 16 amended.
- 17 PART III
- 18 SECTION 16. Section 249-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 19 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
- 20 "(b) Upon an original registration the director of finance
- 21 shall fix, and shall charge to the owner, a fee equal to the

- 1 cost of the number plate and tag or emblem plus the
- 2 administrative cost of furnishing the plate and tag or emblem
- 3 and effecting the registration. Upon the issuance of a new
- 4 series of number plates as determined by the directors of
- 5 finance of each county through majority consent, the director of
- 6 finance shall charge the owner a fee equal to the costs of the
- 7 number plate plus the administrative cost of furnishing the
- 8 plates. Upon issuing a tag or emblem, the director of finance
- 9 shall charge the owner a fee of 50 cents. The owner shall
- 10 securely fasten the number plates on the vehicle $[\tau]$ or
- 11 motorcycle, one on the front and the other on the rear, at a
- 12 location provided by the manufacturer or in the absence of such
- 13 a location upon the bumpers of the vehicle and in conformance
- 14 with section 291-31, in such a manner as to prevent the plates
- 15 from swinging. Number plates shall at all times be displayed
- 16 entirely unobscured and be kept reasonably clean. In the case
- of trailers[-] and semitrailers[-, or motorcycles], one plate
- 18 shall be used and it shall be fastened to the rear thereof at a
- 19 location provided by the manufacturer or in the absence of such
- 20 a location at the rear thereof, and in the case of motorcycles
- 21 in conformance with section 291-31."

1	SECTION 17. Section 2910-32, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
3	"(a) Whenever traffic is controlled by traffic-control
4	signals exhibiting different colored lights, or colored lighted
5	arrows, successively one at a time or in combination, only the
6	colors green, red, and yellow shall be used, except for special
7	pedestrian signals carrying a word or symbol legend, and the
8	lights shall indicate and apply to drivers of vehicles and
9	pedestrians as follows:
10	(1) Green indication:
11	(A) Vehicular traffic facing a circular green signal
12	may proceed straight through or turn right or
13	left unless a sign at the place prohibits either
14	[such] turn. But vehicular traffic, including
.15	vehicles turning right or left, shall yield the
16	right-of-way to other vehicles and to pedestrians
17	lawfully within the intersection or an adjacent
18	crosswalk at the time [such] the signal is
19	exhibited[+];

(B) Vehicular traffic facing a green arrow signal,

shown alone or in combination with another

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1			indicacion, may cauciously enter the intersection
2			only to make the movement indicated by [such] the
3			arrow, or [such] other movement as is permitted
4			by other indications shown at the same time.
5			[Such vehicular] Vehicular traffic shall yield
6			the right-of-way to pedestrians lawfully within
7			an adjacent crosswalk and to other traffic

9		(C)	Unless otherwise directed by a pedestrian-control
10			signal, as provided in section 291C-33,
11			pedestrians facing any green signal, except when
12			the sole green signal is a turn arrow, may
13			proceed across the roadway within any marked or
14			unmarked crosswalk[-];
15	(2)	Stea	dy yellow indication:
16		(A)	Vehicular traffic facing a steady yellow signal
17			is thereby warned that the related green movement
18			is being terminated or that a red indication will
19			be exhibited immediately thereafter when
20			vehicular traffic shall not enter the
21			intersection[-]; provided that the length of the

1			steady yellow indication shall be sufficient to
2			allow any truck to pass through the intersection
3			in a reasonable amount of time before a steady
4			red indication commences; and
5		(B)	Pedestrians facing a steady yellow signal, unless
6			otherwise directed by a pedestrian-control signal
7			as provided in section 291C-33, are thereby
8			advised that there is insufficient time to cross
9			the roadway before a red indication is shown and
10			no pedestrian shall then start to cross the

12	(3)	Stea	dy red indication:
13		(A)	Vehicular traffic facing a steady red signal
14			alone shall stop at a clearly marked stop line,
15			but if none, before entering the crosswalk on the
16			near side of the intersection or, if none, then
17			before entering the intersection and shall remain
18			standing until an indication to proceed is shown,
19			except as provided in the next succeeding
20			paragraphs[-]; provided that the steady red
21			indication shall not commence until any truck has

1		had sufficient time to pass through the
2		intersection on a steady yellow indication;
3	(B)	The driver of a vehicle [which] that is stopped
4		in obedience to a steady red indication may make
5		a right turn but shall yield the right-of-way to
6		pedestrians and other traffic proceeding as
7		directed by the signal at [said] the
8		intersection, except that counties by ordinance
9		may prohibit [any such] a right turn against a
10		steady red indication, which ordinance shall be
11		effective when a sign is erected at [such] the
12		intersection giving notice thereof [-];
13	(C)	The driver of a vehicle on a one-way street
14		[which] intersects another one-way street on
15		which traffic moves to the left shall stop in
16		obedience to a steady red indication but may ther
17		make a left turn into [said] the one-way street,
18		but shall yield right-of-way to pedestrians,
19		proceeding as directed by the signal at [said]
20		the intersection except that counties by
21		ordinance may prohibit any [such] left turn as

1	above described which ordinance shall be
2	effective when a sign is erected at [such] the
3	intersection giving notice thereof $[\div]$; and
4	(D) Unless otherwise directed by a pedestrian-control
5	signal as provided in section 291C-33,
6	pedestrians facing a steady red signal alone
7	shall not enter the roadway."
8	SECTION 18. Section 291C-161, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9	amended to read as follows:
10	"§291C-161 Penalties[-]; photo red light imaging detector
11	system fine. (a) It is a violation for any person to violate
12	any of the provisions of this chapter, except as otherwise
13	specified in subsections (c) and (d) and unless the violation is
14	by other law of this State declared to be a felony, misdemeanor,
15	or petty misdemeanor.
16	(b) Except as provided in subsections (c) and (d), every
17	person who is determined to have violated any provision of this
18	chapter for which another penalty is not provided shall be
19	fined:
20	(1) Not more than \$200 for a first violation thereof;

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1	(2)	Not more than \$500 for a second vioration committed
2		within one year after the date of the first violation;
3		and
4	(3)	Not more than \$500 for a third or subsequent violation
5		committed within one year after the date of the first
6		violation.
7	(c)	$[\underline{\mathtt{Every}}]$ $\underline{\mathtt{A}}$ person convicted under or found in violation
8	of section	n 291C-12, 291C-12.5, 291C-12.6, 291C-13, 291C-14,

10	291C-104,	or 291C-105 shall be sentenced or fined in accordance

12	(d)	$[\underline{\text{Every}}]$ $\underline{\text{A}}$ person who violates section 291C-13 or 291C-
13	18 shall:	
14	(1)	Be fined not more than \$200 or imprisoned not more
15		than ten days for a first conviction thereof;
16	(2)	Be fined not more than \$300 or imprisoned not more
17		than twenty days or both for conviction of a second
18		offense committed within one year after the date of
19		the first offense; and
20	(3)	Be fined not more than \$500 or imprisoned not more
21		than six months or both for conviction of a third or

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1	subsequent offense committed within one year after the
2	date of the first offense.
3	(e) The court may assess a sum not to exceed \$50 for the
4	cost of issuing a penal summons upon any person who fails to
5	appear at the place within the time specified in the citation
6	issued to the person for any traffic violation.
7	(f) The court may require a person who violates any of the
8	provisions of this chapter to attend a course of instruction in
9	driver retraining as deemed appropriate by the court, in
10	addition to any other penalties imposed.
11	(g) Fines collected for violations of section
12	291C-32(a)(3) pursuant to the photo red light imaging detector
13	system program established pursuant to Act , Session Laws of
14	Hawaii 2015, shall be deposited into the general fund."
15	SECTION 19. Section 291C-163, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
