A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO UNDERGROUND STORAGE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that underground storage 2 tank and tank system regulations are intended to protect the 3 environment by preventing the release of petroleum and hazardous 4 substances into the environment. According to the Environmental 5 Protection Agency, field-constructed underground storage tanks 6 and tank systems pose a substantial threat to human health and 7 the environment.

8 The legislature further finds that the Red Hill bulk fuel 9 storage facility, the State's largest field-constructed 10 underground storage tank system, stores more fuel in a single 11 location than any other underground storage tank in Hawaii. The 12 facility stores up to 187,000,000 gallons of fuel per day and is 13 located only one hundred feet above a primary drinking water 14 source. However, chapter 11-281, Hawaii Administrative Rules, 15 exempts field-constructed underground storage tanks and tank 16 systems, including the Red Hill bulk fuel storage facility, from 17 the requirements that must be met by other owners and operators



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1 of underground storage tanks or tank systems. Providing the
2 State's largest field-constructed underground storage tank with
3 an exemption from regulatory requirements that must be met by
4 other underground storage tank and tank system owners is
5 extremely detrimental to human health and the environment.

6 The purpose of this Act is to protect the State's 7 underground drinking water sources and surrounding environment 8 by requiring the department of health to establish rules that 9 require field-constructed underground storage tanks or tank 10 systems to meet the same requirements that must be met by all 11 other owners and operators of underground storage tanks or tank 12 systems under chapter 11-281, Hawaii Administrative Rules.

SECTION 2. The department of health shall adopt rules 13 14 pursuant to chapter 91, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to require that 15 all field-constructed underground storage tanks and tank systems 16 currently exempt under chapter 11-281, Hawaii Administrative 17 Rules, meet all the requirements that must be met by all other 18 owners and operators of underground storage tanks and tank 19 systems under chapter 11-281, Hawaii Administrative Rules, 20 including but not limited to the following requirements:



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(1) Field-constructed underground storage tanks and tank 1 2 systems with capacity less than or equal to 50,000 gallons shall be monitored using release detection 3 methods authorized in chapter 11-281, Hawaii 4 5 Administrative Rules; Field-constructed underground storage tanks and tank 6 (2)7 systems with capacity greater than 50,000 gallons 8 shall be monitored using release detection methods 9 authorized in chapter 11-281, Hawaii Administrative Rules, or one of the following release detection 10 11 alternatives: Daily bulk tank tightness test to detect a 0.5 12 (A) gallon per hour leak rate; 13 14 (B) If using an automatic tank gauging system to perform release detection, which can detect a 15 16 leak rate of one gallon per hour or less. At 17 least weekly, this method shall be used in 18 combination with a bulk tank tightness test that 19 can detect a 0.2 gallon per hour leak rate; and 20 If using an automatic tank gauging system to (C) 21 perform release detection, which can detect a



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1		leak rate of two gallons per hour or less. At
2		least daily, this method shall be used in
3		combination with a bulk tank tightness test that
4		can detect a 0.2 gallon per hour leak rate;
5	(3)	Bulk tank tightness testing shall be capable of
6		detecting at least 95 per cent of leak rates with less
7		than a 5 per cent probability of a false detection;
8	(4)	All recordkeeping requirements shall be in accordance
9		with chapter 11-281, Hawaii Administrative Rules;
10	(5)	New or replaced field-constructed underground storage
11		tanks or tank systems installed after July 1, 2015,
12		shall be secondarily contained and interstitial
13		monitored in accordance with title 40 Code of Federal
14		Regulations section 280.43(g);
15	(6)	Field-constructed underground storage tanks or tank
16		systems shall meet corrosion protection, spill, and
17		overfill requirements of chapter 11-281, Hawaii
18		Administrative Rules;
19	(7)	Field-constructed underground storage tanks or tank
20		systems installed on or before July 1, 2015, may be
21		constructed of metal and shall be cathodically



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1 protected according to a code of practice developed by a nationally recognized association or independent 2 3 testing laboratory and shall meet the following 4 criteria: 5 (A) Field-installed cathodic protection systems shall 6 be designed by a corrosion expert to allow for 7 the determination of current operating status for 8 impressed current systems and operated and 9 maintained in accordance with chapter 11-281, Hawaii Administrative Rules; 10 11 Field-constructed underground storage tanks or (B) 12 tank systems over ten years old without cathodic protection shall be assessed to ensure that the 13 14 tanks are structurally sound and free of 15 corrosion holes prior to adding cathodic protection. The assessment shall be by an 16 17 internal inspection or another method determined 18 by a nationally recognized corrosion association; 19 and 20 (C) Field-constructed underground storage tanks or 21 tank systems installed on or before July 1, 2015,



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that are not cathodically protected or do not 1 meet the release detection requirements shall be 2 secondarily contained and interstitial monitored 3 4 in accordance with title 40 Code of Federal 5 Regulations section 280.43(g); Field-constructed underground storage tanks or tank 6 (8) systems installed on or before July 1, 2015, shall be 7 8 upgraded by July 1, 2025, or shall be permanently 9 closed in accordance with chapter 11-281, Hawaii Administrative Rules; and internal linings shall not 10 meet the corrosion protection upgrade requirement; and 11 (9) Vapor monitoring and groundwater monitoring of field-12 constructed underground storage tanks, tank systems, 13 or piping shall not be used as methods of release 14 detection; and owners and operators of field-15 constructed underground storage tanks, tank systems 16 17 using vapor monitoring and groundwater monitoring as methods of release detection prior to July 1, 2015, 18 19 shall have five years to implement another release 20 detection monitoring method in accordance with title 40 Code of Federal Regulations part 280 subpart D. 21



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SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2015.
