A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LITERACY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii's children
- 2 and families benefit immensely from literacy programs. Most
- 3 importantly, literacy programs assist children with learning to
- 4 read. However, literacy programs also serve to bridge the gap
- 5 between home and school in Hawaii's communities by building
- 6 stronger family relationships, improving the academic tone
- 7 within homes, and changing family attitudes toward school.
- 8 The benefits of literacy programs are evident in the work
- 9 of existing nonprofits. Read Aloud America is a Hawaii
- 10 nonprofit that brings children and parents together in local
- 11 schools and motivates them to read. In addition to parents
- 12 increasing their own reading time, eighty-seven per cent of
- 13 parents who participated in the program report that their
- 14 children's voluntary reading time increased, and seventy-one per
- 15 cent report that their children spend less time with electronic
- 16 media. Teachers have also seen encouraging results and report
- 17 positive changes in student behavior, increased interest in

- 1 reading, and improved home to school relationships. Since 1999,
- 2 Read Aloud America has served eighty-nine Hawaii public schools
- 3 and over 328,989 adults and children. Another organization,
- 4 Read to Me International, is also committed to improving child
- 5 literacy. Active on the islands of Oahu, Hawaii, Molokai, and
- 6 Kauai, the nonprofit collaborates with community volunteers to
- 7 educate families about the importance of reading aloud to
- 8 children and raising children who value reading.
- 9 The legislature further finds that child literacy programs
- 10 have previously been supported by funds from the department of
- 11 human services. Currently, valuable literacy programs such as
- 12 Read Aloud America and Read to Me International are suffering
- 13 from a lack of state funding. The governor's council for
- 14 literacy was established in 1987 to work toward a literate
- 15 Hawaii, and Hawaii families continue to need education and
- 16 resources to help children learn to read and families become
- 17 more engaged in their local schools and community.
- 18 The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds to the
- 19 department of human services to establish a statewide literacy
- 20 program. Utilizing existing programs and nonprofits to provide
- 21 direct services to Hawaii's families, the department of human

- 1 services will administer a literacy program that supports a
- 2 bright future for Hawaii's children and families.
- 3 SECTION 2. Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 4 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 5 and to read as follows:
- 6 "\$346- Statewide literacy program. (a) There shall be
- 7 established within the department a statewide literacy program
- 8 to help increase Hawaii's literacy rates and benefit Hawaii's
- 9 children and families. The department shall administer the
- 10 literacy program.
- 11 (b) The department may contract with third-party
- 12 organizations and nonprofit organizations to assist with
- 13 carrying out the literacy program."
- 14 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 15 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 16 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and
- 17 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 18 year 2016-2017 for the department of human services to establish
- 19 a statewide literacy program, including all program costs and
- 20 hiring of any necessary staff.
