# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

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1	SECTION 1. The Children's Advocacy Centers of Illinois,
2	Illinois Coalition Against Sexual Assault, and Prevent Child
3	Abuse Illinois collaborated to create "Erin's Law". Erin Merryn
4	was raped and molested for six and a half years by a neighbor
5	and a family member. Erin began a crusade her senior year of
6	high school in 2004 to end the silence and shame around sexual
7	abuse. Erin's Law has been passed in twenty-six states with
8	more than seventeen states introducing it. Erin's mission is to
9	shatter the silence and stigma around sexual abuse, and to
10	educate children and empower them to recognize and to report
11	abuse.
12	The legislature finds that schools fail to give young
13	students awareness and a voice if someone is violating them.
14	Unfortunately, without being educated most children will be
15	repeatedly abused for years because often the only message they
16	get comes from their abuser threatening them into silence.
17	The purpose of this Act is to form a task force to guide

the establishment of a program to educate public school students

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- 1 on sexual abuse prevention through use of age appropriate
- 2 curricula; provide relevant training to school teachers and
- 3 staff; and inform parents about important child sexual abuse
- 4 topics.
- 5 SECTION 2. (a) There is established the Erin's Law task
- 6 force to be convened by the legislature to review current
- 7 policies, programs, and curricula for educating students in the
- 8 public school system about sexual abuse prevention, and to make
- 9 a report of recommendations for the establishment of a program
- 10 to educate all children in grades pre-kindergarten through
- 11 twelve in public schools on sexual abuse prevention through age
- 12 appropriate curricula.
- 13 (b) The task force shall comprise:
- 14 (1) A deputy superintendent of the department of
- 15 education, to be designated by the superintendent, who
- shall serve as the chair of the task force;
- 17 (2) The director of health, or the director's designee;
- 18 (3) The director of human services, or the director's
- 19 designee;
- 20 (4) The attorney general, or the attorney general's
- 21 designee;

1	(5)	The executive director of the hawair fouth betvices
2		Network, or the director's designee;
3	(6)	The executive director of the Sex Abuse Treatment
4		Center, or the director's designee;
5	(7)	A member of the keiki caucus of the legislature, to be
6		designated by the caucus;
7	(8)	A member of the board of education to be designated by
8		the chair of the board; and
9	(9)	The executive director of the Hawaii state charter
0		school commission, or the executive director's
[1		designee.
12	(c)	The department of education may expand the task force
13	to includ	e members of community organizations involved in
14	providing	direct services addressing sexual abuse in elementary,
15	middle, i	ntermediate, and high school aged children and youth in
16	Hawaii.	
17	(d)	Members of the task force shall serve without
18	compensat	ion. No member shall be made subject to chapter 84,
19	Hawaii Re	vised Statutes, solely because of that member's
20	narticina	tion as a member of the task force

1	(e)	An initial meeting of the task force shall be held no
2	later tha	n August 12, 2016.
3	(f)	The task force shall consider the following guidelines
4	when revi	ewing current policies, programs, and curricula, and
5	making re	commendations for the establishment of a program which
6	shall:	
7	(1)	Educate children in grades pre-kindergarten through
8		twelve in public schools on sexual abuse prevention
9		through age appropriate curriculum through role plays,
10		discussions, activities, and books;
11	(2)	Give children the tools to speak up and tell if anyone
12		has ever touched them inappropriately rather than keep
13		it a secret; and
14	(3)	Educate children on safe touch, unsafe touch, safe
15		secrets, and unsafe secrets, how to get away and
16		report an incident immediately.
17	(g)	The task force shall consider the following concepts
18	when revi	ewing current policies, programs, and curricula and

making recommendations for the establishment of a program:

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1	(1)	Curr	ent resources available in the State for educating
2		stud	ents in the public school system about sexual
3		abus	e prevention;
4	(2)	Exis	ting gaps in child sexual abuse prevention
5		educ	ation, including education, training, and
6		info	rmation, as needed, for students, school teachers
7		and	staff, and parents and guardians;
8	(3)	The 1	Hawaii content and performance standards;
9	(4)	Requ	ired elements for an instructional program for
10		stud	ents in grades pre-kindergarten through twelve,
11		incl	uding but not limited to:
12		(A)	Techniques to teach children to recognize sexual
13			abuse, equip them with skills to reduce their
14			vulnerability, and encourage them to report the
15			abuse;
16		(B)	At least four sessions of instruction to
17			reinforce the concepts learned in the program;
18		(C)	Sessions conducted annually, building on skills
19			and knowledge learned in previous years;
20		(D)	Developmentally appropriate instruction for each
21			grade level;

1	(E)	involvement of students as active learning
2		participants, through such methods as discussion,
3		modeling, and role playing;
4	(F)	Capacity to be delivered by a range of personnel
5		and professionals, including but not limited to
6		teachers, school counselors, and outside agency
7		prevention educators; provided that the personnel
8		and professionals should have a thorough
9		knowledge of child sexual abuse, including how to
10		respond appropriately to sexual abuse
11		disclosures;
12	(G)	An evaluation component with measurable outcomes;
13	(H)	Instruction that is culturally sensitive and
14		adaptable for use within varying school contexts,
15		including age, race, and special needs;
16	(I)	The use of evidence-based, age appropriate
17		curricula that uses discussions, role plays,
18		activities, books, or other appropriate
19		educational materials and methods;
20	(J)	A professional training component for
21		administrators, teachers, and other school

1		personnel on talking to students about child
2		sexual abuse prevention, effects of child sexual
3		abuse on children, handling of sexual abuse
4		disclosures, and mandated reporting; and
5	(	K) A component that encourages parental or guardian
6		involvement within the child sexual abuse
7		program, which should inform parents or guardians
8		about child sexual abuse topics, including
9		discussion of child sexual abuse myths,
10		characteristics of offenders, grooming behaviors,
11		and how to discuss this topic with children;
12	(5) T	litle IX and any other federal and state laws and
13	Ē	oolicies concerning public school systems' handling of
14	S	sexual violence issues, to the extent that they relate
15	t	o sexual abuse prevention education;
16	(6) F	Resources needed to implement a system wide program
17	f	for child sexual abuse prevention education; and
18	(7) U	Opdates to laws or policies that would assist in the
19	i	mplementation of a statewide program for child sexual
20	ā	abuse prevention education.

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- 1 (h) The task force shall submit a report of its findings
- 2 and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the
- 3 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
- 4 the regular session of 2017. The task force shall also submit
- 5 its report directly to the chairs of the senate committee on
- 6 education, house of representatives committee on education,
- 7 senate committee on human services, and house of representatives
- 8 committee on human services.
- 9 (i) The department of education shall implement the
- 10 recommendations of the task force in the 2017-2018 school year;
- 11 provided that if the department of education determines that
- 12 implementation is not possible in the 2017-2018 school year, the
- 13 department of education shall immediately notify the chairs of
- 14 the senate committee on education, house of representatives
- 15 committee on education, senate committee on human services, and
- 16 house of representatives committee on human services.
- 17 (j) The task force shall cease to exist on June 30, 2018.
- 18 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 19 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 20 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 for
- 21 the operation of the Erin's Law task force.

- 1 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the legislature
- 2 for the purposes of this Act.
- 3 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2016.

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#### Report Title:

Education; Sexual Abuse Prevention; Erin's Law Task Force; Appropriation

#### Description:

Creates and appropriates funds for the Erin's Law task force to guide the establishment of a program to educate public school students on sexual abuse prevention through use of age appropriate curricula; provide relevant training to school teachers and staff; and inform parents about important child sexual abuse topics. Sets out guidelines of instruction. Modeled after Erin's Law. (SD1)

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
