A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The Children's Advocacy Centers of Illinois,
2	Illinois Coalition Against Sexual Assault, and Prevent Child
3	Abuse Illinois collaborated to create "Erin's Law". Erin Merryn
4	was raped and molested for six and a half years by a neighbor
5	and a family member. Erin began a crusade her senior year of
6	high school in 2004 to end the silence and shame around sexual
7	abuse. Erin's Law has been passed in twenty-six states with
8	more than seventeen states introducing it. Erin's mission is to
9	shatter the silence and stigma around sexual abuse, and to
10	educate children and empower them to recognize and to report
11	abuse.
12	The legislature finds that schools fail to give young

students awareness and a voice if someone is violating them.

Unfortunately, without being educated most children will be
repeatedly abused for years because often the only message they
get comes from their abuser threatening them into silence.

The purpose of this Act is to form a task force to guide
the establishment of a program to educate public school students
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- 1 on sexual abuse prevention through use of age appropriate
- 2 curricula; provide relevant training to school teachers and
- 3 staff; and inform parents about important child sexual abuse
- 4 topics.
- 5 SECTION 2. (a) There is established the Erin's Law task
- 6 force to be convened by the legislature to review current
- 7 policies, programs, and curricula for educating students in the
- 8 public school system about sexual abuse prevention, and to make
- 9 a report of recommendations for the establishment of a program
- 10 to educate all children in grades pre-kindergarten through
- 11 twelve in public schools on sexual abuse prevention through age
- 12 appropriate curricula.
- 13 (b) The task force shall comprise:
- 14 (1) A deputy superintendent of the department of
- 15 education, who shall serve as the chair of the task
- force, to be designated by the superintendent of
- 17 education;
- 18 (2) The director of health, or the director's designee;
- 19 (3) The director of human services, or the director's
- 20 designee;

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1	(4)	The attorney general, or the attorney general's	
2		designee;	
3	(5)	The executive director of the Hawaii Youth Services	
4		Network, or the director's designee;	
5	(6)	The executive director of the Sex Abuse Treatment	
6		Center, or the director's designee;	
7	(7)	A member of the keiki caucus of the legislature, to be	
8		designated by the caucus;	
9	(8)	A member of the board of education to be designated by	
10		the chair of the board;	
11	(9)	The executive director of the Hawaii state charter	
12		school commission, or the executive director's	
13		designee; and	
14	(10)	The director of the executive office on early	
15		learning, or the director's designee.	
16	(c)	The department of education may expand the task force	
17	to include members of community organizations involved in		
18	providing	direct services addressing sexual abuse in elementary,	
19	middle, i	ntermediate, and high school aged children and youth in	
20	Hawaii.		

- 1 (d) Members of the task force shall serve without
- 2 compensation. No member shall be made subject to chapter 84,
- 3 Hawaii Revised Statutes, solely because of that member's
- 4 participation as a member of the task force.
- 5 (e) An initial meeting of the task force shall be held no
- 6 later than August 12, 2016.
- 7 (f) The task force shall review current policies,
- 8 programs, and curricula, and make recommendations for the
- 9 establishment of a program that:
- 10 (1) Educates children in grades pre-kindergarten through
- 11 twelve in public schools on sexual abuse prevention
- through age appropriate curriculum through role plays,
- discussions, activities, and books;
- 14 (2) Gives children the tools to speak up and tell if
- anyone has ever touched them inappropriately rather
- than keep it a secret; and
- 17 (3) Educates children on safe touch, unsafe touch, safe
- secrets, and unsafe secrets, how to get away, and
- reporting an incident immediately.
- 20 (g) The task force shall consider the following concepts
- 21 and resources when reviewing current policies, programs, and

2		grade level;
3	(E)	Involvement of students as active learning
4		participants, through methods such as discussion,
5		modeling, and role playing;
6	(F)	Capacity to be delivered by a range of personnel
7		and professionals, including but not limited to
8		teachers, school counselors, and outside agency
9		prevention educators; provided that the personnel
10		and professionals should have a thorough
11		knowledge of child sexual abuse, including how to
12		respond appropriately to sexual abuse
13		disclosures;
14	(G)	An evaluation component with measurable outcomes;
15	(H)	Instruction that is culturally sensitive and
16		adaptable for use within varying school contexts,
17		including age, race, and special needs;
18	(I)	The use of evidence-based, age appropriate
19		curricula that uses discussions, role plays,
20		activities, books, or other appropriate
21		educational materials and methods;

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1		(J) A professional training component for
2		administrators, teachers, and other school
3		personnel on talking to students about child
4		sexual abuse prevention, effects of child sexual
5		abuse on children, handling of sexual abuse
6		disclosures, and mandated reporting; and
7		(K) A component that encourages parental or guardian
8		involvement within the child sexual abuse
9		program, which should inform parents or guardians
10		about child sexual abuse topics, including
11		discussion of child sexual abuse myths,
12		characteristics of offenders, grooming behaviors,
13		and how to discuss this topic with children;
14	(5)	Title IX and any other federal and state laws and
15		policies concerning public school systems' handling of
16		sexual violence issues, to the extent that they relate
17		to sexual abuse prevention education;
18	(6)	Resources needed to implement a system wide program
19		for child sexual abuse prevention education; and

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- Updates to laws or policies that would assist in the
 implementation of a statewide program for child sexual
 abuse prevention education.
- 4 (h) The task force shall submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the 5 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 6 the regular session of 2017. The task force shall also submit 7 8 its report directly to the chairs of the senate committee with 9 primary jurisdiction over education, house of representatives 10 committee with primary jurisdiction over education, senate 11 committee with primary jurisdiction over human services, and house of representatives committee with primary jurisdiction 12 13 over human services.
 - (i) The department of education shall implement the recommendations of the task force in the 2017-2018 school year; provided that if the department of education determines that implementation is not possible in the 2017-2018 school year, the department of education shall immediately notify the chairs of the senate committee with primary jurisdiction over education, house of representatives committee with primary jurisdiction over education, senate committee with primary jurisdiction over

- 1 human services, and house of representatives committee with
- 2 primary jurisdiction over human services.
- 3 (j) The task force shall cease to exist on June 30, 2018.
- 4 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 5 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 6 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 for
- 7 the operation of the Erin's Law task force.
- 8 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the legislature
- 9 for the purposes of this Act.
- 10 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on January 7, 2059.

Creates and appropriates funds for the Erin's Law task force to guide the establishment of a program to educate public school students on sexual abuse prevention through use of age appropriate curricula; provide relevant training to school teachers and staff; and inform parents about important child sexual abuse topics. Sets out guidelines of instruction.

Modeled after Erin's Law. Takes effect on 1/7/2059. (SD2)
