A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO RESTITUTION FOR VICTIMS OF CRIME.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Due to the recent holding in State v. DeMello,
- 2 310 P.3d 1033 (Haw. Ct. App. 2013), which denied restitution for
- 3 a crime victim's wage loss on the basis that "[t]here is no
- 4 explicit provision in HRS § 706-646 for the award of lost wages
- 5 as part of restitution", the legislature finds that crime
- 6 victims who miss work due to injuries or impairment suffered as
- 7 a result of a defendant's offense are currently being denied
- 8 restitution for those lost earnings. Similarly, based on the
- 9 DeMello analysis and holding, it appears that courts would
- 10 similarly deny "therapy" expenses.
- 11 The legislature further finds that the additional language
- 12 in this Act will clarify that the intent of section 706-646,
- 13 Hawaii Revised Statutes, is to reimburse crime victims fully for
- 14 all reasonable and verified losses resulting from a defendant's
- 15 offense. Nevertheless, as signaled by the use of the phrase,
- 16 "including but not limited to", the losses enumerated in
- 17 subsection (3) of section 706-646, Hawaii Revised Statutes, are



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- 1 intended to be illustrative, not exhaustive, for purposes of 2 restitution. 3 SECTION 2. Section 706-646, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (3) to read as follows: 4 5 In ordering restitution, the court shall not consider "(3) 6 the defendant's financial ability to make restitution in 7 determining the amount of restitution to order. The court, however, shall consider the defendant's financial ability to 8 9 make restitution for the purpose of establishing the time and **10** manner of payment. The court shall specify the time and manner in which restitution is to be paid [-]; provided that while the 11 defendant is in the custody of the director of public safety, 12 restitution payments shall be as set forth in section 353-22.6. 13 14 Restitution shall be a dollar amount that is sufficient to reimburse any victim fully for losses, including but not limited 15 16 to:
- 17 (a) Full value of stolen or damaged property, as

 18 determined by replacement costs of like property, or

 19 the actual or estimated cost of repair, if repair is

 20 possible;

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1	(b)	Medical expenses[; and], which include mental health
2	•	treatment, counseling, and therapy;
3	(c)	Funeral and burial expenses [incurred as a result of
4		the crime.]; and
5	<u>(d)</u>	Lost earnings, which include paid leave."
6	SECT	TION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
7	matured,	penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
8	begun before its effective date.	
9	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed	
10	and stric	ken. New statutory material is underscored.

SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on March 15, 2038.
