#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TELEHEALTH.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that telehealth has
2	allowed states to implement innovative health policy reforms
3	that achieve significant cost savings and improve health
4	outcomes. There are many opportunities for improving health
5	care access in Hawaii through the use of telehealth, especially
6	in areas of the State faced with a shortage of health care
7	providers.
8	However, the legislature further finds that restrictions on
9	telehealth, such as geographical limitations on service,
10	limitations on patient setting, and restrictions on applicable
11	technology, act as barriers that prevent health care providers
12	and patients from realizing the full benefits of telehealth.
13	Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to enhance access
14	to care via telehealth by:
15	(1) Requiring the State's medicaid managed care and fee-
16	for-service programs to cover services provided
17	through telehealth;

T	(2)	specifying that any telenealth services provided shall
2		be consistent with all federal and state privacy,
3		security, and confidentiality laws;
4	(3)	Specifying medical professional liability insurance
5		policy requirements with regard to telehealth
6		coverage;
7	(4)	Clarifying that reimbursement for services provided
8		through telehealth shall be equivalent to
9		reimbursement for the same services provided via face-
10		to-face contact between a health care provider and a
11		patient;
12	(5)	Requiring written disclosure of coverages and benefits
13		associated with telehealth services;
14	(6)	Ensuring that telehealth encompasses store and forward
15		technologies, remote monitoring, live consultation,
16		and mobile health;
<b>17</b>	(7)	Ensuring that telehealth is covered when originating
18		in a patient's home and other non-medical
19		environments;

1	(8)	Clarifying requirements for physicians and out-of-	
2		state physicians to establish a physician-patient	
3		relationship via telehealth;	
4	(9)	Ensuring that reimbursement requirements for	
5		telehealth services apply to all health benefits plans

- 17 "Distant site" means the location of the health care
- 18 provider delivering services through telehealth at the time the
- 19 services are provided.
- 20 "Health care provider" means a provider of services, as

- 21 store and forward technologies, remote monitoring, live



- 1 consultation, and mobile health; and which shall include but not
- 2 be limited to real-time video conferencing-based communication,
- 3 secure interactive and non-interactive web-based communication,
- 4 and secure asynchronous information exchange, to transmit
- 5 patient medical information, including diagnostic-quality
- 6 digital images and laboratory results for medical interpretation
- 7 and diagnosis, for the purpose of delivering enhanced health
- 8 care services and information while a patient is at an
- 9 originating site and the health care provider is at a distant
- 10 site. Standard telephone contacts, facsimile transmissions, or
- 11 e-mail text, in combination or by itself, does not constitute a
- 12 telehealth service for the purposes of this section."
- 13 SECTION 3. Chapter 457, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 14 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 15 and to read as follows:
- 16 "\$457- Telehealth; privacy, security, and
- 17 confidentiality. Services relating to the practice of nursing
- 18 provided by telehealth pursuant to this chapter shall be
- 19 consistent with all federal and state privacy, security, and
- 20 confidentiality laws."

1 SECTION 4. Chapter 671, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 3 and to read as follows: 4 "§671- Professional liability insurance; coverage for 5 telehealth. (a) Every insurer providing professional liability 6 insurance for a health care provider shall ensure that every 7 policy that is issued, amended, or renewed in this State on or 8 after the effective date of Act , Session Laws of Hawaii 9 2016, shall provide malpractice coverage for telehealth that shall be equivalent to coverage for the same services provided 10 11 via face-to-face contact between a health care provider and a 12 patient. 13 (b) No insurer providing professional liability insurance 14 policies shall require face-to-face contact between a health 15 care provider and a patient as a prerequisite for coverage of 16 services appropriately provided through telehealth in accordance 17 with generally accepted health care practices and standards 18 prevailing in the applicable professional community at the time 19 the services were provided. The coverage required in this 20 section may be subject to all terms and conditions of the policy 21 agreed upon between the health care provider and the insurer.

1 (c) For purposes of this section: 2 "Distant site" means the location of the health care 3 provider delivering services through telehealth at the time the 4 services are provided. 5 "Originating site" means the location where the patient is 6 located, whether accompanied or not by a health care provider, 7 at the time services are provided by a health care provider 8 through telehealth, including but not limited to a health care 9 provider's office, hospital, critical access hospital, rural 10 health clinic, federally qualified health center, a patient's 11 home, and other non-medical environments such as school-based 12 health centers, university-based health centers, or the work 13 location of a patient. "Telehealth" means the use of telecommunications services, 14 as defined in section 269-1, to encompass four modalities: 15 16 store and forward technologies, remote monitoring, live **17** consultation, and mobile health; and which shall include but not 18 be limited to real-time video conferencing-based communication, 19 secure interactive and non-interactive web-based communication, 20 and secure asynchronous information exchange, to transmit 21 patient medical information, including diagnostic-quality

- 2 and diagnosis, for the purpose of delivering enhanced health
- 3 care services and information while a patient is at an
- 4 originating site and the health care provider is at a distant
- 5 site. Standard telephone contacts, facsimile transmissions, or
- 6 e-mail text, in combination or by itself, does not constitute a
- 7 telehealth service for the purposes of this section."
- 8 SECTION 5. Section 209E-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 9 amended by amending the definition of "medical and health care
- 10 services" to read as follows:
- ""Medical and health care services" means medical
- 12 research[7] and clinical trials, [and telehealth7] but not
- 13 routine medical treatment or services."
- 14 SECTION 6. Section 431:10A-116.3, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
- 15 is amended to read as follows:

- 17 intent of the legislature to recognize the application of
- 18 telehealth as a reimbursable service by which an individual
- 19 shall receive medical services from a health care provider
- 20 without face-to-face contact with the health care provider.

1 (b) No accident and health or sickness insurance plan that 2 is issued, amended, or renewed shall require face-to-face 3 contact between a health care provider and a patient as a 4 prerequisite for payment for services appropriately provided 5 through telehealth in accordance with generally accepted health 6 care practices and standards prevailing in the applicable 7 professional community at the time the services were provided. 8 The coverage required in this section may be subject to all 9 terms and conditions of the plan agreed upon among the enrollee 10 or subscriber, the insurer, and the health care provider. 11 Reimbursement for services provided through telehealth **12** shall be equivalent to reimbursement for the same services 13 provided via face-to-face contact between a health care provider 14 and a patient. [There shall be no reimbursement for a 15 telehealth consultation between health care providers unless a 16 health care provider patient relationship exists between the 17 patient and one of the health care providers involved in the 18 telehealth interaction and the patient is accompanied by a treating health care provider at the time telehealth services 19 20 are provided by the consulting health care provider; provided 21 that when behavioral health services are provided, a second

The coverage required in 6 this section may be subject to all terms and conditions of the 7 plan agreed upon among the enrollee or subscriber, the mutual 8 benefit society, and the health care provider. 9 (c) Reimbursement for services provided through telehealth **10** shall be equivalent to reimbursement for the same services 11 provided via face-to-face contact between a health care provider 12 and a patient. [There shall be no reimbursement for a 13 telehealth consultation between health care providers unless a 14 health care provider patient relationship exists between the 15 patient and one of the health care providers involved in the 16 telehealth interaction and the patient is accompanied by a **17** treating health care provider at the time telehealth services 18 are provided by the consulting health care provider; provided 19 that when behavioral health services are provided, a second 20 health care provider shall not be required to accompany the 21 <del>patient.</del>

#### Report Title:

Telehealth; Insurance; Medicaid; Covered Services; Liability Insurance; Reimbursement; Disclosure; Requirements; EUTF

#### Description:

Requires the State's medicaid managed care and fee-for-service programs to cover services provided through telehealth. Specifies that any telehealth services provided shall be consistent with all federal and state privacy, security, and confidentiality laws. Specifies medical professional liability insurance policy requirements with regard to telehealth coverage. Clarifies that reimbursement for services provided through telehealth shall be equivalent to reimbursement for the same services provided via face-to-face contact between a health care provider and a patient. Requires written disclosure of coverages and benefits associated with telehealth services. Requires that telehealth encompasses store and forward technologies, remote monitoring, live consultation, and mobile health. Ensures telehealth is covered when originating in a patient's home and other non-medical environments. Clarifies requirements for physicians and out-of-state physicians to establish a physician-patient relationship via telehealth. Requires that reimbursement requirements for telehealth services apply to all health benefits plans under chapter 87A, Hawaii Revised Statutes. (SB2395 HD1)
