# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CONCUSSIONS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that across the country,
- 2 legal action is being pursued over the issue of concussion
- 3 management in interscholastic sports and youth sports leagues.
- 4 Class action lawsuits are highlighting the need for related
- 5 baseline testing; student, coach, and parent education; and
- 6 concussion injury data monitoring. To address some of these
- 7 concerns, Act 197, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, required the
- 8 department of education and the Hawaii High School Athletic
- 9 Association to develop a concussion educational program for high
- 10 school students aged fourteen to eighteen. The intent of Act
- 11 197 was to provide a statewide concussion educational program to
- 12 ensure that public and private high school students, school
- 13 personnel, and parents are provided with consistent and up-to-
- 14 date information on the management of symptoms and injuries
- 15 related to a concussion.
- 16 The purpose of this Act is to expand the scope of the
- 17 concussion educational program under Act 197 to include youth
- 18 and incorporate additional program requirements.



- 1 This Act also makes appropriations to develop and implement
- 2 the concussion monitoring and educational program and to
- 3 administer concussion testing to high school student athletes.
- 4 SECTION 2. Act 197, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, is
- 5 amended as follows:
- 6 1. By amending section 2 to read:
- 7 "SECTION 2. As used in this Act, the following definitions
- 8 apply:
- 9 "Coach" means a paid or volunteer [coach.] individual
- 10 working for, assisting, or managing a sports team for school
- 11 athletics or a youth athletic activity.
- 12 "Concussion" means a pathophysiological process affecting
- 13 the brain, caused by direct or indirect traumatic biomechanical
- 14 forces.
- 15 "Licensed health care provider" means an advanced practice
- 16 registered nurse, certified or registered athletic trainer,
- 17 neuropsychologist, physician assistant, physician, [ex]
- 18 osteopathic physician, or physical therapist trained in the
- 19 management of sports concussions.
- 20 "School athletics" means athletic events sponsored by any
- 21 public or private school from grade nine to grade twelve.

1	"Youth athletic activity" means an organized athletic
2	activity where the majority of the participants are eleven years
3	of age or older and under nineteen years of age, and are
4	engaging in an organized athletic game or competition against
5	another team, club, or other entity or in practice or
6	preparation for an organized game or competition against another
7	team, club, or other entity. The term does not include:
8	(1) A college or university activity;
9	(2) An activity that is entered into for instructional
10	purposes only; or
11	(3) An athletic activity that is incidental to a non-
12	athletic program or a lesson."
13	2. By amending section 4 to read:
14	"SECTION 4. [Educational guidelines for development of a
15	high school concussion awareness program. There shall be an
16	educational program developed for every public and private
17	school that is a member of the Hawaii High School Athletic
18	Association on how to develop a school's concussion awareness
19	plan. Every program shall require: The department of
20	kinesiology and rehabilitation science of the University of
21	Hawaii, the department of education, and the Hawaii High School

1	Athletic Association shall jointly develop a concussion

13		information sheet that they have attended [and],

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- 1 provided that this section shall not apply to college and
- professional teams."
- 3 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$450,000 or so much
- 5 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 to:
- 6 (1) Develop and implement the concussion monitoring and
- 7 educational program for school athletics, as required
- 8 by this Act;
- 9 (2) Develop and implement a concussion and awareness
- 10 program for youth athletics; and
- 11 (3) Administer concussion testing to high school student
- athletes, beginning on August 1, 2016.
- The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 14 kinesiology and rehabilitation science of the University of
- 15 Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.
- 16. SECTION 4. The department of kinesiology and
- 17 rehabilitation science of the University of Hawaii shall submit
- 18 a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to
- 19 the convening of the regular session of 2017 regarding the
- 20 progress in implementing this Act.

- 1 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 2 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 3 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2016.

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#### Report Title:

Concussions; Youth; Athletics; Appropriation

#### Description:

Expands the concussion educational program established under Act 197, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, and incorporates additional concussion protocol program requirements. Appropriates funds to develop and implement the concussion monitoring and education program for school athletics and youth athletic activities, administer concussion testing to high school student athletes, and implement a concussion awareness program for youth athletics.
