# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CONCUSSIONS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that across the country,
- 2 legal action is being pursued over the issue of concussion
- 3 management in interscholastic sports and youth sports leagues.
- 4 Class action lawsuits are highlighting the need for related
- 5 baseline testing; student, coach, and parent education; and
- 6 concussion injury data monitoring. To address some of these
- 7 concerns, Act 197, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, required the
- 8 department of education and the Hawaii High School Athletic
- 9 Association to develop a concussion educational program for high
- 10 school students aged fourteen to eighteen. The intent of Act
- 11 197 was to provide a statewide concussion educational program to
- 12 ensure that public and private high school students, school
- 13 personnel, and parents are provided with consistent and up-to-
- 14 date information on the management of symptoms and injuries
- 15 related to a concussion.
- 16 The purpose of this Act is to expand the scope of the
- 17 concussion educational program under Act 197 to include youth

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- 1 athletic activities for participants aged eleven to eighteen and
- 2 incorporate additional program requirements.
- 3 This Act also makes appropriations to develop and implement
- 4 the concussion monitoring and educational program and to
- 5 administer concussion testing to high school student athletes.
- 6 SECTION 2. Act 197, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, is
- 7 amended as follows:
- 8 1. By amending section 2 to read:
- 9 "SECTION 2. As used in this Act, the following definitions
- 10 apply:
- "Coach" means a paid or volunteer [coach.] individual
- 12 working for, assisting, or managing a sports team for school
- 13 athletics or a youth athletic activity.
- "Concussion" means a pathophysiological process affecting
- 15 the brain, caused by direct or indirect traumatic biomechanical
- 16 forces.
- "Licensed health care provider" means an advanced practice
- 18 registered nurse, certified or registered athletic trainer,
- 19 neuropsychologist, physician assistant, physician, or
- 20 osteopathic physician trained in the management of sports
- 21 concussions.

1	"School athletics" means athletic events sponsored by any
2	public or private school from grade six to grade twelve.
3	"Youth athletic activity" means an organized athletic
4	activity where the majority of the participants are eleven years
5	of age or older and under nineteen years of age, and are
6	engaging in an organized athletic game or competition against
7	another team, club, or other entity or in practice or
8	preparation for an organized game or competition against another
9	team, club, or other entity. The term does not include:
10	(1) A college or university activity;
11	(2) An activity that is entered into for instructional
12	purposes only; or
13	(3) An athletic activity that is incidental to a non-
14	athletic program or a lesson."
15	2. By amending section 4 to read:
16	"SECTION 4. [Educational guidelines for development of a
17	high school-concussion awareness program. There shall be an
18	educational program developed for every public and private
19	school that is-a member of the Hawaii High School Athletic
20	Association on how to develop a school's concussion awareness
21	plan. Every program shall require: The department of

1	kinesiology and rehabilitation science of the University of
2	Hawaii, the department of education, and the Hawaii High Schoo
3	Athletic Association shall jointly develop a concussion
4	monitoring and educational program for school athletics and
5	youth athletic activities that shall require:
6	(1) Annual concussion awareness training for coaches,
7	administrators, faculty, staff, and sports officials
8	including:
9	(A) The signs and symptoms of a concussion;
10	(B) The need to obtain [proper]:
11	(i) Proper medical attention for a person
12	suspected of having a concussion; and
13	(ii) Medical clearance from health care
14	professionals trained in concussion
15	management, before a person may engage in
16	any type of physical activity, practice,
17	game, or competition;
18	(C) Information on the nature and risk of
19	concussions, including the danger of continuing
20	to play after sustaining a concussion and the
21	proper method of allowing a [student] person wh

1		has sustained a concussion to return to activity;
2		and
3		(D) Information on the process of a concussed
4		person's return to school, academic and cognitive
5		issues associated with a concussion, and
6		classroom adjustments that the person may
7		require;
8	(2)	Annual concussion awareness education for [parents and
9		students who participate in a school's athletic team
10		or programs or both.] participants in school athletics
11		or youth athletic activities, including the parents of
12		minor or student participants. The [parents and
13		students] individuals required to receive education
14		pursuant to this paragraph shall sign a concussion
15		information sheet that they have attended [and].
16		received, and viewed this concussion awareness
17		education;
18	(3)	Immediate removal from a game, practice, or other
19		activity of any [student] participant who is suspected
20		of having a concussion or exhibits signs, symptoms, or
21		behaviors consistent with a concussion, such as loss

1		of conscio	ousness, headache, dizziness, confusion, or
2		balance p	roblems. The [student] concussed participant
3		shall not	return to the activity until cleared to do
4		so by a 1:	icensed health care provider[ <del>; and</del> ] trained
5		in concus	sion management;
6	(4.)	[The] A co	oncussed student to obtain written clearance
7		from a lie	censed health care provider prior to
8		returning	to academics and athletics, which:
9		(A) State	es that the student is capable of resuming
10		part	icipation in a particular sport;
11		(B) May	require the student to follow a plan designed
12		to a	id the student to recover and resume
13		part	icipation in school and athletic activities
14		that	:
15		(i)	Includes, as appropriate, periods of
16			cognitive and physical rest while symptoms
17			of a concussion persist; and
18		(ii)	Reintroduces cognitive and physical demands
19			on the student on a progressive basis to
20			prevent the reemergence or worsening of
21			symptoms of a concussion; and

1		(C) Requires that the student's return to physical
2		activity be monitored by the school's certified
3		athletic trainer, if an athletic trainer is
4		employed by the school [-];
5	(5)	Cognitive testing of participants prior to the start
6		of each season of school athletics or a youth athletic
7		activity;
8	(6)	Continuous data collection and monitoring of high
9		school concussions, including neuropsychologist review
10		of computerized neuropsychological tests;
11	(7)	The use of information and guidance from the Hawaii
12		Concussion Awareness and Management Program; and
13	(8)	Organizations traveling from without the State to
14		compete in school athletics and youth athletic
15		activities in the State to comply with this section;
16	provided	that this section shall not apply to college and
17	professio	nal teams, and out-of-state athletic trainers who have
18	served the	eir respective teams for less than one month."
19	SECT	ION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
20	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
21	thereof a	s may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 to:

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1	(1) Develop and implement the concussion monitoring and	-
2	educational program for school athletics and youth	
3	athletic activities, as required by this Act; and	
4	(2) Administer concussion testing to high school studen	.t
5	athletes, beginning on August 1, 2016.	
6	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department	. of
7	kinesiology and rehabilitation science of the University of	
8	Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.	
9	SECTION 4. The department of kinesiology and	
10	rehabilitation science of the University of Hawaii shall subm	iit
11	a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior t	.0
12	the convening of the regular session of 2017 regarding the	
13	progress in implementing this Act.	
14	SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general	
15	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so	
16	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 fo	r
17	the department of education to implement the concussion	
18	awareness and management program for students who are eleven	to
19	thirteen years old.	
20	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department	: oi
21	education for the purposes of this Act.

- 2 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 3 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2016.

### Report Title:

Concussions; Youth; Athletics; Appropriations

### Description:

Expands the concussion educational program established under Act 197, SLH 2012, to include youth athletic activities for participants aged 11 to 18 and incorporate additional program requirements. Appropriates funds to develop and implement the educational program, administer concussion testing to high school student athletes, and implement a concussion awareness and management program for students ages 11-13. (SD2)
