# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to address
- 2 homelessness.
- 3 The legislature finds that homeless families and
- 4 individuals deserve shelter and the general public deserves safe
- 5 and clean sidewalks, parks, schools, and other public
- 6 facilities. Achieving both objectives requires a strategy of
- 7 making available emergency and transitional shelters that appeal
- 8 to homeless families and individuals and enforcing state and
- 9 county trespass and anti-nuisance statutes and ordinances. The
- 10 shelters are intended to make space available to homeless
- 11 families and individuals displaced from public sidewalks, parks,
- 12 schools, and other public facilities by the enforcement of
- 13 statutes and ordinances that prohibit camping or habitation in
- 14 those areas.
- 15 This Act is intended to address the first part of the
- 16 strategy: to make available more emergency and transitional

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2	specifica	lly, this Act:
3	(1)	Provides that emergency shelters shall comply with
4		certain minimum requirements that meet basic needs and
5		preferences of homeless families and individuals. By
6		doing so, the legislature intends that the shelters be
7		more appealing to homeless families and individuals;
8	(2)	Requires homeless shelter stipend payments to be made
9		based on performance measures that are actually
10		achieved. The legislature intends that this
11		requirement incentivize emergency and transitional
12		shelter providers to actually provide shelter to more

homeless families and individuals;

shelter space funded in a cost-effective manner. More

- (3) Repeals the automatic annual adjustment of the homeless stipend amount. The legislature intends that any adjustment of the stipend amount shall be subject to the contract between the department of human services and the provider agency;
- (4) Revises existing provisions on the establishment and collection of shelter and service payments by a

1		provider agency from homeless families and
2		individuals;
3	(5)	Requires each provider agency to submit a financial
4		audit to the department at least annually;
5	(6)	Establishes and funds positions for the department of
6		human services to assist in the operation of the
7		homeless program; and
8	(7)	Appropriates general funds for the establishment or
9		improvement of homeless shelter space or expenditure
10		on other non-recurring costs.
11	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12	amended b	y adding a new section to part XVII to be appropriately
13	designate	d and to read as follows:
14	" <u>§34</u>	6- Emergency shelter; minimum requirements. (a)
15	This sect	ion shall apply to every emergency shelter operated by
16	a provide	r agency that is under contract with the department to
17	receive h	omeless shelter stipends for providing shelter and
18	services	to homeless families or individuals at the emergency
19	shelter.	
20	(b)	The department shall require an emergency shelter to
21	comply wi	th the following:

1	(1)	The sherter shall have the number of showers and
2		bathrooms that the department deems appropriate and
3		sufficient for the number of homeless families or
4		individuals that use the shelter and the capacity of
5		the shelter. The showers and bathrooms may be part of
6		the shelter building or portable and unattached to the
7		shelter building;
8	(2)	The shelter may have partitioned space for each
9		homeless family or individual that provides separation
10	•	from other homeless families or individuals in the
11		shelter. The minimum area of the partitioned space
12		and height of the partition shall be determined by the
13		department and may differ among transitional shelters,
14		according to the number of homeless families or
15		individuals that use the shelter and the capacity of
16		the shelter. A shelter that provides separate rooms
17		or portable dwelling units for homeless families or
18		individuals, including converted shipping containers
19		or school classrooms, shall be deemed to exceed this
20		minimum requirement; and

1	(3)	The shelter shall provide storage for the personal
2		possessions of each homeless family or individual
3		served by the shelter. The storage shall be securable
4		by the homeless family or individual. The type and
5		number of the storage equipment, space, or area shall
6		be determined by the department.
7	<u>(c)</u>	The department may require an emergency shelter to
8	comply wi	th any other requirements that the department deems
9	appropria	te or necessary. The requirements established by the
10	departmen	t may vary among emergency shelters.
11	(d)	A provider agency contracted to operate or manage an
12	emergency	shelter not owned by the department shall comply with
13	the minim	um requirements of subsection (b). The provider agency
14	shall bea	r all costs of compliance, unless the department
15	provides	or contributes state funding assistance; provided that
16	the state	funding assistance shall be:
17	(1)	In addition to homeless shelter stipends paid to the
18		provider agency under section 346-374;
19	(2)	Subject to the availability of legislative
20		appropriations; and

1	(3) Recoverable, in whole or part, by the department if		
2	the provider agency does not perform satisfactorily		
3	under or for the duration of the term of its contract		
4	with the department to operate or manage the shelter.		
5	(e) Any emergency shelter owned by the department shall		
6	comply with the minimum requirements under subsection (b),		
7	regardless of whether the department contracts with a provider		
8	agency to manage or operate the emergency shelter."		
9	SECTION 3. Section 346-361, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
10	amended as follows:		
11	1. By amending the definition of "emergency shelter" to		
12	read:		
13	""Emergency shelter" means a homeless facility designed to		
14	provide temporary shelter and appropriate and available services		
15	to homeless families or individuals for a specified period of		
16	time $[\div]$ who are not able to stay in a transitional shelter or		
17	reside in a dwelling unit."		
18	2. By amending the definition of "homeless shelter		
19	stipend" to read:		
20	""Homeless shelter stipend" means a payment to a provider		
21	agency [or to] from the department [on behalf of] to provide		

- 1 temporary shelter and appropriate services for a homeless family
- 2 or individual [to assist with the costs of operating] at a
- 3 homeless facility [and providing appropriate services.] operated
- 4 or managed by the provider agency."
- 5 3. By amending the definition of "transitional shelter" to
- 6 read:
- 7 ""Transitional shelter" means a homeless facility designed
- 8 to provide temporary shelter and appropriate and available
- 9 services for a maximum of twenty-four months to homeless
- 10 families or individuals [for up to twenty four months, pursuant
- 11 to rule.] qualified by the pertinent provider agency or
- 12 department to stay in the transitional shelter."
- 13 SECTION 4. Section 346-371, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 14 amended to read as follows:
- 15 "[+] §346-371[+] Annual [performance audits.] financial
- 16 audit. (a) The department shall require any provider agency
- 17 that dispensed shelter or assistance for any homeless facility
- 18 or any other program for the homeless authorized by this part to
- 19 submit to the department a financial audit [and report] when
- 20 requested, but [no later than every three years.] at least
- 21 annually. The audit shall be conducted by a certified public

- 1 accounting firm. This audit [and report] shall contain
- 2 information specific to the funds received under state homeless
- 3 program contracts. The audit shall include recommendations to
- 4 address any problems found.
- 5 (b) Continuing contracts with provider agencies to
- 6 participate in any program for the homeless authorized by this
- 7 part shall require that the provider agency address the
- 8 recommendations made by the [auditing agency,] audit, subject to
- 9 exceptions as set by the department.
- 10 (c) Failure to carry out the recommendations made by the
- 11 [auditing agency] audit may be grounds for the department to bar
- 12 a provider agency from further contracts for programs authorized
- 13 by this part until the barred provider has addressed all
- 14 deficiencies."
- 15 SECTION 5. Section 346-374, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 16 amended to read as follows:
- 17 "[+] §346-374[+] Homeless shelter stipends. [-(a) The
- 18 stipend limits per shelter unit of zero bedrooms shall be
- 19 adjusted by the department annually on the first day of July
- 20 pursuant to standards established by rule, which may consider
- 21 changes in the cost of operating homeless facilities, the fair

1 market rents, the consumer price index, or other relevant 2 factors. A "shelter unit of zero bedrooms" means a living unit 3 that is a studio unit or a single room occupancy unit. The 4 homeless shelter stipend at transitional shelters for larger 5 shelter units shall be proportional to the difference in unit 6 size. 7 (b) [ (a) The department may make or may contract to make 8 homeless shelter stipend payments [on-behalf of one or more 9 homeless families or individuals] to a provider agency operating 10 or managing an emergency or transitional shelter [or, if the 11 department itself operates and manages a homeless facility, to 12 the department in amounts and under circumstances as provided by 13 rule. The contract may specify a minimum total amount of 14 homeless shelter stipends to be received by a provider agency 15 for making its shelter and services available to eligible 16 homeless families or individuals]. Under each contract, the 17 department shall pay homeless shelter stipends only for 18 performance measures actually achieved by the provider agency, 19 such as the number of homeless families or individuals actually 20 provided with shelter and appropriate services at the emergency 21 or transitional shelter. The contract also may include

1 provisions for the automatic adjustment of the homeless shelter 2 stipend amounts, depending on factors agreed to by the 3 department and provider agency. 4 [<del>(c)</del>] (b) In making homeless shelter stipend payments to a 5 provider agency, the department may establish minimum services 6 to be provided by the provider agency to homeless families or 7 individuals at the provider agency's shelter. The department 8 may also direct provider agencies to establish and manage a 9 savings account program as described in subsection  $[\frac{d}{d}]$ . 10 Additionally, the department may direct provider agencies to 11 subcontract for outreach services from other private agencies 12 specializing in programs for the unsheltered homeless. 13 [<del>(d) Provider agencies and</del>] (c) When authorized under a 14 contract with the department, a provider agency may establish and collect shelter and services payments from homeless families 15 16 or individuals in addition to the amount received in homeless 17 shelter stipend payments [pursuant to rule]. To the extent 18 possible, the shelter and service payment amounts established 19 and collected by a homeless facility, other than an emergency 20 shelter, shall be based on the homeless families' and 21 individuals' ability to pay. If collection of payments based on

- 1 ability to pay is too difficult, costly, or inefficient for the
- 2 provider agency, the payment amounts may be based on other
- 3 criteria authorized under the contract or waived partially or
- 4 entirely.
- 5 Provider agencies and the department may also set aside a
- 6 portion of the payments in a savings account to be made
- 7 available to homeless families or individuals when these
- 8 families and individuals vacate the shelter.
- 9 (d) Any state funding assistance provided to a provider
- 10 agency for compliance with the minimum requirements under
- 11 section 346- (b) shall be in addition to homeless shelter
- 12 stipends paid to the provider agency."
- 13 SECTION 6. (a) For the purpose of this section,
- 14 "emergency shelter", "provider agency", and "transitional
- 15 shelter" mean the same as defined under section 346-361, Hawaii
- 16 Revised Statutes.
- 17 (b) Each contract that takes effect after June 30, 2017,
- 18 between the department of human services and a provider agency
- 19 for the operation or management of an emergency or transitional
- 20 shelter shall comply with this Act. This requirement shall

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- 1 apply whether the contract is entered into, renewed, or extended
- 2 before or after June 30, 2017.
- 3 (c) Beginning July 1, 2016, the department of human
- 4 services shall work with provider agencies to implement this
- 5 Act.
- 6 SECTION 7. There is established in the department of human
- 7 services 2.0 permanent full-time equivalent (2.0 FTE) program
- 8 specialist IV positions to assist in the operation of the
- 9 homeless program.
- 10 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general
- 11 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 12 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 for the
- 13 personal services costs of the program specialist IV positions
- 14 established under section 7.
- 15 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 16 human services for the purposes of this Act
- 17 SECTION 9. (a) Subject to subsection (b), there is
- 18 appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii
- 19 the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for
- 20 fiscal year 2016-2017 for the establishment or improvement of
- 21 emergency and transitional shelters for the homeless and funding

- 1 of other non-recurring costs for projects or programs to assist
- 2 homeless families and individuals.
- 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 4 human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 5 (b) The appropriation under subsection (a) shall be
- 6 effective only if Senate Bill No. 2844 of the regular session of
- 7 2016 or other legislation is enacted to reduce the general fund
- 8 appropriation in section 3 of Act 202, Session Laws of Hawaii
- 9 2015, by at least \$5,000,000.
- 10 (c) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the
- 11 appropriation under this section shall not lapse at the end of
- 12 fiscal year 2016-2017; provided that any unexpended and
- 13 unencumbered balance of the appropriation under this section
- 14 shall lapse on June 30, 2018.
- 15 (d) The department of human services shall submit an
- 16 interim report to the legislature and governor on the actual and
- 17 planned expenditures of the appropriation under this section.
- 18 The report shall list the projects, programs, and expenditures
- 19 that are planned or have been made as of December 31, 2016. The
- 20 report shall be submitted by no later than January 30, 2017.

- 1 (e) The department of human services shall submit a final
- 2 report to the legislature and governor on the expenditures of
- 3 the appropriation under this section. The report shall list the
- 4 projects, programs, expenditures, and encumbrances that are
- 5 planned or have been made as of June 30, 2018. If any amount of
- 6 the appropriation is lapsed on June 30, 2018, the department
- 7 shall provide the reason for allowing the portion of the
- 8 appropriation to lapse. The department shall submit the report
- 9 by no later than September 30, 2018.
- 10 SECTION 10. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 11 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 12 SECTION 11. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2030;
- 13 provided that sections 6, 7, 8, and 9 shall take effect on July
- 14 1, 2016.

#### Report Title:

Homeless Shelters; Requirements; Appropriation

#### Description:

Establishes minimum requirements for emergency shelters. Requires homeless shelter stipends to be paid for achievement of performance measures. Repeals the automatic annual adjustment of homeless shelter stipend amounts. Revises existing provisions on the establishment and collection of shelter and service payments from homeless families and individuals. Requires homeless service provider agencies to submit a financial audit to the Department of Human Services at least annually. Establishes and funds 2.0 FTE positions to assist in the implementation of the homeless program. Appropriates funds. (SB2559 HD1)
