A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATIONAL TOURS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that for over thirty
- 2 years, public school students have been afforded the opportunity
- 3 to participate in educational tours that enrich their academic
- 4 experience by making real and tangible the lessons they learn in
- 5 the classroom. The legislature further finds that for many
- 6 students, educational tours are the first, and sometimes only,
- 7 opportunities for interstate travel. More than simply providing
- 8 an enriching academic experience, such tours also offer students
- 9 the chance to experience places and cultures that expand their
- 10 world beyond the every day.
- 11 Teachers work on their own time to research, plan, and
- 12 implement educational tours, including aligning travel
- 13 destinations and activities to the curriculum and chaperoning
- 14 students twenty-four hours a day during the trip. To help
- 15 ensure that teachers are able to continue to provide this
- 16 enrichment benefit, educational tour companies offer to pay the

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1 direct travel expenses of chaperones based upon the number of

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- 2 students who are traveling.
- 3 On August 4, 2015, the state ethics commission issued a
- 4 memorandum stating the state ethics code prohibits employees,
- 5 including teachers, "from accepting free travel and other
- 6 benefits from tour companies for serving as chaperones on
- 7 student educational trips."
- 8 The legislature acknowledges that but for teachers taking
- 9 on the burden, in addition to their official responsibilities,
- 10 of researching, planning, and implementing educational tours,
- 11 students would not have this invaluable and enriching
- 12 opportunity., The legislature finds that expecting teachers to
- 13 fund direct travel expenses for educational tours for which they
- 14 are serving as chaperones is unrealistic and ignores the
- 15 substantial amount of additional work such teachers take upon
- 16 themselves.
- 17 The legislature further finds that rather than being an
- 18 undue benefit to chaperones, the provision of direct travel
- 19 expenses by educational tour companies functions as a benefit to
- 20 students, ensuring that chaperones will have the necessary
- 21 financial resources to provide these opportunities to students.

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- 1 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to ensure that
- 2 Hawaii's public school students can continue to receive the
- 3 academic and cultural benefits of educational tours.
- 4 SECTION 2. Chapter 84, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
- 5 by adding a new section to part II to be appropriately
- 6 designated and to read as follows:
- 7 "§84- Educational tours. (a) The planning,
- 8 procurement, and implementation of educational tours by an
- 9 employee acting in accordance with the rules or regulations of a
- 10 state department shall not constitute official action under this
- 11 part.
- 12 (b) Direct travel expenses provided to an employee for an
- 13 educational tour for which the employee is acting as chaperone
- 14 shall not be considered a gift under this part.
- (c) As used in this section:
- 16 "Direct travel expenses" means those expenses that are
- 17 directly related to, and necessary for, planned travel,
- 18 including but not limited to an educational tour, including
- 19 airfare, hotel accommodations, ground transportation, travel
- 20 insurance, admission fees, meals, tips, and gratuities.

- 1 "Educational tour" means intra-state, interstate, or
- 2 international travel for public school students arranged through
- 3 a for-profit or nonprofit travel agency or tour company designed
- 4 to enhance student learning and assist students in meeting the
- 5 Hawaii common core standards."
- 6 SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 7 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 8 begun before its effective date.
- 9 SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.
- 10 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
