### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE BIOSECURITY PROGRAM.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. The legislature finds that biosecurity is an
- 2 overarching issue that requires cooperation and collaboration by
- 3 numerous parties in order to be addressed properly and to ensure
- 4 the protection of our environment, community, and local
- 5 agriculture.
- 6 The legislature finds that the department of agriculture
- 7 has multiple duties and activities that address the issue of
- 8 biosecurity and that initiatives to improve Hawaii biosecurity
- 9 go beyond the confines of any one branch within the department,
- 10 and often including other groups both inside and outside of
- 11 state government.
- Groups that positively contribute to Hawaii biosecurity
- 13 efforts include, but are not limited to, the Hawaii invasive
- 14 species council, department of land and natural resources,
- United States Department of Agriculture, coordinating group on
- 16 alien pest species, and private companies that utilize best
- 17 management practices when transporting products and equipment
- 18 throughout the State.

## <u>S</u>.B. NO. <u>2801</u>

1	The purpose of this act is to establish the biosecurity
2	program as the responsibility of the department of agriculture
3	rather than a branch of the department to enable the program to
4	address biosecurity issues across the entire department.
5	SECTION 2. Chapter 141, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
6	amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
7	to read as follows:
8	"PART . BIOSECURITY PROGRAM
9	§141-A Biosecurity program; establishment. The department
10	shall establish a biosecurity program authorized under this
11	chapter that shall operate in conjunction with other relevant
12	state agencies and laws.
13	§141-B Objectives of biosecurity program. The objectives
14	of the biosecurity program shall be to:
15	(1) Establish a multi-dimensional system to prevent the
16	entry into the State and interisland movement of
17	pests, prohibited animals, or restricted organisms
18	without a permit; and
19	(2) Respond effectively to eradicate, control, reduce, and
20	suppress incipient pest populations and established
21	pests and seize and dispose of prohibited animals or
22	restricted organisms without a permit.

1	§141-C General actions to achieve objectives. To achieve
2	the objectives of the biosecurity program, the department shall
3	plan for and, within available funds, implement the following:
4	(1) Work with government agencies and agricultural
5	commodity exporters of other states and countries to
6	establish pre-entry inspection programs under which
7	inbound cargo into the State is inspected at the ports
8	of departure or other points outside the State;
9	(2) Establish, operate, or participate in operating port-
10	of-entry facilities where multiple government agencies
11	may inspect, quarantine, fumigate, disinfect, destroy,
12	or exclude, as appropriate, articles that may harbor
13	pests or exclude articles that are prohibited or that
14	are restricted without a permit, with the goals of:
15	(A) Performing inspections in an efficient,
16	effective, and expeditious manner for the
17	government agencies involved and for cargo
18	owners, carriers, and importers; and
19	(B) Providing for the proper and safe storage and
20	handling of cargo, especially agricultural and
21	food commodities, awaiting inspection;
22	(3) Develop, implement, and coordinate post-entry measures
23	to eradicate, control, reduce, and suppress pests and,

1		as appropriate, eradicate or seize and dispose of
2		prohibited animals, or restricted organisms without a
3		permit, that have entered the State;
4	(4)	Collaborate with relevant government agencies,
5		agricultural commodity importers, and other persons to
6		examine and develop integrated systems to better
7		implement the biosecurity program;
8	(5)	Improve cargo inspection capabilities and methods,
9		including enhancement of the content and submission
10		requirements for cargo manifests and agricultural
11		commodity ownership and movement certificates;
12	(6)	Promote the production of agricultural commodities in
13		the State to reduce cargo shipments of imported
14		commodities into the State; and
15	(7)	Provide public education on the negative effects of
16		pests and prohibited or restricted organisms without a
17		permit, to the environment and economy of the State.
18	§141	-D Biosecurity program; charges; costs. (a) The
19	departmen	t shall set and impose charges for the inspection,
20	quarantin	e, and eradication of pests in accordance with this
21	chapter a	nd chapter 150A. The department shall deposit the
22	charges i	nto the pest inspection, quarantine, and eradication
23	fund esta	blished pursuant to section 150A-4.5.

1	(b) The department shall set the charges at amounts
2	intended to generate revenues that, when combined with federal
3	and other funds, are sufficient to pay for the operating and
4	maintenance cost of the program and debt service on bonds issued
5	to fund facilities constructed for the program.
6	§141-E Federal and other funds. The department shall
7	place high priority on seeking and applying for federal and
8	other funds for the biosecurity program.
9	§141-F Annual report. The department shall submit an
10	annual report on the biosecurity program to the legislature no
11	later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular
12	session of the legislature."
13	SECTION 3. Chapter 150A, part VI, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
14	is repealed.
15	SECTION 4. This Act, upon its approval, shall take effect
16	on July 1, 2016.

DEPARTMENT: Agriculture

TITLE: A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE

BIOSECURITY PROGRAM.

PURPOSE: To establish the Hawaii biosecurity program

as a responsibility of the entire Department of Agriculture, instead of it being solely a

Plant Quarantine Branch function.

MEANS: Amend chapter 141, Hawaii Revised Statutes,

by adding a new part that contains the provisions currently in part VI, chapter 150A, and repeal chapter 150A, part VI,

Hawaii Revised Statutes.

JUSTIFICATION: As invasive species continue to enter and

move throughout the State, biosecurity needs to be realized as an overarching issue that requires cooperation and collaboration by numerous parties in order to be addressed properly and to insure the protection of our

environment, community, and local

agriculture.

The Department of Agriculture has multiple duties and activities that address the issue of biosecurity. Initiatives to improve Hawaii biosecurity go beyond the confines of the Plant Quarantine Branch and often include other groups both inside and outside of state government.

Impact on the public: Would provide further protection from the spread of invasive species and agricultural pests in Hawaii through a more inclusive approach to securing the Hawaii biosecurity program.

Impact on the department and other agencies: Increased collaboration of the Hawaii biosecurity program with other branches within the Department of Agriculture including, but not limited to, the Plant
Pest Control Branch, and the Animal Industry
Division. Also, increased biosecurity
collaboration will be realized through the
Hawaii Invasive Species Council, Department
of Land and Natural Resources, United States
Department of Agriculture, Coordinating
Group on Alien Plant Species, and private
companies that utilize "best management
practices" when transporting products and
equipment throughout the State.
