A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MENTAL HEALTH EXAMINATIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Under section 704-404, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
- 2 a court may order a physical or mental examination of a criminal
- 3 defendant to determine the defendant's penal responsibility.
- 4 The legislature finds that the forensic examination process
- 5 typically takes several months to complete. During this period,
- 6 a pretrial defendant who may have a serious mental disease or
- 7 defect may be held in state custody without receiving the timely
- 8 completion of the court ordered examination or appropriate
- 9 mental health treatment.
- 10 The legislature further finds that the lack of trained
- 11 evaluators available in the State is linked to the rising number
- 12 of pretrial detainees, resulting in homogenous populations of
- 13 mentally ill and non-mentally ill defendants in understaffed and
- 14 underfunded county jails as well as the Hawaii state hospital.
- 15 The legislature further finds that specialty training and
- 16 expertise is required for the proper administration of a court
- 17 ordered mental health examination. The conclusions drawn in a



1	court ordered examination are heavily considered by the		
2	judiciary, and accordingly, a significant factor in the legal		
3	claims and defenses available to a defendant. Significantly,		
4	the recommendations to the judiciary contained in court ordered		
5	examinations have historically shown to strongly sway the final		
6	ruling of the court. The legislature accordingly further finds		
7	that where court ordered examinations involve forensic analysis		
8	post-doctoral or commensurate experience and appropriate		
9	training becomes a crucial factor in the quality of mental		
10	health reports and administration of justice.		
11	The purpose of this Act is to:		
12	(1) Ensure timely administration of mental health		
13	examinations by trained forensic specialists by		
14	establishing within the courts and corrections branch		
15	of the department of health competitive salary, nine		
16	permanent full-time equivalent (9.00 FTE) forensic		
17	psychologist positions;		
18	(2) Ensure the quality of forensic analyses in the		
19	judicial state system, especially where criminal		
20	charges are involved, by requiring the prompt hiring		

of one permanent full-time equivalent (1.00 FTE)

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1		manager position, within the courts and corrections
2		branch;
3	(3)	Establish a system of accountability and efficiency by
4		requiring the manager of the courts and corrections
5		branch to oversee and review the forensically-related
6		work of the forensic psychologists;
7	(4)	Require the manager of the courts and corrections
8		branch to review the certification process by which
9		the department of health may appoint private and state
10		forensic examiners, pursuant to section 704-404(2),
11		Hawaii Revised Statutes;
12	(5)	Provide funds for additional office space to require
13		the court and corrections branch to be located near
14		the courts in major populated areas, secretarial
15		support, and other supplies necessary to facilitate
16		the forensically-related work product of the court and
17		corrections branch; and
18	(6)	Recognize that the lack of critical forensic positions
19		in the department of health constitutes an emergency,
20		and accordingly, lifts any hiring freeze for all
21		exempt positions in the court and corrections branch.

- 1 SECTION 2. (a) There is established in the courts and
- 2 corrections branch of the department of health nine permanent
- 3 full-time equivalent (9.00 FTE) forensic psychologist positions
- 4 that shall engage in psychological work with forensically-
- 5 encumbered patients. At a minimum, a forensic psychologist
- 6 shall have, and shall provide such evidence upon request, one
- 7 year of post-doctoral forensic experience. Forensic
- 8 psychologists shall be appointed by the director of the
- 9 department and be compensated for services with a competitive
- 10 annual salary.
- 11 (b) To ensure maximum personnel retention, all existing
- 12 courts and corrections branch examiners shall be converted to
- 13 the new forensic psychologist position and, their upgraded pay
- 14 scales to reflect past step movements and years of service;
- 15 provided that the examiners meet the minimum requirement
- 16 provided in subsection (a).
- 17 (c) There is established in the courts and correction
- 18 branch one permanent full-time equivalent (1.00 FTE) manager
- 19 position. The manager shall review the current certification
- 20 process by which the department of health may appoint qualified
- 21 private and state forensic examiners, pursuant to section

1	704-402(2), Hawaii Revised Statutes. The review of the
2	certification process shall be completed by May 1, 2016.
3	(d) Until the nine permanent forensic psychologist
4	positions established pursuant to subsection (a) are filled, the
5	court and corrections branch shall remain in an emergency hiring
6	situation and any hiring freeze on any exempt positions within
7	the branch shall be lifted without unnecessary delay.
8	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
9	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
10	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and
11	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
12	year 2016-2017 to:
13	(1) Establish nine permanent full-time equivalent (9.00
14	FTE) forensic psychologist positions within the courts
15	and corrections branch of the department of health;
16	(2) Establish one permanent full-time equivalent (1.00
17	FTE) manager position within the courts and
18	corrections branch of the department of health;
19	(3) Provide capital expenditures necessary for office
20	space for the courts and corrections branch of the

1		department of health located near the courts of highly
2		populated area; and
3	(4)	Provide operating expenses for additional secretarial
4		support and other materials, such as reference
5		manuals, evaluation exams, and office supplies as
6		necessary for the facilitation of forensically-related
7		work.
8	The	sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
9	of health	for the purposes of this Act.
10	SECT	TION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2015.
