A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ELECTIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1		PART 1
2	SECT	TON 1. The purpose of this Act is to:
3	(1)	Beginning on July 1, 2016, require that absentee
4		ballots be mailed to all registered voters, and
5		require voters to return ballots by mail or walk in,
6		deposit in ballot boxes prior to and on election day,
7		and deposit at polling places on election day;
8	(2)	Allow persons to register to vote at absentee polling
9		places at any time prior to the day of an election
10		and, beginning on July 1, 2018, to register and vote
11		at polling places on the day of an election;
12	(3)	Preserve references to absentee voting and ballots as
13		used in the Uniform Military and Overseas Voters Act;
14		and
15	(4)	Beginning on July 1, 2018, establish a minimum number
16		of voter service centers per county and island, in
17		lieu of existing polling places, and require voter

1	service centers to provide services such as allowing
2	people to register to vote and cast ballots on the day
3	of an election.
4	PART II
5	SECTION 2. Chapter 15, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
6	by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to
7	read as follows:
8	"§15- Voter service centers; minimum number;
9	designation; services provided. (a) Beginning on July 1, 2018,
10	voter service centers shall be established at the office of the
11	respective county clerks and may be established at other sites
12	as may be designated by the county clerk pursuant to this
13	section and rules adopted by the chief election officer.
14	Section 11-21 relating to changes and transfers of registration
15	shall apply to the voter service centers as though it were the
16	precinct at which a person's name properly appears on the list
17	of registered voters.
18	(b) All voting service centers shall be open only on the
19	day of the election and at the same times statewide, except as
20	may be provided in section 11-92.3 or by the chief election
21	officer through administrative rules.

1	<u>(c)</u>	For all elections, each county clerk shall designate a
2	minimum n	umber of voter service centers as follows:
3	(1)	For counties with at least four hundred thousand
4		registered voters, at least twenty-five in each such
5		county;
6	(2)	For counties with at least seventy-five thousand but
7		fewer than four hundred thousand registered voters, at
8		least six in each such county;
9	(3)	For counties with at least fifteen thousand but fewer
10		than seventy-five thousand registered voters, at least
11		three in each such county; and
12	(4)	For counties with fewer than fifteen thousand
13		registered voters, at least one voter service center
14		in each such county;
15	provided	that there shall be at least one voter service center
16	on each i	nhabited island of the State.
17	(d)	In designating voter service centers pursuant to this
18	section,	each county clerk shall consider the following factors
19	to addres	s the needs of the county:
20	(1)	Proximity to public transportation lines and
21		availability of parking;

1	(2)	Geographic features, such as mountain passes, that
2		tend to affect access and convenience;
3	(3)	Equitable distribution across the county so as to
4		afford maximally convenient options for voters;
5	(4)	The existence and location of population centers;
6	(5)	Access for persons with disabilities;
7	(6)	Use of locations that have historically served as
8		polling places for a significant number of voters;
9	(7)	Use of schools, recreational halls, park facilities,
10		and other publicly owned or controlled buildings that
11		are known to voters in the county, especially to the
12		extent that using such buildings results in cost
13		savings compared to other potential locations; and
14	(8)	When private locations are considered or designated as
15		voter service centers in accordance with this section,
16	·	methods and standards to ensure the security of voting
17		conducted at such locations.
18	<u>(e)</u>	Each county clerk shall solicit public comments in
19	proposing	voter service center locations and shall submit the
20	proposed	locations to the chief election officer for approval.
21	The chief	election officer shall adopt administrative rules,

1	pursuant to chapter 91, to prescribe the manner of submission,				
2	public comment and notice requirements, deadline for submission,				
3	and criteria for approval of proposed voter service center				
4	locations	locations.			
5	<u>(f)</u>	Each voter service center shall provide:			
6	(1)	The ability for an eligible voter to deposit or cast a			
7		<pre>ballot;</pre>			
8	(2)	The ability for an eligible voter to update the			
9		voter's address;			
10	(3)	The ability for an eligible voter who has legally			
11		changed the voter's name to have the voter's name			
12		changed;			
13	(4)	Facilities and equipment that are compliant with the			
14		federal Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, title			
15		42 United States Code section 12101 et seq., as			
16		amended;			
17	(5)	Electronic voting machines or other voting systems			
18		accessible to voters with disabilities;			
19	(6)	Voting booths;			
20	(7)	Ballots for distribution;			
21	(8)	At least one ballot box; and			

1 (9) Pursuant to section 11-15.2, beginning on July 1, 2018, the ability for an eligible voter to register to 2 3 vote on the day of the election." 4 SECTION 3. Section 15-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 5 amended to read as follows: 6 "§15-1 Definitions. As used in this chapter, unless the 7 context otherwise requires: 8 "Absentee ballot" means a ballot, as defined in section 9 11-1, used in absentee voting[+] pursuant to this chapter. 10 "Absentee polling place" means an office or other suitable 11 facility designated by the respective clerks for the conduct of absentee voting and the processing of absentee ballots. 12 "Ballot" means a ballot, as defined in section 11-1, used 13 14 in voting pursuant to this chapter. The term includes absentee 15 ballots. 16 "Ballot box" means a location established pursuant to 17 section 15-8 to accept the deposit of ballots. 18 "Invalid ballot" means any absentee ballot [which] that 19 does not meet the requirements for a ballot to be counted as

listed in section 15-9.

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          ["Voter in a remote area" means any registered voter who
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    resides ten miles or more from the voter's designated polling
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    place by the most direct route for public travel.]
         "Poll" or "polling place" means an office or other suitable
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    facility designated by the respective clerks for the conduct of
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    voting. Beginning on July 1, 2018, the term "poll" or "polling
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    place" means a voter service center.
         "Stand-alone ballot box" means a location that is
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    established pursuant to section 15-8 to accept the deposit of
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    ballots and is not a ballot box provided at a polling place.
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         "Voter service center" means a location established
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    pursuant to section 15- for accepting ballots on the day of an
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    election and providing other services described in section
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    15- ."
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         SECTION 4. Section 15-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
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    amended to read as follows:
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         "$15-2 Who [<del>may vote by absentee ballot.</del>] shall receive an
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    absentee ballot by mail. Any person registered to vote [may
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    cast an absentee ballot in the manner provided in this chapter
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    and rules adopted by the chief election officer.] and whose name
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    has not been removed from the register pursuant to section 11-17
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    shall receive an absentee ballot by mail."
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         SECTION 5. Section 15-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
    amended to read as follows:
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         "§15-5 Delivery of ballots. [\(\frac{(a)}{a}\)] Immediately upon
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    receipt of [a request within the time limit specified in section
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    15-4, an application to register to vote, the clerk shall
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    examine the records to ascertain whether or not the voter is
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    lawfully entitled to vote as requested. As soon as the printed
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    official ballots are available, the clerk shall [mail]:
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         (1) Mail in a forwarding envelope; or [deliver]
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         (2) Deliver in person, if the voter appears at [the office
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              of the clerk, an absentee polling place; if the voter
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              appears at a voter service center beginning on July 1,
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              2018; or if there is insufficient time to mail a
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              ballot to the voter,
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    an official ballot and other materials prescribed in section
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    15-6, except that an incapacitated voter may send a
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    representative to obtain the voter's ballots pursuant to the
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    rules [promulgated] adopted by the chief election officer. [All
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    requests received upon the last day specified in section 15-4
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- for receipt shall be mailed to the voter requesting the same as 1 soon as reasonably practicable, but in no event later than 2 twenty four hours after receipt thereof. 3 (b) If mailed absentee ballots are not received by the 4 voter within five days of an election, a covered voter under 5 6 chapter 15D may request that absentee ballots be forwarded by 7 facsimile. Upon receipt of such a request and confirmation that 8 proper application was made, the clerk may transmit appropriate ballots by facsimile together with a form requiring the 9 10 affirmations and information required by section 15-6, and a form containing a waiver of the right to secreey, as provided by 11 section 11-137. The voter may return the voted ballots and 12 executed forms by facsimile or mail; provided that they are 13 14 received by the issuing clerk no later than the close of polls on election day. Upon receipt, the clerk shall verify 15 16 compliance with the requirements of section 15-9(c), and prepare 17 the ballots for counting pursuant to section 15-10.] " SECTION 6. Section 15-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 18 19 amended as follows:

17		the county in which the person maintains residence [-] ;

20		voter service center.

The county clerk shall designate a registration clerk, 1 (d) 2 who may be an election official $[\tau]$: Beginning on July 1, 2016, at each of the absentee 3 (1) 4 polling places established in the county [-], prior to election day; and 5 (2) Beginning on July 1, 2018, at each voter service 6 7 center on election day." By amending subsection (i) to read: 8 9 The clerk of each county shall add persons who properly register at an absentee polling place or voter service 10 11 center, as applicable, to the respective general county register. Within thirty days of registration at an absentee 12 polling place $[\tau]$ or voter service center, as applicable, the 13 14 county clerk shall mail to the person a notice including the person's name, current street address, district and precinct, 15 16 and date of registration. A notice mailed pursuant to this subsection shall serve as prima facie evidence that the person 17 18 is a registered voter as of the date of registration." 19 SECTION 7. Section 15-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

12	ballots are made available to voters; provided that all stand-
13	alone ballot boxes shall be open on the same dates and times

15	election officer through administrative rules.
16	(c) Each county shall make available at least one stand-
17	alone ballot box for every ten thousand registered voters in the
18	county.
19	(d) Counties are encouraged to designate community-based

locations as sites for stand-alone ballot boxes.

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1	<u>(e)</u>	Each ballot box shall be secured in accordance with
2	rules [pr	omulgated] adopted by the chief election officer.
3	<u>(f)</u>	Tampering with $[the]$ <u>a</u> ballot box or opening it before
4	the time	prescribed in section 15-9 shall be an election offense
5	under sec	tion 19-6."
6	SECT	ION 8. Section 15-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended a	s follows:
8	1.	By amending the title and subsection (a) to read:
9	"§15	-9 Return [and], receipt, and checking of absentee
10	ballots.	(a) The return envelope shall be:
11	(1)	Mailed and must be received by the clerk issuing the
12		absentee ballot not later than the closing of the
13		polls on any election day;
14	(2)	Delivered other than by mail to the clerk issuing the
15		absentee ballot, or another election official
16		designated by the clerk to act on the clerk's behalf,
17		not later than the closing of polls on any election
18		day; [er]
19	(3)	Delivered other than by mail to any polling place
20		within the county in which the voter is registered and
21		deposited by a precinct official in the ballot box

1		before the closing of the polls on any election
2		day[-]; or
3	(4)	Deposited in any ballot box before the closing of the

11		request or] register as prescribed in the rules
12		adopted by the chief election officer; and
13	(3)	Whether the person is a registered voter and has
14		complied with the requirements of sections 11-15 and
15		11-16."
16	SECT	ION 9. Section 15-14, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	amended t	o read as follows:
18	"§15	-14 Ballots; where voting machines are used. In all
19	[precinct	s] polling places in which voting machines are used,
20	sections	15-1 to 15-13 shall apply provided that the number and
21	type of [absentee ballots to be printed shall be determined at

1 the discretion of the officer charged with printing and 2 furnishing them. The officer may use reasonable facsimiles of 3 the sample ballot used in polling places that use voting 4 [machine precincts.] machines." 5 SECTION 10. Section 15-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 6 repealed. 7 ["§15-4 Request for absentee ballot. (a) Any person 8 registered to vote may request an absentee ballot or permanent 9 absentee ballot in person or in writing from the clerk at any time but not later than 4:30 p.m. on the seventh day prior to 10 11 the election. Any mailed requests for an absentee ballot or 12 permanent absentee ballot shall be mailed by the person directly to the clerk. The clerk may waive any or all of the foregoing 13 14 requirements in special cases as provided in the rules adopted 15 by the chief election officer. 16 The request shall include information such as the person's social security number, date of birth, and the address under 17 which the person is registered to vote. The request shall also 18 19 include the address to which the person wishes the requested 20 ballot to be forwarded. The request, when made for any primary 21 or special primary election, may include an additional request

for an absentee ballot to be voted at any election immediately 1 following the primary or special primary; provided the person so 2 indicates in the person's request. 3 Subsequent to the closing of registration for each 4 5 election, the clerk may mail a request form for an absentee ballot and permanent absentee ballot to each voter in a remote 6 area who has not already made such a request. The request form 7 8 shall be accompanied by: 9 (1) A stamped, self-addressed envelope; and (2) Instructions regarding the manner of completing and 10 returning the request form. 11 (b) Notwithstanding subsection (a), the respective clerk 12 shall be allowed to conduct an absentee ballot-only election and 13 may mail an absentee ballot for each primary, special primary, 14 special, general, and special general election to each 15 registered voter who resides in the county of Kalawao or on any 16 island of a county with a population of less than one hundred 17 eighty thousand, except for the island where the county seat of 18 government is located. The chief-election officer may adopt 19 20 rules to carry out this subsection.

I	(c) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, in the event
2	there are fewer than five hundred registered voters as of the
3	preceding general election in an area covered by a unique
4	ballot type, the clerk shall mail an absentee ballot to each
5	registered voter who resides in such an area, if the chief
6	election officer, or the clerk in a county only election,
7	determines that an election day polling place will not be
8	established for such voters.
9	(d) For the purposes of this section, "ballot type" means
10	the unique ballot containing the contests, questions, or issues
11	that will be used by the voters of a specific area.
12	(e) When a registered voter requests an absentee ballot,
13	the voter also may include an additional request to receive
14	absentee ballots permanently. After receiving a request for
15	permanent absentee voter status, the clerk shall mail to the
16	voter who requested permanent absentee voter status an absentee
17	ballot for all subsequent elections conducted in that precinct.
18	(f) The chief election officer shall inform voters of the
19	option of applying for permanent absentee voter status and shall
20	provide any necessary form to request the permanent absentee

ballot option to any registered voter requesting an absentee 1 ballot and any person applying to register to vote. 2 (g) A permanent absentee voter shall be responsible for 3 informing the clerk of any changes to personal information, 4 5 including changes to the voter's forwarding address. 6 (h) A voter's permanent absentee voter status shall be terminated if any of the following conditions apply: 7 8 (1) The voter requests in writing that such status be 9 terminated: (2) The voter dies, loses voting rights, registers to vote 10 in another jurisdiction, or is otherwise disqualified 11 12 from voting; 13 (3) The voter's absentee ballot, voter notification 14 postcard, or any other election mail is returned to 15 the clerk as undeliverable for any reason; or 16 (4) The voter does not return a voter ballot by 6:00 p.m. 17 on election day in both the primary and general election of an election year. 18 19 (i) If a voter's permanent absentee voter status has been 20 terminated due to one or more of the conditions specified in 21 subsection (h), the voter shall be responsible for again

(6) 15 [An application to register to vote shall include a space 16 to request a permanent absentee ballot. " 17 SECTION 13. Section 11-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 18 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: 19 "(a) Any qualified person unable for any cause to appear in person before the clerk for registration may register to vote 20 21 by mail, not later than thirty days prior to a primary or

- 1 general election, through the affidavit on application for voter
- 2 registration or other form prescribed by the chief election
- 3 officer. The form shall include a self-subscribing oath for the
- 4 applicant to swear to the truth of the allegations in the
- 5 application. An applicant unable to write for reason of

- 7 the applicant's mark witnessed by a person who shall sign the
- 8 affidavit in the space provided. [Each application form shall

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    erection of suitable shelter for this purpose whenever public
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    buildings are not available and shall cause these polling places
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    to be equipped with the necessary facilities for lighting,

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Report Title:

Absentee Voting; Late Voter Registration; Ballot Boxes; Voter Service Centers

Description:

Beginning on July 1, 2016: Requires an absentee ballot for elections held on their regularly scheduled days to be mailed to each registered voter; replaces absentee polling places to remain open through the day before election day; requires ballots to be returned by mail, at absentee polling places before election day, deposited in ballot boxes before and on election day, or deposited at polling places on election day; requires the voter register to remain open. Preserves references to absentee voting and ballots as used in the Uniform Military and Overseas Voters Act. Beginning on July 1, 2018: Establishes a minimum number of voter service centers per county and island, in lieu of traditional polling places; requires voter service centers to provide services such as voter registration on election day.
