A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The Eternal Flame memorial, honoring men and women who served in the armed forces, is currently located on 2 Beretania Street, across from the state capitol building. 3 In 4 contrast, the Korean/Vietnam War memorial is located along 5 Richards Street and the walkway behind the state capitol, a 6 quiet and peaceful oasis on the grounds of the capitol building. 7 The legislature finds that this walkway, also known as Hotel 8 Street mall, is a more appropriate place of reflection for a 9 memorial. Therefore, the legislature finds that relocating the 10 Eternal Flame memorial to the walkway behind the state capitol 11 building and designating the length of the walkway between Richards Street and Punchbowl Street as Memorial mall is a more 12 13 appropriate and meaningful tribute to Hawaii's men and women who 14 served in the armed forces.

15 The legislature further finds that the Spirit of 16 Lili'uokalani statue that is located in the walkway behind the 17 capitol building would be more appropriately located at the

current site of the Eternal Flame memorial. In its current 1 2 location, the statue of Queen Lili'uokalani inappropriately faces away from 'Iolani Palace where she reigned over the Hawaiian 3 kingdom and was unjustly deposed. By relocating her statue to 4 the site of the Eternal Flame, Queen Lili'uokalani would face the 5 capitol building, representing the future of her people, and 6 would also face 'Iolani Palace. Even more, this site is next to 7 8 Washington Place, which was Queen Lili'uokalani's home, close to 9 where she was born, and is across the street from The Queen's 10 Medical Center.

Further, to instill the history of the Hawaiian kingdom in 11 12 perpetuity, the legislature finds that a bronze frieze depicting each of the former rulers of the Hawaiian kingdom should be 13 placed on the wall behind the current location of the Eternal 14 15 Flame memorial. Kahili are fitting artifacts for this wahi 16 pana, or legacy site. Kahili are feathered standards - symbols of rank that were displayed at ceremonial gatherings of chiefs 17 and rulers and are exceptionally unique to Hawaii. 18 The 19 legislature further finds that portraying the Hawaiian rulers attended by bronze kahili along with a frieze of their likeness 20

and description would bring historic validation to the former 1 2 Hawaiian kingdom. 3 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to: Designate the walkway behind the capitol building as 4 (1)Memorial mall; and 5 6 (2) Create a ho'onoho pono working group to interchange the Eternal Flame memorial with the Spirit of Lili'uokalani 7 statue and to create a monument respecting the former 8 Hawaiian rulers to be placed with Queen Lili'uokalani's 9 10 statue. SECTION 2. Section 6E-34, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 11 amended to read as follows: 12 "[+]§6E-34[+] Capitol site. (a) The portion of the 13 "Honolulu Civic Center" adopted by the Honolulu city planning 14 15 commission on February 23, 1945, as the master plan for the city and county of Honolulu after a public hearing on February 1, 16 1945, for the executive-legislative center, specifically that 17 area of Honolulu bounded by Richards, Beretania, Punchbowl, and 18 Hotel Streets, for which lands have been acquired and 19 preliminary plans have been designed pursuant to Act 401, 20

King Kamehameha V - Lot Kapuaiwa; 1 (E) King Lunalilo; 2 (F) King Kalakaua; and 3 (G) Queen Lili'uokalani, 4 (H) and place the bronze frieze on the wall directly 5 behind the current location of the Eternal Flame 6 7 memorial. Bronze kahili, feathered symbols of rank, 8 shall also be designed and displayed at the site. The members of the working group shall serve without 9 (d) compensation, but shall be reimbursed for expenses, including 10 travel expenses, necessary for the performance of their duties. 11 12 The working group shall submit a report, including a (e) 13 design and proposed appropriation amount for the bronze frieze 14 and kahili and the relocation of the Eternal Flame memorial and 15 Spirit of Lili'uokalani statue, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 16 17 2016. (f) The working group shall be dissolved on June 30, 2016. 18

19 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed20 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
