A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FIREWORKS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the use of consumer
- 2 fireworks causes fires and burn injuries mostly to children.
- 3 Fireworks also produce excessive smoke that contributes to
- 4 breathing difficulties. Loud fireworks noises are also known to
- 5 traumatize both war veterans and pets.
- 6 The legislature also finds that, with the increase in
- 7 fireworks-related calls, public safety agencies are strained to
- 8 maintain adequate response levels for other critical
- 9 emergencies. The legislature believes that Hawaii's communities
- 10 deserve to live in peace and security, without the public safety
- 11 risk and disruptive impact of consumer fireworks.
- 12 The purpose of this Act is to limit the use of consumer
- 13 fireworks to cultural purposes only and discontinue the use of
- 14 consumer fireworks on the three designated holidays, namely New
- 15 Year's Eve, Fourth of July, and Chinese New Year. This Act
- 16 would continue to allow display fireworks, articles pyrotechnic,
- 17 and aerial devices that are conducted by licensed professionals.



1	SECT	ION 2. Section 132D-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended b	y amending the definitions of "consumer fireworks" and
3	"cultural	" to read as follows:

6		to the public [during authorized dates and times,]

10		on or near the ground, emits smoke, a shower of
11		colored sparks, whistling effects, flitter sparks, or
12		balls of colored sparks, and includes combination
13		items that contain one or more of these effects.
14		"Consumer fireworks" shall comply with the
15		construction, chemical composition, and labeling
16		regulations of the United States Consumer Product
17		Safety Commission as set forth in Title 16 Code of
18		Federal Regulations and fireworks classified as UN0336
19		and UN0337 by the United States Department of
20		Transportation as set forth in Title 49 Code of

1		Federal Regulations [. "Consumer fireworks" include] ;

3	(2)	Includes firework items commonly known as firecrackers
4		that are single paper cylinders not exceeding one and
5		one-half inches in length excluding the fuse and one-
6		quarter of an inch in diameter and contain a charge of
7		not more than fifty milligrams of pyrotechnic
8		composition, snakes, sparklers, fountains, and
9		cylindrical or cone fountains that emit effects up to
10		a height not greater than twelve feet above the
11		ground, illuminating torches, bamboo cannons,
12		whistles, toy smoke devices, wheels, and ground
13		spinners that when ignited remain within a circle with
14		a radius of twelve feet as measured from the point
15		where the item was placed and ignited, novelty or
16		trick items, combination items, and other fireworks of
17		like construction that are designed to produce the
18		same or similar effects.
19	"Cul	tural" means relating to the arts, customs, traditions,
20	mores, an	d history of all of the various groups of Hawaii[-] and
21	includes	religious events."

The permit shall be signed by the seller or 12 transferor at the time of sale or transfer of the fireworks or 13 articles pyrotechnic, and the seller or transferor shall 14 indicate on the permit the amount and type of fireworks or 15 articles pyrotechnic sold or transferred. No person shall sell 16 or deliver fireworks to any permittee in any amount in excess of **17** the amount specified in the permit, less the amount shown on the 18 permit to have been previously purchased; provided that no 19 fireworks shall be sold to a permittee holding a permit issued 20 for purposes of section 132D-3, more than five calendar days
