## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FIREFIGHTERS.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTIO	ON 1. The legislature finds that the risk of being
2	diagnosed w	with cancer is higher among firefighters than the
3	general pop	oulation. In a three-year study completed in 2006 by
4	the Univers	sity of Cincinnati, researchers concluded that
5	firefighter	s face a higher risk of cancer than the general
6	population.	Statistics from this study show that, when compared
7	to the gene	eral population, the risk for firefighters is:
8	(1) C	one hundred two per cent higher for testicular cancer;
9	(2) F	rifty-three per cent higher for multiple myeloma;
10	(3) F	Fifty-one per cent higher for non-Hodgkin's lymphoma;
11	(4) 1	hirty-nine per cent higher for skin cancer;
12	(5) T	hirty-two per cent higher for brain and malignant
13	n	nelanoma;
14	(6) I	wenty-nine per cent higher for rectal cancer;
15	(7) I	wenty-eight per cent higher for prostate cancer;
16	(8)	wenty-four per cent higher for buccal cavity and
17	r	pharynx cancer;

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- 1 (9) Twenty-two per cent higher for stomach cancer;
- 2 (10) Twenty-one per cent higher for colon cancer; and
- 3 (11) Fourteen per cent higher for leukemia.
- 4 Firefighters also face a greater risk of contracting blood-
- 5 borne infectious diseases and illnesses associated with exposure
- 6 to hazardous materials.
- 7 The purpose of this Act is to provide a firefighter who
- 8 develops cancer, blood-borne infectious diseases, or conditions
- 9 related to hazardous material exposure contracted in the course
- 10 of employment with additional benefits of one-hundred per cent
- 11 average weekly wages, disability indemnity, and death benefits
- 12 as paid for by the employer through workers' compensation
- 13 benefits, upon the time such a workers' compensation claim is
- 14 filed by the firefighter, unless and until a claim is found not
- 15 compensable as determined by the appropriate division of the
- 16 department of labor and industrial relations, or by the courts,
- 17 in the case of an administrative appeal.
- 18 SECTION 2. Chapter 386, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 19 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 20 and to read as follows:

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1	" <u>§386-</u> <u>Injuries covered; firefighters.</u> (a) In addition
2	to the injuries covered pursuant to section 386-3, if a
3	firefighter develops cancer, a blood-borne infectious disease,
4	or develops methicillin-resistant staphylococcus aureus skin
5	infection, it shall be presumed to arise out of and in the
6	course of employment. The additional benefits shall include
7	one-hundred per cent average weekly wages, disability indemnity,
8	and death benefits as paid for by the employer through workers'
9	compensation benefits.
10	(b) The presumption under subsection (a) is rebuttable
11	only by a finding of substantial evidence to the contrary.
12	(c) If the firefighter's treating physician refers the
13	firefighter to a consultation with a medical specialist, if
14	within a month of the referral, the firefighter is unable to
15	obtain an appointment for consultation, then the employer shall
16	pay for a comparable consultation with a medical specialist,
17	even if the medical specialist does not accept workers'
18	compensation insurance.
19	(d) For the purposes of this section, "firefighters" shall

have the same meaning as defined in section 88-21."

#### Report Title:

Firefighters; Presumption; Workers' Compensation

### Description:

Establishes a rebuttable presumption that a firefighter who suffers from cancer, blood-borne infectious diseases, or conditions related to hazardous material exposure contracted it in the course of employment. Benefits include one-hundred per cent average weekly wages, disability indemnity, and death benefits. (SB675 HD3)

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
