## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The Hawaiian language, the native language of
- 2 the Native Hawaiian people, was once a thriving language used by
- 3 Native Hawaiians and foreigners alike. However, by the late
- 4 twentieth century, the Hawaiian language was pushed to the brink
- 5 of extinction due to a number of factors, including an 1896 law
- 6 that functioned to ban the speaking of the Hawaiian language in
- 7 Hawaii schools. Fortunately, the Hawaiian language was saved by
- 8 several historic initiatives, including the department of
- 9 education's Hawaiian language immersion program, which was
- 10 launched during the 1980s. The Hawaiian language immersion
- 11 program, ka papahana kaiapuni, is offered at twenty public
- 12 schools and educates more than two thousand students in
- 13 kindergarten through the twelfth grade.
- 14 Federal accountability assessment requirements present a
- 15 challenge for ka papahana kaiapuni. Because English is not
- 16 formally introduced in kaiapuni classrooms until the fifth
- 17 grade, third- and fourth-grade kaiapuni students have been

- 1 offered assessments in the Hawaiian language in order to comply
- 2 with federal accountability assessment requirements. Beginning
- 3 in the 2005-2006 school year and through the 2010-2011 school
- 4 years, these students were offered the Hawaiian aligned
- 5 portfolio assessment, which was developed in the Hawaiian
- 6 language, specifically for ka papahana kaiapuni. During school
- 7 years 2011-2012 through 2013-2014, English-to-Hawaiian
- 8 translations of the Hawaii state assessment were instead offered
- 9 to third- and fourth-grade kaiapuni students. These translated
- 10 assessments contained numerous flaws, including inconsistent and
- 11 inaccurate translations, and as a result, failed to accurately
- 12 measure kaiapuni students' academic achievement.
- However, according to board of education policy 2105, "the
- 14 program's effectiveness requires the development and proper
- 15 administration of appropriate formative and summative assessment
- 16 tools. These program evaluation tools should be in alignment
- 17 with the State's kaiapuni curriculum and measure student growth
- 18 and proficiency with the goal to prepare students for success in
- 19 college, career and community."
- 20 Act 134, Session Laws of Hawaii 2013, appropriated
- 21 \$1,000,000 to the department of education for the development of

- 1 "a common core state standards assessment in the Hawaiian
- 2 language." In 2014, the department of education entered into a
- 3 three-year memorandum of agreement with the University of Hawaii
- 4 to develop non-translated Hawaiian language assessments for
- 5 kaiapuni students in grades three and four.
- 6 The purpose of this Act is to require the department of
- 7 education to develop annual non-translated assessments in the
- 8 Hawaiian language for language arts, mathematics, and science
- 9 subjects, in accordance with federal accountability assessment
- 10 requirements, to be administered to kaiapuni students in certain
- 11 grades.
- 12 SECTION 2. No later than twenty days prior to the
- 13 convening of the regular sessions of 2016 and 2017, the
- 14 department of education shall prepare and submit a preliminary
- 15 and a final report, respectively, to the legislature on:
- 16 (1) The status of the development and administration of
- the non-translated Hawaiian language assessments
- 19 (2) The status of federal compliance issues relating to
- 20 the non-translated Hawaiian language assessments,

1	including the status of any waivers sought from the
2	United States Department of Education; and
3	(3) Any other actions taken to comply with this Act;
4	provided that the final report shall include the department's
5	long-term plan to develop and administer non-translated Hawaiian
6	language assessments for each of the grade levels required for
7	federal accountability purposes, including funding projections
8	and any federal compliance issues.
9	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
10	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
11	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and the
12	same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
13	2016-2017 for the continued development and administration of
14	annual non-translated assessments in the Hawaiian language as
15	required by section 2 of this Act.
16	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
17	of education for the purposes of this Act.
18	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2015.

### Report Title:

Hawaiian Language Immersion; Student Assessments; Appropriation

### Description:

Requires, and appropriates funds for, the Department of Education to continue developing and administering annual non-translated assessments in the Hawaiian language of established statewide performance standards for students in the Hawaiian language immersion program. Requires a preliminary and final report to the Legislature. (SB778 HD2)
