A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Reinventing
- 2 Education Act of 2004 (Act 51, Session Laws of Hawaii 2004)
- 3 established a weighted student formula to allocate moneys to
- 4 schools according to the different costs of educating students
- 5 with different needs. Despite the intended equitable
- 6 distribution of funds, the legislature finds that the weighted
- 7 student formula has placed small, remote schools at a
- 8 disadvantage. In the case of Lanai high and elementary school,
- 9 students have no public school alternative on-island.
- 10 Therefore, the school must have all the resources necessary to
- 11 meet the various needs of students. It must also have the staff
- 12 necessary to regularly offer courses required for graduation
- 13 while providing adequate elective courses to students.
- 14 Balancing such demands with a staff of fewer than fifty full-
- 15 time teachers, across all grades can be difficult.
- 16 The legislature finds that despite the current economic
- 17 situation, remote schools should be funded to retain the minimal



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- 1 personnel and resources necessary to graduate students. Remote
- 2 schools are more appropriately funded through categorical
- 3 allotments that guarantee the minimum number of positions and
- 4 amount of resources to ensure that school operations can
- 5 continue.
- 6 The purpose of this Act is to require that funding
- 7 allocations for remote schools be determined by categorical
- 8 allotments rather than the weighted student formula.
- 9 SECTION 2. Section 302A-1303.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
- 10 is amended to read as follows:
- "§302A-1303.6 Weighted student formula. (a) Based upon
- 12 recommendations from the committee on weights, the board of
- 13 education may adopt a weighted student formula for the
- 14 allocation of moneys to public schools that takes into account
- 15 the educational needs of each student. The department, upon the
- 16 receipt of appropriated moneys, shall use the weighted student
- 17 formula to allocate funds to public schools[-]; provided that a
- 18 remote school, as defined in subsection (b), and other schools
- 19 designated by the committee on weights shall not be allocated
- 20 operating funds using the weighted student formula and shall
- 21 instead be allocated operating funds by categorical allotments

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1	chat guarantee the funding of a minimum number of instructional
2	positions to ensure that at least minimum course requirements
3	are maintained. Principals shall expend moneys provided to the
4	principals' schools. This section shall only apply to charter
5	schools for fiscal years in which the charter schools elect
6	pursuant to section 302D-29 to receive allocations according to
7	the procedures and methodology used to calculate the weighted
8	student formula allocation.
9	(b) For purposes of this section, "remote school" means
10	any public school, as defined in section 302A-101, excluding
11	charter schools governed by chapter 302D, that is a high schools
12	(1) Located at least a one-hour drive away from the next
13	nearest public high school; or
14	(2) Located on the island of Lanai, Molokai, or Niihau;
15	provided that if a high school is combined with an elementary,
16	middle, intermediate, or other lower level of schooling, that
17	the entire school shall be deemed a high school for the purposes
18	of this subsection."
19	SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
20	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

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SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

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Report Title:

Weighted Student Formula; Remote Schools; Public Schools; Funding

Description:

Requires remote schools to be allocated funds using categorical allotments, rather than through the weighted student formula. Defines a remote school as any public school that is a high school located at least a one-hour drive away from the next nearest high school or a high school located on the island of Lanai, Molokai, or Niihau and includes high schools combined with any lower level of schooling.

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
