WHEREAS, most tea in Hawaii is grown on the Hilo side of 2 the island of Hawaii and grown in volcanic soil; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the ability for an applicant to register a 5 product's origin according to standards that define a geographic 6 region designation for tea would enable Hawaii tea growers to 7 benefit from the image of Hawaii while also honing their 8 9 products in anticipation of the TOTUS Awards; and 10 WHEREAS, tea is not currently defined as an agricultural 11 commodity under chapter 147, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and 12 therefore the Department of Agriculture does not have statutory 13 authority to adopt geographical region designation standards for 14 15 tea grown in Hawaii; and 16 WHEREAS, encouraging the Department of Agriculture and the 17 tea industry to collaborate on proposed legislation would be 18 beneficial to the development of Hawaii's growing tea industry; 19 now, therefore, 20 21 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-eighth 22 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2016, the 23 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of 24 Agriculture and the tea industry are encouraged to collaborate 25 on proposed legislation to define tea as an agricultural 26 commodity under chapter 147, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and 27 establish standards that define geographical region designations 28 29 for tea grown in the State; and 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Agriculture 31 32 is requested to submit a report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 33 34 2017 on the proposed legislation developed in collaboration with the tea industry; and 35 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a certified copy of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chairperson of the 38 39 Board of Agriculture.
