The successful web work allowed me to successfully put Hawaiian items on the web, like dictionaries, teacher curriculum, and modern as well as vintage Hawaiian books.

These positions provided management experience, including successfully coordinating a few dozen community representatives in a planning process for a historical cultural park, and experience with additional historical research and writing.
