HCIA stands in support of HB1041 HD1 SD1.

HCIA stands alongside Hawaii's local hunters acknowledging their wealth of knowledge and notable contribution to nature and food sustainability. Through combined efforts, we hope to establish a positive environment for hunters, fishermen, and farmers alike, so that we may pass that gift to the future generations of Hawaii.

We believe a State Game Management Advisory Commission will enable hunters to better work with the appropriate agencies to efficiently coordinate efforts. This commission should directly address and advise the Board of Land and Natural Resources to have a fair and unified representation.

Other states strongly advocate for hunting and fishing programs and typically have a "fish and game commission" comprised of sportsmen and wildlife experts from their respective communities. I, Alan Nakagawa, strongly support HB 1041 been a hunter on the Big Island for over 40 years and have witnessed the continued loss of hunting opportunities and areas. Large scale fencing projects throughout the island (especially in the Mauna Kea and Pohakuloa Training Areas) have not only eliminated large populations of animals but also prevents access. Loss of hunting areas with the opening of the new saddle road provided mitigation for loss of plant/wildlife habitat but no value or mitigation was awarded for the loss of hunting areas.

Hunting in Hawaii has continually been reduced and much of this is due to the lack of game management on the part of the State DLNR. The lack of a game management plan that includes updated rules and regulations and plans for habitat improvement and protection is evidence of the Department's lack of commitment and concern toward hunting. The establishment of a game commission will provide the Board of Land and Natural Resources a coordinated resource management effort that will give stakeholders an opportunity to assist in the enhancement and maintenance of public hunting in Hawaii.

Once again I strongly support this bill.
