In consideration of HOUSE BILL 1041, HOUSE DRAFT 2 RELATING TO HUNTING

House Bill 1041, House Draft 2 proposes to establish a game management advisory commission within the Department of Land and Natural Resources to serve in an advisory capacity to the Board of Land and Natural Resources. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this measure provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities indicated in the Executive Supplemental Biennium Budget. The Department also offers the following comments and recommendations.

The Department is pleased to have had the opportunity to work with representatives from the County of Hawaii's Game Management Advisory Commission and other interested hunters to come to agreements on amendments to House Draft 1, some of which were incorporated in House Draft 2.

The Department supports the current House Draft 2 in that it clarifies the advisory role of the commission with regard to game resource management and hunting throughout the state, including regulations under Chapters 13-122 and 13-123, Hawaii Administrative Rules (HAR). However, we do not believe that an advisory role for issues related to Chapter 13-124, HAR, which regulates indigenous wildlife, endangered and threatened wildlife, and introduced wild non-game birds is relevant to the purposes of the game management advisory commission and should therefore be struck from this measure.

Additionally, the Department believes that an estimated \$100,000 is needed to provide administrative support for the implementation of this commission. Use of existing funding sources would decrease funding available for the hunting program, which provides hunter access,

game enhancement and management, and many other direct benefits to public hunting. While an appropriation is included in the bill, the long-term support of this commission may eventually rely upon funding from the Department's existing programs. This includes the Department's recently expanded Access and Acquisitions Program that specifically targets increasing access to hunting lands and the acreage of lands available for hunting. In the past decade, more than 17,000 acres of new hunting opportunities have been added to the Department's Division of Forestry and Wildlife's managed lands and an additional 28,000 acres are in the process of being added to serve the approximately 11,500 licensed hunters in Hawaii.

The Department appreciates the opportunity to provide these comments.

Regarding House Bill 1041 HD-2, Hawaii County Game Management Advisory Commission (GMAC) STRONGLY SUPPORTS the creation of a State Game Management Advisory Commission.

GMAC was voted into being with a 2/3rds margin from Big Island Voters frustrated by years of neglect by DLNR and their many partnerships from being included in the decisions that affect our forestlands, fishing and gathering rights and the disturbing loss of resources. Part of that frustration is exemplified by the attitude of DLNR when asked why they weren't following the mandates of 183D, statutes regarding game, and told "So sue us!"

An Advisory Commission working in partnership with DLNR and being at the table with them is something that has long been needed in order to bring the voices of forest users to the forefront. Hawaii needs the participation of its resource users. The goal of the Commission is to assist in developing sustainable strategies of integrated resource management.

As to financing this Commission, we assume that a portion, at the very least, would be funded through the Wildlife Revolving Fund, a fund that receives it's

monies from fees for hunting licenses and similar commercial interests, fines collected for hunting or wildlife law violations, bail forfeitures, as well as the sale of tags and stamps required before hunting. This Self-Funding is likely to be continually supported by hunters statewide as long as the goals of the Commission are being met by the DLNR.

The Hawaii County Game Management Commission strongly supports HB1041 – HD2 and ask that you pass this legislation as written. Thank you.

We respect and value the opportunity to work collaboratively with the Department of Land and Natural Resources and assist in conservation and resource management.

HB1041 HD2 will lead to a more equitable system of natural resource management by empowering local communities, sharing knowledge, power and responsibility.

Due to the renewal of the Wildlife Conservation Stamp, hunter license, application and tag fees, funding for a Game Management Advisory Commission is available through the Wildlife Revolving Fund. Funds have tripled from approximately \$160,000 to \$460,000 in the past year alone.

The goal of the Wildlife Revolving Fund (WRF) is to provide funds to manage and enhance public hunting opportunities in Hawai'i. Act 290, Session Laws of Hawai'i 1991, amended Section 183D-10.5, Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS) by adding a requirement for an annual report to be prepared by the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) on the status of the Wildlife Revolving Fund (WRF) and transmitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to each regular session.

The State Game Management Advisory Commission would be one of the few if not the only commission funding by its own user dollars. Hunter license fees, conservation stamps, tags and application fees are paid solely by hunters.

We strongly believe that the department and our stakeholders should continue this collaborative and transparent effort to achieve balance regarding all of our natural resources.

In Support of HB1041 HD2 Hawaii State Legislature Twenty-Eighth Legislature Regular Session of 2016

Aloha Representative Luke, Representative Nishimoto, and members of the House Committee on Finance,

Thank you for the opportunity to have HB1041 HD2 heard by this finance committee. We are looking forward to the hunters having a better communication with The Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) and the wildlife personnel that works in conservation in Hawaii. Hunting is part of everyone's culture here in Hawaii, and our multi-ethnicity heritage goes back generations. Creating a game commission will secure hunters a spot on the table in making important decisions about the game resources.

Previous discussions at the HD1 hearing were about creating committees, our previous testimony still stands. We have committees on every island created and working with DLNR which is the Aha Moku Council. On Kauai we have the Kauai Aquatic Life and Wildlife Advisory Committee (KALAWAC). Both of which are not fully functioning and not a requirement for these committee members to be legal hunters. This is one of the most important requirements of HB1041.

HB1041 won't need substantial funding, *The members shall receive no compensation for their services on the game management advisory commission but shall be entitled to reimbursement for necessary expenses, including travel expenses, while attending meetings and while in the discharge of their duties.* HB1041 could use the monies in the Wildlife Revolving Funds (WRF) in Hawaii and it's obvious that hunters monies make a difference in the management of our wildlife programs (see list of revenues for FY 2015 below). *Section 183D-10.5(e), HRS, also requires that the state first use WRF monies to "maximize the state's participation to secure federal funds under the Pittman-Robertson Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Act."* I also hope that the State has honored the rules of the Pittman-Robertson Act, *These States must fulfill certain requirements to use the money apportioned to them. None of the money from their hunting license sales may be used by anyone other than the State's fish and game department.*

The top five revenues for FY 2015:

- Hunting Guide License \$1,825
- Game Bird Farmers \$10,425
- Hunting Licenses \$181,784
- Hunter Ed Fees \$1,368.50
- Sales of Game Tags \$15,610

From 2010 to 2015 there has been an increase in fiscal year revenue derived from the WRF (\$146,847 in 2010 and \$222,194 in 2015). According to the DLNR WRF report hunting economically benefits our state and hunters help keep the "nuisance wildlife" in check:

In addition to providing recreation and supporting a chosen lifestyle for many residents, hunting provides an economic benefit to the state. Hunting in America is big business. It generates more than \$67 billion in economic output and more than one million jobs. The top 10 states all receive over \$ 1 billion annually in economic benefit from hunting. The top two, Texas and Pennsylvania, which actively promote hunting, receive triple and double that amount, respectively (IAFWA 2001).

Hawaii, Montana, Maine and Idaho are states of similar population. Montana, Maine, and Idaho actively promote hunting in their states, and realize an average of \$430 million in economic benefit annually. Although Hawaii does not actively promote its game resources, the state economy nevertheless benefits from its hunting programs. The estimated overall economic impact from hunting in Hawaii was \$31 million in 1996 and \$28 million in 2001 (IAFWA 1996), (IAFWA 2001). A modest effort in promotional activities could increase the state's economic benefit substantially.

In addition to the tangible revenue benefit described, hunters provide a no cost service to mitigate the adverse impact of nuisance wildlife, a cost that would otherwise be borne by government agencies. State and local taxes would have to be raised significantly to pay for professionals to make up for the loss of licensed hunters who currently pay a fee to provide the same service. National studies have been made to estimate costs to the public in areas of human health, transportation, safety, agriculture, dwellings, and infrastructure if hunting and trapping were lost as primary wildlife management tools (IAFWA 2005).

I see examples in the Fiscal Year 2015 WRF document attachments has many proud accomplishments described on each island. Wouldn't you want to see an objective accomplished that one day it'll say, "Successfully managed by our local hunting State Game Commission"? Wouldn't that make the State proud to know they're working with hunters and their issues in a professional setting?

TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF HB1041 HD2, ESTABLISHING A STATE GAME COMMISSION

Hawaii currently has over 170 Boards and Commissions, including those on Acupuncture, Boxing, Elevator Mechanics, and Fatherhood. But there is no commission to represent the state's 23,000 hunters. They remain a disenfranchised minority, with no voice in affairs that directly affect their lifestyle.

Wildlife management in mainland states follows the North American Model of Wildlife Conservation and Public Trust Doctrine, a system that keeps wildlife as a public and sustainable resource, scientifically managed by professionals. Agencies entrusted with wildlife management communicate with stakeholders via institutionalized processes, and receive advice, direction, and support from established Boards and Commissions.

There is no established and systematic process through which Hawaii's hunting community can effectively participate with the State's wildlife agency to address concerns and provide advice on issues that directly affect them.

As an example, The Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Act of 1937, which taxes firearms and ammunition, provides a major source of revenue to the State's wildlife programs (\$3.3 Million in FY 15). It specifies public participation in state allocations. No established process exists, however, by which hunters can provide input into the distribution of the funds which they provide.

Operation of the proposed State Game Commission could be funded by appropriations from the federal Wildlife Restoration Act as well as the State Wildlife Revolving Fund, which is based on hunting license fees.

A Hawaii Game Management Commission composed of experienced hunters and wildlife professionals would be instrumental in moving the state to a scientifically-based and stakeholder-advised system for management of a valuable State resource. Properly managed, the State's game animals would contribute to island self-sufficiency, generate income, and provide recreational opportunity for Hawaii's people.
