HOUSE BILL NO. 1042 RELATING TO IMPORTANT AGRICULTURAL LANDS

Chairperson Tsuji and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill 1042. The purpose of this measure is to provide grants-in-aid to the counties for the identification and mapping of potential Important Agricultural Lands (IAL). The Department of Agriculture strongly supports this measure provided it does not adversely affect the priorities expressed in the Administration's FY15-17 executive biennium budget.

The county identification of potential IAL is a critical component of the IAL Law (Chapter 205, Part III, HRS). Unlike the "voluntary" IAL process, the county process is more intensive and time-consuming, involving significant stakeholder and public input, use of advisory committees, notification of affected land owners, and adoption of the maps and plans by resolution of the county council prior to transmittal to the Land Use Commission for further action. The counties of Kauai and Honolulu have already made significant progress in identifying potential IAL pursuant to Section 205-47. Passage of this measure would reinforce the State's commitment to identifying and incentivizing IAL in alignment with the mandate to protect and conserve IAL found in Article XI, Section 3 of the State Constitution.

Thank you for this opportunity to testify in strong SUPPORT of HB 1042.

Background: The purpose of this measure is to fully implement Act 183 in accordance with the State's constitutional duty to protect important agricultural lands ("IAL") by providing funds to the counties for the identification and mapping of important agricultural lands.

IAL first emerged in 1978 when voters passed an amendment to the Hawaii State Constitution. Under this amendment (Article XI, Section 3) the State is required to "protect and conserve agricultural lands, promote diversified agriculture, increase agricultural self-sufficiency, and assure the availability of agriculturally suitable lands."

In 2005, in order to fulfill this requirement, the State legislature passed landmark legislation to establish a process and criteria for the establishment of IAL (Act 183). Act 183 requires each County to undertake a process to designate IAL within five years of receipt of State funding to undertake the IAL project (identify and map potential important agricultural lands within its jurisdiction.)

With all due respect, to date, Maui County has **not** received any State funding necessary to fulfill the requirements of Act 183 and to implement this project.

Approach and Benefits: In accordance with Act 183, Maui County is respectfully requesting that the State appropriate \$500,000 for this purpose. Our reasons for this request include:

- Maui County is the only county made up of three separate islands. Staff would be required to travel inter-island and identify and map potential IAL for Maui Island, Molokai, and Lanai.
- Resultant products would include:
 - A geodatabase and hard copy maps of IAL.
 - A report of findings and recommendations and related technical studies supporting the identification of IAL.
- Expected benefits of IAL include:
 - Significant land base designated and farmed.
 - Increased investment in basic agricultural infrastructure.
 - Greater self-sufficiency in food production.
 - o Reduced development threats for lands designated IAL.

For these reasons I strongly support HB 1042, and respectfully request an appropriation for Maui County in the amount of \$500,000 to identify and prepare maps of proposed Important Agricultural Lands on the islands of Maui, Molokai, and Lanai.

Thank you for this opportunity to testify in STRONG SUPPORT of HB 1042.

The purpose of HB 1042 is to implement Article XI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution which establishes the State's duty to "conserve and protect agricultural lands, promote diversified agriculture, increase agricultural self-sufficiency, and assure the availability of agriculturally suitable lands" and includes specialized protections for lands identified as important agricultural lands.

In 2005 the Legislature adopted Act 183 to establish a process and criteria for the identification of important agricultural lands (IAL). Act 183 requires each County to begin the process of identifying IAL within five years of receipt of State funding to undertake the IAL project. Maui County has not yet received State funding to identify IAL.

The identification of Maui County's IAL will ensure that a significant amount of productive farmland is protected for future generations of Maui County farmers. We also expect that IAL designation will lead to new investment in the basic infrastructure that is needed for a viable agricultural economy. IAL will stimulate new farming activity that will further State and Maui County policy to become more self-sufficient in food production. The identification of IAL will also reduce development pressure and speculation on Maui County's best agricultural lands.

Maui County is well positioned to take on the IAL project. The County recently adopted its Maui Island Plan, and the update to its Lanai Community Plan is pending final review and adoption before the Maui County Council. The Planning Department has also prepared a Draft Molokai Community Plan update which the Molokai Community Plan Chair Tsuji HB 1042 Testimony of Planning Director William Spence February 19, 2015 Page 2 of 2

Advisory Committee will soon review. These plans provide directed growth strategies to meet community needs over a 20-year planning horizon. These Plans also include goals, policies and actions to support agriculture throughout Maui County including the identification of IAL.

In accordance with Act 183, the Maui County Planning Department is respectfully requesting that the State appropriate \$500,000 to Maui County so it can identify and prepare maps of proposed important agricultural lands for Maui Island, Molokai and Lanai.

The Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) **supports, with an amendment,** House Bill No. 1042, which appropriates funds to counties for assistance with identifying and mapping important agricultural lands (IAL). We suggest an amendment to allow funds to be used for developing county IAL incentives.

The proposed funding will further assist the City and County of Honolulu's efforts to comply with Act 183, SLH 2005. We have been making a good faith effort to comply with the mandate of this State law, despite receiving no State funding, as provided for under Section 7 of Act 183.

We anticipate completing our IAL mapping soon, possibly by the end of this calendar year. While this pending appropriation may not be helpful in preparing our maps, we may be able to use such funds to prepare the final submission package to the State Land Use Commission, and to assist with exploring county incentives for IAL. This amendment would increase the overall effectiveness of the IAL program as counties move into implementation.

We respectfully request the Committee move this Bill forward with the requested amendment.

Aloha Chair Tsuji, Vice Chair Onishi, and Members of the Committee:

I am Christopher Manfredi, President of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,932 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

HFB supports HB 1042, which appropriates funds for grants-in-aid to the counties for assistance with identifying and mapping important agricultural lands.

Since the enactment of the Constitutional Mandate in 1978 to preserve and protect Important Agricultural Lands (IAL), HFBF came before the Legislature every year with proposals of how this measure could be implemented. It was only in 2005 when the standards and criteria to designate IAL was finally passed and in 2008 when the incentives were passed. It was a long road.

We were pleased when the first lands were designated by Alexander and Baldwin in 2009 totaling nearly 4000 acres in Kauai. Today, we have over 100,000 acres that were voluntarily designated by landowners across the State.

Seven years have passed since 2008 and we remain in the phase in which counties will submit maps to the LUC identifying lands to be designated as IAL. Act 183 (SLH 2005) states that the counties will work on identification and mapping of important agricultural lands via funding from the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism disbursed through the Land Use Commission. The funding has never been released and in turn the county IAL identification and mapping has not progressed as anticipated. HFB supports the funding necessary to identify and map IAL in each county and defers to the LUC on amount necessary to carry out this measure.
