In consideration of HOUSE BILL 1754 RELATING TO HUNTING

House Bill 1754 proposes to establish a Hawaii apprentice hunting license to authorize persons without a hunting license to hunt under direct supervision of a licensed hunter. The **Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) acknowledges and appreciates the intent of this bill and provides the following comments.**

The Department is committed to preserve, protect, and promote public hunting (Section 183D-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes) and is aware that the maintenance and expansion of the state's hunting program hinges on continual recruitment of new hunters. The hunter education program was established to assure that personal and public safety are a priority for all hunters, as well as ensuring that hunters have a basic understanding and respect for game resources, non-game resources, and firearm regulations in Hawaii.

The Department agrees that a combination of mentorship and formal hunter education are necessary to promote legal, safe, and ethical hunting, and that this bill will provide potential hunters with these sound hunting principles. However, the Department suggests that issuance of apprentice hunting licenses be limited to a single license year and not be eligible for renewal.
