SUBJECT: HB 1814 - Relating to Education

The State Council on Developmental Disabilities **SUPPORTS HB 1814.** The bill appropriates funds to provide training and track data on public school pupil punishment and use of restraints restrictions established by Act 206, Session Laws of Hawaii 2014.

The implementation of Act 206 – Relating to Restraints and Seclusion in Hawaii Public Schools requires school personnel to be properly trained in the use of physical restraints, nonviolent crisis intervention, and how to develop and maintain a data base in order to document all incidents involving the use of restraints. HB 1814 will fund one full-time equivalent position (1.0 FTE) to provide training and data accountability to assist with the effective implementation of Sections 302A-1141, 302A-1141.3, and 302A-1141.4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as outlined in Sections 1 and 2 of the bill.

Act 206, Session Laws of Hawaii 2014, requires an appropriation in order to be implemented. Our understanding is that the Department of Education (DOE) does not have the funds in its budget to carry out the requirements of Act 206. The passage of HB 1814 would provide the means necessary for DOE to properly train school personnel, and provide data accountability.

The Community Children's Councils (CCC's) **supports HB1814**, with the amendments proposed which appropriates funds to provide training and track data on public school pupil punishment and use of restraints restrictions established by Act 206, Session Laws of Hawaii 2014. Requires report. Appropriates funds.

The CCCs have maintained seclusions and restraints continues to be a large problem in schools. Typically this is used with students with disabilities when they are upset in order to calm or control them. An analysis by ProPublica and NPR data for the 2011-2012 school year disciple practices from the US Department of Education's Civil Rights Data Collection show:

- Restraint and seclusion were used at least 267,000 times nationwide. That includes 163,000 instances in which students were restrained, Mechanical restraints were used 7,600 of those times.
- Schools reported that the placed children in seclusion rooms about 104,000 times
- In 75 percent of the cases, it was kids with disabilities who were restrained or secluded.

The 17 CCCs are community-based bodies comprised of parents, professionals in both public and private agencies and other interested persons who are concerned with specialized services provided to Hawaii's students. Membership is diverse, voluntary and advisory in nature. The CCCs are in rural and urban communities organized around the Complexes in the Department of Education.
