Regarding HB2069 HD2 Relating to Community Improvement Districts

Aloha Chair Harimoto, Vice Chair Galuteria, and esteemed members of Committee on Housing,

Hawaii Bicycling League **supports the intent of HB2069 HD2** to facilitate walkable, bikeable, and transit-rich development in the Kapalama and Iwilei areas.

Experiences from around the country have taught us that carefully planned development coordinated with walking, biking, and transit improvements can create communities where people have more transportation choices, spend less on transportation, and live happier, healthier lives. The Kapalama and Iwilei areas with their central location and future rail stations offer us an opportunity to learn from these national best practices and create a truly pedestrian-, bicycle-, and transit-rich community.

Kapalama and Iwilei along with Kalihi and Palama are already one of Hawaii's most multimodal areas, with three times as many commuters walking, bicycling, and taking transit (42.3% to 16.1%) and three times as many households not owning a car (28.3% to 10.4%) as the Oahu average. This is in spite of the fact that the area's streets are in need of significant biking and walking improvements – the three pedestrian deaths on North King Street in 2014 show the severity of need. In this context, walking and biking improvements in Kapalama and Iwilei will be a major benefit to the surrounding communities making walking and bicycling safer and more accessible for transportation, recreation, and health.

My name is Gladys Marrone, Chief Executive Officer for the Building Industry Association of Hawaii (BIA-Hawaii), the Voice of the Construction Industry. We promote our members through advocacy and education, and provide community outreach programs to enhance the quality of life for the people of Hawaii. BIA-Hawaii is a not-for-profit professional trade organization chartered in 1955, and affiliated with the National Association of Home Builders.

BIA-HAWAII **supports the intent** of H.B. 2069 H.D. 2, which would establish a community improvement districts program with a revolving fund, and a pilot project in Kapalama.

We believe that there is a need for government leadership in the redevelopment areas near the transit stations. There is a pressing need to address infrastructure capacity building along the entire transit corridor if we are to realize any of the increased density at the transit stations.

However, we question the need to create another layer of government through the proposed local redevelopment agency. We strongly believe that the appropriate entity to oversee the planning and redevelopment efforts would be an entity attached to the HCDA. HCDA currently has all of the statutory authority to redevelop urban areas, as has been done in Kakaako. Creating an entity within the existing structure of HCDA with the specific role of planning and redeveloping the lands near the transit stations would be a more efficient and effect approach than what is being proposed in the bill.

We understand that there are other bills which would give HCDA authority to plan and redevelop areas around the transit stations.

Chair Harimoto and Members:

Thank you for giving us the opportunity to testify on this measure.

The Hawaii Iron Workers Stabilization Fund <u>SUPPORTS the intent</u> of HB 2069, HD2, which authorizes community improvement districts with a revolving fund, and a pilot project in the Kapalama area. This measure seeks to coordinate the efforts of the City and County of Honolulu and the State to provide the needed infrastructure for transit oriented development.

The pilot program focuses on an older neighborhood that is in dire need of infrastructure improvement. The goals set out for the pilot program include 6,000 residential units, with 3,000 being affordable rentals and 1,500 being affordable in fee. These new units would be a major step towards providing the needed workforce housing in the urban core.

The City is currently undertaking an in depth study of the area of the pilot program in the Iwilei-Kapalama infrastructure master plan. We suggest that this legislation be flexible enough to incorporate the findings of the master plan.

We ask that following be considered: First, that renters of the affordable rentals have an option to purchase after 8-years of tenancy. Homeownership will provide Hawaii's working families a chance at financial security and the American dream. Second, that any developer which receives funds from the revolving fund must be subject to a project labor agreement. Project labor agreements will ensure construction runs smoothly and efficiently with labor disputes resolved prior to ground breaking. We applaud this effort by the State to coordinate with the City.

I serve as the President of the Land Use Research Foundation, member of the Building Industry of Hawaii, Urban Land Institute and the Chamber of Commerce, please let this testimony serve as my support for HB2069 Relating to Community Improvement District.

Community Facility District Bond Financing has historically been a successful tool in financing infrastructure and public improvements with Community Improvement District.

Establishing a pilot project in Kapalama will prove to be a very successful example for redeveloping the neighborhood in anticipation of the light rail under construction. The Kapalama district is ideal for mixed use redevelopment which should include a diverse mix of housing opportunities including workforce rentals, entry level for-sale products and commercial uses. Creating an improvement district will encourage redevelopment and the use of tax exempt bond financing utilize private capital financing and not relying on tax payer funds and government financing. Support of Intent and Proposed Amendments to HB 2069, HD2 Relating to Community Improvement Districts. (Establishes a community improvement districts program with a revolving fund, and a pilot project in Kapalama.)

The Land Use Research Foundation of Hawaii (LURF) is a private, non-profit research and trade association whose members include major Hawaii landowners, developers and a utility company. One of LURF's missions is to advocate for reasonable, rational and equitable land use planning, legislation and regulations that encourage wellplanned economic growth and development, while safeguarding Hawaii's significant natural and cultural resources and public health and safety.

HB 2069, HD2. This measure would establish a community improvement districts (CIDs) program with a revolving fund, and a pilot project in Kapalama. The purpose of this bill is to establish CIDs as an innovative means of accelerating appropriate development in certain areas of the State.

LURF's Position. LURF supports the intent of HB 2069, HD2, and respectfully recommends that this measure be **amended as recommended by the City and County of Honolulu (City)**, with respect to, among other things, (1) Expanding the uses of the proposed revolving fund to allow "fair share" improvement district assessments by state agencies within the CID; (2) Allow flexibility to expand of the boundaries of the Kapalama CID, because infrastructure improvements may involve other neighboring areas as well; and (3) Prior to adoption of the CIDs, require a public hearing on the specific boundaries and goals of each CID, so that the public can be informed and provide input prior to the finalization of the CID.
