Chair Tokuda, Vice Chair Dela Cruz and Members of the Committee.

The Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT) <u>supports</u> the intent of House Bill 2086, HD2, SD2 (Proposed) and offers the following comments.

HB2086, HD2, SD2 (Proposed) addresses immediate deficits in the state highway fund. With increases in fuel efficient vehicles available to the public, it is clear that the current gas fuel tax is not sustainable for future highway funding. Transportation industry experts have indicated that Federal Corporate Average Fuel Economy (CAFE) standards are driving improvements in fleet fuel efficiency, which is expected to reduce fuel consumption and erode Hawaii's state gas tax revenue per mile driven. DBEDT recognizes that public infrastructure requires everyone to share responsibility and supports modestly increasing revenues to provide needed infrastructure enhancements for motorist, pedestrians, bicyclists, and transit users.

DBEDT also respectfully requests to re-insert the language from HB2086, HD2, SD1 into HD2086, HD2, SD2 (Proposed). HB2086, HD2, SD1 amended the statewide transportation plan to include bicycle facilities as part of the transportation system components, required the Department of Transportation (DOT) to develop a survey on travel behavior and each county to develop transportation mode sharing plans. DBEDT supports incorporating bicycle facilities as part of the transportation system components, and as part of a holistic approach to transportation planning. Last year, DBEDT convened transportation stakeholders in a series of meetings culminating in the Hawaii Clean Energy Initiative (HCEI) Transportation Energy Analysis (HTEA) report. The substance of HB2086, HD2, SD1 is a recommended strategy identified in

the HTEA report to reduce the use of petroleum in Hawaii's ground transportation sector. Additionally, the HTEA report highlighted the importance of gathering key data as well as coordination between key stakeholders such as the DOT and County transportation agencies.

DBEDT respectfully defers to the DOT with regards to implementation hurdles and budgetary needs. Thank you for the opportunity to provide these comments regarding House Bill 2086, HD2, SD2 (Proposed).

#### RE: H.B. 2086 H.D 1 S.D. 2: Relating to Transportation.

Dear Chair Tokuda, Vice-Chair Dela Cruz, and members of the Committee:

My name is Gladys Marrone, Chief Executive Officer for the Building Industry Association of Hawaii (BIA-Hawaii), the Voice of the Construction Industry. We promote our members through advocacy and education, and provide community outreach programs to enhance the quality of life for the people of Hawaii. BIA-Hawaii is a not-for-profit professional trade organization chartered in 1955, and affiliated with the National Association of Home Builders.

BIA Hawaii **supports the intent** of H.B. 2086, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, which provides for an appropriation from the general funds into the state highway fund as a subsidy. Requires governor to provide a plan to sustain the state highway fund.

As the bill states: "The purpose of this Act is to provide an infusion of state general funds into the state highway fund while plans and immediate actions are taken to restore the state highway fund to solvency. The legislature very reluctantly makes this deposit. Subsidizing the state highway fund with state general funds is a drastic initiative contrary to recent past practices and sound budgetary policy. The legislature finds that the consequence of failing to provide the subsidy, however, would be more drastic: the decline of the condition and capacity of state highways, thus diminishing the general welfare and jeopardizing public safety."

It is unfortunate that sometimes, things must reach a "crisis" before any action is taken. The inability of an agency to plan and be pro-active in providing for the transportation needs of our state is unfortunate. While we understand the need to keep the State Highway fund solvent, it is unacceptable to continue providing funding to this agency without some accountability. The legislature should find ways to hold agencies accountable for their actions or inactions.

We concur that the department needs funds to perform their function, therefore support this Proposed SD2.

We can see there are critical roads, tunnels, and bridge repairs throughout the state that greatly impact communities and need to be addressed.

Our transportation infrastructure is key to our standard of living in Hawaii and key to the commercial transportation industry's ability to maintain that standard of living for everyone. Our timely deliveries provide Hawaii's citizens with everything they consume, and we accomplish this by having a safe and maintained infrastructure.

So you see it is not only the motorists or the commercial transportation industry that are affected by these roads, tunnels, and bridges. Being that entire communities are dependent on transportation we believe it is reasonable to utilize general funds to ensure our infrastructure can be relied upon to continue supplying those communities.

Transportation alone cannot always sustain the entire budget. In addition to "normal" business taxes our industry also pays various fees specific to our industry operations:

Federal heavy vehicle use tax; Federal excise tax on trucks, tractors, and trailers; State registration, fuel, and weight taxes; State PUC fees; State Airport fees (permittee; gross receipts; vehicle registration; merchandise delivery); State Harbor fees; State Tour Vehicle Surcharge; National Parks fee; County Loading Zone permits; and County fuel taxes and weight taxes.
