TESTIMONY ON HOUSE BILL NO. 2169, H.D. 1, RELATING TO SOCIAL WORKERS.

TO THE HONORABLE ANGUS L.K. MCKELVEY, CHAIR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

My name is May Ferrer, Executive Officer for the Social Workers Program,

Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs ("Department"), Professional and

Vocational Licensing Division. The Program appreciates the opportunity to submit

testimony offering comments on House Bill No. 2169, H.D. 1, Relating to Social

Workers.

House Bill No. 2169, H.D. 1 revises the supervision requirements for the

licensure of clinical social workers by deleting the requirements of direct face-to-face

supervision and individualized supervision, and replacing it with supervision that may be

face-to-face or via a Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996-

compliant ("HIPAA-compliant") video conferencing service. By deleting the requirement

for individualized supervision on page 4 line 14, it is not clear what type of supervision would have to occur to meet the sixty hour requirement. The Department recommends that the individualized supervision requirement be retained. Also under the current draft, it is unclear what type of supervision must occur in the group setting.

Regarding the language in the bill that would provide for face-to-face or HIPAAcompliant video conferencing, the Department recognizes that a number of states have begun to authorize face-to-face electronic supervision and understands that this mode of supervision will facilitate supervision in rural areas. The Department suggests that rather than allowing all the supervision to occur in this fashion, the committee consider retaining at least some in person face-to-face supervision. The Department also requests that the bill include a definition of HIPAA-compliant video conferencing so that the required mode of video conferencing is clear.

Regarding the revisions on page 5, lines 20 to page 6 line 1, the Department supports this revision. The Department finds that this language is prohibitive to some individuals who are not able to obtain supervision within their employing agency because a qualified Licensed Clinical Social Worker may not be available, or because the agency does not allow for supervision to take place on site.

Comments: I have supervised several social workers in preparation for their LCSE licensing. The changes in this bill will help the profession. Hawaii Island, especially, is very remote, and many prospective social workers can not easily get into town to meet the supervisory requirements. I want to HIGHLY ENCOURAGE the inclusion of the following concept/language: (iii) Supervision shall have [occurred in an agency setting that provides] included review of assessment, clinical diagnosis, and psychotherapy AND/ OR SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT. The reason for explicitly including the option for LCSWs to gain supervision in substance abuse treatment is because as per HRS 431-M, LCSWs are qualified to diagnose mental health AND substance abuse patients. I am a crisis worker with Aloha House Inc.; and am currently working towards my Master's in Social Work degree through University of Hawai'i at Mānoa's Distance Education program. I am testifying as an individual in strong support of HB2169, HD1.

Distance education (DE) has provided me opportunities, which would not have otherwise been available to me. When I first entered the program I was living in Hilo; and in November of 2013 my mom had a stroke. Luckily, the program allowed me to change my DE site. I was able to move back home to Molokai to care for my mom and to *kōkua* (help, support) my *'ohana* (family). Had I been enrolled in a program that did not offer DE, I would have been forced to drop out of the program. Additionally, DE allows us as social work students to work in our communities, which is vital to our learning and practice. Likewise to Distance education, HB2169, HD1 provides opportunities for social workers, especially those in rural areas, to remain in their communities whilst achieving licensure. This is important, as there is a shortage of licensed and licensed clininal social workers in rural areas. Furthermore, it will benefit consumers in these areas by encouraging higher levels of professinalism and services, and client accessibility.

My name is Isaac Kawika Nahakū'elua and I am in support of HB 2169 relating to social workers. I am a Master's level graduate student with the Myron B Thompson School of Social Work at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa and I'm a combat veteran that realizes that there is a great need for licensed clinical social workers for Hawai'i.

According to the National Alliance on Mental Health 18.5% of people experience a mental illness and 4.2% of people experience a severe mental illness, and according to the 2014 census there are approximately 1,419,561 people in Hawai'i. These numbers suggest that there are 262,618 people in Hawai'i that experience a mental illness, and there are 59,621 people in Hawai'i that experience a severe mental illness. According to the state of *Hawai'i Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs Professional and Vocational Licensing Division Geographic Report*, the current licenses for mental health workers in Hawai'i as of January 26th 2016 report 985 licensed clinical social workers, and the A.M.H.D. (*Adult Mental Health Division*) report 43 different kinds of facilities to treat people with mental illnesses throughout the Hawaiian Islands. This data suggests that for the 262,618 people in Hawai'i that experience a mental illness, and for the 59,621 people that experience a severe mental illness, there are only 985 licensed clinical social workers to assist with mental health treatment. Hawai'i needs more licensed clinical social workers, and your support for HB 2169 relating to social workers would allow a better opportunity for Master's level social workers to get their supervision hours needed for clinical-licensure in effort to help with the high demand of people needing professional mental health treatment in Hawai'i.

As there is a great need for licensed mental health Social Workers in Hawai'i state, I am in support of HB 2169.

WRITTEN TESTIMONY in SUPPORT

Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Woodson and members of the House Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce. I am testifying in strong support of HB 2169 HD1 Relating to Social Workers.

I was the Executive Director of the National Association of Social Workers, Hawaii Chapter in 1994 when we first established the LSW license for social workers in the state and in 2002 when we added licensing for bachelor level social workers (LBSW) and clinical social workers (LCSW). At that time, 14 years ago, the technology for video conferencing was still fairly new and not fully accepted as a means of communication for a profession that is historically based on face-to-face interaction. In fact, at that time we were very skeptical and cautious about using technology to do therapy. Today the technology has matured and become very sophisticated. Security and privacy issues have been resolved and it is an accepted mode of communication. Telehealth including the use of technology for therapeutic purposes is much more widely accepted than in 2002. In fact, professional education for our degrees and continuing education courses are also now provided via teleconferencing or online. Our professional practice has evolved to embrace technology and so must our statute change to incorporate these new advances.

This bill allows the <u>option</u> of either face-to-face or a HIPAA compliant video conferencing to meet supervision requirements for licensing. Additionally, this will make it easier for our colleagues on the neighbor islands to receive supervision for their clinical license.

We need our profession to keep up with the times and HB 2169 HD1 will help us do that. Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of this measure.
