Chairperson Tsuji and Members of the Committee:

The Agribusiness Development Corporation ("ADC") strongly supports House Bill No. 2271 which establishes a grant program within Chapter 163D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to support Hawaii's farms and emerging agribusiness operations.

The ADC is an agency attached to the Hawaii Department of Agriculture tasked with transitioning former plantation lands and water systems for diversified agriculture and providing solutions to certain bottleneck issues facing today's agriculture industry.

Establishing a grant program under 163D HRS will give ADC the ability to provide capital to farmers and agribusiness operations for critical agriculture-related improvements such as modernizing and expanding existing agricultural

operations, which includes equipment modernization and/or replacement, infrastructure repairs, research and development of new markets and products, and technical training and educational services.

The ability to issue grants will not only allow the ADC to streamline its operations, it will: 1) provide the means to assist local farming operations; 2) make investments to strengthen and diversify Hawaii's agricultural; and 3) attract and retain businesses. In addition to providing ADC with another tool to help move agriculture forward, the ability to issue grants may help foster partnerships to facilitate ADC projects.

In regard to Section 1, subsection (e) on page 3, line 15, the ADC already has a self-imposed limit due to its limited amount of funds and cannot issue a grant it cannot sustain. Furthermore, a limit on the grant amount may limit or deter certain grant proposals. For these reason, the ADC request the removal of this provision to provide the grant program with more flexibility. We appreciate your consideration.
