SUBJECT: MOTOR VEHICLE, Exempt Disabled Veterans from Motor Vehicle Taxes

BILL NUMBER: HB 2490

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: Disabled veterans by this bill are excused from paying all vehicle registration fees and weight taxes. However, there is no showing that veterans are unfairly singled out by the tax or otherwise face undue hardship, so why should the rest of us be required to pay for repairs, maintenance, and similar charges on roads they use?

BRIEF SUMMARY: Amends HRS section 249-31.5, which now exempts disabled veterans from payment of annual vehicle registration fees. Under the amendment, disabled veterans can qualify without needing to receive disability retirement pay from a branch of the armed services, and the exemption would extend to all tax imposed under chapter 249.

EFFECTIVE DATE: July 1, 2016.

STAFF COMMENTS: Act 128, SLH 2015, provides that disabled veterans (except those dishonorably discharged) shall be exempt from the state motor vehicle registration fee provided the exemption shall not apply to commercial vehicles and be applicable to only one motor vehicle for vehicles registered or renewed after 1/1/16. To accomplish this, Act 128 added a new section to HRS chapter 249, and that section is proposed to be amended by this bill.

The present bill seeks to expand on the benefits offered to disabled veterans (as defined in the existing statutory section).

The motor vehicle weight tax and registration fees are user charges designed to recover the cost of construction and maintenance of Hawaii's highway system. It should be remembered that all motorists use the state highways and should, therefore, lend a hand in paying for good and safe roads. Note well, that any exemption granted to a select group of users requires that the lost revenues be made up by those who must continue to pay. Motorists who will have to pick up the additional costs created by this proposed exemption should hold those who would propose such an exemption responsible for raising their taxes.

Exemptions based solely on physical condition or age represent poor tax policy. So while the exemption would provide relief to a disabled veteran, a single mom making minimum wage, barely making ends meet, must continue to pay these fees. Given that this proposal has been continually introduced, it is hard to imagine that lawmakers have not asked the question as to why they believe that a disabled veteran is financially incapable of paying his or her fair share to maintain the state's highways.
