1 **Fiscal Implications:** None to the Department of Health

2 **Department Testimony:** The Department supports HB 2494 and defers to the Department of

3 Education (DOE) for issues on implementation. The purpose of this bill is to include blood

4 glucose monitoring by the student and DOE employees and agents who volunteer to assist a

5 student with blood glucose monitoring.

6 Public Health Nursing Branch currently provides education and training on proper administration

7 of insulin and glucagon in the school setting. Students requiring diabetes care in the school

8 setting are referred to a Department of Health public health nurse (PHN). The PHN completes a

9 comprehensive assessment and develops an individual student diabetes plan. This plan, which is

10 based on the students needs, may include education to school personnel on diabetes, blood sugar

11 testing, insulin and glucagon administration, and emergency action plans for hyperglycemia or

12 hypoglycemia. Training is based on the American Diabetes Association guidelines.

The Hawaii State Teachers Association <u>supports HB 2494</u>, relating to blood glucose monitoring.

This bill will help clarify the assistance that may be provided at school to protect and keep our students with diabetes medically safe; allowing DOE employees to volunteer to administer or assist a student with blood glucose monitoring. This housekeeping measure seeks to ensure that the original intent of the legislation is clearly codified – specifically, that the rights and protections afforded by Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) §302A-1164 apply to all volunteers providing assistance with diabetes care as well as students with diabetes performing self-care.

DOE employees want to help their students when they are in need and this bill will allow those who volunteer and are properly trained to assist students as needed with blood glucose monitoring. This clarification of language will ensure that volunteers who provide diabetes care or assistance will be fully protected from liability under HRS §302A-1164(h) and students with diabetes who are capable of performing selfcare will be allowed to do so.
