This position appears to stem from a perception that certain activities that are normally associated with routine assistance to students with diabetes are not covered by Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) §302A-1164. While the language of that statute was never intended to be construed so strictly, HB 2494 seeks to eliminate any such ambiguity by amending the statutory language to specially include those actions. Doing so will ensure that volunteers who provide diabetes care or assistance will be fully protected from liability under HRS §302A-1164(h).
