On behalf of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation (HHSC) Corporate Board of Directors, thank you for the opportunity to present testimony in **strong support of HB 586, HD2**, that prohibits tobacco and electronic smoking device usage on HHSC campuses state-wide.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention ("CDC"), secondhand smoke contains more than 7,000 chemicals – hundreds which are toxic to humans – and 70 that can cause cancer. An estimated 2.5 million *non-smoking* adults have died since 1964 due to the adverse effects of secondhand smoke. There are numerous health problems associated with exposure to secondhand smoke, particularly in women and infants, including more severe and frequent asthma attacks, ear infections, respiratory infections and sudden infant death syndrome ("SIDS").

HHSC is in the business of providing quality healthcare services to the communities we serve. Our employees are a valued part of that community. Thus, employees who express an interest to quit smoking should also be supported. Allowing tobacco and electronic smoking device usage at our facilities is in direct conflict with the nature of our operations. Passage of this bill would ensure our patients, employees, and visitors are

#### Re: Support for HB 586, HD2, Relating to the Use of Tobacco Products and E-Cigarettes on Hawai`i Health Systems Corporation Premises

Thank you for the opportunity to offer testimony in **support** of HB 586, HD2, which amends Chapter 323F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to prohibit the use of tobacco products and e-cigarettes on the premises of all health facilities operated by the Hawai`i health systems corporation. This Bill also makes available tobacco-cessation programs for public employees of health facilities.

The Coalition for a Tobacco Free Hawai`i (Coalition) is a program of the Hawai`i Public Health Institute working to reduce tobacco use through education, policy and advocacy. Our program consists of over 100 member organizations and 2,000 advocates that work to create a healthy Hawai`i through comprehensive tobacco prevention and control efforts.

# The Coalition supports a system-wide tobacco-free policy for all health systems facilities in Hawai`i as well as tobacco cessation programs for public employees of health facilities.

Smoking and tobacco use contribute to a wide range of institutional costs. These costs include employee absenteeism, extensive health care costs and increased medical insurance costs, fire risk, negative environmental impacts, and increased cleaning and maintenance costs.

Furthermore, secondhand smoke is dangerous; the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary U.S. Surgeon General Report released on January 17, 2014 states that any level of exposure to secondhand smoke is dangerous and can be harmful and over 2.5 million people have died from secondhand smoke. The International Agency for Research on Cancer and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency both note that environmental tobacco smoke (or secondhand smoke) is carcinogenic to humans. Secondhand smoke contains 7,000 identifiable chemicals, 69 of which are known or probable carcinogens.

Electronic smoking devices (ESDs), sometimes called e-cigarettes, also emit an aerosol that can be breathed by both the ESD user and bystanders. "Secondhand aerosol (incorrectly called vapor by the industry) from ESDs contains nicotine, ultrafine particles and levels of toxins."<sup>1</sup> It is vital that we protect everyone from the dangers of secondhand aerosol. According to Dr. Stanton Glantz, Director for the Center for Tobacco Control Research and Education at the University of

California, San Francisco, "If you are around somebody who is using e-cigarettes, you are breathing an aerosol of exhaled nicotine, ultra-fine particles, volatile organic compounds, and other toxins."<sup>2</sup> Studies have shown that even ESDs claiming to not contain nicotine contain low levels of nicotine.<sup>3</sup> The World Health Organization (WHO) recommends that "legal steps should be taken to end use of e-cigarettes indoors in public and work places. Evidence suggest that exhaled e-cigarette aerosol increases the background air level of some toxicants, nicotine and particles."<sup>4</sup>

By passing HB 586, HD2, exposure to secondhand smoke and aerosol will decrease, creating a healthy environment for all residents and tourists in the state.

#### **TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF HB 586 HD2**

RELATING TO USE OF TOBACCO PRODUCTS AND E-CIGARETTES ON HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION PREMISES.

Thank you for the opportunity to present testimony in support of HB 586 HD2. I<u>, Jo-Nelle Tavares</u>, <u>Food Service Manager</u> of the East Hawaii Region of Hawaii Health Systems Corporation, am in support of this bill to prohibit the use of tobacco products and e-cigarettes on premises of the facilities operated by HHSC and require the corporation to offer tobacco cessation programs to employees.

The vast body of scientific evidence in recent history indisputably establishes the hazardous health effects of direct and second-hand exposure to tobacco products. In a 2005 study conducted by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (hereinafter, "CDC"), the CDC surveyed mortality rates connected with tobacco use in a four year period and concluded that tobacco use is the foremost preventable cause of death in the United States. In particular, during the survey period, tobacco use was determined to be responsible for an estimated 438,000 deaths per year, or about one out of every five deaths. Other data provided by the CDC estimates that approximately 8.6 million people in the United States are currently afflicted with serious illnesses attributable to tobacco use.

In addition to the substantial loss of life and debilitating diseases caused by tobacco, tobacco use is also responsible for billions of dollars in healthcare costs and lost productivity. According to data provided by the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, tobacco-related illness is annually responsible for approximately \$96 billion in public and private healthcare costs in the United States, including \$30.9 billion in Federal and state Medicaid payments, \$27.4 billion in Federal Medicare payments, and \$9.6 billion in other federal expenditures. The data further indicates that approximately \$97 billion is lost each year in productivity as a result of lives shortened by tobacco-related deaths. In Hawaii alone, data from the CDC provides that annual tobacco-related medical costs totals approximately \$336 million and lost productivity totals approximately \$308 million.

In light of the devastating effects of tobacco use, it is important for HHSC to take all available steps to protect patients, employees and visitors from exposure to tobacco products while they are on HHSC premises. Moreover, given HHSC's status as the fourth largest public health system in the nation and Hawaii's predominant health care provider on the outer islands, HHSC also has a special responsibility to set positive examples for other organizations as well as the local communities it serves. It goes without question that a tobacco-free environment on all of HHSC's premises would set a prime example of positive health practices.

With respect to e-cigarettes, preliminary research conducted by the United States Food and Drug Administration ("FDA") suggests that the ingredients contained in many e-cigarette cartridges are not free from harmful substances. Specifically, according to a July 22, 2009 news release, the FDA noted that its Division of Pharmaceutical Analysis examined the ingredients in a small sample of cartridges from two leading brands of e-cigarettes. In one sample, the FDA's analyses detected diethylene glycol, a chemical used in antifreeze that is toxic to humans. In several other samples, the FDA analyses detected carcinogens such as nitrosamines.

More recently, the California Department of Public Health ("CDPH") released a report declaring ecigarettes a health threat in that they emit cancer-causing chemicals and get users hooked on nicotine. While both the FDA and CDPH acknowledged that supplementary testing of e-cigarettes is required to gain a more specific and comprehensive understanding of the long-term detriments of ecigarettes, the potentially harmful effects of e-cigarettes and nicotine vapor cannot presently be ignored. As such, HHSC must additionally oppose the use of e-cigarettes on the premises of its facilities.

In short, given HHSC's mission of providing and promoting quality healthcare for the people of Hawaii, HHSC is unequivocally in support of HB 586 HD2. If enacted, patients, employees and visitors to HHSC's facilities would be free to enjoy clean, tobacco-free air on all of HHSC's properties. Additionally, employees would be given the opportunity to participate in tobacco cessation programs offered by HHSC to help them overcome their reliance on tobacco products. It is our sincere hope that patients, visitors and other employees would likewise be encouraged to quit tobacco use which, in the long run, would result in a healthier population, diminished health care costs and improved productivity.

# TESTIMONY ON HB 586, HD 2 RELATING TO USE OF TOBACCO PRODUCTS AND E-CIGARETTES ON HAWAII <u>HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION PREMISES</u>

My name is Dayton M. Nakanelua, and I am the state director of the United Public Workers, AFSCME, Local 646, AFL-CIO (UPW). The UPW is the exclusive representative for approximately 11,000 public employees, which include blue collar, non-supervisory employees in Bargaining Unit 01 and institutional, health and correctional employees in Bargaining Unit 10, in the State of Hawaii and various counties. The UPW represents approximately 1,600 employees of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation (HHSC). The union opposes HB 586, H D 2 because it (1) interferes with the right of public employees to negotiate over terms and conditions of employment, (2) it undermines the grievance and arbitration process to resolve pending disputes with HHSC, and (3) grants HHSC special or unequal treatment over other employees.

As you know the right to engage in collective bargaining is a constitutional right of public employees under Article XIII, Section 2 of the State Constitution. The times, places, and circumstances under which smoking is authorized or permitted at work is a negotiable subject under HRS Chapter 89. <u>United Public Workers, AFSCME, Local 646, AFL- CIO v. Benjamin</u>

<u>Cayetano</u>, 6 HLRB 112 (Dec. No. 413). This bill interferes with employee rights by allowing an employer to implement a total ban on smoking by mere "consultation." See page 3 lines 1 through 3. The need for good faith bargaining or negotiation is fundamental in bringing to fruition the legislatively declared policy to promote harmonious and cooperative relations between government and its employees and to protect the public by assuring effective and orderly operations of government. <u>Board of Education v. Hawaii Public Employee Relations</u> <u>Board</u>, 56 Haw. 85, 87, 528 P.2d 809, 811 (1974).

Until 2012 all HHSC hospitals and medical facilities by policies and past practice and custom authorized employee smoking in designated smoking areas (outdoors). In 2012 and 2013 hospitals on Maui and the Big Island unilaterally implemented a smoking ban, which is currently the subject of arbitration before Arbitrator Keith Hunter. <u>United Public Workers,</u> <u>AFSCME, Local 646, AFL-CIO (Grievance: No Smoking Ban, JS-13-02; AN-13-03)</u> (See attached decision and interim order). This bill undermines the grievance and arbitration process over the pending dispute. See Section 89-10.8, HRS (which authorizes final and binding arbitration of grievances).

This measure would afford HHSC "special" treatment not afforded to other employers. In <u>State of Hawaii Department of Education v. United Public Workers (Grievance</u> <u>involving tobacco free policy)</u> (Arb. Parnell 1995), a class grievance was sustained for violations of the unit 1 agreement when DOE sought to implement a total smoking ban via consultation. In the private sector, smoking policies are mandatory subjects of collective bargaining. See <u>S.S. Kresge Co. v. N.L.R.B.</u>, 416 F.2d 1225, 1229-30 (6<sup>th</sup> Cir. 1969); <u>W.T.</u> <u>Forest Products Co.</u>, 304 NLRB 957, 959 (1991) ("we find, . . . , that a ban on smoking on an employer's premises during working hours is a mandatory subject of bargaining, regardless whether the bargaining representative seeks to obtain such a ban or to limit or eliminate it."). Since 2009 the legislature has allowed smoking in "outdoor areas of places of employment" in Section 328J-7 (5), HRS. We do not believe HHSC should be afforded unequal treatment.
