In consideration of HOUSE BILL 883 RELATING TO AQUARIUM FISH

House Bill 883 proposes to prohibit the sale of aquatic life taken under an aquarium permit to be subjected to substantial injury or cruel treatment. The Department of Land and Natural Resources ("Department") appreciates the intent of this measure and offers the following comments.

The bill proposes to require three elements for a violation to occur - 1) the aquatic life be taken under an aquarium permit, 2) the aquatic life must be sold or offered for sale, and 3) the aquatic life was subjected to substantial injury or cruel treatment. In order for an officer to properly enforce this section, they must first observe or be aware that the aquatic life was taken under the authority provided by the aquarium permit at the time it was taken. Second, they must determine that the aquatic life is intended to be sold or offered for sale, likely at a location that is very different from where it was collected and third, that the aquatic life was subjected to cruel treatment at some time between when it was collected and the time the conservation and resources enforcement officer observed it.

The bill also provides that withholding food for twenty-four hours or holding aquatic life in less than one gallon of water per specimen would be cruel treatment. It is our understanding that the practice of not feeding prior to shipment is intended to prevent the animal from fouling the water. The practice improves survival and feeding the animals may actually increase the likelihood of death. Also, some species of aquatic life, such as invertebrates and tide pool fish, do not require a gallon of water per specimen to survive shipping as the oxygen content in the container is more important than the amount of water the animal is shipped in.

TESTIMONY OF QUALITY MARINE IN OPPOSITION TO HB 883 For Consideration of The Hawaii State Legislature House Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs

February 9, 2015

Dear Honorable Members of the Hawai'i State Legislature, please take into consideration our comments regarding HB 883 relating to "cruel and unethical treatment of reef species sold as pet animals."

Quality Marine is one of the largest and longest-standing marine ornamentals businesses in the United States. For nearly 40 years, Quality Marine has imported and distributed live aquatic species for the public aquarium, education, research, and retail sectors. Quality Marine is a strong advocate of responsible aquarium keeping, supports sensible science-based regulations governing the trade in live aquatic species and sound scientific management of fisheries. We are proponents of the IUCN guidelines on Sustainable Use, and operate in alignment with those ideals. Quality Marine is an advocate for the well-being and humane treatment of the aquatic species in our trade and work with suppliers that share similar standards.

Definitions of cruel and unethical treatment vary dramatically among individuals, among industries, and of course among subject matter. In direct contrast to every other fishing activity, the aquarium trade is dependent on the survival of the species collected, the optimal appearance, and the good health of those organisms. It can be safely argued that the well-being and survival of an aquarium fish is of paramount importance and is central to all considerations and activity surrounding its harvest, care and transport. To that end, high levels of care are employed throughout the custody of an aquarium fish, from the point of collection underwater to the eventual display in public or private aquaria.

There is no evidence to suggest that current common practices in trade that this bill intends to prohibit are either cruel or unethical. To the contrary, there are published studies, standards and guidelines that prescribe as best practices these methods of swim bladder decompression via needle, and the withholding of food in preparation for transport. The clipping of tail spines to ensure that bags used for transport are not punctured is the equivalent of trimming ones finger nails and not a cruel disfiguring practice. These methods promote the survival and good health of the species rather than contribute harm to the species and potentially, mortality. By the practices this bill defines as cruel, "behavior that may result in substantial injury to the aquarium fish or aquatic life" and substantial injury "bodily injury that creates a substantial risk of death or that causes serious, permanent disfigurement... or impairment of any bodily member or organ," most fishing activities other than aquarium fishing, particularly fishing for food and for sport is by definition cruel and unethical. To single out only marine aquarium species as being cruelly or unethically treated is not only highly subjective or completely inaccurate, but very discriminatory, not only toward the fishermen collecting aquarium fish, but also to all other aquatic species not benefitting from these proposed welfare benefits that this bill intends to promote.

We appreciate the opportunity to voice our opposition to HB 883.

Comments: • Every responsible scientific study, and even Hawaii's own DLNR, say that the management practices currently in place have resulted in an increase in Hawaii's fish population over the last 15 years. Of all the things that affect the health of the reef and its inhabitants, fishing for the aquarium trade has the lowest impact. Tourism, while essential to the Hawaiian economy, has a far greater impact than aquarium fishing does. To see tourism businesses like diving guides complain about the aquarium trade is opportunistic and hypocritical. They are seeking to use the legislature to gain a business advantage, not protect Hawaii. • A moratorium is a ban. The idea that the state of Hawaii would kill an entire industry and shut down Hawaiian businesses that have been responsibly operating for decades is unfathomable. The idea that this legislation offers job retraining for people who have built business over generations closed despite the proven fact that it was doing no harm to the environment is, frankly, dismissive of all the effort and risk that it took to build the business. • The steps that are taken in preparing fish for transportation are done for the safety and survivability of the fish. If withholding food keeps them from swimming in their own waste and trimming their fins (the equivalent of trimming your nails) keeps them from puncturing the bag that they're in, then why would anyone object. Requiring one gallon of water per fish is completely arbitrary. Those of us who transport fish for a living know how to do so safely and effectively, our livelihood relies on it. We stay in business by delivering live, healthy fish and these proposals will make it much more difficult to do so. • Hawaii's aquarium trade is considered to be one of, if not the best regulated near-shore fishery in the world. DLNR found that the West Hawaii "no-aquarium collecting Fish Replenishment Areas (FRAs), implemented in 1999, have been very successful in increasing populations of Yellow Tang which is the most heavily targeted aquarium fish accounting for 84% of the total catch. Despite claims that the Yellow Tang is disappearing, its abundance over the entire West Hawaii coast has increased by over 1.3 million fish (up 58%) from 1999 to 2013. The current population across all areas is estimated to be 3.6 million fish. • The Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) submits a report to the legislature every five years relating to the West Hawaii Regional Fishery Management Area. The 2015 Report finds that the "The Hawaii marine aquarium fishery is currently the most economically valuable commercial inshore fishery in the State with FY 2014 reported landings greater than \$2.3 million." • Marine Protected Areas (MPAs) and the DLNR Aquarium 'White List' for West Hawaii of 40 species permitted for the aquarium trade are working. Fish not on the list cannot be collected for the aquarium trade. In fact, the DLNLR, based upon the effectiveness of the West Hawaii FRAs for aquarium fish, recommends that it establish MPAs for non-aquarium fish species. • We all want a vibrant, sustainable and diverse reef. Science, history and common sense all confirm

that these things can be accomplished without draconian bans or restrictions. The people arguing for these restrictions are those who believe that to keep fish in a tank is immoral. They are a noisy but miniscule fringe element, and deserve to be treated as such. • The proof that HB 873 is unnecessary is evidenced by the fact that it is justified under false pretenses. The very first line is an easily proven to be patently false. It claims that legislation is needed because "The United States Coral Reef Task Force has reported that severe over- harvesting of coral by the aquarium industry occurs in Hawaii." In reality, there is no harvesting of coral by the aquarium industry in Hawaii and there no evidence that the United States Coral Reef Task Force ever made any such statement.

The following testimony is presented on behalf of the Pet Industry Joint Advisory Council (PIJAC) and its membership in opposition to House Bill 883, defining certain activities involving the collection of fish as "animal cruelty." We appreciate the opportunity to submit our comments before your Committee.

PIJAC is the world's largest pet trade association representing the interests of all segments of the pet industry. PIJAC's membership includes member associations, organizations, and corporations as well as individuals involved in the commercial and hobby pet and aquarium trade. More specifically, we represent the interest of live animal retailers, importers/exporters/ breeders, product manufacturers, wholesale distributors, and hobbyists.

For more than 40 years, PIJAC has promoted best practices for handling and care of live animals. For many decades, PIJAC has been engaged in legislation, regulation and best practices associated with the movement of live animals via all modes of transport. PIJAC has actively participated in the deliberations of the International Air Transport Association's Live Animals and Perishables Board leading to the publication of the IATA Live Animals Regulations, the globally accepted transport standards for animals of all types. PIJAC's representative to the IATA Board chairs IATA's Live Animal Advisory Committee and has represented several airlines as well as animal shippers for over 40 years and is well versed in all aspects of air transportation of live animals.

A review of HR 883 raises a number of issues which are inconsistent with acceptable animal husbandry practices and, if adopted as drafted, would achieve the opposite result of the proponents' objectives: the unnecessary stress and death of transported animals.

The preparation and shipping of live animals is not conducted in a vacuum. Contrary to some beliefs, shippers involved with live animal transportation do not prosper economically by transporting sick, dying or dead animals. The withholding of food prior to shipment is in the best interest of the fish and does not constitute animal cruelty.

Shippers utilize customary and generally acceptable husbandry and veterinary care practices when preparing the animals for transport. The terms and conditions governing the acceptance and carriage of live animal have evolved over the years to the current state found in the 41st Edition of International Air Transport Association (IATA)'s Live Animals Regulations (LARs) (2015), which contains detailed criteria, recommendations and guidelines in a 400-plus page document. The information found in the LARs reflects transport standards developed over decades of experience in transporting hundreds of millions of live animal shipments. The IATA LARs are the global standard adopted by hundreds of airlines, they are incorporated in national laws, and are prescribed by one or more United Nations Treaties.

PRESIDENT/CEO Edwin Sayres IATA's guidelines covering feeding and watering are based on the documented premise that feeding and watering requirements must vary by species as well as by individual specimens within a species, mainly due to age, size, preshipment conditioning, length of haul, etc. Fundamental to IATA's approach, therefore, is shippers have the responsibility of utilizing the generally accepted animal husbandry and veterinary care practices when preparing their animals for shipment via air.

In some circumstances, IATA provides species-specific guidelines. In other situations, which cover thousands of species of all ages, sizes and shipping conditions (i.e. bulk shipments in sealed containers versus single specimen shipments or shipments accompanied by attendants), IATA's guidelines leave it to the shipper to apply appropriate pre-conditioning. Inasmuch as the term "tropical fish" generically categorizes thousands of species, IATA provides that shippers are to responsibly pack the specimens to survive for 48 hours in transit. In order to meet the IATA 48-hour rule, withholding food is essential to clear the gut of food to minimize the fouling of transport containers.

Absent such pre-shipment protocols, the fish could be subjected to unacceptable toxic ammonia levels or other wastes resulting in poor water quality, which in turn is an undesirable stressor that could lead to death or serious morbidity. That is why customary practices, as indicated by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums in its testimony, as well as information provided below, notes that a "2-10 day fast is routinely done as a matter of professional practice."

For example, the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES) Transport Guidelines¹ at page 73 provide, in pertinent part, that fish shipments should be packed "in order to minimize pollution of the water, fishes should not be fed for 24 hours prior to shipment." In crafting their Guidelines, CITES relied upon not only the IATA *LARs* of 1980, but also recommendations from leading researchers from around the globe from a number of zoos, aquariums, research institutions, and humane societies. CITES, at a Conference of the Parties in March 2013, adopted a resolution containing language applying IATA *LARs* along with several special rules unique to ground transport when transporting CITES-listed species.

The IATA *LARs* have long recognized that the withholding of food prior to shipment of aquatic organisms is a globally accepted practice not only within the ornamental fish trade, but also in the live food fish trade. The withholding of food prior to transport decreases the amount of excreta from the fish, reduces the metabolic rates, and thus reduces water pollution; pollution that could counter IATA's 48-hour in-transit rule for tropical fish shipments. Withholding food also has been shown to reduce stress responses to handling and thus reduces unnecessary loss during packaging and transport.

The IATA guidelines are based on not only years of empirical experience, but also upon relevant literature. A 2010 publication by the University of Florida recommended

"<u>Withholding food from the [tropical] fish for at least 24 hours just before shipment allows them to purge their digestive</u> tracts, which greatly reduces the buildup of wastes during shipping. It also takes longer for larger fish to completely empty their guts." Watson, Craig A., Shipping Fish in Boxes, SRAC Publication No. 3903 (2010)(Emphasis supplied)

And from the NOAA website, one can find the APEC statement at page 18:

"Diurnal rhythms also affect oxygen demand. Handling and packing

procedures should be designed to keep metabolic rates at a low level. In most cases, this can be accomplished by reducing temperature and eliminating feeding for several days prior to shipping. The optimal time to cease feeding varies depending upon the species. Feed reduction schemes should consider product weight loss in order to ensure that the product condition remains prime." Air Shipment of Live and Fresh & Seafood Guidelines, APEC Fisheries Working Group, January 1999. (Emphasis supplied)

In an Hawaii based report on shipping ornamentals, Drs. Cole, Tamaru, Bailey, Brown, and Ako found:

"Feeding should be withheld for a minimum of two days and up to five days, depending on species," Cole, B., Tamaru, C., Bailey, R., Brown, C., and Ako, H., Shipping Practices in the Ornamental Fish Industry; Center for Tropical and Subtropical Aquaculture Publication Number 131, (February 1999: Hawaii NOAA Sea-Grant project) (Emphasis supplied)

¹ In recent years, CITES has adopted the IATA *LARs* as a substitute for its 1981 Guidelines.

As one would expect, the feeding and watering requirements vary not only among species, but also with specimens within a species depending on age, size and pre-transport conditioning, as they would among different humans.

Too often animal rights activists have been successful because they can make something sound much more dramatic than it is. When it comes to "piercing swim bladders," it is done to protect the health of the fish, and a 2012 Washington State University study by Emily Munday — "The Effects of Venting and Decompression on Mortality and Sublethal Effects in Yellow Tangs (Zebrasoma flavescens) Caught for the West Hawaii Aquarium Trade" — found that the practices of the Hawaii fish exporters did not cause any mortality in Yellow Tangs received by the researcher and held for the duration of the 6 month study – and ongoing observation. Although researchers expected to find higher mortality rates in vented fish, they did not. Their report found that "Though animal rights groups in Hawaii criticize venting, we did not find that it caused mortality or sublethal injuries in Yellow Tang. Banning venting may increase mortality rates if fishers implemented ascent without decompression. While opponents of venting have suggested that slow decompression be used instead, the time required to properly decompress these fish is economically prohibitive and impractical for fishers to implement."

Similarly, cutting the fin or spine sounds traumatic. Trimming tail spines (fins are not trimmed) is actually the equivalent of trimming your nails, and keeps them from puncturing the shipping bags. There are no published reports or scientific studies readily found that support the proposed ban on the sale of fishes with clipped fins. If data exists to contradict the experience of fishers and those in the trade who liken the practice to cutting one's toenails, it has yet to be presented.

The most inexplicable requirement in HB 883 is that shippers hold fish or aquatic life in a gallon of water. The dictate of one gallon per fish seems specific enough that one would assume that it was derived through scientific analysis. If it was, however, there is no mention of the source. In fact, requiring one gallon of water per fish is apparently completely arbitrary and there are absolutely no science-based studies supporting such a requirement.

The fact that this bill draws an equivalency between the slaughter of dogs for human consumption and catching fish for an aquarium is outrageous and an insult to those who have responsibly fished the waters of Hawaii for generations. The aquarium trade has decades of experience in transporting fish responsibly, and has a spectacular record of doing so successfully. Imposing these arbitrary requirements with no scientific basis to justify them can only have a detrimental effect on the fish. PIJAC strongly opposes HB883. We respectfully requests that the House Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs to side with science over unnecessary solutions to non-existent problems. We ask that the committee decline to take up, or defeat, HB883.

On behalf of Drs. Foster and Smith's Live Aquaria, a veterinarian operated pet specialty retailer we strongly oppose bill HB 606, HB 873 and HB 883. For over 31 years, Drs. Foster and Smith has heled educate pet parents on responsible pet and aquarium ownership, pet health and welfare, and our support of environmentally responsible fisheries management practices.

Hawaii's aquarium fishery is considered the best regulated and most viable inshore fishery in the entire world. Through the hard work and efforts of the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR), who submit reporting to the legislature every five years, the 2015 report found that the Hawaii marine aquarium fishery is currently the most economically viable commercial inshore fishery in the state.

The DLNR has successfully implemented Fish Replenishment Areas (FRA's) in West Hawaii where no take zones are employed. This initiative has been very successful in increasing populations of Yellow Tang (*Zebrasona flavescens*) which is the most heavily targeted species and accounts for 84% of the catch. Fifteen years after closure, the Yellow Tang populations have increased by 64% in the FRA's while their abundance in the 'Open to Take' areas has not declined significantly. Overall abundance of Yellow Tang through this management initiative has yielded a current population in excess of 3.6 million fishes.

The current regulatory initiatives in West Hawaii and Oahu, with their updated rules package for the ornamental aquarium fishery support the IUCN's policy statement on Sustainable Use of a renewable natural resource. This is a very important conservation tool, which provides individuals and families with socio-economic incentives, while ensuring the viability and prosperity of the fishery and habitat.

Responsible scientific studies of the fishery in Hawaii, and even Hawaii's own DLNR agree the management practices currently in place have resulted in an increase in Hawaii's fish populations over the last 15 years. Of all the pressures that negatively affect the health of Hawaii's reefs and marine life, fishing for the aquarium trade has the lowest impact.

We fully support responsible legislation using scientific based methodologies. Unfortunately, HB 606, HB 873, and HB 883 do not meet this criteria based on the successful management and regulatory initiatives employed by the state of Hawaii's DLNR, and therefore Drs. Foster and Smith's Live Aquaria strongly oppose this legislation.

OATA represents the interests of importers, wholesalers and retailers of aquatic ornamental organisms, including fish, in the UK. Some of the marine ornamental fish imported in the UK originate from Hawaii. Our members agree to abide by a Code of Conduct which includes the need to protect and enhance the welfare of fish in their care. OATA has participated in meetings of CITES, the CBD, WTO, the OIE and IATA on issues relevant to the sector. We strongly support the legal, sustainable and humane use of renewable natural populations of aquatic organisms including fish.

Fasting fish prior to transport is internationally recognised good practise. The IATA Guidelines eg Container Requirement 51 states "Fish must be fasted for a few days prior to transport in order to reduce excreta and subsequent ammonia formation". The OIE (a standards setting body for WTO purposes) Aquatic Animal Code (Chapter 7) states "Prior to transport, feed should be withheld from the fish, taking into consideration the fish species and life stage to be transported." In 2006 in a response to a question concerning mortalities of ornamental fish in transport a Minister of the UK Department for Environment Farming and Rural Affairs stated "...all commercial consignments of live fish imported directly to the UK from third countries must be routed through a border inspection post and all consignments are subject to a programme of targeted inspection. Evidence from this inspection programme suggests that mortalities account for approximately 1 per cent of consignments of live fish."

To require that each fish be transported in 1 gallon of water would be tantamount to a ban. Such a requirement would increase the volume and hence weight of water required to transport each fish by a factor of least x10. The freight costs of moving this water by air to importing countries would render Hawaiian fish vastly prohibitively expensive, closing businesses but rendering no gain in welfare.

Current practice in terms of both the amount of water used and the pre transport preparation and packing of specimens achieve good outcomes.

I believe this Bill must be opposed.

Dear Honorable Members of the Ocean, Marine Resources & Hawaiian Affairs Committee:

On behalf of the 228 accredited member institutions of the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA), we would like to take this opportunity to express our serious concerns regarding HB 883, which would prohibit the selling or offering for sale of any fish or other aquatic life. We respectfully submit that if this bill were to pass, it would greatly impact the ability of AZA-accredited aquariums and zoos to educate and inspire millions of visitors with compelling exhibits that showcase the natural beauty of marine life and habitats, including coral reefs and coral reef fishes.

AZA is a non-profit organization dedicated to the advancement of accredited zoos and aquariums in the areas of animal care and husbandry, conservation, education, science and recreation. With over 185 million visitors to 228 accredited zoos and aquariums, AZA's focus on connecting people and animals provides a critical link to helping animals in their native habitats.

AZA zoos and aquariums are committed to conserving the world's oceans for future generations of Americans and people around the globe. We do this by educating our audiences about issues related to ocean health, and encourage them to join us in reducing threats to fragile ocean ecosystems and wildlife. This is very important as a recent National Research Council study found that people learn as much as 90% of their science in informal settings such as accredited zoos and aquariums. We strongly believe that our message of respect, wonder and appreciation of the natural world contributes significantly to coral reef conservation and management.

AZA-accredited zoos and aquariums fully understand, recognize, respect, and support Hawai`i's desire to maintain its unique and diverse coral reef habitat. We also acknowledge Hawai`i's marine aquarium fishery to be one of the best-studied and best-managed fisheries. The fishery is a model for similar aquarium fisheries management programs around the world. We applaud the numerous efforts underway by state, federal and private organizations to accurately determine the health of this fragile ecosystem. Sustainably managed fisheries help to ensure that generations of children visiting AZA-accredited institutions and viewing the species acquired from these fisheries will be inspired to a lifetime of proactive stewardship of all our collective marine resources.

The AZA believes that nothing is more important than assuring the highest standards of animal care and minimizing the stress on animals during transportation. Best practices for transporting aquatic species have been perfected over decades and have been adopted by most in the aquaculture and tropical fish industries. We are concerned that the prohibitions included in HB 883 do not support the best practices developed by the industry and in many cases create a situation which would increase trauma and mortality among fishes. Additionally, HB 883 would shut down the tropical fish industry and deprive public aquarium visitors of the opportunity to learn about the vast diversity of marine life in Hawai`i because many of these best practices would become illegal.

For example, HB 883 would prohibit piercing or deflating the swim bladder. If the swim bladder is over-inflated, a simple 2-second procedure with a hypodermic needle can alleviate this problem. This is standard operating procedure throughout the aquaculture and aquarium industries. HB 883 also would prohibit withholding food for more than twenty-four hours, yet this practice is standard operating procedure for all fish shipments worldwide. Feeding fish within twenty-four hours prior to shipment as specified in HB 883 will result in fish dying during transport due to the buildup of feces and ammonia in the shipping bags.

Some species of fishes have spines that may puncture shipping bags resulting in their death during shipping (and possibly water in the cargo area of the airplane). The clipping of the tips of spines means the difference between life and death. This procedure is analogous to trimming a dog's nails or your own fingernails because the spines will grow back.

Lastly, the provision that all aquatic life must be held and shipped in one-gallon of water or more is arbitrary and unsupported by any objective evidence. The ratio of water and oxygen also has been perfected to ensure the fish bags have adequate surface area for mixing to maintain safe oxygen levels in the water.

We do not believe that HB 883 meets the intent of the bill which is to prevent cruelty to aquatic life. It would eliminate the only truly safe and effective means of holding and transporting fishes and would only allow activities that are lethal to fishes. We believe that HB 883, if enacted, would actually increase trauma and mortality among fishes.

The AZA community views itself as partners with the State of Hawai'i and its counties. We have the well-documented ability to speak to hundreds of millions of visitors annually about marine conservation needs. AZA accredited institutions agree that a common-sense regulatory approach that governs the humane take, the husbandry and transport of coral reef species in a fully sustainable manner, is a positive step in enhancing the coral reef fishery populations throughout the State. It is also important that legislation affecting this industry follow the best practices established over decades of proven techniques and research.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide input on these important decisions.

I strongly oppose HB 883 due to the following economic impacts it would impose on the state of Hawaii and specifically West Hawaii County.

- Needless monitoring expense and effort to enforce standards not recommended by various institutions worldwide such as Association of Zoos & Aquariums, IATA, and Pet Joint Advisory Committee.
- Loss of the ability for exporters to ship fish without mortality long distance due to the feeding requirement which is in direct VIOLATION of IATA established regulations worldwide. (Feeding fish within 24 hours of shipping will cause fouling of the packing container and increase mortality, precisely the **opposite** of the supposed intention of this bill).
- Cost of transport with the one gallon of water per fish, regardless of size, would result in freight costs approximately sixteen times higher than required for a live healthy arrival as currently practiced, making shipping completely cost prohibitive.
- Direct economic impact due to loss of income of families supported wholly in the industry and the loss of income by part time workers who count on this employment such as retirees, mothers with school age children, etc. who cannot for many reasons, either find full time work, or are available for full time employment.
- This bill is without any scientific support or basis in fact of practice or best industry standards as mandated by the International Air Transport Association and would require shippers to violate these regulations.

Please consider the families that will lose their livelihoods and do NOT pass this bill.

Dear State Legislators,

I am writing to urge that you <u>use the best available science</u> when making a decision on this bill. The text of <u>the bill as it stands now includes many false statements</u> regarding the threat of the aquarium trade to Hawaii's reefs and its people; these have been shown to be untrue based on decades of research by the Hawaii Division of Aquatic Resources and my laboratory group.

I have been working in West Hawaii since 1992 when I served on the faculty at the University of Hawaii-Hilo until 1998; as faculty member at Washington State University since 1998; and at Humboldt State University since 2013. I have conducted multiple research projects on the aquarium fishery in West Hawaii including evaluating the effectiveness of the West Hawaii Regional Fishery Management Area (I helped author both the 2005 and 2010 Legislative reports), research on the habitat, ecology and genetics of aquarium fish, and the dynamics and long-term sustainability of the aquarium fishery. As a marine scientist I have authored or co-authored 20 scientific papers on West Hawaii through more than 20 funded research projects, many supported by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and the State of Hawaii.

Fishery management in West Hawaii is unique for the <u>unparalleled amount and quality of</u> <u>scientific data available for management</u>, the effective leadership of DAR in West Hawaii by Dr. William Walsh, and the very important high level of engagement of the community through comanagement with DAR through the West Hawaii Fisheries Council (WHFC). As such they have repeatedly addressed emerging management issues that have been identified in West Hawaii using years of scientific research, committee meetings, and community discussions; all facilitated by the WHFC.

Based on many decades of work our research in West Hawaii has concluded:

- Most aquarium fish are yellow tangs caught from West Hawaii which has increased in abundance by 65% over the last 15 years;
- There have been no detected impacts of the aquarium trade to fish populations nor the health of coral reefs;
- The aquarium fishery is highly regulated with limits on species and number of fish;
- 99% of the yellow tangs are harvested without causing mortality;
- Fisher venting and barotrauma of yellow tangs caused no mortality nor sublethal effects for three weeks after collecting.

I recently conducted an international review of the global aquarium trade and published a paper with 18 co-authors, all experts in various fields relating to the aquarium trade (Tissot et al.,

2010, Marine Policy). One of the conclusions of our study was that Hawaii, and West Hawaii in particular, was one of the best-managed fisheries in the world. However, to continue this distinction the I am writing to urge that you <u>use the best available science</u> when making a decision on this bill. The text of <u>the bill as it stands now includes many false statements</u> regarding the threat of the aquarium trade to Hawaii's reefs and its people; these have been shown to be untrue based on decades of research by the Hawaii Division of Aquatic Resources and my laboratory group.

I was born and raised on the Island of Molokai and began collecting aquarium fish while I was still in high school. My father, who was also born and raised in Hawaii, taught me how to dive for fish and how to keep them alive and healthy. With the money I earned from diving for aquarium fish I was able to send myself to college. When I returned from college, I started Kaiohi Tropical Fish. Our company is one of the few in the world to use cutting edge technology such as closed circuit rebreathers and portable decompression chambers to collect deep-water fish in a healthy and sustainable manner. I was recently asked to give a talk at the Marine Aquarium Council of North America to an audience of thousands of people who are enthralled by Hawaii's aquatic biodiversity.

The scientific studies commissioned and carried out by the state of Hawaii show that the aquarium industry is the only sustainable local fishery. Those opposed to the aquarium industry would rather you ignore the science and facts and instead give in to their belief that this is a moral or emotional issue. Personally, I do not agree with tourism or the mass marketing of our island to outsiders, but this does not give me the right to try and push through legislation that might jeopardize the livelihoods of those involved in tourism or real estate sales. The future of the aquarium fishery, like all of Hawaii's fisheries, should be left up to the management and guidance of the state appointed custodians of the sea, the Department of Land and Natural Resources. The DLNR has checks and balances and management practices in place to insure that the nearshore reefs are not over-harvested by aquarium collectors.

Aquarium fishermen are incredibly good stewards of the sea. They know that if an area is overfished or the coral is damaged, the fish that they make their living off of will not return to that area in the future. Therefore, aquarium divers exercise great care when collecting fish. They leave large breeding pairs alone and never fully deplete an area of any type of fish. Aquarium fish have an incredibly high fecundity rate. Many of them can spawn almost every night, sending out tens of thousands of eggs. Unlike food fish that take years to reach market size, aquarium fish are more prized in the juvenile state. Most of them can be harvested in as little as four to five months of age. As soon as aquarium fishes are removed from the reef, the larvae from new spawns are already settling in to take their place.

Currently, Kaiohi Tropical Fish provides employment for eight local divers, one warehouse manager and a handful of divers in Christmas Island, Tahiti and Australia.

It is my request that you leave the management of the ocean and its resources to those who have the skills and scientific back ground to properly manage it. This should not be a knee-jerk emotional issue but a sound action plan based on scientific studies and resource management. Let the Department of Land and Natural Resources continue to do the job that they were tasked by the State of Hawaii to do. If the legislature wants to interfere within the DLNR's realm of responsibility, where will it stop? If you allow people to take away my livelihood just because they have an emotional problem with it, how is that right?

Dear Honorable Members of the Hawai'i State Legislature:

As a commercial member of the 221 accredited member institutions of the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA), a member of the World Association of Zoos and Aquariums (WAZA), and member of the European Union of Aquarium Curators, who combined *, reach an annual visitation of nearly a billion people world-wide to spread the conservation message*, I would like to take this opportunity to express our serious concerns regarding the upcoming legistation for the sustainable Hawaiian marine tropical fish fishery.

I am hopeful you will not approve legislation on the bill in front of you on HB 883. It is NOT supported by any science nor do these "cruel treatments" mentioned in the bill, represent anything more than some of the best management practices.

- 1. Standard operating procedure is to slowly bring fish to the surface by staging them at shallower and shallower depths until it is safe to bring them to the surface. This procedure is humane and is designed specifically to cause the least stress to the fishes being surfaced. Anything less is counter-productive to the fisher involved in the process pure and simple.
- 2. Piercing the swim bladder is no more invasive that one of us going to the doctor to get a flu shot or a blood test. We as the only AZA member commercial supplier (also a WAZA member and EUAC member facility) have been using this method humanely and sustainably for over 3 decades of professional practice to deliver display animals to public display facilities and to research facilities.
- 3. Cutting a sharp fin or spine such as is the case with the larger surgeonfishes, actually will prevent damage to other fish species in the holding system. Coral reef fish often use these spines to inflict damage during territorial squabbles to conspecifics within the short-term captive environment prior to being shipped out of HI. The practice is actually beneficial to the entire population being held for this purpose. It is analogous to trimming the claws on your pet cat, nothing more.
- 4. Withholding food prior to shipment is a standard portion of best management practices used when humanely shipping fish to any destination to briefly allow the digestive tract to purge. NOT WITHHOLDING FOOD IS ACTUALLY FAR MORE INJURIOUS, as the feces that are inevitable will contaminate the water in the shipping bag and cause far more harm! This is analogous to us, as humans, fasting and cleansing our intestines prior to a colonoscopy.
- 5. The size of a holding area for any fish is totally relative to the size and behavioral demands of that species. There is no simplistic empirical formula to determine this requirement. It is learned with observation and experience. It is also in the best

interests of the fisher, both ethical and financial to hold fishes in the best care possible. Fishes that have not received the best care are not desirable for aquarium display so the issues are self-managed and without need for legilation and mandate. A fish that is 2" long can easily be held is far less space than a gallon container for the short term of acclimation in HI systems. Conversely, a very large fish like a 3' moral eel needs 50 times the volume of a one gallon containers to be held ethically and humanely. You run a very real risk of mandating bad management practices with this regulation!

In the end I think we all will eventually agree that a common sense, science-based, regulatory approach that governs the take and humane transportation of coral reef species is a positive step in the management of this fishery and a key element in enhancing the coral reef fishery populations in Hawai'i. We remind you that we strongly support the State of Hawai'i Division of Aquatic Resources management team to enact limited entry and other conservation measures deemed appropriate by science, and not be overly swayed by emotion to fairly and successfully manage this valuable fishery.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide input on these important decisions.

Tropical Marine Centre was a founding supporter, data provider and financial sponsor of **UNEP** –**WCMC's Global Marine Aquarium Database (GMAD)** as well as being a founding member of the **Marine Aquarium Council (MAC)** and became one of the first certified livestock operations in Europe. Tropical Marine Centre maintains a close relationship with our own Government's Department of the Environment and Rural Affairs and assists with the training of CITES Wildlife Inspectors in the United Kingdom in respect of identification and handling of CITES listed corals species.

Through the collecting operations in both O'ahu and in particular Kona, which supply Tropical Marine Centre, we strongly oppose HB 883 due to the following economic impacts it would impose on our business through this mandate for additional practices imposing standards not recommended by various institutions worldwide such as Association of Zoos & Aquariums, IATA, and Pet Joint Advisory Committee. In particular the loss of the ability for exporters to ship fish without mortality long distance due to the feeding requirement which is in direct VIOLATION of IATA established regulations worldwide is a nonsense. Feeding fish within 24 hours of shipping will cause fouling of the packing container and increase mortality, precisely the opposite of the supposed intention of this bill. Cost of transport with the one gallon of water per fish, regardless of size, would result in freight costs approximately sixteen times higher than required for a live healthy arrival as currently practiced, making shipping completely cost prohibitive and make exports from Hawaii unaffordable or economic. There will as a result be a direct economic impact in terms of loss of income of families supported wholly in the industry by exports to Tropical Marine Centre from Hawaii. This bill is without any scientific support or basis in fact of practice or best industry standards as mandated by the International Air Transport Association and our own Codes of Conduct and would require shippers to violate these regulations and codes.

It is important for all stakeholders to note that the Hawaiian marine collecting businesses supplying Tropical Marine Centre already conform to the highest standards of best practice in our industry and this is reflected in the very high quality and condition of collected Hawaiian fish, and the low mortality both during transport and post transport to the UK. These mortalities are typically less than 0.1 -0.3% for the long journey from the Pacific, and the onward survivorship in our aquariums, with our retailers and with the hobbyist is very high.

Tropical Marine Centre already consider the aquarium fishery in Hawaiian to be one of the best managed and regulated of all the 42 collection areas we work with worldwide.

Bill <u>HB 883</u>

Dear Members of the Legislature,

The transport of ornamental aquatics has a long history and has well established practices that are used internationally to ensure that the fish arrive safe and sound with the best care for the welfare of the organism. It is economically completely counterproductive to transport fish and have them die at the receiver. Steps that are taken in preparing fish for transportation are done for the safety and survivability of the fish. Withholding food prior to shipment is a long accepted husbandry practice well documented in the literature as well as recommended in the International Air Transport Association (IATA) Live Animals Regulations. It eliminates harm to fish by avoiding elevated levels of ammonia and fouling of the water with excrement. If the proposed rule is adopted it will lead to severe stress or death. Requiring one gallon of water per fish is completely arbitrary and there are absolutely no science-based studies supporting such a requirement.

One would hope that such a bill would not be necessary given our animal cruelty laws, but we urge you to pass HB 833 so that it will be easier to enforce those laws within the commercial aquarium trade and significantly reduce the number of fish and other species that die in transit as they are shipped to aquarium enthusiasts.

My name is Robert Wintner, Owner of Snorkel Bob, testifying in strong support of HB 883, which would prohibit the sale of Hawaii reef wildlife subjected to abuse for the aquarium trade.

The aquarium trade is focused on dollar efficiency, and dollar efficiency causes the aquarium trade to ship Hawaii reef life with only minimal water. Dollar efficiency also drives abusive practices such as "fizzing" and "finning."

Aquarium expert Bob Fenner has advised for years that more water used in shipping will reduce mortality. Now the aquarium trade claims that more water will actually kill the critters, but would you ever fly coach if you had a choice to go up front? More water will eliminate the need for starvation—now up to 12 days of starvation on some species. Minimal water is far more likely to foul.

"Fizzing" is puncturing a fish's swim bladder (or air bladder) with a hypodermic needle to prevent barotrauma—bulging eyes and guts out the mouth—from surfacing too fast. It makes a fizzing sound. Humans avoid barotrauma by rising slowly, but that takes time, and time is money, so the aquarium trade calls fizzing a life-saving practice as it rushes Hawaii reef wildlife to the surface for more profitable trafficking to the pet trade.

"Finning" is cutting the dorsal fins to avoid puncturing the tiny plastic bag used for shipping. Finning could be avoided by double bagging, but that would cost more.

RE: SUPPORT for HB883; Relating to Aquarium Fish

On behalf of our members and supporters across Hawaii we respectfully urge your support of HB883 to afford the most basic animal welfare protections to reef fish taken for the Aquarium Trade. While <u>research</u> has demonstrated that the vast majority of Hawaii residents want to see an end to this wasteful trade in its entirety, prohibiting certain practices, such as starvation prior to transport and a sufficient volume of water for shipping, will help to reduce mortalities that are ever-present in the trade.

This measure is further needed based on the following research:

- High mortalities are associated with transport: 5% "Dead on Arrival" is the industry standard for "acceptable losses" during air transport (Lim, et. al, 2003). Cumulative mortality within seven days of arrival at wholesalers is 11%. (Lim, et al., 2003). A survey of marine aquarium dealers and retailers nationwide showed similar losses (at least 9%) within 3 days of arrival (AMDA, 1997). Note: these transport-related losses are repeated at each step in the supply chain (i.e. at importer; wholesaler/distributor; and/or retailer), creating a cumulative impact of up to 40 percent mortality beginning from extraction.
- Factors within the supply chain contributing to mortalities include physical injury during capture (e.g. net injuries, barotrauma, fizzing, fin clipping), poor water quality, oxygen depletion, poor handling, disease, starvation, jostling during transport, the accumulation of ammonia in the bag water, and stress at all stages in the chain of custody (Wood 2001; Wabnitz et al. 2003; Rubec & Cruz, 2005; Cartwright et al., 2012).
- Stress plays a key role in fish mortality: though individual stressors may be sub-lethal, the effects of multiple stressors are cumulative and result in considerable loss (Rubec, et al., 2000). The stress and starvation combination has been shown to cause the highest delayed mortality rates (Rubec & Cruz, 2005).
- Fish are intentionally starved for 2 10 days prior to air transport. They are packed in small plastic bags with minimal water just enough to cover the fish, plus 1" (Cohen, et al., 2010).
- Delayed mortality continues for weeks after transport. Post Traumatic Shipping Disorder (PTSD aka Delayed Mortality Syndrome) results in the sudden death of seemingly well-adjusted fish, days or weeks after transport. The cause may be digestive tract damage from starvation and stress during transport (Lidster, 1999; Noga, 2000). PTSD affects a large number of animals. For

example over 75% of Flame Angels and Potter's Angels shipped from Hawaii likely perish in the first 6 weeks of captivity from PTSD (Lidster, 1999).

- 11% of fish die within 14 days at retail from problems in the supply chain. Monthly average is 16% (Cartwright et al., 2012). An average cumulative mortality of about 20% at retail has been reported elsewhere (Rubec & Cruz, 2005).
- Retailers and suppliers and each level of the supply chain are profiting from the high mortalities in home aquariums and subsequent purchases of "replacement fish". These profits are a disincentive to change their practices (Cartwright et al., 2012).
- 80% of the fish mortality in home aquariums is attributable to supply side practices rather than hobbyist error, which is typically cited by the trade as the driver behind the high losses. Hobbyists are unknowingly buying injured and diseased animals from retailers (Cartwright et al., 2012).
- Numerous papers report that collection levels are much higher than demand in order to compensate for mortalities throughout the supply chain. This results in severe overfishing on the world's threatened coral reef ecosystems (Wood, 2001; Bruckner, 2004; US Coral Reef Task Force 2004; Cartwright et al., 2012).

Based on the aforementioned, we again urge your passage of HB883, to provide the most basic protections to Hawaii's fragile reef species.

Testimony on HB883 Relating to Aquarium Fish -- IN SUPPORT

Aloha Honorable Chair Ing, Vice-Chair Lowen, and Committee Members,

My name is Rene Umberger and as the founder of For the Fishes and co-founder of the Reef Rescue Alliance, I am testifying in support of HB883. Thank you for hearing this bill protecting Hawaii's reef wildlife from harmful aquarium trade practices. Until the aquarium trade is shut down, this bill is needed to bring compassion to an industry that too often sacrifices wildlife well-being for increased profits. As stewards of Hawaii's wildlife and reefs, increasing the captive survivability of marine life captured and sold as pets is the least we can do.

Industry-reported mortality rates and independent research provides evidence that reef fish in the pet industry are mistreated. Appropriate capture, holding, and transport would be indicated by a mortality standard below 1% at each step in the chain of custody. That 1% threshold was set in a multi-million dollar, multi-stakeholder reform effort and certification scheme attempted over a decade ago by the Marine Aquarium Council, an international effort based in Honolulu. That effort ultimately failed, in part from vocal trade opposition that wanted the death rate set at 5%.

Today's mortality rates reflect that. The industry reports deaths generally ranging from 3 – 5% at each step before retail, where it then doubles. For example, Hawaii's trade reported a 3% loss between the collector and wholesaler in 2012. More were lost in holding and in transport as they moved from Hawaii to wholesaler to retailer. Applied to Hawaii's 2012 reported catch, supply chain mortalities likely exceeded 100,000 fish before retail sale. Once in a hobby tank, 80% of the fish deaths there are caused by poor supply chain practices.

HB883 would end the cruel practices contributing to that unacceptably high loss. It's one thing to kill a fish and eat it or use it as bait, but once we take an animal as a pet, we're obligated to treat it humanely. In fact, HRS requires it of us. The need for the provisions in this bill are attached.

When an industry is shown to profit from premature pet deaths, it's time for lawmakers to step in. Evidence shows that with better care, fewer fish will die. That also means more fish will be left on our reefs. I urge you to pass this bill.

Mahalo, Rene Umberger Reef Rescue Alliance For the Fishes (1) Surfacing at a rate resulting in physical damage to the body tissue:



Taking fish to the surface too quickly results in barotrauma, an injury to tissues and organs, most commonly seen in bulging eyes and stomachs. This trauma is easily avoided by slow surfacing/decompression. A recent Hawaii report (Munday, 2012) noted that yellow tangs surfaced slowly over the course of > 2 hours suffered no barotrauma injury. It also noted that slow decompression might be economically detrimental to aquarium trade members.

(2) Piercing or deflating the swim bladder:



Piercing/deflating fish swim bladders is an action used to mitigate visible signs of barotrauma. It causes further stress that contributes to delayed mortality in the supply chain and is completely avoidable with slow decompression and avoidance of barotrauma.

(3) <u>Cutting the fin or spine</u>:



Cutting fins and spines is an action used to save money on shipping materials. Fish with sharp fins/spines should be packed in rigid plastic containers or heavy plastic bags alternating between layers of sturdy paper.

(4) Withholding food for more than twenty-four hours; or



In preparation for air cargo shipment, fish are starved for 2 – 10 days. This serves one purpose: to reduce shipping costs. Starving fish for extended periods facilitates transport in minimal water which is heavy and very expensive. Enough water to cover the fish, plus \sim 1" above the dorsal fin is the norm. This may equate to as little as one quart of water.

Starvation, combined with stress is linked to the highest mortality rates (Rubec, 2005). The alternative is to starve for less time, up to 24 hours, and ship in more water (with more oxygen). This example is shown in the 2nd and 3rd images above: Rare and expensive Weedy Sea Dragons were shipped from Australia to a Kona aquaculture facility in December.

One meal was withheld and each small Sea Dragon was shipped in gallons of water.

This disproves claims that reduced starvation time and increased shipping water would be detrimental to fish well-being. On the contrary, it facilitates well-being for numerous reasons.

(5) Holding fish or aquatic life in less than one gallon of water, per each specimen, within any container.



Fish value also determines water/space provided in warehouse holding tanks: landed value for yellow tangs is \$4 each. Compare to the space provided for Chevron Tangs, valued at \$17, and Achilles Tangs, at \$21.

<u>HB 883.</u> Calls for shipping fishes in not less than one gallon of water. This practice is not only unwarranted; as again, the trade and science have determined that less water, using the space in the bag for more oxygen), is the best practice for assuring health in transit. More water gives the animals too much space to move about during transport. I urge you to read the natural history of these fishes; at night time they "lay down" in nooks, crannies changing color a bit... to avoid predators. For shipments, fish are double bagged and placed in shipping containers which will induce the "sleep phase" behavior. More water and room sloshing about will only damage this life in transit.

If you were required to ship your dog with the same space requirements as a 2" yellow tang in a gallon of water you would have to transport the giant kennel to the airlines with a police escort for a double wide load on a huge specialized truck. So while you are sitting crammed into seat 268, the fish are snoozing away in the cargo hold held at the same cabin temperature.

It is a well-established world-wide practice to "clean out" livestock to be shipped. This practice greatly increases the preservation of health of aquatic livestock, that otherwise is greatly stressed by the addition of ammonia. All aquatic fish produce ammonia, continuously, with more being present with increased feeding and subsequent wastes in the bag. Feeding fishes and invertebrates so soon to their shipment would result in much higher incidental mortality especially with fishes like Tangs that produce copious amounts of wastes due to their mostly algal diet.

Only a few fish require the tips of the spines to be dipped. This practice prevents fish from injuring each other or damaging the shipping bags. It is exactly the same as clipping your finger nails or caring for your horses hoofs, or trimming your dog's nails.

Emily Munday, a Washington State student, did a thorough study of the AQ fishery in Kona for her master thesis. Out of sixty yellow tang caught, vented, clipped, purged and shipped to Washington in standard shipping bags, all sixty are still alive and well over two years later. In fact they are in an exhibit at the Hatfield Marine Aquarium highlighting the sustainability of the aquarium trade in Hawaii. Thousands of visitors get reminded of Hawaii when visiting there. This is the only third party shipping study done on the yellow tang fishery in Hawaii. Our opponents use twenty year old data from third world countries where the fish are captured using cyanide to support their contention there are high mortality shipping rates.

As Rett Talbot, senior editor of Coral magazines states, "The aquarium fishes harvested in Hawaii reach the mainland by one of the shortest supply chains available to North American aquarists. As a result, Hawaiian fishes are consistently healthy with extremely low mortalities. Because Hawaiian fishes are harvested in a well-managed fishery with copious data supporting fishery sustainability, they represent one of the best choices for environmentally aware aquarium keepers".

Comments: I strongly oppose this bill for the following reasons: 1. Hawai'i's aguarium industry is considered as one of if not the best regulated near-shore fishery in the world. 2. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR), pursuant to State law, submits a report every 5 years to the legislature "Relating to the West Hawai'i Regional Fishery Management Area." 3. The 2015 Report found that the "The Hawai'i marine aquarium fishery is currently the most economically valuable commercial inshore fishery in the State with FY 2014 reported landings greater than \$2.3 million." 4. DLNR found that the West Hawaii "no-aquarium collecting" Fish Replenishment Areas (FRAs), implemented in 1999, have been very successful in increasing populations of Yellow Tang (Zebrasoma flavescens) -- the most heavily targeted aquarium fish accounting for 84% of the total catch. Fifteen years after closure, the population of Yellow Tang has increased 64.5% in the FRAs while its abundance in the Open Areas has not declined significantly." Overall Yellow Tangs have increased substantially with a current population in excess of 3.6 million fish. 5. DLNR, based upon the effectiveness of the West Hawai'i FRAs for aquarium fish, recommends that it establish MPAs for other fish species. 6. DNLR Aquarium 'White List' for West Hawaii of 40 species permitted for the aquarium trade is working. Fish not on the list can not be collected for the aquarium trade. Size and bag limits for three species are in place. 7. Recently an updated rules package was adopted for the Oahu ornamental aquarium fishery. 8. The regulatory mechanisms covering the Hawaiian aquarium fishery supports the tenets of the sustainable use of renewable natural resources supported in the IUCN's Policy Statement on Sustainable Use as an important conservation tool that provides people with incentives in the form of social and economic benefits as in the case of DNLR's management of the Oahu and West Hawaii fisheries. That is buttressed by DLNR's adaptive management by continually improving its management as new challenges arise. This involves monitoring, assessment and applying the results by adjusting management regimes to achieve the desired result. 9. Every responsible scientific study, and even Hawaii's own DLNR, say that the management practices currently in place have resulted in an increase in Hawaii's fish population over the last 15 years. Of all the things that affect the health of the reef and its inhabitants, fishing for the aguarium trade has the lowest impact. 10. Tourism, while essential to the Hawaiian economy, has a far greater impact than aguarium fishing does. To see tourism businesses like diving guides complain about the aguarium trade is opportunistic and somewhat hypocritical. 11. A moratorium is a nothing more than a ban. The idea that the state of Hawaii would kill an entire industry and shut down Hawaiian businesses that have been responsibly operating for decades is unfathomable. The idea that this legislation offers job retraining for people who have built business over generations closed despite the proven fact that it

was doing no harm to the environment is, frankly, dismissive of all the efforts, risks and financial commitments that it took to build these businesses 12. The steps that are taken in preparing fish for transportation are done for the safety and survivability of the fish. It makes no economic sense to intentionally engage in selling injured, infirm or sick fish. 13. Withholding food prior to shipment is a long accepted husbandry practice well documented in the literature as well as recommended in the International Air Transport Association Live Animals Regulations to eliminate harm from exposing the fish to elevated levels of ammonia and to ensure that the digestive tract is cleared and the water has not been fouled. If the proposed rule is adopted it will lead to severe stress or death. 14. Trimming tail spines (the equivalent of trimming your nails) keeps them from puncturing the shipping bags. 15. Requiring one gallon of water per fish is completely arbitrary and there are absolutely no sciencebased studies supporting such a requirement. 16. A 2012 Washington State University study by Emily Munday -- "The Effects of Venting and Decompression on Mortality and Sublethal Effects in Yellow Tangs (Zebrasoma Flavescens) Caught for the West Hawaii Aquarium Trade" -- found that the practices of the Hawaii fish exporters did not cause any mortality in Yellow Tangs received by the researcher and heldfor the duration of the 6 month study – and ongoing observation. The same study found that fasting pre-shipment is the best practice and prohibiting fasting would be detrimental.

Proposed bill HB 883 claims to have no goal other than to promote animal welfare, but there is a complete lack of data upon which this concept of animal welfare is based and the bill is essentially an ethical argument driven by emotional anti-aquarium trade activists who want the trade banned entirely.

There is no scientific evidence to suggest that venting causes mortality or sublethal injuries in the fish studied, so the suggestion that venting be made illegal is not based on fact but on the unfounded assumptions of key activists. According to a recent study, "Banning venting may increase mortality rates if fishers implemented ascent without decompression. While opponents of venting have suggested that slow decompression be used instead, the time required to properly decompress these fish is economically prohibitive and impractical for fishers to implement."

The clipping of spines is not "cruel treatment," rather it ensures that the fish cannot accidentally puncture their shipping containers during transport. Clipping is a necessary safety precaution that results in decreased shipping mortality.

Witholding food prior to transport, or purging, is also a safety precaution for the health of the animal. It greatly reduces the amount of ammonia excreted while the fish is in transit, a natural byproduct of metabolism that can reach lethal levels if fish are not purged first. With this logic, it would also be "cruel treatment" to withhold food and water from mammals prior to procedures even though it has been shown to drastically increase survivability.

The argument that 1 gallon of water is necessary for shipment is an arbitrary figure that seems to have been plucked from a hat. The existing shipping system works extremely well, and there is no evidence to suggest that larger volumes of water will decrease mortality.

It is important to remember in considering this ruling that the plural of anecdote is not data. The science provides us with the facts necessary to make an educated decision, while the anti aquarium trade activists spout emotional anecdotes seeded with contempt for the marine aquarium trade. If Hawaii legislation would like to rule in favor of facts and evidence, then HB 883 should be rejected.

Comments: I oppose HB883. Captured aquarium fish are not subject to substantial injury or cruel treatment. This bill is a thinly disguised end run to kill the aquarium industry by pretending to care about the health of the fish. The process of shipping very large numbers of fish all over the world was developed many years ago by the commercial aquaculture hatchery industry. These methods are reliable and safe and result in very few of these fish dying in transit and they remain healthy after shipping. I am a marine ecologist and have been in the commercial marine aquaculture industry for over 35 years and have shipped and received countless numbers of fish and invertebrates over long distances. These methods have been substantiated and published by many governmental and academic institutions (U. of Florida Extension Service, Louisiana Extension Service, U. of H. Sea Grant Extension Service, Hubbs Seaworld to name a few). The all agree that fish MUST be purged of all food for at a very minimum of 24 hours and preferably 48-72 hours before shipping. Larger fish and herbivores require longer purge times. Commercial marine fish hatcheries typically ship at 20-250 grams of fish/gallon for 12-24 hours depending on size. Fish are not harmed at all if they are not fed for several days. Requiring feeding close to shipping time guarantees they will all die. In addition requiring a gallon of water per aquarium-size fish is extreme and way out of the norm for commercial shipping methods which results in less than 5% mortality. A scientific study by Emily Munday at Washington State University using standard shipping methods of Hawaiian exporters showed no harm to the fish shipped to the mainland. This bill should be stopped now. It is disingenuous and full of misinformation. The requirements stated in this bill would guarantee all the shipped fish would die and the water stipulations would kill the industry in excess freight charges, for no reason.

Comments: Please vote no on this bill, as the reasons behind it have no basis in fact. The steps that are taken in preparing fish for transportation are done for the safety and survivability of the fish. It makes no economic sense to intentionally engage in selling injured, infirm or sick fish. Withholding food prior to shipment is a long accepted husbandry practice well documented in the literature as well as recommended in the International Air Transport Association Live Animals Regulations to eliminate harm from exposing the fish to elevated levels of ammonia and to ensure that the digestive tract is cleared and the water has not been fouled. If the proposed rule is adopted it will lead to severe stress or death. Trimming tail spines (the equivalent of trimming your nails) keeps them from puncturing the shipping bags. Requiring one gallon of water per fish is completely arbitrary and there are absolutely no science-based studies supporting such a requirement. A 2012 Washington State University study by Emily Munday -- "The Effects of Venting and Decompression on Mortality and Sublethal Effects in Yellow Tangs (Zebrasoma Flavescens) Caught for the West Hawaii Aquarium Trade" -- found that the practices of the Hawaii fish exporters did not cause any mortality in Yellow Tangs received by the researcher and held for the duration of the 6 month study -- and ongoing observation. The same study found that fasting pre-shipment is the best practice and prohibiting fasting would be detrimental.

Anti-Aquarium activists in Hawaii are using a new tactic in 2015, alleging that the collection and handling of reef fishes for the aquarium trade amounts to "cruel treatment"—but does this stand up to facts gathered by marine scientists?

The Data behind Defining "Cruel Treatment" & "Substantial Injury" in Aquarium Fisheries

Five aquarium fishery-related bills will be heard Wednesday by the House Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources and Hawaiian Affairs, including HB 883. While the two so-called "ban bills" on Wednesday's agenda (**HB 606 and HB 873**) are fairly easy to understand-they would both close Hawaii's aquarium fishery based on claims of unsustainability-HB 883 is somewhat more complicated, and, as such, may need some explanation.

People interested in submitting testimony for the public hearing should do so before 8 am HST February 9, 2015 (Tuesday). The instructions for submitting testimony may be found at the bottom of this article.

On the surface, HB 883 may appear a good bill for Hawaii's fishes, as it calls for prohibiting the sale of aquarium fishes subjected to "substantial injury" or "cruel treatment" during harvest, holding or transport. While this may seem an obvious bill to support, the Bill itself defines many common

practices in the aquarium fishery as "cruel treatment" or as leading to "substantial injury." While anti-aquarium fishery activists contend the practices outlined in the Bill are responsible for the majority of post-harvest mortality, fishers, aquarium trade experts and the best available science claim many of these same practices are actually in the fishes' best interest. Critics of the Bill argue that if HB 883 passes, parts of the new law could actually increase post-harvest mortality, while other parts could unnecessarily make harvesting fishes for the aquarium trade cost-prohibitive. Some contend the Bill is actually little more than a non-data based effort to close the fishery.

Substantial Injury & Cruel Treatment – Definitions

According to the Bill, the purpose of HB 883 is "to increase survivability and prohibit the cruel and unethical treatment of Hawaii's marine life when taken for sale as pet animals, and uphold Hawaii's values of respect for local marine life." HB 883 specifically seeks to achieve these objectives by prohibiting the sale of fishes "taken under an aquarium fish permit...that has been subjected to substantial injury or cruel treatment." As such, the definitions of "substantial injury" and "cruel treatment" are central.

"Substantial injury" is defined in the Bill as "bodily injury that creates a substantial risk of death or that causes serious, permanent disfigurement, or protracted loss or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ."

"Cruel Treatment" is defined as "behavior that may result in substantial injury to the aquarium fish or aquatic life, including but not limited to:

- 1. Surfacing at a rate resulting in physical damage to the body tissue;
- 2. Piercing or deflating the swim bladder;
- 3. Cutting the fin or spine;
- 4. Withholding food for more than twenty-four hours; or
- Holding fish or aquatic life in less than one gallon of water, per each specimen, within any container."

The objective of the Bill is therefore really twofold: "to increase survivability" and to "prohibit cruel and unethical treatment." The former can be viewed within the context of what is known-what the data and the best available science show regarding whether or not the practices in question actually lead to increased mortality or not. This article will focus on that data and how the best available science can inform the legislative process. The latter, the question of what is "cruel" and what should be deemed as "unethical" is a much broader question that is significantly harder to address. Legislating ethics is generally considered to be problematic on multiple fronts.

Barotrauma

Advocates of HB 883 contend that outlawing certain practices that are common in the aquarium fishery and trade would lead to lower post-harvest mortality. The first two specific practices the Bill would outlaw have to do with bringing fishes up from depth. When fishes, like SCUBA divers, come to the surface too quickly, injury and even death may occur secondary to a change in ambient pressure. A fish that is not given time to properly acclimate to the changing pressure (i.e., decompress) may experience an increase in swim bladder gasses that can result in both external and internal trauma known as barotrauma.

While barotrauma is considered less of a concern in food fisheries because, in most cases, survivability is not economically necessary, in fisheries where the survivability of the fish is valued, barotrauma is a very real concern. When it comes to aquarium fisheries, catch-and-release recreational fisheries, live food fisheries, and bycatch in food fisheries, minimizing trauma is critical to a fish's long-term survival. Quite a bit of research has been done on barotrauma in fishes, but very little of it has focused on reef fishes being brought up from the most common depths at which most aquarium fishes are harvested.

The obvious signs of barotrauma may include an inability to swim properly because of an overinflated swim bladder (positive buoyancy), bulging eyes (exophthalmia) and intestinal protrusion. Even if a fish recovers from these external signs of barotrauma, or shows no signs of trauma at all, studies show nonlethal internal injuries such as ruptured swim bladder, internal bleeding, damaged organs surrounding the swim bladder and other trauma associated with gasses leaked from the swim bladder can persist for extended periods. It is believed that these nonlethal injuries can indeed lead to post-harvest mortality the fisher may never witness.

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"Cruelty to Aquarium Fishes"? A Look at the Facts

Common methods used by fishers to mitigate barotrauma include venting and decompression. In Hawaii, venting-sometimes called "pinning" or "fizzing"-involves puncturing the swim bladder of the fish with a hypodermic needle to release accumulated gasses. In other parts of the world where the value of fishes at the point of harvest is less, venting may be performed with any available sharp object ranging from a modified fishing hook to the spine of another fish.

Decompression is similar to what divers do-coming up to the surface at a rate that gives the body time to acclimate to the difference in pressure. In Hawaii, it is common for fishes to be held at one or more decompression stops, although practices vary based on diver, species of fish and other factors. In general terms, venting is quicker and therefore less expensive. In fact, some argue that properly decompressing fishes is prohibitively time-consuming. Fishers in Hawaii and elsewhere commonly use a combination of venting and decompression when harvesting aquarium fishes, and they argue there are no long-term effects that cause post-harvest mortality.

If HB 883 passes, the sale of vented aquarium fishes would become illegal. Presumably the sale of aquarium fishes brought to the surface by decompression would be legal but only if there was no "bodily injury that creates a substantial risk of death or that causes serious, permanent disfigurement, or protracted loss or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ."

New Data Published on Venting and Decompression

As already mentioned, few data exist regarding barotrauma associated with bringing shallower water reef fishes to the surface. A group of researchers recently set out to better understand whether or not delayed mortality caused by sublethal injuries was in fact a significant cause of post-harvest mortality in aquarium fishes. Their paper "The effects of venting and decompression on Yellow Tang (*Zebrasoma flavescens*) in the ornamental aquarium fish trade" was recently published in the journal *PeerJ*.

According to Dr. Brian Tissot, one of the co-authors on the paper, the impetus for the study was a trip to Maui in 2010 and a long discussion Dr. Tissot had with anti-aquarium fishery activists Robert Wintner and Rene Umberger. "They expressed major concern at that time of the effects of 'fizzing' and felt that it was responsible for causing most of the aquarium fish mortality," says Tissot, pointing out that Wintner and Umberger often pegged post-harvest mortality at greater than 90%. "Even though Todd Stevenson has shown that was not the case in his 2011 paper it didn't address venting directly."

When Emily Munday, who is the lead author on the paper, started graduate **school** at Washington State University, Dr. Tissot discussed with her the idea of looking more closely at venting, and Munday took it in on for her MS thesis. The work, which was funded through the NOAA Coral Reef Conservation Program, was undertaken during the summers of 2011 and 2012.

At the outset, the researchers predicted that fishes collected for the aquarium trade suffer the same sort of undetected sublethal injuries as food fishes do. What they wanted to know is if these sublethal injuries, if they exist, lead to mortality further along the supply chain. Answering this question is central to HB 883, for if it is the case that common practices in the fishery lead to post harvest mortality, then making the sale of fishes harvested in such a manner illegal would indeed increase survivability.

No Morality in Yellow Tangs Subjected to Standard Collection Practices

Munday et al found that "the methods commonly used in this fishery (ascent without decompression stops, or ascent with one decompression stop, followed by venting) resulted in no immediate or delayed mortality." In the study, only fish subjected to ascent without decompression stops and no venting suffered mortality. Beyond outright mortality, the researchers used histopathology to detect any signs of inflammation, organ damage or infection caused by venting. "Wound healing with no evidence of ongoing necrosis or inflammation, as seen in these fish, indicates that the venting procedure does not pose a significant threat to fish survival post-collection, nor does it cause significant sublethal effects."

"[T]he project clearly showed that there was no morality in Yellow Tangs subjected to standard collection practices–fast ascent and venting–from normal collection depths of 25-40 feet," even after being held for 3 weeks," says Tissot. "Moreover the histology showed no long-term tissue damage from the needle.... The only mortality observed was in animals brought quickly to the surface that were not vented." That mortality was 6%.

The second part of Munday's study, which has yet to be published, looked at fish collected from the





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reef and holding practices in a collector's facility in West Hawaii. "It is more holistic then the venting work as it includes their normal handling procedures and eventually shipping to the mainland," says Tissot. That study showed that the practices of the Hawaii fish exporters did not cause any mortality in Yellow Tangs received by the researcher and held for the duration of the six month study.

Munday's study is not a comprehensive study on the practices of venting and decompression in the Hawaii aquarium fishery, as it only looked at one species collected in the 15-18 meter depth range. The researchers caution that fishes collected from different depths may yield different results. They also point out that different species may react differently to the venting and decompression. Nonetheless, the data do show that rapid ascent and/or venting does not contribute noticeably to post-harvest mortality in the most frequently harvested aquarium fish in Hawaii. The study also suggests HB 883 should, at the very least, be amended to not define fast ascent and/or venting as "cruel treatment" if that phrase is defined as "behavior that may result in substantial injury to the aquarium fish or aquatic life, including but not limited to 1) Surfacing at a rate resulting in physical damage to the body tissue, or 2) Piercing or deflating the swim bladder."

"Though animal rights groups in Hawaii criticize venting, we did not find that it caused mortality or sublethal injuries in Yellow **Tang**. Banning venting may increase mortality rates if fishers implemented ascent without decompression. While opponents of venting have suggested that slow decompression be used instead, the time required to properly decompress these fish is economically prohibitive and impractical for fishers to implement."

Is Clipping Cruel?

Another common practice in the Hawaii aquarium fishery is clipping spines on fishes that have extremely sharp spines on their fins or tail. HB 883 would prohibit the sale of fish with clipped spines, as the practice is, according to the Bill, "cruel treatment" that may result in substantial injury to fish. While anti-aquarium trade and animal rights activists argue the practice is unethical, fishers and aquarium fishery experts argue it is necessary to insure that some fishes do not puncture the bag in which they are being shipped. "This does not harm the fish, and the spines soon grow back," says one fisherman, summing up the general consensus of those familiar with the practice. "It is no different than cutting your toenails or trimming your hair."

There are no published reports or scientific studies readily found that support the proposed ban on the sale of fishes with clipped fins. If data exists to contradict the experience of fishers and those in the trade who liken the practice to cutting one's toenails, it has yet to be presented despite the fact that this same bill has been presented in various forms over the past five years at both the county and state level.

Purging Fishes Prior to Transport

The practice of not feeding fishes prior to transport is based in the best available science and is considered a best practice. The purpose for withholding food before transport is so that ammonia doesn't build up in the shipping water. Many organizations, including the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations and Hawaii Sea Grant, recommend withholding food long enough to void the stomach and intestine as a best practice. The reason is that, as part of the metabolic process, fish excrete ammonia after being fed. If fish are fed too close to the time of shipping, ammonia can accumulate to lethal levels very quickly during transport. As the New England Aquarium, a science-based leader in ocean research and conservation, stated in testimony regarding a 2011 version of this bill, "This portion for the proposed bill is paramount to suggesting it is inhuman to withhold food and water from a dog or cat prior to any veterinary procedures."

Arbitrary and Capricious?

The fifth and final practice HB 883 specifically addresses is the holding of "fish or aquatic life in less than one gallon of water, per each specimen, within any container." Again, there are no readily available, published scientific studies supporting the proposed one-gallon per each "aquarium life" standard specified in the Bill. Marine aquarium trade exporters, research institutions that ship fishes and other live animal shipping experts say that in some cases, shipping in a gallon of water is insufficient, while in other cases it is over the top. They argue the one-gallon minimum is, in the absence of any data, "arbitrary and capricious."

Around a half a million fishes are shipped from Hawaii to the mainland annually, and these shipments consistently have some of the lowest shipping mortalities in the industry according to

importers. Many importers report less than 1% mortality on Hawaii shipments, indicating that current water volumes and shipping densities are not contributing significantly to post-harvest mortality as the Bill's supporters contend. As Dr. Andrew Rossiter of the Waikiki Aquarium pointed out in testimony last fall against a similar bill at the county council level, "it is hard to imagine why [a report supporting the one-gallon minimum] would be needed when the existing shipping system is clearly already almost perfect."

Sticking to the Data

While HB 883 portends to have animal welfare at its center, in reality, there is little if any science supporting it when it comes to the practices it specifically mentions. When it comes to the ethical argument, there is a lot more grey area and opportunity for debate. Many of the Bill's advocates believe keeping wild-harvested fishes in an aquarium is ethically repugnant in the same way that other animal rights activists argue against a variety of commonly accepted practices in the complex relationship between humans and animals. The Legislature is a difficult place to have this discussion, and, as stated earlier, legislating ethics is generally problematic. As such, it seems prudent to focus on what the data show, and the data appear to clearly support opposing HB 883.

As **reported today in** *West Hawaii Today*, HB 883 is one of a bevy of animal welfare bills before the Hawaii State Legislature this year. Most were drafted by lawyers for the Humane Society of the United States (HSUS), and the HSUS's senior director for state affairs in Hawaii is quoted as calling the bills "common-sense" measures.

In opposition to HB 883, relating to Aquarium Fish

I am a commercial fishermen on Oahu, with the majority of my income from saltwater aquarium fish. For my business to be successful, it is critical that we are able to hold and transport animals in a way that is safe, humane, and maintains them in good health. I am very strongly opposed to HB 883, which would force us to handle and transport animals in a way that would endanger their health and safety.

There are several problems with HB 883:

- Venting the swim bladder of aquarium fish is not harmful to the fish, and in many cases is essential to avoid injury. Prohibiting this practice would increase fish mortality and make it difficult to safely collect fish from deeper depths.

- Certain fish have sharp spines on their fins or tail, which will puncture the bags used for transport and cause the death of the animal. To avoid this, these spines are lightly trimmed before shipment. This does not harm the fish, and the spines soon grow back. It is no different than cutting your toenails or trimming your hair.

- Feeding a fish too soon before shipment will cause severe injury or death during transport. Enforcing a 24-hour feeding rule would cause the fish to defecate in the bag and produce ammonia, which is toxic to the fish. Increasing the water volume does not adequately compensate for this.

- A 1-gallon per fish water volume rule is arbitrary, wasteful, and meaningless. The appropriate volume of water can vary widely depending on how and where the fish is being held, and differs between fish of different species and sizes. One gallon is extremely excessive in some situations, and in other cases it is insufficient.

At present, the number of fish lost, from the time I catch them in the ocean to the time they arrive safely on the mainland, is less than one percent. Should HB 883 become law, it would be impossible for us to maintain these high standards and, consequently, mortality rates during transport would be astronomical. In the interests of business, conservation, and animal welfare, I ask that this bill be held in committee.

Comments: Aloha, My name is Michelle Lemech, BS, MS. I am a SCUBA diver and an aquarium hobbyist, published photographer and author. I have visited Hawaii many times and have several friends there. While I was there I participated in KUPS, The Kona Underwater Photography Society and the Kona Reefers Dive Club I am writing to oppose Bill 606. I am hoping that rational minds will prevail as scientific evidence is present to oppose this bill. There are many emotions that surround Hawaii's fisheries but level heads will listen to evidence not emotion. Some emotional arguments will likely be presented by people such as Snorkel Bob's, Robert Winter which will likely provide misleading and false information. I am asking you to please listen to scientific evidence and reason. Hawai'i's aquarium industry is considered as one of if not the best regulated near-shore fishery in the world. It is a model to followed by other countries desiring to establish sustainable fishing practices. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR), pursuant to State law, submits a report every 5 years to the legislature "Relating to the West Hawai'i Regional Fishery Management Area." The 2015 Report found that the "The Hawai'i marine aquarium fishery is currently the most economically valuable commercial inshore fishery in the State wi th FY 2014 reported landings greater than \$2.3 million." I have seen fishes, specifically Achilles Tang, (Acanthurus achilles), valued in the hundreds of dollars in the aquarium industry (\$299 on the www.liveaquaria.com website) http://www.liveaquaria.com/product/prod_display.cfm?c=15+43+325&pcatid=325, be used for fish tacos for an individual. I find this a heartbreaking waste as this fish could have provided fish tacos for several large Hawaiian families if it were to go to the aquarium hobby. DLNR found that the West Hawaii "no-aquarium collecting" Fish Replenishment Areas (FRAs), implemented in 1999, have been very successful in increasing populations of Yellow Tang (Zebrasoma flavescens) -- the most heavily targeted aquarium fish accounting for 84% of the total catch. Fifteen years after closure, the population of Yellow Tang has increased 64.5% in the FRAs while its abundance in the Open Areas has not declined significantly." Overall Yellow Tangs have increased substantially with a current population in excess of 3.6 million fish. DLNR , based upon the effectiveness of the West Hawai'i FRAs for aquarium fish, recommends that it establish MPAs for other fish species. I have to share my personal experience here. The fist time I saw a Yellow Tang (Zebrasoma flavescens)was in a friend's aquarium in 1993. I was absolutely amazed. It was so incredibly beautiful. I had never seen anything like it. This friend's aquarium inspired me to learn more about this fish and others like it. It lead me to set up several aquariums of my own, which lead me to get involve in several clubs where I learned about fragging corals for reproduction and conservation. I also learned about fish breeding. These home hobbyist have made guite impressive contributions. Matthew Pedersen, a reef hobbyist, for

example was the first to successfully breed the Harlequin Filefish (Oxymonacanthus longirostris) http://www.coralmagazine-

us.com/sites/default/files/u7/CORAL%20©%20Article%20Harleguin%20Filefish.pdf This is because these hobbyist have passion that is hard to come by. They use their own resources and own time to make significant contributions to reef conservation. Hobbyist have been fragging corals for years before their scientific counterparts. Hobbyist and scientist have a great deal they can learn from each other. My involvement in these clubs lead me to involvement on an national and international level where I was able to share my photos (Some of which were taken in Hawaii) and writing with those around the world. I now have friends in such far away places as Mauritius, Bali, Australia and of course Hawaii. This involvement also lead me to become a certified SCUBA diver. I have been fortunate to go on many dive trips and I am constantly surprised by how little many divers know about what they are looking at. I am always happy to share my knowledge and have shared my knowledge on dive trips, and in my local and regional community. Without exposure to my friend's home marine aguarium I would have never pursued this path and would probably never visited Hawaii or cared much about Hawaii's reefs, but because of this one friends purchase of a beautiful yellow fish that I had never seen before. I lead me to care deeply about Hawaii's sustainable fisheries program and to share my passion about coral reefs with countless others. You can't care about something you aren't exposed to, and you can't easily love something you've never seen. Yes, public aquariums are out there and they serve a definite purpose. But rarely does a person get the up close, hands on and personalized contact such as I had because another aquarium hoovist shared his passion with me. I am providing more logical and scientific arguments below that others will also likely submit but I wanted to share some of my personal experience with the committee before the 8:30am deadline. I may try to continue with more testimony but I will not be assured that it will be submitted if it is submitted before 5pm today so I will unfortunately have to cut it short in order to assure something gets shared. More personalized comments are shared in all caps below. DNLR Aguarium 'White List' for West Hawaii of 40 species permitted for the aquarium trade is working. Fish not on the list can not be collected for the aguarium trade. Size and bag limits for three species are in place. Recently an updated rules package was adopted for the Oahu ornamental aquarium fishery. The regulatory mechanisms covering the Hawaiian aquarium fishery supports the tenets of the sustainable use of renewable natural resources supported in the IUCN's Policy Statement on Sustainable Use as an important conservation tool that provides people with incentives in the form of social and economic benefits as in the case of DNLR's management of the Oahu and West Hawaii fisheries. That is buttressed by DLNR's adaptive management by continually improving its management as new challenges arise. This involves monitoring, assessment and applying the results by adjusting management regimes to achieve the desired result. Every responsible scientific study, and even Hawaii's own DLNR, say that the management practices currently in place have resulted in an increase in Hawaii's fish population over the last 15 years. Of all the things that affect the health of the reef and its inhabitants, fishing for the aquarium trade has the lowest impact. Tourism, while essential to the Hawaiian economy, has a far greater impact than aguarium fishing does. To see tourism businesses like diving guides complain about the aquarium trade is opportunistic and somewhat hypocritical. IT'S VERY HYPOCRITICAL, HAVING OBSERVED WHAT SOME DIVERS DO AND EVEN WORSE WHAT SNORKLERS DO, STANDING ON CORAL, DOING TREMENDOUS DESTRUCTION TO THE REEF. I CAME TO HAWAII TO SEE THE YELLOW TANG. I WAS CERTIFIED BY JACK'S DIVE LOCKER IN K ONA. WITHOUT EXPOSURE TO A HOME AQUARIUM, I WOULD HAVE NEVER DONE THIS. A moratorium is a nothing more than a ban. The idea that the state of Hawaii would kill an entire industry and shut down Hawaiian businesses that have been responsibly operating for decades is unfathomable. The idea that this legislation offers job retraining for people who have built business over generations closed despite the proven fact that it was doing no harm to the environment is, frankly, dismissive of all the efforts, risks and financial commitments that it took to build these businesses The steps that are taken in preparing fish for transportation are done for the safety and survivability of the fish. It makes no economic sense to intentionally engage in

selling injured, infirm or sick fish. HOBBYIST CARE A GREAT DEAL ABOUT THEIR FISHES AND CORALS. IF YOU TAKE THE TIME TO GO ON ANY REEF COMMUNITY BULLETIN BOARDS YOU WILL SEE A LOT OF PASSION AND IF A CORAL OR FISH IS SICK OR INJURED YOU WILL SEE A LOT OF ATTEMPTS MADE TO SAVE THESE PRECIOUS ANIMALS. Withholding food prior to shipment is a long accepted husbandry practice well documented in the literature as well as recommended in the International Air Transport Association Live Animals Regulations to eliminate harm from exposing the fish to elevated levels of ammonia and to ensure that the digestive tract is cleared and the water has not been fouled. If the proposed rule is adopted it will lead to severe stress or death. THIS PRACTICE INCREASES SURVIVAL SAME AS HUMANS WHO NEED TO FAST PRIOR TO SURGERY, BECAUSE IT INCREASES SURVIVAL. Trimming tail spines (the equivalent of trimming your nails) keeps them from puncturing the shipping bags. Requiring one gallon of water per fish is completely arbitrary and there are absolutely no science-based studies supporting such a requirement. A 2012 Washington State University study by Emily Munday -- "The Effects of Venting" and Decompression on Mortality and Sublethal Effects in Yellow Tangs (Zebrasoma Flavescens) Caught for the West Hawaii Aquarium Trade" -- found that the practices of the Hawaii fish exporters did not cause any mortality in Yellow Tangs received by the researcher and heldfor the duration of the 6 month study – and ongoing observation. The same study found that fasting pre-ship ment is the best practice and prohibiting fasting would be detrimental. Statements that the Aguarium trade is harvesting Hawaiian corals are inaccurate Collecting corals for the aquarium trade has been prohibited for years and there is no evidence of the aquarium trade removing corals. mahalo, Thank you for your time Michelle Lemech BS, MS

HB 883 RELATING TO AQUARIUM FISH

My name is Rob Toonen, and I live in Kailua. While I am a research professor at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, I do not speak for the University in offering this testimony. I am familiar with the marine ornamental trade and frequently travel around the world to speak on coral reef conservation, captive breeding of marine species and aquarium husbandry to reduce loss of reef species in captivity. I am unable to attend the hearing because I am teaching a class at the same time as this hearing, but I wish to state that I am opposed to this bill.

I want to start by saying that I am also opposed to the cruel treatment of animals. While I appreciate the intent of this bill, it is based on our familiarity with mammals rather than scientific data or husbandry knowledge of fishes. For example, a study of the effect of piercing the swim bladder in yellow tang found that it significantly decreased mortality from 6.2% of collected fish to 0 (Munday et al. 2015). Likewise, withholding food for more than 24hrs seems like a cruelty from our perspective, but when a dog, cat or guinea pig urinates or defecates during shipping, that waste lays on the floor of their kennel and is not choking them. The same is not true, however, for a fish in a fixed volume of water if it is fed just prior to shipping – that waste will be voided by the animal during shipping, and because it is contained within the bag, the waste must be recirculated through the gills of the animal. The most likely outcome of mandating feeding prior to shipment is increased stress and high mortality during long shipments due to ammonia accumulation in the shipping containers (which is one of the primary causes of death among shipped fishes).

If this bill were to pass, it would result in the unnecessary death of the majority of fishes shipped from the State. HB 883 states "The purpose of this Act is to increase survivability and prohibit the cruel and unethical treatment of Hawaii's marine life" but in my professional opinion, the passage of this Act will result in decreased survivability, and increase needless death of fishes captured for sale in the pet trade. I consider it unethical to mandate treatment that will only increase stress and decrease the survival of animals.

For these reasons, I strongly oppose this bill.

I urge the committee to say NO to HB 883. Out of Step with Best Practices

HB 883 seeks to mandate collection, shipping and holding practices by prohibiting the sale of fishes subjected to "substantial injury" or "cruel treatment."

The Bill's definitions of "substantial injury" and "cruel treatment" are, however, inconsistent with currently established best practices in the industry. Critics of the bill contend that passage of HB 883 would make it "impossible to care for fish in a humane manner." Specifically the Bill claims that "[R]eef species captured and sold as pet animals are subject to cruel and unethical treatment, including mutilation, puncturing, and confinement, which are common practices by individuals capturing and selling these species." HB 883 goes on to define "cruel treatment" as "behavior that may result in substantial injury to the aquarium fish or aquatic life, including but not limited to:

Piercing or deflating the swim bladder;

Cutting the fin or spine;

Withholding food for more than twenty-four hours; or

Holding fish or aquatic life in less than one gallon of water, per each specimen, within any container.

If all of these practices were categorically made illegal, some aquarium trade experts argue it would have a significant effect on the State's aquarium fishery and trade. They point out that some of the current practices are widely accepted as best practices and supported by the best available science. Many of these practices are, according to the scientific literature, in the best interest of the animal's health and wellbeing.

For example, the practice of not feeding fish prior to shipping is so that ammonia doesn't build up in the shipping water. Many organizations, including the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations, recommend withholding food long enough to void the stomach and intestine as a best practice. <u>http://www.reef2rainforest.com/2015/02/07/public-hearings-approach-for-hawaii-aq-fishery-bills/</u>

I would like to submit the following testimony and strongly state my opposition of H.B. NO.883 relating to aquatic fish.

In regards to those items defined under Cruel Treatment.

- (1) Piercing or deflating the swim bladder not deflating a fishes swim bladder is animal cruelty to the fish and is a well documented, safe procedure
- (2) Cutting the fin or spine not cutting the spine for safe transport will actually result in the death of the fish during transit. This is another well-documented, safe procedure.
- (3) Withholding food for more then 24 hours feeding the fish within 24 hours of transport can and will cause water chemistry imbalance and create toxicity during transit, which can and/or will result in fish death. This is a long accepted industry practice and is specifically recommended by the International Air Transport Association Live Animals Regulations to eliminate and prevent toxic levels of ammonia.
- (4) Holding the fish in less than 1 gallon of water per specimen within a container there is no documentation showing 1 gallon of water per specimen is required for the well being of a fish. In fact, the Hawaiian aquarium industry has been shipping fish for years in less water successfully and has one of the best chain of custody/live arrival records in the industry.

The drafter of this bill obviously knows very little about salt water aquarium fish transport or the science of fish health. If they did the bill would not be drafted as such. Or maybe it is designed to hurt fish and put aquarium fishermen out of business. Please read below for the explanation.

Is there a problem with death rates for aquarium fish shipments and transportation?

As far as aquarium related mortality in Hawaii goes here's a quote from a Cesar 2002 study "Mortality rates of aquarium fish are low and have gone down considerably since the last survey in 1984. Currently, mortality rates from collection to wholesaler are estimated at 0 to 1 percent. In the wholesaler's tanks, mortality rates range from close to 0% up to 2%. During shipment, rates range from 0.75% to 2%. This give a current total of between 1% and 5%, down from a range of 5% to 8% in the early 1980's (van Poolen and Obara, 1984; estimates of wholesalers and collectors, own study)." These studies quoted are old and much better technology and care techniques now exist so we are sure it is an even lower rate today. Decreased transport times due to better roads and more airline flights make it even easier to ship shipments with no DOA at all. We ship many shipments with no DOA it is the norm. Life extension techniques are used by the hobbyist at all times. Customers demand such care. Life spans of fish can be greatly increased in captivity. Life span of the average fish in the wild can be very short. Why do we need this bill then?

History of these types of bills:

A similar bill to this one was deferred last year and the previous year, in the first committee meetings that heard them by Hawaii States Legislature. Also the same bill was introduced in the big Island county council and not even voted on. Why?

Because it is not humane and had overwhelming opposition from the airlines, veterinarians, and pet owners who love their dogs, cats and fish. All Veterinarians I interviewed on this subject opposed it. They balked at the idea of a no food restriction before long flights.

What is inhumane is to not restrict food before the shipment of a dog cat or other animal. If the animal poops in their holding cage or fish bag they will be in feces for hours during a flight. That is inhumane! Plus restricting food and not water for an animal for 24 hours is healthy for most animals. Restricting food for short periods is used as treatment for many diseases and allows the animal or Human to clean out; It is beneficial to fast! This bill is not based in science or facts at all. Similar Bills like this one have not passed in the past for a good reason.

Is it humane to starve fish?

Yes for short periods of time it would actually extend lifespan. Fasting for people, mammals and fish all benefit from lack of nutrition for short periods of time. To restrict diet or reduce food for 24 hours or over will improve health usually. To starve a fish, dog or cat before a flight is not inhumane! Just the opposite it is very humane. Airlines, and most veterinarians even go as far as to suggest that pet owners do just that restrict food before a long flight! Food is not placed inside with a dog or cat but it is attached outside of the shipping container so the airline workers can feed the animal upon arrival after the flight.

Do aquarium fishermen even starve fish before shipping?

No! Most will only restrict food supply a little before shipping and add to packing water Amquil powder to prevent ammonia burn or nitrate toxicity. Those who run short of this chemical may ship without feeding for a short period of time to keep the fish alive during a flight in a bag. If we do not reduce food or use this chemical you are then making the fish suffer and could possibly cause the fish to lose its life. Not allowing fish to have restricted diets before shipping will hurt the fish during transport! This is a very bad bill from a fish health point of view. My fish say No to this bill!

Do aquarium fish shippers or fish transporters use too little water in transport or their shipments resulting in more dead's? No. What will happen if we have to keep each fish in 1 gallon of water?

This would stop all shipping of small fish as one gallon of water is too much to ship fish in. This is a disguised shut down bill.

It is not the water that restricts the fishes health and transport time but the oxygen they breathe. Oxygen during transport is the most important life sustaining nutrient. Aeration not the amount of water is the restricting factor. When shipping fish on a flight if you add to much water to a bag you restrict the amount of oxygen you can put in the bag. Too much water in a bag that reduces oxygen will put the fish at risk for suffocation.

With Amquil you can maintain healthy water quality at a much smaller amount than one gallon. Who came up with one gallon anyway? It was made up and has no scientific basis for being reasonable. Aquarium fish are shipped in big enough bags so they can swim in circles -that is more than we do for people! Packed this way will result in an average 5 day life span in a bag. Most flight are only a few hours to 24 hours long leaving a big safety factor to prevent fish loss. Only one fish per bag is shipped for long flights!

Health of the fish is of the upmost importance for the fish shipper. No dead or damaged fish will be paid for. It would quickly put aquarium fishermen out for business to use 1 gallon of water per fish. It is unpractical to use this much water for smaller fish. A big fish may actually already be shipped in this much water. Fish size not a made up one gallon restriction determines how much water a fish needs to be healthy for transport or packing longevity. A water restriction is not needed to ensure survival.

Airlines cost would increase for smaller fish in extremely big bags putting fishermen out of business. Right now Kona is sustainable intake and Dr. Bill Walsh agrees no further restrictions are needed and no problems with fish death occur. New laws just went into effect this year January 1 st giving DLNR and the state more management of the fishery.

Please shelf Bill 883 it is not needed, was poorly drafted, makes no since scientifically and does not help but actually hurts fish and their humane treatment.

For my master's research at Washington State University, I studied the West Hawaii aquarium trade from 2010-2012. Part of my study focused on holding and transport of live yellow tang in the West Hawaii aquarium trade.

My research on fish holding and transport indicated that the practices implemented by Hawaiian fish exporters do not cause mortality in yellow tang. In June of 2012, I collaborated with fishers and exporters in Kona, and caught 60 yellow tang from the reef, held them in a working export facility, and shipped them from Kona, HI to Portland, OR. The fish were then transported to the Hatfield Marine Science Center in Newport, OR where they resided for 6 months. My study shows 100% survival rate of these tangs during collection, holding in the export facility, air transport, and after a 6-month holding period. In fact, the fish have now become part of an exhibit at the Hatfield Marine Science Center about sustainability in the aquarium trade and I have received no reports of mortality after 2.5 years.

Decreased transport times due to better roads and more airline flights make it even easier to ship shipments with no DOA at all. Life extension techniques are used by the hobbyist at all times. Customers demand such care. Life spans of fish can be greatly increased in captivity. Many aquarium fish hobbyists tout their ability to increase fish pets life spans. Several cases have pet fish owners keeping fish alive for 15 years.

Life span of the average fish in the wild can be very short. Without enough food and the predators eating many smaller fish survivability to adult breeding state is only 2%. In 2014 a much bigger percentage survived due to increases in plankton due mainly to changes in currents.

If the food is there the 1-5 million fry per adult pair spawning can result in astronomical population growth. This has resulted in biblical increases in fish populations in fall of 2014. A few species like Angels only produce 10,000 fry per spawning which is way below the norm for most reef fish. Even those species are doing great in population numbers. Fish are very efficient breeders.

<u>HB 883</u> does not take into consideration current science, health and transport maintenance regarding salt water or aquarium fish. <u>HB 883</u> is drafted in such a way that will definitely provide serious problems for the industries involved. But this bill, if accepted as such will be cause of "substantial" injury to the aquarium industry and those related. Cruel treatment, indeed.

Aloha,

BASIS OF BILL: "The legislature finds that cruelty to pet animals including dogs, cats, guinea pigs, and caged birds, in Hawaii, is a misdemeanor." & "The legislature further finds that reef species captured and sold as pet animals are subject to

cruel and unethical treatment, including mutilation, puncturing, and confinement, which are common practices by individuals capturing and selling these species."

- Mutilation appears to be related to the clipping of the spines of the fish so as to avoid bag puncture and leaking of the bag during transit or their attacking one another if they have blades. If the ethical treatment of reef fish is to be like other pet animals it is unclear where in this bill the clipping of nails, tails, ears, wings and other cosmetic practices common to dogs, cats, and birds is banned?
- Puncturing of reef fish is undertaken for the health of the fish with a syringe needle exactly as used for all the pet animals listed above. The same syringes are used for the health of all the listed pet animals, and the use of these syringes on fish should not be confused with syringes use by the Humane Society to kill pet animals. If the use of syringes for the health of the pet is unethical why are other pet animals not protected from the use of syringes?
- Confinement is utilized for some species of reef fish due to their aggressive nature and to prevent them from harming one another. We assume that confinement is now considered cruel and all pets are required to be grouped in animal shelters, breeding facilities, pet shops, etc. and that even the most aggressive pet animal should not be kept in confinement, but mixed with other animals that will be hurt.
- Further Bill 883 fish are required to be fed under any and all circumstances so no fasting of the fish is allowed even if undertaken for the well- being of the pet reef fish. If fasting a pet is unethical why is this not applied to all pet animals? Why is it only applied to pet reef fish?
- In addition Bill 883 requires a minimum volume of water per fish. If a similar proportional volume container was applied to cats, dogs, horses, etc. it would be impossible to transport them as the weight of those animals would require enormous transport containers.

Bill 883 does not provide the same protections listed above to pet animals including dogs, cats, guinea pigs, and caged birds, in Hawaii and that is because those protections are not in the best interest of the pet animal. They are also not in the best interest of marine aquarium fish. Bill 883 is flawed, discriminatory, and will result in unethical treatment of marine aquarium fish.

Dear Members of the House Oceans Committee,

I would like to go on record opposing the proposed HB 883 that proposes to regulate collection, transport, holding, and shipping practices for the marine life fishery of Hawaii. If the legislature really wants to get involved in the minutia of how an industry work, then it should spend time and look at the best management practices already established within the industry and use those as a starting place. In my opinion the state should not be involved in this level of detail, at least not at the legislative level. Some of the terms and provisions in the bill are especially worrisome because they are designed more to destroy the industry than to try to help insure the humane treatment of the marine life. The goal of every marine life fisherman and wholesaler is to get their product to the end user alive and in good shape, and they only get paid when that happens, so there is a lot of incentive to get it right. The proposed bill would result in higher losses along the entire chain of custody, which seems to contradict the stated intent of the bill.

I spent 30 years of my life as a marine life fisherman in Florida and have done a 180 degree turn in my career to the point where I am an avid conservationist. I now run a nonprofit company that is working diligently to protect and restore corals reefs. Of all the threats to coral reefs, overfishing being one of them, I think the marine life fishery has one of the smallest environmental impacts of any fishery and is hardly worth worrying about.

To Whom It May Concern:

- Hawaii is frequently used as a model for aquarium fisheries. This is because of the low mortality and high quality of Hawaii aquarium fish. Current practices result in healthy fish.
- To transport aquarium fish in good health draft guidelines are being developed by the South Pacific Community. As with other guidelines for transport of live fish such as required by IATA when shipping on airlines they conflict with the requirements of H.B.883.
- It is well documented that feeding live fish before transport is not recommended. Short term removal of food is a common practice for the health of organisms. A reasonable length of fasting does not result in mortality for fish or any of the pets listed in HB 838.
- Requiring one gallon of water per fish is not a recommendation I have seen in 20 years of packing live fish. Further I cannot find any scientific studies or published reports supporting this requirement. There is a correct amount of water, bag size, surface area, depth of water, etc. for each fish and one size does not fit all.
- Not all fish are kept in "confinement". Fishes that are social are grouped as they are more comfortable together. Fishes that are highly territorial or aggressive are separated. Usually mixing wolves with lambs does not have a good result for the lambs.
- Use of syringes as for other pets is for the health of the fish and studies have shown that it does not create mortality.
- Mutilation certainly sounds horrific but actually we are talking about clipping spines so the fish do not puncture the bag and end up without water during transport. Like fingernails they grow back quickly and there is no pain. Is this illegal for all the other pets listed in Bill 838?

It is as if someone with no knowledge of keeping marine aquarium fish or transporting live fish picked these "ethical" requirements out of thin air. They do not appear to be applied to any of the pets listed that the marine aquarium fish will be grouped with? The requirements of Bill 838 are critically flawed, without basis, and will result in needless suffering and mortality of fish that would have otherwise been perfectly healthy.

My name is Dr. Heather Rally. I am a veterinarian with specific experience in marine conservation, ecosystem health, and marine mammal medicine. I am submitting this written testimony in support of HB883, and I thank you for your attention to this important subject.

Having grown up between California and Hawaii, I have spent much of my childhood on or in the water and feel a very strong bond to the islands. In my professional career, I have had the privilege of working directly with a variety of marine species - from rehabilitating sick and injured marine mammals to researching coral reef diseases right here on this beautiful island of Oahu. Furthermore, over the past 5 years, I have been working with the Oceanic Preservation Society on a documentary film, Racing Extinction, that focusing on the global marine wildlife trade and anthropogenic threats to species.

Hawaii's coral reefs ecosystems are fragile and they have been declining at an unprecedented and alarming rate in recent years as a result of a variety of man-made insults. Among these pressures is the aquarium collector, who has proven to be a formidable predator. It is estimated that over 1 million marine animals every year are removed from Hawaiian reefs and destined for the aquarium trade. This mass extraction often targets species that are critical to reef health, and their removal can have devastating consequences. Scientists have proven that ecosystem resilience and coral reef health are intimately linked to the maintenance of biological diversity. Extracting ornamental fish from reefs can have unforeseen consequences for the food web, which can result in increased algal growth, coral predation, and the spread of coral disease.

Additionally, fish have complex physical and behavioral needs that have evolved to fit the specific conditions of their diverse native ecosystems. When removed from the ocean, marine fish are subjected to immense stress during capture, transport, sale, and ultimately captivity. If the animals survive this grueling journey, they are placed on display under a variety of unnatural conditions, including an artificial ecosystem, an unvaried and sometimes unnatural diet, and exposure to novel pathogens found on land to which their immune systems are naïve. The process is not only inhumane, it is also dangerous to the animal's health and often deadly. Fish have well-developed nervous systems and it is well know that they feel pain and experience distress in much the same way as warm-blooded mammals. Yet despite this scientific fact, fish are not protected by even the bare minimum standards of the Animal Welfare Act. Therefore, it is now in Hawaii's hands to ensure that her precious natural resources are treated with care and respect.

HB 883, has NO basis in fact, in actual practice, scientific data or research, to support these proposed requirements for the transport and handling of tropical fish. I strongly oppose it for these reasons.

IATA, the International Air Transport Association, requires shippers to "responsibly pack specimens to survive 48 hours in transit". Feeding fish prior to shipment causes shipping water to become fouled. Ammonia, a by-product of fish waste, is toxic to fish and would insure high mortality rates during transit. So, in order to meet the IATA 48 hour rule, withholding food is "essential to clear the gut of food to minimize the fouling of transport containers".

The IATA live animal regulations, known as LARS, contains detailed criteria and recommendations and guidelines which has been developed over decades of experience involving the transport of hundreds of millions of live animal shipments. The IATA LARS are the GLOBAL adopted standard and incorporated in national laws, and prescribed by one or more United Nation's Treaties. HB 883 would require shippers to violate these regulations, which have long been the practiced standard in the pet industry.

The Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Flora and Fauna, referred to as CITES, has now adopted the IATA LARS as a substitute for its own guidelines.

Fish are cold blooded and do NOT require daily feeding. They do, however, require clean water and oxygen.

It is important to keep metabolic rates of fish at a low level prior to shipping so that less oxygen will be consumed. This is accomplished by reducing temperature, combined with cessation of feeding for several days prior to shipping. These are guidelines from the APEC Fisheries Working Group, January 1999.

Water requirements for shipping is not a "one size fits all" situation, but varies by species, pre-shipment conditioning, age, size, and length of transit.

The passage of this legislation will not only limit a fully sustainable trade, but would prevent the normal and ethical transport between facilities under the best standards of practical care.

This bill does NOT support the ethical treatment of aquatic life. In fact, it actually will have the impact of insuring high mortality rates, and therefore must not seriously be considered for passage.

Additionally, as an accredited member of the Association of Zoos and Aquariums, we are dedicated to the highest standards of animal welfare, ethics, and conservation. As such, we pride ourselves in providing top-notch care for our living collections, ensuring that our activities are conducted with particular attention to all ethical considerations, and that the ultimate goal is to inspire meaningful conservation change in our guests as they learn about and understand the science of biology and ecology.

The California Science Center is an admission-free informal science education institution that has hosted an average of 2 million guests per year over the last five years. The findings in Section 1.of this bill is flawed. The trimming of dog's nails and de-clawing of cats are not deemed to be cruel treatment. The withholding of food for a reasonable amount of time prior to dogs and cats being shipped on airplanes is a logical attempt at minimizing urinating or defecating in shipping container and is standard best practice to protect the health and safety of one's pets.

The supporters HB 883 would have you believe that enforcing the definition of "cruel treatment" would decrease substantial injury to live fish shipped out of State. In fact the opposite would be true. If spines were not clipped they could puncture the shipping bag resulting in loss of aquatic atmosphere essential to survival of a quality Hawaiian product.

Feeding a live fish prior to shipping would result in urination and defecation in the essential aquatic atmosphere thus turning it toxic and insuring the death of quality Hawaiian product.

The requirement of a minimum of one gallon of water has little to do with best management practices and is a clever way of adding shipping cost as a deterrent to exporting a valuable Hawaiian product. The size of the animal dictates the quantity of water needed for successful transport. The Aquarium industry would not be in business today if they shipped live fish that didn't survive.

All professional divers take great care of their product as this is the only way the Aquarium Industry remains sustainable.

The web of animals and industries of Hawaii that interact and are connected to coral reefs are all impacted. The aquarium trade while produces revenue between \$1 to 2 million, but the damages caused from such an industries easily significantly surpasses this number. Ecosystems such as coral reefs are not closed systems and industries such as the aquarium trade are not closed industries. Thus they do not operate as a single self-sufficient system but form a rather complex web that connects everything that interacts with it. Thus any action performed from an aquarium collector impacts anyone and everyone that interact with the species, the area, and the ecosystems that the collectors operate. Limiting the magnitude at which collector's impact coral reef ecosystems may lessen the impacts caused by the collectors. This includes prohibiting injury and death to coral reef organisms. While these regulations will not completely stop or solve the significance of the impacts of the aquarium trade it will at least serve as a stepping-stone to the potential solution. The most appropriate solution would be a complete ban of the aquarium trade but if that proposal fails to be implemented presently, restricting the harm and death of coral reef organisms may not only help reduce impacts but also assist the potential and hopefully eventual ban of the aquarium trade.
