HB 995 – RELATING TO AGRICULTURE

Chair Takumi, Vice Chair Ohno, and members of the House Committee on Education, thank you for this opportunity to testify in <u>support with amendment requested</u> of HB 995, which appropriates funds to support the Future Farmers of America and the 4-H youth education programs.

We support this bill provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities as indicated in the University's Board of Regents Approved Executive Biennium Budget. We note that our support includes a request to amend the funding provision for 4-H to provide a grant to the 4-H Foundation, rather than an appropriation for this purpose to the University of Hawai'i.

Future Farmers of America is a valued youth agricultural education program, under the direction of the Department of Education. We will defer to the Department of Education for discussion of the FFA program, and of that section of HB 995.

4-H, under the direction of the 4-H Foundation, volunteer committees, and the Cooperative Extension Service faculty within the College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR), University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, is one of the oldest programs of non-formal education in Hawai'i. 4-H assists young people age 5-19 in developing life skills and in forming attitudes that will enable them to become self-directing, productive, and contributing members of society, and touches approximately 35,000 young people annually throughout the State of Hawai'i. The four H's stand for Head, Heart, Hands, and Health. 4-H projects in livestock and crop education are well-known and very successful, 4-H members may also learn about food and nutrition, clothing, health, safety, the environment, and leadership. As a future-looking organization, 4-H's new programs even range from aerospace to theatrics to food safety.

At present, the 4-H program in Hawai'i is in a process of some reorganization. With support from CTAHR, the 4-H Foundation, with support from 4-H volunteers, has taken

on new responsibilities and thus new costs, to address changes in tax code, in addition to their primary function as the funding arm for the 4-H program.

For that reason, rather than an appropriation to the University of Hawai'i at this particular time, we believe it would be most valuable to amend this section of HB 995 to provide any funding this session in the form a grant to the 4-H Foundation, as the funding body for the program. This request for amendment in no way reflects any change in the continuing support of the University of Hawai'i for the 4-H program. It is simply a matter of allocation of resources in the most effective manner to support the program at the present time.



The Hawaii Primary Care Association (HPCA), which represents the federally qualified community health centers in Hawaii, supports House Bill 995, which appropriates monies to the FFA and 4-H programs.

The HPCA is a staunch believer in the social determinants of health, those economic and social conditions that influence an individual and a community's health status. These conditions serve as risk factors endemic to a person's living and working environment, rather than their behavioral or genetic histories. Factors such as income, education, access to recreation and healthy foods, housing, and employment, can and do have measurable impacts on a person and a community, both in health and financial outcomes.

House Bill 995 speaks to several of these social determinants by (1) seeking to expand working knowledge for Hawaii's youth, (2) promote the production of healthy, local foods, and (3) develop an active agriculture workforce.
