# Testimony to the Senate Committee on Ways and Means Thursday, April 21, 2016

Regarding HCR169 Requesting the Department of Transportation to Begin Construction on the Leeward Bikeway Before the End of 2016

Aloha Chair Tokuda, Vice Chair Dela Cruz, and esteemed members of Committee on Ways and Means,

Hawaii Bicycling League **strongly supports HCR169** requesting that the DOT begin construction on the Leeward Bikeway in 2016.

The Leeward Bikeway has been promised since 1980, 36 years ago. Funding was made available in 1995, 21 years ago. People from Nanakuli, Kapolei, Ewa, and Waipahu are waiting for this off-road multi-use path to be built as an alternative way to get to work, exercise, and recreate.

The Hawaii Bicycling League has made starting construction on the Leeward Bikeway in 2016 our priority project. We are committing our time and asking others in the community to make it their priority also. Our members have a target to raise \$60,000 in private donations to hire community outreach staff to inform Leeward Oahu residents and community organizations about the project's status and gain community support for this important project that will enable people to save money, get exercise, and fight global warming while going to work instead of being stuck in traffic, wasting time and gas. This multi-use path will complement the rail system and enable more people non-motorized access to rail stations.

At the HCR169 hearing before the Senate Committee on Transportation and Energy, DOT testified that the estimated construction start is late 2017. The project does indeed have some last hurdles to clear, most significantly the National Historic Preservation Act Section 106 requirements that are already underway. However, based on our involvement in the project, including in the Section 106 process, we believe that if the remaining items are expedited that construction can begin significantly earlier than the 2017 date.

We urge the Senate Ways and Means Committee to pass this resolution and send a strong message that all Oahu wants this multi-use path built now and that DOT should do everything they can to expedite the project.

Aloha e Chair Tokuda and Committee Members:

The Trust for Public Land strongly supports HC 199/HCR 169 requesting the Department of Transportation to Begin Construction on the Leeward Bikeway in 2016.

The Trust for Public Land is working with the Blue Planet Foundation, the National Park Service, the Hawai'i Community Development Authority, and other community organizations to implement the over 80 year vision of connecting Diamond Head (Le'ahi) to West O'ahu via a multi-use waterfront path (also known as the Lei of Green or Lei of Parks concept). Different portions of the path are in different stages of planning and development. The Leeward Bike Path is a critical portion of the overall, connected vision of a South Shore waterfront multi-use path that would provide tremendous recreation, fitness, health, transportation, art/culture, beautification, and community building opportunities along the path.

The Leeward Bike Path was planned and promised to the West O'ahu community in 1980 – 36 years ago. Funding is available for the construction of the path, and has been since 1995 – over 20 years ago. This path could a tremendous asset to the community for recreation, exercise, and an alternative transportation method for getting to work or going to school.

The State Outdoor Recreation Plan (2015) surveyed thousands of people in the State regarding their recreation needs – respondents to the survey reported using walking paths, tracks or sidewalks most frequently, and emphasized the need for more bike and pedestrian paths. We urge the Senate to send a strong message to DOT to spend previously appropriated funds (including federal funds) allocated for this project and fulfill the vision of the Leeward Bike Path, a key element and connector for West O'ahu to what many groups hope will be a larger connected South Shore Multi-Use Path or Lei of Green/Lei of Parks.
