2 Department Testimony: The Department of Health is willing to participate in a proposed Task
3 Force to examine issues relating to cancer risks for the firefighting profession in Hawaii.

Firefighters are potentially exposed to various mixtures of particulates, gases, mists, and fumes of an organic and/or inorganic nature that may have acute, toxic and carcinogenic effects. There are nearly 2,000 state and county firefighters in nearly 100 fire stations throughout Hawaii, and for some, the long-term health consequences of workplace exposure to harmful toxicants may only become apparent after retirement. The 2015 published study (Daniels RD, et al.) from the national multi-year study to examine cancer among firefighters found slight but statistically significant positive exposure-responses for lung cancer and leukemia risk.
