SUBJECT: HR2/HCR 5 REQUESTING THE CONVENING OF AN EARLY CHILDHOOD SEXUAL ABUSE WORKING GROUP TO ADDRESS AND REDUCE CHILD SEXUAL ABUSE IN HAWAII

> Hearing: Thursday, March 17, 2016, 9:30 a.m. Conference Room 329, State Capitol

**DEPARTMENT'S POSITION:** The Department appreciates the intent of this resolution and offers the following comments regarding the similar multiple efforts and data gathering.

**PURPOSE**: The purpose of this bill is to convene an early childhood sexual abuse working group to address and reduce child sexual abuse in Hawaii.

In addition to this Keiki Caucus resolution, HB1787 HD2 creates and appropriates funds for Erin's Law Task Force to review policies, programs, and curricula for educating public school students about sexual abuse prevention, and report recommendations for the establishment of a program to educate public school children on sexual abuse prevention through ageappropriate curricula. Amongst others, HB1787 HD2 similarly names the Department as a member to the Erin's Law task force and lists members of the Senate and House of Representatives to serve as co-chairs. The Department is concerned that education and prevention efforts for parents, providers, and children should contain fundamental principles and consistency which provides continuity across the children's ages and settings. The Department supports and participates in multiple collaborative efforts to improve system response and reduce child sexual abuse, such as:

1. <u>Hawaii Children's Justice Centers' (CJC) Interagency Advisory Committee</u> (Judiciary)

The CJC brings together a multi-disciplinary team of professionals to coordinate and improve the investigation of and system response to child abuse and neglect reports.

- Hawaii's Commercially Sexually Exploited Children Response Protocol <u>Development Workgroup (Family Court of the First Circuit)</u> Under the leadership of the Family Court, a multi-disciplinary team of federal, State, and county government agencies is developing protocols for the detection, classification, and accompanying of commercially sexually exploited children through appropriate systems of trauma-informed care.
- 3. <u>Hawaii Coalition Against Human Trafficking (Department of the Attorney General)</u> The Hawaii Coalition Against Human Trafficking is a statewide partnership of victim service providers and federal, State, and local government agencies that work collaboratively to: a) identify, investigate, and prosecute human trafficking cases; b) provide services to victims of trafficking; and c) increase public awareness of human trafficking, including the commercial sexual exploitation of minors.
- 4. Zero to Three Court (Judiciary)

The Zero to Three Court is a specialty child abuse court established by the Judiciary to provide early intervention to prevent or alleviate problems that babies and toddlers experience as a result of harm and dysfunctional family dynamics.

- 5. <u>Sex Offender Management Team (SOMT) (Department of Public Safety)</u> The SOMT is a multi-disciplinary team established to develop and implement, through a collaborative effort and legislative support, best practice standards statewide for the evaluation, treatment, disposition, ongoing assessment, and supervision of sex offenders and youth with sexualized misbehavior.
- 6. <u>Violence Against Women's Act (VAWA) State Planning Committee (VPC)</u> The VPC was lead by the Department of the Attorney General and its membership was

comprised of representatives from state and county agencies and non-profit victim service agencies that sets forth funding priorities for the State's VAWA funds.

While the reports are limited in the sense that the data are derived from Sex Abuse Treatment Center client information, the analysis is comprehensive, impactful, informative, and instructive in terms of developing a strategy.

If additional statewide information is required, gathering statewide data will take additional time and likely appropriations. Fortunately, the Hawai'i Department of the Attorney General and the four county police departments have very recently committed to transitioning from participation in the FBI's traditional Summary Reporting System (SRS) version of the nationwide Uniform Crime Reporting Program, to participation in the National Incident-Based Reporting System version. Whereas the SRS is based on simple aggregate tallies of reported offenses and arrests, NIBRS provides individual, case-level data (56 data elements) for each offense and arrest, including data on victim demographics. The transition process should take only a few years to complete, after which point statistics on juvenile (and other) victims of sexual assault (and other crimes) will be readily available on an annual basis. The NIBRS data can also be used for a variety of in-depth studies on special topics, including sexual assault.

- 1 Fiscal Implications: The Department of Health (DOH) defers to the Department of Human
- 2 Services (DHS) for fiscal implications. Convening an early childhood sexual abuse working
- 3 group to address and reduce child sexual abuse in Hawaii would require staff resources and
- 4 possible funding.
- 5 **Department Testimony:** This measure requests the Department of Human Services to convene
- 6 an early childhood sexual abuse working group to identify the means of addressing early
- 7 childhood sexual abuse and create strategies for reducing child sexual abuse in Hawaii.
- 8 At least 26 states and the territory of Guam have enacted "Erin's Law," legislation requiring
- 9 states to either study or develop age-appropriate child sexual abuse identification and prevention
- 10 curricula for pre-k through fifth, eighth or  $12^{th}$  grades to help children, teachers, and parents
- 11 recognize and identify child sexual abuse. Legislation for Erin's Law generally provides for
- some type of referral, counseling or safe way for children to report incidences of child sexual
- abuse and requires training for school personnel. Many states have also required task forces to
- 14 further study the issue and provide statewide recommendations.
- 15 Currently, the DOH, Maternal and Child Health Branch (MCHB) contracts with the Sex Abuse
- 16 Treatment Center (SATC) to provide K-12 sex abuse prevention curricula training and youth
- education sessions statewide. The SATC's curricula consists of four (4) separate age-appropriate
- 18 curricula for grades K-2, 3-5, middle, and high school to prevent sexual abuse. At this time,
- 19 SATC does not have sex abuse prevention curricula specifically for early childhood, ages birth to
- 20 five years.

1 2 3 4	Using effective principles and strategies in the primary prevention of sexual violence results in better outcomes. Should this resolution pass, the DOH MCHB encourages the early childhood sexual abuse working group to align efforts with Hawaii's K-12 sexual abuse prevention curricula.

Dear Chairs Morikawa and Belatti and Members of the Committees on Human Services and Health,

Planned Parenthood Votes Northwest and Hawaii ("PPVNH") writes in support for and offers amendments to H.R. 2 and H.C.R. 5, requesting the convening of an early childhood sexual abuse working group to address and reduce child sexual abuse in Hawaii.

In short, we respectfully request that the CEO, or the CEO's designee of our sister affiliate, Planned Parenthood of the Great Northwest and the Hawaiian Islands ("PPGNHI"), be added as a member of the task force. PPGNHI's experience working with the Department of Education ("DOE") to implement a sexual health education program pursuant to BOE policy 103.5 and their knowledge of that program will greatly benefit the task force in researching and determining its educational goals pertaining to sexual abuse prevention education. Currently, public school sexual health education programs are required to help students "develop relationships and communication skills to form healthy relationships that are based on mutual respect and affection and are free from violence, coercion and intimidation." Including on the the task force members who are knowledgeable and experienced with the sexual health education program will ensure that educational goals related to sexual abuse prevention will complement the sexual health education program going forward and better ensure that youth have the skills and tools to keep themselves healthy and safe.

It is our understanding that other stakeholders may be important to a strategically addressing early childhood sexual abuse. Therefore, the Committees may wish consider if additional stakeholders, such as direct service providers, representatives from the preschool community, healthcare providers (e.g. pediatricians), and additional state agencies, may be needed as named members of the working group.				
	- In orde	r to strategically address early childhood sexual abuse, we note that			

prevention, while very important, must exist alongside the means to detect and identify abuse and respond to it appropriately. It may therefore be desirable to amend the scope of the working group's deliberations from 'creating goals for a state policy that would prevent [early] child[hood] sexual abuse' to include consideration of policies to improve detection, identification and response to early childhood sexual abuse.
