SUBJECT: SB 1311 Proposed SD1 - Relating to Education

The State Council on Developmental Disabilities respectfully **OPPOSES** SB1311 Proposed SD1 and proposes an amendment to the bill. This measure would allow an individual of a school-based profession to engage in the practice of behavior analysis without being licensed as a behavior analyst; provided the unlicensed individual does not use any title or description to state or imply that the individual is a licensed behavior analyst.

The Council strongly supports the licensing of behavior analysts for the practice of behavior analysis. We appreciate the Legislature's commitment of this in the passage of Act 199, Session Laws of Hawaii 2015, that requires the licensing of behavior analysts beginning on January 1, 2016. Children who receive applied behavior analysis (ABA) should receive them from qualified providers who are licensed and trained.

However, we are aware of students within the Department of Education (DOE) who are currently receiving and benefiting from ABA through the implementation of an applied behavior analysis plan by unlicensed providers. Based on the DOE's testimony in support of a similar bill (HB 868 HD1 Proposed), they are dealing with vacancies and hard-to-fill positions, including ABA positions to provide behavioral support and intervention services.

The Council is concerned that the passage of SB 1311 SD1, as proposed, would have a negative impact and the unintended consequence of immediate disruption of ABA to students who are currently receiving these services from unlicensed providers. To address this, the Council respectfully proposes an amendment to include a sunset date of June 30, 2017, or a date determined to be appropriate by the **Legislature**. This would assure that students currently receiving ABA services can continue with their education plans and provide DOE and other providers with additional time to meet the provisions of Act 199, SLH 2015, regarding the practice of applied behavior analysis and licensure of behavior analysts.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony and for your consideration of the above amendment to SB 1311 Proposed SD1.

Testimony in OPPOSITON of SB1311 SD1 Proposed-behavior analysis DOE exemption

Honorable Chair Baker, Chair Kidani, Vice-Chair Harimoto and members of the committees,

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony today in **strong OPPOSITON to SB1311 SD1 Proposed.** My name is Kristen Koba-Burdt, President of the Hawai'i Association for Behavior Analysis (HABA). Just this last legislative session, Act 199 was passed to license behavior analysts because the legislature recognized the need for consumer protection. Individuals that receive behavior analytic services are some of our state's most vulnerable population. Individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities that may not be able to speak for themselves. We believe that any child receiving applied behavior analysis (ABA) services deserves a licensed, trained, and qualified provider. Act 199 as written includes exemptions for other licensed professionals working within their scope of practice. However, HB868 HD1 proposed seeks to amend Act 199 to allow *any* individual to provide behavior analysis services in a public education setting without a license or any protection that the individual is qualified, trained, and experienced in the practice of behavior analysis. This proposed change would expose the most vulnerable students to a myriad of potential problems, from ineffective intervention to serious harm.

The practice of behavior analysis requires specialized training and experience. Recent news reports continue to document the shortage of special educators in the Department of Education, with recent figures reporting nearly 20% of positions vacant. Many positions are filled by long-term substitutes or emergency hires that do not have the training and qualifications needed to provide behavior analytic interventions to children in an effective and ethical manner. Our educators need support, from licensed, trained, and qualified professionals. This proposed bill would allow undertrained staff, outside contracted providers, substitutes, and others to practice behavior analysis, putting the most vulnerable special education students at risk

We ask that you uphold the existing language of Act 199 by ensuring all children in Hawai'i are afforded the same protection of a licensed professional working in their scope of practice when receiving behavior analytic interventions. Please oppose this bill.

Hawaii Association of School Psychologists (HASP) believes that licensure is important for all professionals that are entrusted to care for students, especially those with special needs. Act 199 ensured a higher level of care for children with autism based on the specialized training and expertise required to implement Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA). HB868 and SB1311 proposes that the training and expertise are not necessary in the "practice of behavior analysis" within the educational setting.

School psychologist act to benefit all students and to do this, they must practice within the boundaries of their competence, use scientific knowledge from psychology and education to help students and others make informed choices, and accept responsibility for their work (NASP Ethics, Principle II.1). In accordance with the National Association of School Psychologists (NASP) Practice Model 2010, HASP asks that school psychologists practice in ways that are consistent with ethical, professional, and legal standards and regulations. School psychologists engage in effective, collaborative, and ethical professional relationships that support a multi-tiered continuum of services to support all students' attainment of academic, social, emotional, and behavioral goals. School Psychologists are trained in a variety of treatments that distinguishes us as mental health professionals within schools, but we do not provide nor practice "applied behavior analysis" (ABA) or "behavior analysis" when it is outside the scope of our competency. Those who have attained competency to provide ABA are recognized by their board certification through the Behavior Analyst Certification Board and through the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, Professional and Vocational Licensing in the state of Hawaii.

Hawaii Association of School Psychologist asks that you uphold the existing language of Act 199 by ensuring all children in Hawaii are afforded the same protection of a licensed professional working in their scope of practice. Please oppose this bill.

Reason for Referral

This evaluation is in response to STUDENT's biological mother, requesting for an Independent Educational Evaluation (IEE) and a Functional Behavior Assessment (FBA). Mrs. Mother has concerns with STUDENT's lack of progress with her current educational programming. She is concerned that STUDENT's engagement in self-stimulatory behaviors and vocal stereotypy are impacting STUDENT's learning. Mrs. Mother would like to know of any other potential variables that contributes to her lack of progress and learning in school. Mrs. Mother would like the Evaluator to provide feedback and recommendations that would increase learning and strengthen STUDENT's educational and behavioral programming, across school and home environments. Please note that a FBA report is a separate assessment report from this IEE that addresses her self-stimulatory behaviors and vocal stereotypy.

Diagnosis and Medications

- STUDENT has a primary diagnosis of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and a secondary diagnosis of Epilepsy.
- Her current medication includes:
 - Divalproex Sodium 1 tablet 2x daily; taken for seizures
 - Phenobarbital 2 tablets 2x day; taken for seizures

Present Testing by the Evaluator, Kim Wolff, M.S., BCBA

1. Verbal Behavior Milestone Assessment and Placement Program (VB-MAPP) 2nd Edition, testing date of 11/2/2015 (plus observations noted above)

Please note that the evaluator scheduled for an observation at Hawaii Elementary School to be conducted on October 29, 2015 in the afternoon. At 7:42am on the morning of the 29th, Mrs. M contacted the Evaluator to report STUDENT was going home as a result of not feeling well upon arrival to school.

Background Information

STUDENT is a ten-year-old female who lives with her family in Honolulu, Hawaii. She lives in a multifamily unit with her mother, step-father, and her four-year-old half-brother on the top floor. Her maternal grandparents live downstairs. STUDENT's biological father is deceased. Her ethnicity is Hapa Haole, Japanese and Caucasian decent. STUDENT was diagnosed with ASD in 2009 by Dr. Sean Scanlan, psychologist. She received a primary diagnosis of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and a secondary diagnosis of Epilepsy. STUDENT currently has limited language and was observed to use body gestures and a program called, Proloquo, on her iPad.

Some of STUDENT 's preferred activities include swinging, watching movies, going to the beach, going on car rides, watching people's feet in motion, watching bubbles float in the air, and being outdoors. Mrs. Mother shared that she doesn't like certain noises. These noises to an average person may not find bothersome but STUDENT can hone in on it. For example, she doesn't like fan noises, buzzing of the

light bulbs, sound of microphone use indoors, loud echoes of speakers, and sounds in parking garages. STUDENT also has a difficult time going to unfamiliar and/or crowded places in the community.

STUDENT is reported to be a healthy eater. She is not selective when it comes to meal time across settings. She does like food items that are crunchy such as carrots, celery, chips, and crackers. She doesn't like to eat spicy foods. STUDENT likes to drink water, juices, and milk. During observations, STUDENT requested for milk often. Mrs. Mother reported of STUDENT having difficulty with sleeping through the night. She has been observed by Mrs. Mother to laugh, giggle, or lay awake in bed. During parts of this assessment period, STUDENT was sick and as a result she didn't sleep well on several occasions.

STUDENT received Early Intervention starting at the age of 1 provided by E.S. and Hawaii Pre-School. She received Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) services by Catherine Wilson, BCBA. However, there are no current records of past assessments or behavior plans. It is unknown to the Evaluator the reason of discharge. This information was not provided upon request.

Current Services

STUDENT is in the 5th grade at Hawaii Elementary School in Honolulu, HI. She spends most of her day in the resource room facilitated by her special education teacher, Mrs. K Teacher. She is supported by her Educational Assistant (EA), Mrs. C B, throughout the school day. Mrs. B reported that STUDENT spends approximately 1-2 hours per day in the general education classroom depending on her level of tolerance and type the activity for the day. In her current IEP, she receives 1830 minutes of Special Education support per week.

Mrs. Teacher reported in her interview on October 29, 2015 that STUDENT has made progress since the start of the school year. However, when data was requested to show progress, Mrs. Teacher reported there was no data to demonstrate her progress. Mrs. Teacher shared that she can see her progress by observing her in the classroom. She noticed that STUDENT has been attending better. Mrs. K said, "STUDENT is a very effective communicator; she shows it using facial expressions and body language." Mrs. K continued to report that STUDENT has never independently used her iPad to communicate her wants and needs. She can use American Sign Language (ASL) for bathroom, yes, eat, and please. Mrs. Teacher would like to see consistency and structure in STUDEN's programming.

Per her IEP, STUDENT receives 270 minutes of speech language consult per quarter by E P. During Miss. P's interview on October 29, 2015, she reported that she consults weekly which consists of observations, monitoring, data collection and reliability checks. Miss. P reported that STUDENT is non-verbal and currently uses an iPad for communication. The iPad was introduced to STUDENT last school year. She often observes STUDENT being provided with reinforcers but would like for STUDENT to ask for it using her iPad. Miss. P would like more data collection from her EA but doesn't know of the best way for the EA to take data while multitasking STUDENT's other programs. STUDEN's behaviors, self-stimulatory behaviors and vocal stereotypies, distracts her from learning. Miss. P reported, "The iPad is used more consistently but it doesn't mean she's learning; she may have memorized the positions." While Miss. P reported that STUDENT hasn't made progress with communication, she agrees with the time she has for consult per quarter. Miss. P would like for STUDENT to learn to discriminate live objects and pictures, use basic ASL (e.g. bathroom, hi), and given more opportunities to communicate throughout the day to increase language and communication.

STUDENT receives 135 minutes of occupational therapy (OT) services per quarter by J C. During Mrs. C's interview on November 3, 2015, she reported that she sees STUDENT for consult twice per month for approximately 30 minutes. While she reported the duration limits her ability to teach STUDENT she

agrees with 30 minutes of consult is sufficient. "Because it's sufficient time to work on new things and I don't want to make too many new changes when she already has an EA." Said Mrs. C. During her 30 minutes of consult, Mrs. C reported, "I check up on her skills and sometimes bring new materials to experiment to see if she will use it." Mrs. C shared that she didn't train the EA to run the OT IEP goals since the EA was trained by the previous therapist and Mrs. C's methods may not be preferred by the Behavioral Instructional Support Services (BISS). Mrs. C doesn't conduct reliability checks with the EA but she often will ask the EA if there are anything new going on with STUDEN . Currently, Mrs. C doesn't meet with STUDENT's educational team to discuss programming beyond IEP meetings. Mrs. C reported that STUDENT has already taken a lot of time to work on her current goals and is unsure of when she'll master the programs. Mrs. C would like for STUDENT to learn and master skills that are essential to her daily living routine.

Jamie O provides Behavioral Instructional Support Services (BISS) to STUDENT under *Teacher Consultation* in the current IEP for a total of 480 minutes per month. Mrs. O used to work with STUDENT as a skills trainer and is currently her BISS. She has known STUDENT for approximately 5 years. Mrs. O develops the data sheets and programing instruction sheets for the EA to implement. She provides consult on a weekly basis which includes reviewing data, graphing, and updating programs pending approval by Mrs. Teacher. Mrs. O reported that she started fidelity checks in the last week from this interview date, 11/05/2015. She shared that STUDENT has regressed as a result of inconsistency of staffing and programming. Mrs. O would like to be able to train the EA, make program changes to improve STUDENT's programming, and if given the opportunity conduct an assessment called Assessment of Functional Living Skills.

After school on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Wednesdays, STUDENT attends E.S. After School Enrichment Program. The program activities observed by the Evaluator consisted of break time upon arrival until other peers arrive, snack time, art & crafts project, outdoor activities, and sensory activities. The staff members at E.S.s used verbal praise for compliance and presented her iPad during snack time for STUDENT to make requests or identify the snack item presented to her. STUDENT was disinterested in most of the activities except for snack time, break time which consisted of watching movie on TV or on an iPad, and listening to sounds while sitting in the garden outside. She didn't initiate interactions with peers but was able to orient her head towards a peer when a peer was upset and crying.

On Thursdays and Fridays after school, STUDENT is supported by her skills trainer, Mrs. JW. On Thursdays, Mrs. W generally takes STUDENT out to the community such as grocery shopping, walking in the park, and/or getting a snack. She spends approximately an hour to an hour and a half with STUDENT in the community. When they return home, Mrs. W works on skills such as putting grocery items away, cleaning in the kitchen, dressing/undressing, and showering. On Fridays, Mrs. W takes STUDENT to Hawaii Academy, a gymnastics and trampoline center. STUDENT is there for approximately an hour. During this time, she spends some time on a series of courses that includes climbing up/over/under/through/down structures and walking across a balance beam. Most of her time is spent jumping on large trampolines.

Present Testing

Test Used

The VB-MAPP balances the curriculum in an attempt to avoid the common trap of developing rote responding due to deficiencies in the related verbal repertoires (Dr. Mark Sundberg). It is an assessment of the child's existing verbal and related skills which are mand, tact, listener, visual perception and matching-to-sample, independent play, social and social play, motor imitation, echoic, and intraverbal. This assessment establishes a baseline of current skills compared to typically developing peers. The skills

tested are skills essential to one's development, learning, and communication. The VB-MAPP also includes a barriers assessment that identifies barriers that are impacting learning and progress. The barriers assessment evaluates the presence of behavior problems, instructional control, impaired mand, impaired tact, impaired imitation, impaired echoic, impaired visual perception and matching-to-sample, impaired listener, impaired intraverbal, impaired social skills, prompt dependent, scrolling, impaired scanning, impaired conditional discrimination, failure to generalize, weak motivators, response requirement weakens motivating operations, reinforcer dependent, self-stimulation, impaired articulation, obsessive-compulsive behavior, hyperactive, failure to make eye contact, and sensory defensiveness.

Test Conditions

Please note that a significant part of this assessment is completed through observations which was completed during observation sessions listed above.

Under the testing condition for the assessment, STUDENT was brought to the office of Behavior Analysis in Honolulu, HI. When STUDENT arrived, the Evaluator indicated to Mrs. Mother that she would be in the conference room upstairs for the assessment. The Evaluator gestured and instructed to STUDENT to follow the Evaluator. While STUDENT was compliant, it is a concern that STUDENT willingly followed an unfamiliar person. She smiled while walking until we reached the bottom of the stairs. The Evaluator gestured with a verbal instruction to STUDENT to go upstairs. She immediately engaged in avoidance behaviors which included whining, crying, and turning her body away from the stairs. Her facial expression was sad. The Evaluator repeated the verbal instruction, gestured towards the stairs, and took 2 steps to model. STUDENT continued with crying and whining. Her iPad was presented to her and she touched the picture for milk. She was praised for communicating appropriately but was informed milk wasn't available. During this time, the Evaluator instructed another staff to bring down her juice. The Evaluator provided STUDENT with the instruction to go up the stairs and with a light physical prompt to her upper back to move forward. She refused. At this time, a juice box was brought to the Evaluator. STUDENT was instructed to identify juice on her iPad. She touched milk. The reinforcer was not provided but she received praise for listening and staying quiet. The Evaluator provided STUDENT with a full physical prompt to request for *I want juice* on her iPad. She was immediately praised and provided with the juice. This was repeated two more times. Then the Evaluator instructed STUDENT to go upstairs and walked halfway up the stairs. STUDENT stopped crying but started to walk up the stairs while whining. She was praised for walking up the stairs.

Once STUDENT reached the top of the stairs, she was instructed to use the bathroom per Mrs. Mother 's suggestion prior to the starting the assessment session in the conference room. Here is a task analysis and baseline of her current skills:

After using the bathroom, STUDENT followed the Evaluator to the conference room. She immediately walked towards the table and sat at the chair that was gestured to her. STUDENT's chair was positioned so her back was facing towards the window to minimize distractions from outside. The Evaluator sat to the right of STUDENT.

During testing. STUDENT was provided with praise and reinforcers contingent upon appropriate behaviors and correct responses. She was also provided with non-contingent reinforcers and frequent breaks. At the start of the session, STUDENT placed her head down at the table and appeared to be falling asleep. She was prompted to sit up several times but continued to fall asleep. The Evaluator took STUDENT for a brief walk around the office for about 2 minutes. She returned to the testing room alert. A brief preference assessment was conducted and her high reinforcers were juice, Oreos, and the movie of Clifford on her iPad. Her other reinforcers were gummy bears and seaweed snacks. Reinforcers that Mrs. Mother provided but wasn't preferred during assessment was bubbles and approximately 20 other shows on her iPad.

While STUDENT was able to remain seated in her chair and participate in the assessment, she engaged in self-stimulatory behaviors (SSB). As the assessment continued, her engagement in SSB increased. She was provided with frequent breaks. Halfway through the assessment, STUDENT continued to engage in SSB and also engaged in vocal stereotypy (VS). She appeared to be happy by smiling and her vocals were upbeat and loud. Occasionally she would have outbursts of high pitched laughing sounds. When STUDENT was provided with time on her iPad to watch Clifford, she initially held onto it while engaging in SSB. The Evaluator placed the iPad down on the table and propped it up on a small toy so she could see it without holding it. Her hands were guided to stay on her lap but she was allowed to engage in other SSB and VS. This was the requirement for the entire session when the iPad was presented. STUDENT responded really well to the prompts and compliant.

Figure 1.1 STUDENT scored 9.5 points out of a possible 170 points on the Milestone Assessment Level 1.


The result in Figure 1.1 shows the current baseline of STUDENT's skills. The test demonstrates that she scored within the 18-30 months level but doesn't have mastery in all areas. The shaded areas indicate she has the skills. Whereas the non-shaded areas, are recommended skills for STUDENT's learning objectives. The absence of more skills are a result of barriers that contribute to her lack of progress which are indicated below under *Barriers Assessment*.

Manding is the behavior of STUDENT asking for what she wants. She demonstrated the ability to mand for items across 2 people (testing and home skills trainer), 2 settings (testing at office and at home session), and 2 different examples of reinforcers (juices). Tact is the behavior of identifying or labeling objects, actions, events etc. She was unable to demonstrate this skill. Listener responding is being able to attend and respond to words spoken by others. She was unable to demonstrate this skill. Visual perceptual skills and matching-to-sample is the ability to attend and respond to visual stimuli and match objects or pictures. STUDENT was able to visually track a moving stimuli for 2 seconds 2 out of 5 opportunities during observation session at E.S.s. She was able to grasp small objects using the pincer grips. Independent play is the behavior of exploration and manipulation of objects and cause-effect play. STUDENT was unable to demonstrate this skill when observed at school. Social behavior and social play is the ability attend to others and attempt to socially engage. STUDENT was unable to demonstrate this when observed at school. Motor imitation is the behavior of imitating another person's actions. STUDENT was able to clap her hands and tap the table. Echoic is the behavior of repeating sounds (vowels, consonant phonemes, singly and in combinations) that the Evaluator emits. STUDENT was unable to repeat the sounds. Spontaneous vocal behavior is the behavior of spontaneous engagement in vocalization and the nature of the vocalization. STUDENT is able to emit limited sounds of "h," "ah," "u," "mm," and "e."

It is recommended part of STUDENT's educational objectives be based on the evaluation of the VB-MAPP. The objectives are to be the next non shaded area from the shaded. STUDENT should be reassessed with the VB-MAPP in a year. The recommended goals are:

- 1) Spontaneously emits (no verbal prompts) 5 mands.
- 2) Tact 2 items with echoic or imitative prompts.
- 3) Attend to speaker's voice by making eye contact with the speaker 5 times.
- 4) Visually tracks moving stimuli for 2 seconds 5 times.
- 5) Visually attends to a toy or book for 30 seconds (using a non-self-stim item)
- 6) Makes eye contact as a type of mand 5 times.
- 7) Imitates 4 gross motor movements when prompted

The VB-MAPP also includes a Barriers Assessment that assesses 24 common learning and language acquisition barriers.






Figure 1.2 STUDENT received a score of 74 out of a possible 90 points on the barriers assessment that prevents her from mastering the milestones above.

The Figure 1.2 shows that STUDENT has significant barriers that contributes to her lack of progress and reaching the milestones in the assessment. Each box shaded on the first column for each barrier shows the level of severity. The non-shaded boxes on column 1 indicates there are no barriers or hasn't reached extreme severity in the barrier if some are already shaded in the column. Many of the barriers are already demonstrated when she was tested for the Milestones Assessment (impaired mand, tact, imitation, echoic, visual perceptual skills and matching-to-sample, listening, intraverbal, and social skills). Other barriers that are shown illustrates that she currently has poor instructional control and lack of understanding of the use of motivators in her learning environment and this was prevalent during the Evaluator's observations. STUDENT is also prompt dependent, has poor eye contact and scanning, and unable to generalize skills. These barriers are a result of poor programming and lack of behavior support to address her self-stimulatory behaviors and vocal stereotypies. It is highly advised that the recommendations in this evaluation is followed to prevent further reinforcements of barriers.

Impressions and Recommendations

Communication Needs and Abilities

STUDENT was observed to communicate primarily through the use of her facial expressions, non-sensible vocalizations, and when her iPad was presented to her. She was not observed to independently initiate her wants and needs (e.g. use of bathroom, breaks, snacks etc.). Mrs. P, SLP, also reported that

STUDENT hasn't or unable to communicate effectively "because she is simply memorizing the positions of the icons". It is hypothesized that STUDENT uses the iPad as a form of self-stim by touching milk when asking for milk is irrelevant to the context; or touches the last word the staff said (e.g. Staff says, "STUDENT I don't have milk but I have crackers; Tell me what else you want?" STUDENT responds by touching crackers or *I want*.) This doesn't reflect that STUDENT has never used it to communicate her actual wants but her level of communication using the iPad is very inconsistent.

In times that she was observed to communicate, STUDENT was presented with the iPad but she was never observed to independently access her iPad. During one of the observations at HawaiiElementary School, the EA presented STUDENT with the iPad and said, "STUDENT, what do you want?" STUDENT didn't respond. The EA asked STUDENT if she wanted bubbles or swing. STUDENT didn't respond. The EA primed the response by touching, "I want bubbles." Then the EA provided STUDENT with full physical prompting to complete the exact phrase. STUDENT was compliant with the physical prompt but was not attending. The EA asked STUDENT to complete it herself this time. STUDENT was able to imitate. Then the EA reminded STUDENT she forgot to hit clear and for her to try again. The EA provided STUDENT with a full physical prompt to hit the following phrase, "I want bubbles clear."

During another observation at E.S.s, the staff informed STUDENT that it was time for snack; touched the snack picture on the iPad, repeated the statement, and provided STUDENT with a partial physical prompt to touch snack. When STUDENT finished her snack, the staff asked, "Do you want more crackers?" STUDENT independently used the iPad and touched milk followed by crackers. The staff asked STUDENT if she wanted more milk. STUDENT turned to her iPad and touched crackers. The staff informed STUDENT that there were no more crackers but she could give her more water. The staff instructed STUDENT to use her iPad and ask for water. STUDENT touched crackers followed by water. Again, this demonstrates a lot of inconsistency with the use of the iPad. It doesn't function as an appropriate method of communication until she can demonstrate simple discrimination with proper motivating operation in place.

On numerous occasions, STUDENT was observed to touch milk more frequently than other edible options on the page. It appears that she doesn't consistently look at the page and discriminate for the items she wants. Often times when she does request for the same item multiples times appropriately, these items appear to be unavailable. There were also observations of STUDENT appropriately requesting for a potentially preferred activity (e.g. bubbles, swing) but would have to complete a task prior to the activity. While this is an appropriate approach of first do this then you can have this (Premack Principle), the timing of the presentation of the reinforcement was significantly delayed and the task (e.g. opening all of the classroom windows) is too long, too high of a response effort.

STUDENT also has limited signs that she uses when prompted which are bathroom, eat, yes, hi, and please. Her SLP, Miss. P, reported that STUDENT is unable to discriminate between 2 objects. With STUDENT having poor attention, lack of scanning, poor imitation skills, and behaviors, Miss. P reported these barriers contribute to her lack of progress towards communication. STUDENT has also had several changes with educational assistants.

The iPad used as STUDENT's form of communication was presented last year. Her iPad at home includes preferred movies and TV shows, whereas, the one in school doesn't. Currently, she doesn't use it independently. It is a significant concern that her barriers haven't been addressed prior to teaching the use of a communication device such as an iPad program Proloque. Introducing costly devices with limited access to it when STUDENT is unable to request for preferred items/activities consistently doesn't allow STUDENT to learn how to communicate effectively. Before teaching labels/identifying items (e.g. fork,

spoon), there needs to be high rates of communication opportunities of learning pictures/signs that are relevant to STUDENT's wants and needs (e.g. help, bathroom, stop, wait, swing, drink etc.). Once she can consistently discriminate these pictures and signs, then the iPad can be introduced. It is recommended she is provided with errorless teaching with the use of the iPad in the absence of SSB and to prevent her from using it as an SSB. Engaging in self-stimulatory behaviors while using a communication device could result of damaging it. Then she will be left without a communication device which would result in STUDENT not being able to communicate until she can get a new one. STUDENT should also be presented with communication opportunities at high rates within her day.

Safety/Behavior Reduction Targets

STUDENT's level of safety awareness is a significant concern. She exhibits no traffic awareness and she is unable to identify strangers. While she demonstrates excitement when she sees her mom or other familiar people that she has known over the years, STUDENT will also follow strangers as indicated during testing of the VB-MAPP. During transitions with peers, STUDENT was observed to fall significantly behind her peer because she was focused on watching their feet in motion. She was observed to have poor balance at Hawaii Academy and throughout observations. Her engagement in SSB also contributes to her safety. When STUDENT engages in SSB, she generally moves her head in a circular motion clockwise and this includes occasionally moving her entire upper body in the same motion. She was observed do this while transitioning in school and her peers moved away to prevent STUDENT from bumping into them. While there are no reports of injury since she has someone with her at all times, STUDENT would be as risk of injuries if left unattended. STUDENT demonstrates abnormal gait when walking. She walks with her toes pointed outwards which contributes to poor balance. It is recommended STUDENT receives therapy services (OT and PT) that will address her gait, balance, and motor skills; and programs to teach her safety skills (e.g. such as crossing the street, walking appropriately, etc.) Additionally, STUDENT should be introduced to her local emergency responders (e.g. police department and hospital); inform them of her diagnosis, how she communicates, reinforcers, behaviors and lack of safety awareness as a safety precaution in the event STUDENT gets lost. STUDENT should also carry an identification card that includes her picture, name, contacts, phone numbers, behaviors, diagnosis, and brief recommendations on how to interact with her. STUDENT is a high risk individual for falls or other injuries, abuse since she has limited communication, and loss/stolen personal belongings (e.g. jewelry. money etc.). It is imperative there are safety considerations and protocols in place for her.

Collaboration, Training, and Assessments

Per Mrs. Mother's initial interview, she reported that this is the first time STUDENT is receiving an IEE and a FBA. STUDENT has had OT, PT, and Cognitive assessments to determine qualification for services and consult minutes. Maladaptive behaviors and lack of progress were reported to the Evaluator during interviews. Additionally, there has not been an appropriate assessment conducted to address STUDENT's behaviors or barriers to learning. Her IEP doesn't state behavior services consult minutes but she receives behavioral consult through the BISS.

It is imperative there are structure, routine, consistency, and predictability for children with ASD. There needs to be appropriate learning objectives based on an appropriate assessment for children with ASD and a strong interdisciplinary educational team, prioritization of skills, and a high degree of staff training with ongoing training and monitoring to facilitate a proper structured learning environment for STUDENT. In addition to a well-structured learning environment, STUDENT requires strong programming with a team of well educated, well trained individuals with experiences teaching children with ASD. STUDENT has been observed across settings and it is evident she requires teaching approaches and programming using behavioral analytic methods across environments. It was reported to the Evaluator across all interviews that there are inconsistencies across her programming. The interviews conducted with her teacher, speech

therapist, occupational therapist, educational assistant, and behavioral specialist suggests that they have difficulty with identifying the appropriate motivating conditions, teaching methods for discrimination, increase attending, decrease self-stim and vocals, and increase effective communication.

The EA and substitutes who work directly with STUDENT the majority of the time should have a minimum of 40 hours of training and supervision on the use of behavioral analytic approaches, techniques, and program implementations specific to STUDEN. Her special education teacher could also benefit from participating in training if s/he plans on providing direct support at any point.

It is highly recommended there is one professional supervising and monitoring STUDENT's programming. This professional is to be someone who is a qualified professional with 5 or more years of experience working with children with ASD at a low functioning level; experienced with verbal behavior training, natural environmental training, discrete trial training; and experienced with conducting assessments such as AFLS, VB-MAPP, or Vineland II. This professional will also need to collaborate across disciplines to ensure STUDENT receives appropriate programming that is conducive to her development and quality of life.

Prioritizing Teaching Targets

The ability to teach STUDENT effectivity includes being able to prioritize her educational objects into the following areas:

- 1) Communication/requesting wants and needs consistently
- 2) Decreasing self-stimulatory behaviors and vocal stereotypy to zero or near zero occurrences
- 3) Facilitating independence/Adaptive Daily Living Skills with significant consideration of safety skills

All of these areas should be targeted as soon as possible and with numerous opportunities throughout the day. Her other teaching targets should also be obtained from an appropriate assessment for children with ASD (e.g. AFLS, VB-MAPP, ABLLS, Vineland II, Essential Skills for Living). A behavior support plan will also need to be place to address competing behaviors that are barriers to learning. The use of preference and reinforcer assessments should be included in STUDENT's educational programming. Please refer to the section that discusses recommended goals using the VB-MAPP above.

When developing educational objectives, well-educated and intentional planning must take place to identify mastery of skills, plan for generalization, and provide maintenance schedule. When an improper or neglectful planning occur within educational programing, it results in time lost spent on teaching goals that are unable to generalize, have lack of social significance, or significant to STUDENT.

Curriculum Considerations

As suggested previously, STUDENT's curriculum should primarily be behavioral analytic, developed, supervised, and monitored by a highly experienced, qualified Board Certified Behavior Analyst. Her programming should also include collaboration across disciplines (e.g. Sped teacher, SLP, OT, PT etc.). She requires a total of 40 hours of behavioral programming across settings to address all 3 three areas listed under *Prioritizing Teaching Targets*. Again, her curriculum should be properly assessed using appropriate assessments tools (e.g. AFLS, VB-MAPP, Vineland II etc.). She should be re-assessed at a minimum annually to track her progress.

Data should be collected daily and for all objectives. Data should be graphed weekly or biweekly to track progress. The graph should demonstrate a stable baseline and daily data points prior to implementing teaching condition. Decisions should be data driven to aide proper programming decisions. Sleep data is recommended to be tracked for possible correlations to behaviors and barriers to learning. A recording of

mastery skills should be recorded, placed into maintenance skills with a maintenance schedule, and transferred to the next school year. Staff training should occur as often as possible and immediately when scoring below 90% during fidelity checks. If the EA score below a 60% during fidelity checks, s/he should be removed from working with STUDENT until s/he score 90% or higher on the fidelity checks. This also includes fidelity checks on the substitutes, home instructors, and teachers if they work with STUDENT at any point. Program sheets should be well written in a way that any person who look at it is able to implement the program with 90% accuracy or higher. Please see recommended goals under the VB-MAPP results above.

Evaluating Program Effectiveness

Based on STUDENT's programming, there are not enough data or appropriate data to demonstrate progress therefore it cannot be determined to be effective. Mrs. Teacher reported that STUDENT has made progress through observations but doesn't have data to show progress. STUDENT 's progress could have and most likely resulted from maturation.

As indicated in the abridged IEP comparison across the most recent 3 IEPs, her most current IEP objective added a significant amount of prompts. This is setting her up to be prompt dependent when she is already prompt dependent. STUDENT needs to have proper programing to set her up for independence and generalization. The objectives don't display appropriate measurements for mastery. STUDENT has had some of these objectives for over a year and the only changes made to it are mastery criterion and added

prompts. This demonstrates to the Evaluator that STUDENT has regressed or the teaching program was unsuccessful. Setting the mastery measurements at 3 data collection doesn't allow for long term learning to occur. When it takes a STUDENT a long time to master a skill, the criterion should be higher/longer to ensure learning has occurred. Additionally, 3 data collections could occur within a day. A day is not enough to demonstrate mastery of a skill if it already has taken her over a year to learn the skill. Prompts should never be in an objective because it is setting her up for failure, moving her away from independence. Objectives can include a discriminative stimulus and the expectation of independence. It is recommended there are careful considerations and planning when developing objectives, mastery criterion, and programs.

During the Evaluator's observation on October 26, 2015 at Hawaii Elementary School, the EA worked on matching object-to-object with STUDENT in the resource classroom. The EA presented STUDENT with a field of 2 actual items, pink cup and small toy. EA asked STUDENT, "Put cup in cup." STUDENT was unable to hold her eye gaze with the object prior to placing the cup into the cup. 2 out of 4 trials were incorrect responses. 2 out of 4 trials were correct. 2 out of 4 trials the cup was placed to the left of STUDENT. 2 out of 4 trials the cup was placed to the right of STUDENT. Then the stimuli changed to book and toy. Carol presented STUDENT with the instruction, "STUDENT put book with book." STUDENT didn't respond to the first request. She spent most of the teaching session looking out the window. Carol turned STUDENT's desk away from the window and proceeded with the teaching trials. STUDENT responded correctly 1 out of 4 trials. 2 out of 4 trials the book was to the right of STUDENT. 2 out of 4 trials the book was to the left of STUDENT. Each trial STUDENT responded correctly, she received either a verbal praise or a small edible reinforcer. The total number of recording trials were unknown to the Evaluator since the error correction procedure wasn't clear. The instruction to place the object into/onto the object was repeated up to 4 consecutive times in a row when STUDENT wasn't paying attention. When STUDENT randomly placed the object down on the desk, she was provided with the instruction again and full physical prompt to match. The discriminative stimulus doesn't correspond in a practical situation or allows for adding more objects to match.

Based on the program sheet provided, the discriminative stimulus (SD) was for the EA to say the word *match*. It is recommended her instructions are brief when teaching a simple skill such as matching and clear teaching procedures versus error correction needs to be in place prior to teaching. A field of 2 shouldn't be used when teaching discrimination. A field of 2 only allows for a 50/50 percent chance of responding correctly or incorrectly. This method measures STUDENT's correct responding as a 50/50 chance versus actually learning to discriminate for the correct stimuli. Additionally, it was reported by Mrs. Teacher that STUDENT has a side preference. In this case, she'll always respond correctly to the preferred side and will most likely score 50% if the target stimuli is placed to her preferred side 50% of the time. This needs to be addressed in her programming with specific methods on preventing side preference.


The procedure section should include clear teaching steps or phases with the type of prompts. There needs to be more instruction so that even an untrained individual who looks at the program sheet is able to replicate the teaching session with 90% accuracy. Correction procedure has independent noted in it. Independence should never be an expectation within a correction procedure. A correction procedure is as simple as demonstrating the correct response. Gesturing is not appropriate within a correction procedure since it leaves room for yet another error within an error. The occurrence of an error should always be prevented during correction procedure. It is also recommended that there is a plan for mastery of criterion and a plan for remediation. The program calls for a reinforcement assessment prior to implementation of the program. The method described in the section is not a reinforcement assessment. Instead, it is a forced choice preference assessment since it calls for one trial of selecting a preferred item out of two options.

The data sheet above doesn't reflect data collection or measurement for the 3-step task to measure her accuracy for criterion. This data sheet lack data collection for the actual task analysis. The Evaluator is unsure as to how the criterion for mastery was set at 75% and the actual steps for each task.

Here is sample of the monthly report of the same objective but different IEP dates (4/20/15 & 9/5/15):



This graph above for IEP 4/20/15 shows an average data point for baseline of 3% in May 2015 with a conditional change line and three additional monthly average data point of 0%, 3%, and 3%. Based on the data provided in the teaching condition, the data suggests STUDENT is still on baseline condition because the teaching condition doesn't demonstrate that learning has occurred across 92 days of learning opportunities. The graph itself is missing labels on the abscissa and ordinate. The type of teaching used during the teaching condition should include a label of the teaching method. It is important to establish a stable baseline in order to make appropriate decisions on programming and mastery criterion. This is advised so future decisions on program changes can be made based on STUDENT's progress.

This graph above for IEP 9/4/15 shows a monthly average for the month of September 2015 at 6%. Based on this one data point and since it's in baseline, the Evaluator is unable to determine program effectiveness. However, if this data point was graphed with the IEP 4/20/15 it would suggest a reversal treatment (A-B-A) design and the treatment condition display no progress. All of the data points are still in baseline phase, no effective treatment has been implemented. The graph itself is missing labels on the abscissa and ordinate. The type of teaching used during the teaching condition should include a label of the teaching method. It is important to establish a stable baseline in order to make appropriate decisions

on programming and mastery criterion. This is advised so future decisions on program changes can be made based on STUDENT 's progress.

Summary of Recommendations

- STUDENT requires a total of 40 hours of programming based on the principles of applied behavior analysis (ABA) across settings. (This is also recommended in educational and behavioral research such as S.J. Rogers, L.A. Vismara. Evidence-based comprehensive treatments for early autism, Journal of Clinical Child and Adolescent Psychology, 37 (2008), pp. 8–38.)
- 2. Appropriate assessments (e.g. AFLS, Vineland II etc.) for children with ASD in order to develop appropriate educational and functional objectives.
- 3. Goals based on the VB-MAPP assessment within this evaluation stated above.
- 4. Re-assess in a year using the VB-MAPP and other relevant assessments indicated in #2 of this section.
- As a result of the barriers assessment, STUDENT should be taught using errorless teaching approaches as much as possible.
- It is recommended STUDENT display mastery of simple discrimination using basic motivating operations, matching-to sample skills, and decrease in SSB prior to re-introducing a communication device such as Proloque app on the iPad.
- 7. Provide STUDENT with high frequency of communication opportunities within her educational day.
- 8. It is recommended STUDENT receive an independent SLP, OT, and PT evaluation to address her gait, balance, motor skills, and communication. Prior to evaluation, be sure the individual has extensive *successful* experience working with children with ASD and at low functioning level.
- Due to safety concerns, STUDENT should be introduced to her local emergency responders; inform
 them of her diagnosis, methods of communication, reinforcers, behaviors, and lack of safety
 awareness as a safety precaution in the event STUDENT is lost.
- 10. STUDENT should carry a photo identification card when going into the community that includes a photo of her, name, contacts, phone numbers, behaviors, diagnosis, and brief recommendations on how to interact with her.
- 11. There needs to be appropriate learning objectives based on appropriate assessment indicated in #2 of this section, prioritization of skills, and a high degree of staff training with ongoing training/monitoring to facilitate a quality structured learning environment.

- 12. STUDENT educational supports (e.g. EA, substitutes) should receive a minimum of 40 hours of training and supervision on the use of behavioral analytic approaches, techniques, and program implementations specific to STUDENT. The hours of training may vary from one person to the other. For example, if the home instructor only works with STUDENT twice per week for a couple of hours each day, she would require training at approximately 25% of hours worked with STUDENT per month.
- 13. Educational objectives should be developed with well-educated and intentional planning which includes identifying mastery of skills, plan for generalization, maintenance schedule, and plan for remediation when necessary. These objectives should be measureable and meaningful to and for STUDENT.
- 14. Data should be collected daily and for all objectives completed within the day. Additionally, data should be graphed weekly or biweekly to monitor progress. The graph is used to measure stability and treatment outcomes. Decisions should be data driven to avoid biases and trial-and-error teaching methods.
- 15. Daily sleep data should be collected and shared across settings to assist in potentially modifying her programs for the day. This doesn't mean that STUDENT will have no expectations or learning programs for the day but her programs may be achievable and require a low response effort.
- 16. As STUDENT masters each skills/objectives, it should be generalized and placed on maintenance. It is suggested she has a separate binder for maintenance skills and schedule for maintenance. This binder should go with her to the next school year.
- 17. Contingent upon a fidelity check with a score less than 90% or below, re-training should be implemented. If the EA or home instructor scores below a 60% during fidelity checks, s/he should be removed from providing direct 1:1 instruction with STUDENT until s/he scores 90% or higher.
- 18. It is recommended her instructions are brief when teaching a simple skill such as matching and clear teaching procedures versus error correction needs to be in place prior to teaching. Errorless teaching is recommended to prevent side preferences as reported.
- 19. The procedure section in the programming sheet should include clear teaching steps or phases with the type of prompts. There needs to be more instruction so that even an untrained individual who looks at the program sheet is able to replicate the teaching session. Independence should never be an expectation within a correction procedure. A correction procedure is as simple as demonstrating the correct response. Gesturing is not appropriate within a correction procedure since it leaves room for yet another error within an error. The occurrence of an error should always be prevented during correction procedure. It is recommended that there is a plan for mastery of criterion and a plan for remediation.
- 20. A basic graph must include a minimum of labels on the abscissa and ordinate. The type of teaching used during the teaching condition should include a label of the teaching method. It is important to establish a stable baseline in order to make appropriate decisions on programming and criterion for mastery.
- 21. Assessment and baseline should be established prior to developing programs and objective.
- 22. It is highly advised everything stated under Overview of next-step recommendations is followed.
- 23. STUDENT's programming should cover all three areas listed under *Prioritizing Teaching Targets*.

The Hawaii School Counselor Association (HSCA) aims to advance guidance and counseling in order to maximize the educational, academic, career, and personal/social development of every student by upholding the ethical standards set by the American School Counselor Association (ASCA). School counselor ethical standards include adhering to all professional standards regarding selecting, administering and interpreting assessment measures and only utilize assessment measures that are within the scope of practice for school counselors and for which they are trained and competent (ASCA Ethical Standards for School Counselors A.9.a). HB 868 and SB1311 propose that proper training and expertise are not necessary in the "practice of behavior analysis" within the educational setting.

School counselors have a primary obligation to the students, who are to be treated with dignity and respect as unique individuals. If necessary or appropriate, referrals must be made to other mental health professionals for student and/or family support for services that are beyond the capabilities of the school counselor. Services that are beyond the capabilities of a school counselor include coordinating cognitive assessments, such as applied behavior analysis (ABA), and providing therapy or long-term counseling to address psychological disorders.

On behalf the Hawaii School Counselor Association, I ask that you uphold the language of Act 199 by ensuring that all students in Hawaii are afforded the same protection of a licensed professional working in their scope of practice. Please oppose this bill.

My name is Amy Smith Wiech, I am a Doctoral Level Board Certified Behavior Analyst and Licensed Behavior Analyst. I am the Founder of Autism Behavior Consulting Group (ABC Group), a Kama'aina company for over 10 years. I have over 20 years experience in Behavior Analysis. Thank you so much for the opportunity to testify in **STRONG OPPOSITION** of SB1311.

This proposed bill would allow for certain individuals unlicensed in behavior analysis to engage in the practice of behavior analysis (ABA) when done in a public educational setting.

THIS WILL BE AKIN TO ALLOWING SOCIAL WORKERS OR SPEECH PATHOLOGISTS WHO HAVE ATTENDED A ONE-DAY WORKSHOP ON SURGERY TO PERFORM LIFE THREATENING SURGERY ON THE CHILDREN OF HAWAII, INSTEAD OF BUILDING CAPACITY AND TRAINING AND ADEQUATE POOL OF BOARD CERTIFIED SURGEONS IN HAWAII. I personally would not even think of following protocols related to speech pathology or social work because I know that I do not have the requisite credentials, training or experience. The same goes for Behavior Analysis. It is a science that requires years of coursework, training, supervision and examination to meet the minimum standards.

The State of Hawaii just recently passed licensure starting on 1/1/16 for Behavior Analysts (Act 199). We have over 100 Behavior Analysts in Hawaii, and 370 RBTs. This number will keep climbing, and these credentials will provide protection for consumers. Hawaii can build capacity. Let us help!



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The State of Hawaii needs to build a capacity of Behavior Analysts and Registered Behavior Technicians in Special Education and in the field of Health Care not create laws to circumvent licensure. The Behavior Analyst Certification Board (BACB) has established training and experience standards which establish MINIMUM STANDARDS OF COMPETENCE for Board Certified Behavior Analysts (BCBAs) and Registered Behavior Technicians (RBT) who practice behavior analysis.

ABC Group is activity working to build capacity for ABA practitioners in our community. ABC Group will be teaching an RBT course at Leeward Community College starting March 7, 2016. This course will enable anyone in our community to access RBT training in order to meet the competency for the RBT credential. In addition, ABC Group is a Florida Institute of Technology (FIT) hybrid site for the Master's degree in Professional Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) providing the coursework, supervision and experience for professionals to meet the requirements and be eligible to take the BCBA exam.

This dangerous bill presents an issue of consumer protection and safety. We need to protect the children of Hawaii from unlicensed and untrained people who do not possess the requisite credentials or experience within their license from providing ABA treatment to children in Hawaii.

Just the other day, the news reported a boy with autism being reportedly strapped to a chair daily, and withheld food and liquid from him at Koko Head Elementary- these were people who are not licensed in Behavior Analysis, like EAs and Paraprofessionals. At Kipapa Elementary, there were several parents who raised similar concerns a few years ago about their children being fed vomit, and tied to chairs- these again are people who are not licensed in Behavior Analysis, like EAs and Paraprofessionals. We need to protect our children, and putting unlicensed persons in the schools to "do behavior analysis" is egregious. There are untrained EAs, Paraprofessionals, and other staff in schools already doing damage to kids in special education. **Let's raise the bar for our children and for our state.**

DO NOT PASS SENATE BILL 1311! It will lead to more and more costly and litigious due process cases that will continue to burden our state special education system!

The Hawaii State Teachers Association opposes SB 1311 proposed SD1, relating to education.

This bill would allow unlicensed and untrained individuals to provide behavior analytic services to keiki in Hawaii's public schools. We have serious concerns with this bill. Behavioral Analysis for our most vulnerable keiki is extremely important for our students with special needs. Those who complete this analysis require a license and a considerable amount of training. Teachers and Educational Assistants are neither certified nor licensed to complete this task, and that is why they need specialists, such as Behavior Analysts to assist them. Teachers and Educational Assistants are not specialists in Behavior Analysis, and they are not expected to be.

To become a Behavior Analyst, you need a master's degree, additional coursework in behavior analysis, and 1500 supervised fieldwork hours where they are trained in the hands-on applications of behavior analysis. This bill would allow people to provide "behavior analysis" without the level of training that is necessary to be competent, and could even be detrimental to our students.

Yes, the Department of Education already struggles to provide decent behavior analytic services. A recent article in the Star Advertiser states that the DOE does not currently have the ability to provide services to the students in need of special

education. They struggle with providing services, with hiring and retaining qualified staff, and with monitoring services. This leads to many unqualified people attempting to provide educational services that will inevitably lead to poor outcomes, educational neglect and even abuse. However, this lack of finding qualified people does not mean we should lessen our level of care for our keiki. Once again, we need more funding for our schools to help us retain and provide these specialized services for our keiki.

Our state must not allow untrained individuals to provide behavior analytic services to our most vulnerable keiki in Hawaii's public schools. Therefore, the Hawaii State Teachers Association asks your committee to **oppose** this bill.

We offer the following COMMENTS on S.B. 1311, proposed S.D. 1. The Bill would allow the Department of Education ("DOE") to provide applied behavior treatment to students with autism through individuals who are not licensed professionals and who may be unqualified.

S.B. 1311 would amend Act 199 of 2015 (codified at H.R.S. §465D-7) by exempting the DOE from its requirements. HMSA testified last year in support of that legislation (S.B. 40), stating:

"Given the specialized nature of services that are necessary for children with autism spectrum disorder services, it is imperative that those providers be of the highest quality. A licensure requirement will help to ensure those service providers to whom we will entrust those children, meet those professional standards."

The autism insurance legislation enacted last year (Act 235, 2015) requires that applied behavior treatment be provided by an individual who is licensed by a state licensure board. Medicaid rules provide that reimbursement for applied behavior treatment be made only to licensed providers. Those mandates establish a standard of care that would likely be applied in due process hearings and appeals filed on behalf of students with disabilities. The lower standard this bill would adopt for the DOE would cause harm to children with disabilities and impair the DOE's position in litigation. That would likely lead to supplemental service awards, private school placements, and attorney fees to the detriment of State taxpayers.

On June 1, 2000, the U.S. District Court held the State in contempt of court in the *Felix* case for failing to increase the number of qualified special education teachers.* The DOE's use of unlicensed behavioral analysts permitted by this Bill would be similar to its contumacious behavior in *Felix*.

The DOE should ensure that applied behavior treatment provided through its own employees or contractors meets the standards established under existing State and Federal law.

My name is Anne Lau. I have been practicing behavior analysis in Hawai'i for the last 12 years. I would like to thank you for the opportunity to testify in OPPOSITION to HB 868. This bill would add an overly broad exemption to Act 199- related to the licensure of Behavior Analysts. The three pertinent exemptions currently in the law are as follows:

(1) An individual working within the scope of practice or duties of another licensed profession that overlaps with the practice of behavior analysis; provided that the person does not purport to be a behavior analyst;

This means that other licensed professionals, such as psychologists, teachers, occupational therapists, social workers, speech-language pathologists, and audiologists, can already practice behavior analysis as long as they have the education and training that would allow them to do so successfully. Those that do not have behavior analysis within their scope of practice should not attempt to use it, for the protection of the vulnerable population that often requires its application.

Another exemption that is already listed in Act 199 pertains to the high school level credential that Educational Assistants would be required to obtain in order to implement behavior analysis protocols. This credential is the Registered Behavior Technician (RBT) and is already exempt as follows:

(3) An individual who directly implements applied behavior analysis services, is credentialed as a registered behavior technician by the Behavior Analyst Certification Board, and is under the direction of a behavior analyst licensed in this State;

The RBT credential requires that applicants:

- Be 18 years old
- Possess a high school diploma or national equivalent
- Complete 40 hours of training
- Complete a criminal background check
- Pass the RBT Competency Assessment and RBT examination

This minimum credential is already required of Technicians funded through health insurance, and nearly 400 RBTs are currently working in that field. This requirement is not too difficult.

It is understandable if the Department of Education needs more time to comply with the training expectations that would allow some students to excel, but we should hold to the expectation that the Individual's with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) spells out for us: those providing a specialized education must be highly qualified to do so.

The third relevant exemption that is already in our current law states:

An individual pursuing experience in behavior analysis consistent with the Behavior Analyst Certification Board's experience requirements; provided that the experience is supervised by a behavior analyst licensed in this state.

This means that any non-licensed practitioner that wants to practice ABA just needs to begin a training program- this is again, a reasonable expectation of those wishing to use behavior analysis with any person in our state.

For these reasons listed as well as for the safety and protection of our most vulnerable students, I implore you to stop this bill from gaining traction. Please OPPOSE HB 868.

I strongly believe that licensure is important for all professionals that are entrusted to care for ALL our keiki, especially those who are the most vulnerable, children with special needs. The true intent of Act 199 is to safeguard the rights of these children by ensuring a high quality standard of care based on the specialized training and expertise required to implement the science of Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA). SB1311 SD1 proposes that the training and expertise are not necessary in the "practice of behavior analysis" within the educational setting, but at what cost?

The Hawaii Department of Education's leadership claims that by opposing their proposed exemption there will be an interruption in service for the children who need it most. This smoke and mirrors statement would only be true if the department was actually providing all these children the quality services they need by professionals appropriately trained to do so. This bold claim is just another bullying tactic to skirt the fact that this is a serious problem and will continue to put our most vulnerable keiki in true harm's way at the hands of untrained individuals.

As a community stakeholder, and a parent of a child with special needs, who has previously worked in the DOE and at a non-profit organization, which serves the families of children with special needs, I can speak with tremendous concern that DOE even refuses to listen to their own people. In my time with DOE I know of many well-intentioned employees that work in the trenches with these students, and they are crying out for more support and training, (which by the way doesn't work if you use your own untrained in house autism consultants to tackle this ongoing problem). Wouldn't it make sense to instead partner with professionals that are licensed, and extensively trained in ABA to support your own people?

Furthermore, there are groups of professionals within the DOE that strongly oppose the 'gut and replace" tactics in both HB 868 and SB 1311 because this goes against their own professional integrity and code of ethics to not operate outside their scope of training and expertise. Nevertheless, many of them are reluctant to take a stand for fear of losing their jobs. When I worked for the non-profit parent training information center, I fielded numerous calls from parents of children with special needs who were also DOE employees begging for representation and support in getting appropriate services for their children because they could not advocate for their very own child without fear of retaliation. We should not allow the DOE to bully their way out of ACT 199 as it was truly intended. I ask that you uphold the existing language of Act 199 and take a stand for our keiki. Please oppose this bill.

My name is Jessie Mitchell; I am a Board Certified and Hawai'i Licensed Behavior Analyst and I living in Mililani, HI. I am born and raised in Hawai'i and have been providing Applied Behavior Analytic (ABA) services in Hawai'i since 2000.

I am **STRONGLY OPPOSED to SB1311 S.D. 1** relating to education.

I have gone to school and worked for many years learning how to provide evidence-based services. I have crafted many wonderful plans; that sit in file cabinets as there are few skilled to implement such programs without continuous oversight. ABA is a technology that works very efficiently when applied precisely and monitored. The Behavior Analyst Certification Board has developed an array of credentialing to certified people with high school diplomas - Registered Behavior Technician (RBT), with Bachelor's degrees - Board Certified Associate Behavior Analyst (BCaBA), Master's Degrees - Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA) and Doctorates - Board Certified Behavior Analyst Doctorate (BCBA-D).

Appropriately implemented ABA programs help promote effective and efficient behavioral change. Children who attend public school who need assistance in accessing their education should have the right to a Licensed Teacher, Licensed Speech-language pathologist, Licensed Physical Therapist and Licensed Occupational Therapist AND a Licensed Behavior Analyst.

Yes, the Hawaii Department of Education does not have a job description for Board Certified Behavior Analysis, so it is hard to recruit for individuals to provide ABA services without a position.

Yes, Behavior Analyst need to supervise the plans they develop just like all other licensed professionals.

Yes, Behavior Analyst need to work with Registered Behavior Technician or BCaBA and families to implement programs.

Yes, Luke's Law says An individual working within the scope of practice or duties of another licensed profession that overlaps with the practice of behavior analysis; provided that the person does not purport to be a behavior analyst. Teacher's professional trained in developing functional behavioral assessment and positive behavioral support plan (FBA/BSP) are not prohibited under our current licensure laws if their professional license supports such training.

Yes, Special Education Teacher are burnt out with too many demands, and Teachers need more support to educate the students in their classroom. Not more work demands.

To say that school psychologists, teachers, educational assistants, occupational therapists, school social workers, guidance counselors, speech-language pathologists, and audiologists can develop and implement FBA/BSP, then ALL listed above can provide speech-language services, medical services, occupational therapy services and mental health services as well. We know that that is not in the best interest of our children!

Honorable Chair Baker, Chair Kidani, Vice-Chair Harimoto and members of the committees,

My name is Johanna Taylor and I provide support to children with autism and their families in

Hawaii. I am a Maui resident. I am in strong opposition of SB1311 SD1. There are several key reasons why this bill should not move forward:

It limits consumer protection --- Act 199 went into effect January 1, 2016. This law mandated licensure for behavior analysts; thereby improving consumer protection in Hawaii. This bill proposes that untrained individuals (ranging from audiologists to education assistants) should be approved to deliver applied behavior analysis (ABA) treatment. No matter the setting (school, home, community) children with autism should have the right to access appropriate treatment from trained individuals. Based on previous testimony from caregivers of children with autism in Hawaii it is clear that harm can come to children that do not have access to treatment from trained professionals. As a neighbor island resident we

have an even greater shortage of licensed, qualified educators in the schools; therefore, the consumer protection that Act 199 provides is even more important.

- Hawaii DOE already does not have the capacity to provide appropriate services for children with autism --- Hawaii has a history of difficulties related to hiring and retaining special education teachers. The DOE contracts many outside providers to help with children with autism. Recently, it was reported that 20% vacancies exist in special education across the state. This bill will only worsen the condition of education in Hawaii because it will limit implementation of ABA by qualified, trained professionals in classrooms.
- Licensure is important for all professionals Act 199 ensured a higher level of care for
 children with autism due to the specialized training and expertise required to implement
 ABA. This bill proposes that the training and expertise are not necessary. To be proficient in
 the application of behavior analysis (ABA) requires an individual to complete extensive
 training and supervision. This science of ABA sets behavior analysts apart from individuals
 with other educational backgrounds.

The passing of this law is unrighteous for the future of keiki in Hawaii. Please **OPPOSE SB1311 SD1.**

I strongly oppose the proposed SB1311 that allows exemptions for unlicensed school employees to practice behavior analysis. The proposed added verbiage to the current Hawaii State Law (Act 199) will allow unlicensed employees working in the Hawaii Public Schools to engage in behavior analysis with our most vulnerable keiki population- our children with special needs.

I am a mother of a child who needs specialized instruction in order to access the school curriculum- he absolutely can learn all the skills needed to pass his grade; including social, academic and behavioral goals set forth in his Individualized Education Plan (IEP).

I have seen my son grow in his abilities by leaps and bounds using evidence-based instructional methods called Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA/Behavior Analysis). The instruction in social skills, behavioral modification, academic and life skills that he has received as part of an individualized instructional plan that was assessed, designed and implemented by a Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA) and Registered Behavioral Technicians (RBTs) changed his life. At three and a half years old he was nonverbal, had routine tantrums and was unable to accept transitions. His level of daily frustration I could only imagine was unbearable, as he could not understand me and could not convey his wants and needs beyond screaming and crying, like an infant.

Then our first Behavior Analyst entered our life. Within 2 weeks my son was pointing to indicate wants, within 1 month was responding "yes" or "no" and had a command of nearly 50 regularly used nouns to convey what he wanted. In 6 months he was communicating in phrases and we began potty training. Fast forward 2 years and he is in an inclusion classroom, reading above grade level, doing math his peers haven't mastered yet, counting US coins in amounts up to \$1, telling time on an analog clock, enjoys playing at the beach, going down the twisty slide at the local pool and plays an impressive array of board games.

NONE of these routine skills would have been possible without ACCURATE IMPLEMENTATION of applied behavior analysis. And all this success doesn't mean he still doesn't have many more challenges... but I like to focus on the possible.

Allowing unlicensed and untrained personnel to implement behavior analysis for our most vulnerable children in school is at best – ineffective and unethical, and worst- HARMFUL.

The Superintendent commented in an article that the DOE is "hampered by vacancies" and may argue that there are already shortages in special education staffing--- this bill will not solve those problems. However, it will ABSOLUTELY HELP TEACHERS EFFECTIVELY instruct their most challenging student population

by partnering with them. Paying untrained and unlicensed personnel to provide behavior analysis is a waste of taxpayer money.

What I would like to see is the DOE engage in discussion about how best to use the valuable knowledge and skills that Behavior Analysts possess, in order to help our special education teachers make greater strides in their students' education and behaviors. Why prevent children and their teachers- both of which are struggling, from learning from this valuable team of experts? Behavior Analysts can help make the small changes in behavior that lead to big gains in social, behavioral and academic goals. To expect teachers or educational assistants to attempt behavior analysis is unethical and will slow children's progression... and quite frankly, my son doesn't have time to waste.

Dear Chairs Kidani and Baker, and Vice Chairs Harimoto and Kidani,

I am writing to express my strong OPPOSITION to SB 1311, SD1. I am an attorney on Maui and specialize in the area of special education law. Allowing Department of Education ("DOE") staff to engage in the practice of behavior analysis without a license does a disservice to Hawaii's children with special needs, one of our most vulnerable populations.

The Individuals With Disabilities Education Act ("IDEA"), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, and the Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA") ensure that children with disabilities have the same access to the general education curriculum as their non-disabled peers, and that they have specially designed instruction to meet their unique educational needs. This measure flies in the face of the federal protections individuals with disabilities have fought so hard for.

The Hawaii DOE receives federal funding to provide special education and related services pursuant to the IDEA. There is no reason why the DOE cannot recruit and hire properly trained and licensed behavior analysts. In addition, I believe Hawaii is one of the most litigious states in the area of special education. The FFY 2013 Part B State Performance Plan Annual Performance Report (located on the DOE website) indicates that in FFY 2013 only 9 of 56 cases were resolved through resolution session. This fell well below the target of 43%. In FFY 2013 there were less than 10 mediations. It appears the DOE is choosing to spend money litigating complaints rather than settling complaints through mediation or resolution sessions. This is money that could be put instead toward providing adequate services to children with disabilities.

If this measure is passed, it will likely result in more due process complaints filed by parents and increasing costs to the DOE. There is no valid reason for giving the DOE an exemption under the law. Passage of this measure will result in more harm to children and increased litigation. The DOE should spend its time and money recruiting and hiring licensed behavior analysts and providing our most vulnerable children with the services they deserve. Please vote no on SB 1311_SD1.

My name is Kriste Draper and I am the mother of a school age boy with autism. I am also the Executive Director of the Hawaii Autism Foundation. On behalf of myself and my organization, we urge you to oppose SB 1311.

I am also a licensed attorney in both California and Hawaii and understand the importance of licensing. When we identify a profession as requiring specialized skills and training, we require a license. This license ensures that consumers are protected from individuals saying they can provide a service when in fact they are not qualified to do so. Just last year all of you along with your colleagues recognized that Applied Behavior Analysis was a profession that required specialized skills and training and providers needed to be licensed. The state stepped in last year to protect parents just like me from exactly what the DOE is trying to do right now.

A speech therapist cannot design and implement an ABA program. They are not trained to do so. Last year Hawaii recognized this and that is why the licensure law passed! Correct me if I am wrong but I do not believe that in the last year speech therapists, teachers and occupational therapists have all suddenly received a masters degree in behavior analysis and there is no longer a need for this law.

I have had the opportunity to watch my son receive services from a speech therapist and an occupational therapist using applied behavior analysis principles. I have also watched my son receive applied behavior analysis under the the supervision of a licensed behavior analysis and here is the difference.

My son was completely non verbal, meaning that he did not speak a single word and he also could not understand a single word. Not his name, not my name, nothing. After a year of speech therapy and occupational therapy using applied behavior analysis he SPOKE NO WORDS. HE UNDERSTOOD NO WORDS.

JUST 30 DAYS INTO HIS ACTUAL ABA PROGRAM PROVIDED BY A NOW LICENSED BEHAVIOR ANALYIST, MY SON HAD HIS FIRST WORD. TWO YEARS INTO HIS ABA PROGRAM HE HAS HUNDREDS OF WORDS AND JUST TWO NIGHTS AGO SAID "MOM, BANYAN BONKED MY HEAD." That is a full sentence from a boy that just two years ago was so low functioning he could not even be given an IQ because he could not even comprehend the testing.

I have been on the University of Hawaii website and there is NOT A SINGLE COURSE IN APPLIED BEHAVIO ANALYSIS REQUIRED TO GET A BACHELORS IN EDUCATION. Applied behavior analysis is not required to get a special education certificate either. I have been on educational institutions websites that give out degrees in speech therapy and occupational therapy throughout the United States and none of them require courses in Behavior Analysis.

To become a BCBA you need a masters degree. That is 6 years of post secondary education, on top of over 1000 hours of supervised practicum work. No one, not the DOE, not anyone can say that the quality of an applied behavior analysis program administered by a speech therapist

without a single course in applied behavior analysis is equal to that of a program designed, implemented and over seen by a licensed, masters degree holding behavior analyst.

I have seen the difference first hand with my son. Shame on the DOE for trying to short change my son and hundreds of other children from the opportunity to speak, laugh, learn and love the world around them. Because that is what a licensed BCBA and ABA program can do for a child.

For these reasons I hope you will join me in opposing SB 1311.

Honorable Chair Baker, Chair Kidani, Vice-Chair Harimoto and members of the committees.

First, thank you all so much for passing Act 199, to ensure the licensure of Behavior Analysts during the last session. I am writing today to lend my voice in STRONG opposition of SB1311 SD1. This bill would allow unlicensed and untrained individuals to provide behavior analytic services to keiki in Hawaii's public schools. I have several concerns with the bill.

- 1. Behavior Analysis is a field which requires a considerable amount of training. To become a Behavior Analyst, I needed to have a master's degree, additional coursework in behavior analysis, and 1500 supervised fieldwork hours where I was trained in the hands on applications of behavior analysis. This bill would allow people to provide "behavior analysis" without the level of training that is necessary to be competent.
- 2. The Department of Education already struggles to provide decent behavior analytic services. A recent article in the Star Advertiser states that the DOE does not currently have the ability to provide services to the students in need of special education. They struggle with providing services, with hiring and retaining qualified staff, and with monitoring services. This leads to many unqualified people attempting to provide educational services which will inevitably lead to poor outcomes, educational neglect and even abuse.
- 3. The DOE does NOT have the capacity to provide these services at this time. They employ very few people with training in Behavior Analysis. Historically, much of the service provision has been outsourced to private companies. Changes in the contract for next year will actually prevent those with training from providing direct services as they have in the past. This new contract will essentially tie the hands of competent service providers while allowing those with NO training to do what they will.

- 4. Many teachers are struggling. They are asking for help to create and monitor progress with behavior analytic programs. While they have the training and ability to use classroom reward systems, they do not have the training and skills to perform Functional Behavioral Assessments, Functional Analyses, and to create acquisition and behavior management programs. As licensed teachers, many in the DOE will fall under exemption #1 in Act 199.
- 5. There have been many reports of abuse and neglect of our keiki in special education. In the past week, another story of abuse was made public. These cases are avoidable with proper training and supervision by a qualified, licensed Behavior Analyst.
- 6. The goal of Act 199 was increasing consumer protection. I believe that is a reasonable goal that should be upheld, regardless of the setting. DOE should NOT be exempt.

How long will we as a state allow some of our most vulnerable keiki to receive subpar education? Just last year, our state passed a licensure law to increase consumer protection for those receiving Behavior Analysis services. This bill has been in effect for less than 1 and a half months. Why is DOE so quick to ask for an exemption from something that was intended to protect our keiki?

I urge you to oppose SB1311 SD1. This bill will do nothing but perpetuate harm for Hawaii's keiki with special needs.

Thank you for your time and your desire to do what is right! Let's continue to work together as a state to Malama Our Keiki!

My name is Naomi Tachera, I have two sons with autism, Kaiao 5 and Kaleohano 3. When Kaiao was diagnosed at 3 years old, I researched what I could do as a parent to create the best opportunities for him to learn in the best environment that meet his needs. Through my research, Applied Behavioral Analysis or ABA is an Evidence-Based treatment for Autism Spectrum Disorder. According to the Cambridge Center for Behavioral Studies, the scientific evidence that ABA works are cited in 45 independent and systematic reviews and meta-analysis of research on ABA interventions, and every review cites the obvious positive results of ABA, and in those 45 reviews none could conclude that ABA doesn't work. I was sold on the idea of getting ABA, but to my surprise it wasn't covered under his current medical plan.

July 2014, I received an email from Autism Speaks in celebration that Medicaid was now mandated to provide ABA services under each state's health plan. I immediately picked up the phone and called my sons health insurance provider United HealthCare, under the Quest Expanded Access and asked how to get ABA. Not one person I talked to that day knew what I was talking about! I provided information about the mandate and they were very sorry they couldn't help me, instead they sent me another copy of their member handbook. Well I read that handbook and under the section Behavioral Health Services it stated, services can be provided if it is medically necessary. So, how does everyone get anything that's medically necessary? I thought a prescription of course! Kaiao and I met with his pediatrician and I told him about our situation, I brought literature about ABA and I asked if he could write a prescription for 40 hours a week of ABA, he was on board to at least try. Now I had to find a provider of ABA that services my area on Hawai'i Island, in the small plantation town of Pa'auilo. I contacted every service prover in the state and found Bayada. The Bayada Program Manager for Hawai'i Island, the Director of Pediatric care from United HealthCare and I coordinated how to submit the prescription. In December 2014, Kaiao was the first in the State of Hawai'i to get approved for

30 hours a week of ABA through Medicaid. Well at the time I was not aware that he was the first to get approved, Hawai'i Disability Right had launched a class action lawsuit against the State of Hawai'i because Medicaid was denying all other children since the mandate. I was already working with an attorney from Hawai'i Disability Rights and filed due process against the DOE, because the DOE denied my son daily transportation. Well I read the entire Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), and quickly knew the DOE was in violation because transportation is a related service and is defined in 34 CFR §300.34(c)(16). Transportation includes travel to and from school and between schools.

Later in December my other son Kaleohano was diagnosed with autism and I was faced with the reality that autism and advocacy will be a part of my life forever. Although heart wrenching as it was, I couldn't stay there and unpack my bags, I had to move forward. I do not have a background in the medical or legal field, yet somehow I managed to advocate in these areas for my children. I work full time in Early Childhood Education, and a part time student at the University of Hawai'i at Hilo, graduating with my bachelor's in Psychology this May, and along the journey I learned about Board Certified Behavioral Analysist. During the assessment stage of Kaiao's ABA program, a BCBA observed Kaiao for 2 days to create his initial treatment plan. I had requested from the DOE that the BCBA observe Kaiao during his school day to get a holistic view of him in different environments. The DOE denied that request stating it was a violation of the other children's privacy, although the BCBA was only observing my child.

Fast forward to receiving the final approval after the initial assessment from the BCBA.

Now Kaiao has 30 hours of ABA a week. He spent 7 hours a day in school, 2 hours in transportation to and from school, so from 6:30am – 3:30pm (9 hours a day) he was getting services from the DOE, now how could I fit ABA hours without burning him out? Well one of my solutions was purposing to the DOE, instead of the having an Educational Assistant for Kaiao as his 1:1 aid, could his Registered Behavioral Technician (RBT) that is qualified to do ABA and

supervised by a BCBA, come and provide services during school. Well I called another IEP meeting and just so happens Debra Farmer, the Administrator for the State's Special Education Services Branch & Special Education Section, was in the area for another meeting and decided to stop by our IEP meeting. During this two hour meeting discussing my proposal of having an RBT come and provide services, Debra was offensive, spoke inappropriately, was intimidating, and was visibly in complete disgust at my request claiming my son was getting a free and appropriate education. My request was denied.

In my journey thus far, I have noticed a major shortage in BCBAs on Hawai`i Island, so I'm planning to go to graduate school next Fall at UH Manoa and get a Master's in Special Education with a BCBA. Lucky for me the program is completely online. Hopefully you can see my investment in my children in making sure I create the best opportunities for them to learn in the best environment that meet their individual needs as well as give back and provide services to other kiddos in need in my community.

What's the problem with SB1311? The Department of Education is asking for an exemption that allows certain individuals to engage in the practice of behavior analysis when this practice is done in a public educational setting; provided that the individual cannot use the title or description stating or implying that the individual is a "licensed behavior analysist" or "behavior analyst" without holding a license. (SB1311 HD1 Proposed). Let's explore some of the positions in the DOE and their educational requirements:

Governor David Ige sent a memo July 2, 2015; ACT 199 (15)

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the practice of behavior analysis in Hawaii affects the public's health, safety, and welfare. The legislature further finds that behavior analysts and the practice of behavior analysis should be subject to regulation and control to protect the public from the unqualified practice of behavior analysis and from unprofessional conduct by persons licensed to practice behavior analysis.

The legislature additionally finds that certain measures introduced during the regular session of 2015 provide mandated insusance coverage for the diagnosis and treatment of autism. If such legislation is ultimately enacted, it is critical that behavior analysts, who engage in the practice of behavior analysis with individuals with autism, be fully licensed.

I strongly urge you to opposed SB1311, as it will be detrimental to our most vulnerable population in the public educational system. The DOE should not be exempt from the License to practice behavioral analysis, and need proper supervision from a BCBA. ABA is welcome in the DOE, but not without the proper licenses.

Members of the Committee on Education and Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health:

Good Afternoon. My name is Sara Sato and I am a Board Certified and Hawaii Licensed Behavior Analyst. I have been working with children with disabilities since 1999 in both the public and private educational settings. I am writing to you today as an educator but most importantly a concerned citizen who **opposes SB1311**.

Last year, Hawaii lawmakers felt it was imperative to enact legislation to regulate the practice of Behavior Analysis. The aim of ACT 199 was to ensure that individuals receiving Applied Behavior Analytic (ABA) therapy or individuals who were part of a program that utilized ABA principles, would have well trained, qualified, and LICENSED professionals implementing and overseeing their program.

Behavior Analysis is the scientific study of principles of learning and behavior. ABA is a systematic approach for influencing socially important behavior through the identification of reliably related environmental variables and the production of behavior change techniques that make use of those findings.

Practitioners of behavior analysis provide services consistent with the dimensions of ABA. Common services may include, but are not limited to, conducting behavioral assessments, analyzing data, writing and revising behavior-analytic treatment plans, training others to implement components of treatment plans, and overseeing the implementation of treatment plans. Behavior analysts are qualified to provide services to clients with a variety of needs, including improvements in organizational functioning (e.g., staff performance, management and pay structure interventions), skill deficits (e.g., communication, adaptive behavior), and problem behavior (e.g., aggression, self-injurious behavior), among others.

In recent years, the prevalence of Autism has increased from 1 in 80 (2011) to 1 in 45 (2014). ABA is the only empirically validated treatment for Autism and is endorsed by the U.S. Surgeon General, the American Academy of Pediatrics, etc. If implemented by trained and qualified professionals, ABA can be extremely effective in teaching positive behavior and decreasing problem behavior. In the Department of Education (DOE), a child who qualifies for special education receives an Individualized Educational Program (IEP) which outlines goals and objectives, services, and supports/strategies that the child's team has determined to be most appropriate to help the child make progress. For most children with disabilities, there will be strategies of Applied Behavior Analysis recommended in their IEPs.

SB1311 would exempt individuals implementing ABA procedures in the DOE setting from being licensed. This essentially means ANYONE can utilize and practice ABA in the public schools. With the recent news stories indicating the poor quality of special education in Hawai'i public schools, the introduction of this bill seems to take a GIANT step back rather than a much needed 500 leaps forward. I ask you, members of the House Committee on Education to consider the following questions:

- 1) What are the qualifications and training required of individuals implementing ABA procedures in the DOE? Specifically, paraprofessionals and district consultants? Is this comparable to the Registered Behavioral Technician (RBT) credential and Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA) certification?
- 2) What percentage of special education teachers in the DOE are highly qualified and licensed to teach Special Education?
- 3) How many special education children in Hawai'i are receiving the quality care they deserve? Are they all being serviced by competent and well-trained professionals? Does the DOE truly have the in-house capacity to meet the needs of these students?

The bottom line is, all keiki deserve the best education that can be provided. There NEEDS to be a change to our education system and our goal is for it to happen NOW. Please consider the points brought up in this and the many pieces of testimony you will receive in opposition of this bill. I truly appreciate your time.

There has always been and continues to be a significant difference in training and competency between DOE staff and contracted providers. More so, when compared to a BCBA. Although the DOE reports that their staff members are trained in ABA, I can assure you that they are not. This has led to inappropriate treatment of our Keiki. I currently continue to encounter the miss-use of punishment procedures, inappropriate placement, and schools without Fully Self Contained (FSC) classrooms forcing students to transition during every class into classes that are 3-4 times above their academic level. I continue to encounter teachers that would rather allow there students to hit themselves with a bloodied face using extinction (a popular but not always ethical ABA treatment) rather than implementing a Functional Behavior Assessment and appropriate Behavior Support Plan that would use more ethical and humane procedures. I continue to see the promotion of paraprofessionals and the transformation of untrained DOE personnel into ABA consultant positions without nearly the ABA education needed to create and monitor an ABA program. This is a continua frustration that I encounter. On the positive side. I continue to work with teachers and staff members that are so stressed and in need of help. These are the providers that ask for help. These are the providers that willingly express that the help from a BCBA consistently surpasses the help that they receive from DOE staff members. Teachers themselves will agree that a BCBA is needed to confidently and successfully create and monitor ethical ABA programs. Without a licensed professional, I can assure you that Teachers and staff will use the limited interventions that they have been taught in the past to treat suffering children. Such inappropriate interventions as ignoring a child that hits herself until bloodied. Inappropriate interventions such as restraint just to gain compliance (not recommended in ABA). Interventions that will not just lead the DOE into more law suits but will create undo pain and suffering upon our children and continue to hinder their learning and reduce their potential in life. Please continue to hold the DOE at the same standard as everyone else. If the law doesn't, neither will thev.

My name is Lindsey Shepherd, and I am a licensed Board Certified Behavior Analyst. Before I became a Behavior Analyst I was hired by the Kauai school district as a Behavior Specialist, consulting with teachers, paraprofessionals, and parents on students diagnosed with Autism. I had no experience prior to being hired on, but was lucky enough to get to shadow a current behavior specialist. We taught paraprofessionals how to deliver ABA instruction, worked with teachers on developing behavior plans based on ABA strategies, and taught parents how to deal with students in their own home using ABA strategies. I enjoyed the work I did so much that I went back to school to get my masters in applied behavior and autism and pursue my BCBA. During my schooling I was incredibly embarrassed and shocked at the amount of things that I was doing incorrectly. The training that I had delivered to teachers and families was not up to par with standards of practice. Since then I have still worked with the school district as a contracted provider on the Island of Kauai, and I am constantly faced with situation where people who are given less training then I was when I was hired are designing and training ABA programs. Many of the Behavior Specialist employed are emergency hires who were paraprofessional and have no formal training in designing ABA programs, functional behavior assessments, or even the diagnosis that they work with most often, Autism. The school district is unable to hire or maintain skilled staff and the staff that are skilled are pulled so thin that their services become ineffective. It is crucial to the students with Autism in the department of education that they are required to hire and train staff to the reasonable standards that are already put forth in the law. It is logical that a licensed professional be the person delivering training to a teacher, instead of someone who has received no formal training or practice in the area. I strongly oppose HB868 and SB1311 and support delivering quality services to keiki in our school districts.

DOE teachers are not required to adhere to these ethical codes of conduct, will not be overseen by the board, and is not apart of the ABA field. With that being said, Applied Behavior Analysis is also one of the only recognized treatments for autism. Autism is a multifacted disorder affecting many areas of development. In schools (DOE/public), the behaviors of autism can be so severe that a child's safety is at risk. ABA can help these kids with severe needs; but only if a qualified professional is providing services. There are two bills which the DOE has submitted which would allow anyone in school settings to legally practice Applied Behavior Analysis. As a graduate student studying Applied Behavior Analysis, I can assure you that there is so much to the science, that someone who is unqualified cannot fathom to implement or understand. It sounded like it was easier for them to just tie him up; and 2) an audit found the DOE lacking in educating students in inclusion because they don't know what to do it??? Oh, my gosh! The DOE asking for exemption is like a janitor teaching students at school (which by the way happened at one of my child's schools ... as told to me by ... the janitor, who was unlocking the classroom door with a key from several on a ring and to this day, I still hear the jangling of keys!). Last year it was determined that licensure was necessary to ensure that behavior analytic programs are designed and implemented by qualified individuals. In order to become a licensed behavior analyst in the state of Hawaii one must become certified by the Behavior Analyst Certification Board by meeting these requirements: 1. Hold a master's degree in the field of applied behavior analysis, education, or psychology. 2. Complete 270 classroom hours of graduate-level instruction from specific content areas from an accredited institution. 3. Gain experience under the supervision of a Board Certified Behavior Analyst though either supervised independent field work (1500 hours), a practicum (1000 hours) or an intensive practicum (750 hours). 4. Pass the Behavior Analyst Certification Board Exam. At public school campuses, there are students with developmental disabilities and problem behaviors that require the use of applied behavior analysis in order to remain in their least restrictive environment and access meaningful education with their peers. In my experience working on public education campuses with students with special needs, efforts to implement applied behavior analysis by untrained individuals are usually ineffective and/or harmful. Techniques that may seem simple to a lay person are actually quite complicated and require constant adjustments based on the individual and their progress. When determining the requirements for certification and licensure, experts agreed on the level of education and experience needed to develop the necessary skill set to provide

behavior analysis services. There are teachers, paraprofessionals, and even many school behavioral health specialists that do not meet the requirements to legally provide applied behavior analysis. Paraprofessionals often have no training requirements prior to beginning work and spend more time with their student than any other school employee. They usually do not receive any training in behavior analysis. Without training and supervision from a behavior analyst, the behavior support plan is often abandoned in favor of ineffective reprimands and threats resulting in frustration to the student, teacher, and paraprofessional. Why should the requirements to practice behavior analysis be completely disregarded in the most important environment that reaches the majority of Hawaii's children? Public schools should adhere to the same requirements as any other practicing individual to fulfill their ethical responsibility to provide effective evidence-based interventions to their students.

It sounded like it was easier for them to just tie him up; and 2) an audit found the DOE lacking in educating students in inclusion because they don't know what to do it??? Oh, my gosh! The DOE asking for exemption is like a janitor teaching students at school (which by the way happened at one of my child's schools ... as told to me by ... the janitor, who was unlocking the classroom door with a key from several on a ring and to this day, I still hear the jangling of keys!). Was this janitor exempt from licensing to teach? A board certified behavior analyst expertise is behavior. DOE's expertise is education. The reason we have licensure requirements for professionals that provide medical and therapeutic care is because we want to ensure a standard of care for ourselves and our loved ones. The reason Applied Behavior Analysis, lawyers, medical doctors, psychologists, physical therapists, dentists and countless other professions all have licensure requirements is because we have identified these professions as requiring a specialized skill set, requiring specialized training. This training ensures a certain level of care and expertise. Just this past year, you, the Hawaii Legislature, determined that Applied Behavior Analysis was a profession that required a license. You did this because you know, as I know as a parent, that Applied Behavior Analysis is a method of treatment that requires specialized training and skill. ABA is NOT something that can be done by anyone. I am disappointed that the DOE would even suggest that a teacher with a bachelor's in education is qualified in applied behavior analysis. I looked up the University of Hawaii School of Education curriculum and there is NOT ONE SINGLE COURSE REQUIRED in Applied Behavior Analysis to get your bachelor degree in education. Even the Master's in Special Education DOES NOT REQUIRE ONE SINGLE COURSE IN APPLIED BEHAVIOR ANALYSIS. My child

deserves to receive his Applied Behavior Analysis Therapy from an actual Applied Behavior Analyst. Just as every child has a right to receive their medical care from a licensed medical provider. This is no different and shame on the DOE for trying to save money at the expense of the health and welfare of my son. We have seen attempts by private companies and public agencies who do not have licensed, trained, qualified providers. The difference is night and day in terms of efficacy, professionalism, and money—as anyone who has ever fixed someone's bad job can tell you, it costs more to correct someone's work than to do it right in the first place. Untrained, unlicensed persons attempting to provide these specialized services have NOT been able to achieve results or adjust their methods in a knowledgeable and timely way, in the moment and specific to the child—instead, they do DAMAGE that must be reversed or corrected. Providing ABA services requires the knowledge and training to be able to work with the child in the moment, not defer to another authority for "review at a later time". This is not slapping on a bandage at the school nurse--this is working with a child's brain, behavior, and emotional life. Our family has worked in the DoE, retired from it, and all are shocked that HB868 is an actual proposal. Our family and I strongly oppose HB868. If you have ever had a child in need of these services, you do too. If you have not ever had a child in need of these services, PLEASE defer to the testimony of those who have and do. Would you go to a dentist who has "read up on dentistry," tells you "I have someone I can call if I need to," or hides behind "but I work for Kaiser/Queens/etc." as a shield against actually BEING a dentist? No? So why does the DoE think that our keiki deserve less than a back molar? Shame on you, DoE, for trying to scam our keiki and families. Well-meaning is NOT well trained. HB868 should die the shameful death it deserves, and its authors should apologize to families--this ridiculous attempt at cutting corners by shorting children who need protection the most is beneath all of us.
