Bill No. and Title: Senate Bill No. 1367, S.D.1, H.D.1, Relating to Project Kealahou.

Purpose: Appropriates funds for the continued funding of Project Kealahou within the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Division of the Department of Health. Requires the Department of Health to submit an annual report on the program to the Legislature.

Judiciary's Position:

The Judiciary submits this testimony in strong support of Senate Bill No. 1367, Senate Draft 1, House Draft 1, which will enable Project Kealahou to continue operating after a six year appropriation of federal funds ends this year.

Several years ago, when the family court began researching the need for a Girls Court, two primary findings became clear early in our research: (1) nearly all of the girls in the court system, regardless of age, had suffered major trauma and were exhibiting acting out behaviors in an effort to cope with the past trauma and (2) the juvenile justice system, developed in response to boys' misbehaviors, had very little expertise when it came to dealing with girls. The Judiciary's Girls Court, originating in the First Circuit, was built on a wave of support from the community who recognized the new challenges and roadblocks experienced by girls today.

Project Kealahou has and continues to address these two findings. The program has and continues to provide valuable services to girls who have suffered from child abuse/neglect, bullying, domestic violence, date rape, exploitation by older men in the sex trade, and human trafficking. Project Kealahou provides a spectrum of services including specialized therapy as well as in-community, holistic strategies such as mentoring and peer support. Of equal importance to their direct service delivery, Project Kealahou has also begun very important steps to share their hard earned expertise by writing curriculum for professional training and have begun plans to offer this training to other service providers.

Since we opened the door to Girls Court and accepted the first "cohort" (our designation for a group of girls and their families admitted during the same time period), the community support has increased and we have learned so much by doing the work and applying principles being developed by researchers in this growing field. A research finding that we confirmed by our experience is that a surprising proportion of girls in our community in general and girls in the juvenile justice system in particular have suffered traumatic events and victimization. This was borne out early in our research and development when a focus group of juvenile probation officers were asked to come together and share their experiences with their teenage girl clients. Without exception, the case studies involved traumatic events, generally repeatedly, that had gone unnoticed, undiagnosed, and untreated for years (keep in mind these are not adult women, they are just teenage girls who are already carrying such heavy psychological burdens).

Lessons learned in Girls Court have included the devastating impact that untreated childhood trauma can have on the life of a child. A girl's pathway into the juvenile justice system is often paved by the girl's very imperfect (and often self-destructive) coping methods to trauma and victimization. These coping methods, such as promiscuous sexual behavior and drug and alcohol usage, not only ensnares them into a delinquency lifestyle but causes long term physical, mental, and psychological damage. This is exacerbated by what all parents know and what research confirms, i.e., teenagers respond more to short term gratification than to a consideration of long term consequences.

Research also highlights the urgent need for gender specific services and programs, i.e., there really are differences between boys and girls when we are dealing with trauma treatment. Specifically trained professional staffing and programs designed for girls were and continue to be challenging to obtain for our girls. Project Kealahou has been at the forefront of research-based services to girls. One of Family Court's front line employees working with girls eloquently stated that:

I have seen the tremendous difference trauma-informed, genderspecific care makes in the treatment and healing of girls who have

trauma histories. Project Kealahou has been an important resource in helping these girls and their families, and I want to see it continue and be expanded to serve more families on Oahu and beyond.

Federal funding is indispensable for trying out new ideas and developing new programs based on emerging research. But, there will always come a time when the community must take "ownership" and responsibility for adequately serving those minors in our care. The time has come for our community to do so with Project Kealahou.

Like Project Kealahou, Girls Court began with major federal funding. It has since matured into a program with different funding sources and with a network of public, private, and volunteer gender specific services. At this time, the Judiciary funds the key positions of Program Coordinator, Probation Officers, Administrative Assistant, Social Service Aide, and a full time Girls Court therapist. We have developed a network of public and private agencies and a network of volunteers that provide experiential prosocial activities for the girls such as the Surfer Sprit Sessions, health and nutrition classes, and family relationship strengthening—all at no additional cost to the families and the Judiciary. From time to time, Girls Court and/or a community partner will apply for grants to fund such activities. The Friends of the Family Court Specialty Court also provides partial funding for activities. We receive federal funds through the Department of Health's CAMHD for gender-specific mental health assessments. This impressive network and "braiding" of private/public partnerships can only happen with basic state funding.

We support similar basic state funding for Project Kealahou, an important partner to the family court. Failure to fund its continuation will result in the loss of crucial expertise and will deprive critical services to our most vulnerable youth. Such loss will result in human and economic losses for the youth, their families, and our community. We respectfully request passage of this bill with an approved appropriation amount and that the funding become effective in the state's next fiscal year.

It is tragic that we have adolescent girls who at such a young age have experienced trauma in their lives, and these girls subsequently require interventions unique to their presenting needs – and Project Kealahou offers such interventions.
