In consideration of SENATE BILL 2026, SENATE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO HUNTING

Senate Bill 2026, Senate Draft 1, proposes to establish the Hawaii apprentice hunting license program within the Department of Land and Natural Resources; provides for the issuance of a Hawaii apprentice hunting license to program participants between the ages of ten to seventeen; establishes requirements for program participation; and exempts a holder of an apprentice license from taking the required hunter education class prior to licensure under Section 183D-22, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS). The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) offers the following comments.

The Department is committed to preserve, protect, and promote public hunting (Section 183D-2, HRS) and is aware that the maintenance and expansion of the State's Hunting Program hinges on continual recruitment of new hunters and the promotion of safe outdoor experiences. We believe that a combination of positive mentorship and formal hunter education are complimentary components toward promoting legal, safe, and ethical hunting.

The Department respectfully requests the following amendments to this measure:

- 1) On line 13 of page 1, delete the words "a person" and add the words "any previously unlicensed Hawaii resident" before the words "who is";
- 2) On line 4 of page 2, add the sentence "As used in this subsection, accompanied means being close enough to each other to permit uninterrupted visual contact and unaided verbal communication."; and

3) On line 10 of page 2, add the word "consecutive" after the word "additional".

In addition, the Department believes that the establishment of an apprentice hunting license program requires much more discussion and consideration to be successfully implemented. The State Game Management Advisory Commission as proposed in House Bill 1041 House Draft 2 would be an appropriate entity to further review this proposal with the Department to ensure broad input is received from Hawaii's hunting community. Such considerations that are not addressed in this measure are: 1) whether there are restrictions on game species and game seasons pursued by apprentice licensed hunters; 2) whether a sponsor must be an immediate relative of the apprentice hunter; 3) whether there should be a maximum number of apprentice hunters that a sponsor can supervise while hunting; 4) whether state sponsored lottery hunts held on private property can include apprentice licensed hunters; and (5) whether the sponsor should be unarmed while supervising the apprentice hunter.

Finally, the Hawaii Hunter Education Program course is the Department's primary mechanism in recruiting new hunters and educating them on game resources, non-game resources, hunter responsibility and hunting regulations in Hawaii. The twelve-hour course is provided throughout the State and is required in order to obtain a hunting license. The Department recognizes that limited Hunter Education course availability is a reason why some states on the continental United States have instituted an apprentice hunter program, so that interested individuals can hunt while waiting to attend a hunter education course. However, the Department does not find that the need to attend the Hawaii Hunter Education Program course poses a significant barrier to the recruitment of new hunters. However, to make the course more easily accessible, the Department will be offering an online Hunter Education course later this year.

= Apprentice Hunting Available

Hawaii Apprentice Hunting License represents an opportunity for Hawaii to join the many other states who recognize the importance of bringing dedicated new sportsmen and women into the field.

Hunting has been and continues to be an important family recreation. Hawaii is one of 14 states that don't yet recognize the application and benefits of a mentored introduction to hunting at a time when the new hunter, whether child or adult is apt to be most enthused by the experience.

A Hawaii Apprentice License **won't circumvent Hunter Education!** It has been suggested that this is just a tactic to get around the requirement to sit through 14 hours of Hunter Education in order to go hunting. This is a "try before you buy" opportunity to introduce folks to the value and experiences of hunting and only temporarily defers the requirement of attending Hunter Education.

An Apprentice License allows for a prospective hunter, under the direct supervision of a Hawaii Licensed Adult to be able to be mentored in safe field practices from start. If successful in creating in their mentee an ongoing desire to become a hunter, they will then sit for their Hunter Education Certificate with positive outlook and eagerness.

The Statistics that surround Apprentice License programs are all positive. **Safety, Demographics, and an early interest in taking Hunter Education** in order to get permanently licensed are all reasons to support this legislation.

A lot of folks know that the apprentice hunting license is a remarkably effective method to attract new hunters from the young to the young at heart. Many might not be aware, however, **that the apprentice hunter is THE safest hunter** in the woods. In fact, hunting under supervision as an apprentice hunter has been shown to be more than four times safer than the general hunting population.

Apprentice Hunters Take Hunter Education:

Apprentice hunting allows new hunters to try hunting before spending countless hours in a hunter education class This "try-before-you-buy" concept allows mentors to instill safety, ethics, and their passion for the sport in new hunters in a safe setting while they get to experience the thrill of the hunt Its important to note that a component of Families Afield is the requirement that prior to becoming a full licensed hunter a newcomer must pass hunter education.

The program is working! Research from the Ohio Division of Wildlife shows that once Apprentice hunters are hooked, they voluntarily transition to becoming a fully licensed hunter by taking Hunter Education before it's required by law.

What Happens to Apprentice License buyers in Years 2 & 3?

In year two, nearly 1/2 of repeat license buyers (44%) took Hunter Ed when they could have continued to hunt on an apprentice license for two additional years By year three, it jumps to 75% This data demonstrates that Apprentice hunters are giving up the remaining years of eligibility for Apprentice licenses and transitioning to Hunter Education and regular hunting licenses.

Lastly, "some have suggested that Families Afield attracts apprentice license buyers who would have become hunters anyways. Research from Minnesota shows that is true for less than 1/4th of apprentice hunters in the state. The data makes it clear that without apprentice hunting to help recruit new hunters, the majority of those individuals would have not hunted, and another 26% report that they are not sure if they would have or not without the new license." (www.familiesafield.org) -

The Hawaii County Game Management Commission strongly supports SB2026 SD1 and ask that you pass this legislation with the following changes.

People of all ages enjoy the sport of Hunting. In particular, women are the largest demographic to be served by this program as seen above in Minnesota, where women are 3X more likely to participate in hunting than through the general population experiences.

Both Nielsen (http://www.nielsen.com/us/en/insights/news/2011/when-it-comes-to-spendingdecisions-women-are-in-control.html) and Pew Research (http://www.usatoday.com/story/news/nation/2013/03/14/men-women-work-time/1983271/) confirm that **women** are integral to family decisions on spending and children. It is important to include them in these opportunities for **women** as well where they can be encouraged to participate with family and friends in a wholesome and safe manner. For these reasons we ask that you **amend SB2026 SD1 in the following** way. On line 12, page one (b) A Hawaii apprentice hunting license shall be issued to

13 a person who is:

14 (1) Between Over the age of ten and seventeen; and

15 (2) Sponsored by an adult who is eighteen years of age or

16 older and who holds a valid hunting license under this 17 part.
