This bill would authorize issuance of driver's licenses with the notation of "Veteran" for persons who are veterans of the Korean Conflict. Under HRS 286-109 (a) and (a) 3, guidance reads for the issuance of the card licenses: "Veteran means any person who served in any of the uniformed services of the United States and was discharged under conditions other than dishonorable."
