SUBJECT: SB 2442 SD1– Relating to Children and Youth Day

The State Council on Developmental Disabilities (DD) strongly supports SB 2442 SD1 to recognize the celebration of Children and Youth Day as an official State event.

The Council is a systems advocacy agency responsible for statewide planning, coordination, monitoring, evaluation, and advocacy on behalf of individuals with DD and their families and strongly supports Children and Youth Day. Children and Youth Day is a day which encourages, supports, and promotes educating and strengthening families, involving citizens in public policy development, promoting access to the legislative process, and informing legislators of the issues and challenges facing Hawaii's children and youth with and without disabilities.

For the past 16 years the Council has convened its annual "Day at the Capitol" event with more than 400 self-advocates, family members, and service providers to celebrate and participate in the legislative process. Participants have met with legislators from their districts, been introduced and recognized during the House and Senate floor sessions, attended public hearings, took a tour of the State Capitol, and met and networked with others. This day has been invaluable to participants attending our event. Similarly, Children and Youth Day promotes active participation of children, youth, families, organizations, businesses and policymakers in celebrating and embracing the well-being of Hawaii's keiki.

S.B. No. 2442, S.D. 1, Relating to the Children and Youth Day

Decision Making: Wednesday, February 26, 2016, 9:40 a.m.

The Hawaii State Ethics Commission has **no position** on the intent of S.B. No. 2442, S.D. 1, which designates the celebrations of Children and Youth Day held in the area of the state capitol to be an official state event. The Commission, however, offers information about the application of the State Ethics Code to Children and Youth Day activities.

Background

Last year, in response to concerns directed to the Commission about state resources being used to support Children and Youth Day, the Commission offered guidance that, because Children and Youth Day was a privately sponsored activity, i.e., it was not an event of the state, state resources could not be used to support Children and Youth Day.

Specifically, the Commission understood that one or more legislators were using their staff to: (1) organize volunteers; (2) create, print and mail solicitation letters to past and potential sponsors; (3) coordinate vendors and vendor booths; (4) create Children and Youth Day participant and sponsor forms; (5) answer telephone calls and emails regarding Children and Youth Day; (6) update the Children and Youth Day website; (7) record payments from participants; (8) record donations and transmit those donations to a fiscal agent; (9) direct disbursements and payments to vendors; (10) order toys for goodie bags; (11) prepare goodie bags; (12) disseminate Children and Youth Day-related information to Keiki Caucus Resource Group members and others; (13) prepare 150-200 participant packets; (14) order food for volunteers; and (15) prepare/organize meal tickets and parking passes for participants and volunteers. In addition to the staff time, state funds, state supplies, and state facilities were being used to plan and otherwise support Children and Youth Day. The Commission also understood that a

legislator was using the legislator's position to secure permits and other approvals from the state and city and county of Honolulu for the private event.

The fair treatment provision of the State Ethics Code, HRS section 84-13, prohibits a legislator from using or attempting to use his or her official position to secure or grant unwarranted privileges, exemptions, advantages, contracts, or treatment for the legislator or others. The statute further prohibits a legislator from using state resources, which includes the legislator's staff, office, and allowance, for private business purposes, which includes support of a non-profit organization.

The Commission suggests that certain language of the bill should be clarified. Specifically, the bill designates the "[a]ctivities of Children and Youth Day" to be an official state event. It is unclear from the bill as to the purpose of the designation of Children and Youth Day as an "official state event." For example, if the intent is that the state organize and fund the Children and Youth Day activities, it is unclear which state agency will be responsible for doing so; it also appears that the "activities" that are deemed to be an official state event include those that are organized on neighbor islands in celebration of Children and Youth Day. The Commission suggests that the bill more clearly reflect the Committee's intent with respect to the state's role in the Children and Youth Day activities that are deemed to be an official state event.

The Commission also notes that, even if the Children and Youth Day is deemed to be a state event, the fair treatment law nevertheless may prohibit a legislator from using legislative resources, including his or her staff, legislative offices, and discretionary allowance money, to support Children and Youth Day. Generally, legislators may use state resource for official legislative business, i.e., to perform their legislative duties. A legislator's official duties likely do not include organizing and working directly on Children and Youth Day activities.

Thank you for your continuing support of the Commission's work and for considering the Commission's testimony on S.B. No. 2442, S.D. 1.
