#### In consideration of SENATE BILL 2450 RELATING TO PREDATORS

Senate Bill 2450 proposes to prohibit releasing or caring for predators on all state lands. This measure would also expand the definition of "predators" to be inclusive of all rodents, rather than just rats. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this measure and offers the following comments.

Hawaii's native species evolved over millions of years in an environment devoid of humanintroduced predators such as mongooses, cats, dogs, and rodents. Today, 28% of all threatened and endangered species in the U.S. are located in Hawaii, and 78% of all U.S. species extinctions have occurred in Hawaii. Reducing predation is a critical component of avoiding further declines in the populations of Hawaii's natural resources.

Because feeding and care of wild mongooses, dogs, and rodents is not thought to be widespread, the species primarily impacted by this measure is cats. Cats are designated as predators by Chapter 183D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and are widespread across the State due to their popularity as pets. Feral cats, however, are not pets; these are animals that do not belong to a home and exist on the landscape to the detriment of native wildlife and humans. In some locations, feral cat colonies are managed by people who do not own these animals, yet provides them with food and care. In a subset of these feral cat colonies, the colony "manager" practices a method known as Trap, Neuter, Release (TNR) with the intent that a managed, neutered population will decrease in size over time until it is eliminated. A number of peer-reviewed, scientific publications have demonstrated that TNR is not an effective tool at reducing feral cat

populations and contributes to a maintained presence of feral cats on the landscape that, despite being cared for and fed, continue to harm wildlife and act as vectors of disease.

In addition to preying on native wildlife (cats kill an estimated 2.4 billion birds per year in the U.S.), cats pose a substantial health risk to humans and wildlife due to being the only known reproductive host of the toxoplasmosis parasite (*Toxoplasmosis gondii*). Toxoplasmosis reproduces in the feline digestive system, and a single cat can excrete 145 billion eggs per year in its feces. Once released into the environment, these eggs can infect other animals, including humans, both on land and in the ocean. Toxoplasmosis parasites create cysts in muscle and organ tissues and can cause inflammation of the heart, liver, and brain. In Hawaii, the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration has recorded at least eight endangered Hawaiian monk seal deaths that are attributable to toxoplasmosis infection. Toxoplasmosis can impact the immune system and has been known to primarily impact pregnant women and unborn children. During pregnancy, this infection can result in severe damage to the unborn child, miscarriage, stillbirth, or substantial birth defects including enlargement or smallness of the head.

In preparation of this measure, the Department met with representatives of the national and local chapters of the Humane Society and other animal welfare groups. A shared interest was identified in reducing the number of feral cats on the landscape. Owned, indoor cats generally live longer, healthier lives and have significantly less impact on the environment. Shared interest was also identified in reducing the number of cats that are abandoned by pet owners and placed in feral cat colonies. This goal may be achieved by the passage of House Bill 2245 or Senate Bill 2512, which would substantially increase the penalties associated with animal abandonment.

The Department supports these efforts, and suggests as additional actions, the creation of a statewide outreach campaign to educate the public about the threats associated with abandoning cats, as well as feeding or caring for feral cats. The Department also suggests as a possible amendment, the addition of funding for trapping feral cats and support for Humane Societies, where such animals can either be rehabilitated as pets or humanely euthanized.

With regard to the proposed amendment in the definition of "predators" to be inclusive of "rodents" rather than "rats," the Department notes that this broader definition would include mice, because mice pose significant predation threats to native wildlife.

The Department appreciates the opportunity to provide these comments.

Testimony in SUPPORT

Aloha Chairs Gabbard and Wakai, Vice Chairs Nishihara and Slom and committee members, the Kauai Invasive Species Committee enthusiastically supports SB2450.

Our organization is primarily focused on incipient invasive species; however we have been working diligently with the County of Kauai to help create an ordinance that would reduce the number of feral cats occupying the landscape.

It is imperative that the state passes this amendment in order to create consistent policy with our efforts at the local level on Kauai. The extremist animal rights groups opposed to this amendment have initiated smear campaigns against those working towards solutions and posted violent online threats based on false statements. They will leverage any method of deceit to continue using public land for their own benefit at the cost of society and the environment.

Toxoplasmosis can only exist where cats are present. Cat ownership and feral populations are skyrocketing. Between 1989 and 2006 cat ownership increased 50% in the United States. Globally, every year there is an estimated 200,000 cases where Toxo is passed from mothers to the fetus causing a variety of birth defects. Johns Hopkins Medical Institute researchers say there is evidence that this parasite is becoming a significant health hazard especially in children's sand boxes and gardens where cats defecate. In Hawaii numerous cat colonies are located on public land along coastal beaches exposing millions of people to potential infection, possibly threatening the tourist industry and contaminating marine waters and fish. Cats should stay on their owner's property or be under direct control just as dog owners must do.

Toxo has killed numerous marine mammals including, a porpoise, seals and sea otters. Our state bird, the Nene, also dies from Toxo. Cattle ingest the parasite while grazing which could pose a threat to the future export of Hawaiian beef. Finally, cats kill several endangered species which the public is tasked with recovering creating a burden to both the tax payer and society that needs to comply with endangered species regulation. #### RE: Oppose SB2450; Relating to Predators on State Lands

On behalf of The Humane Society of the United States members and supporters across Hawaii, we urge your opposition to SB2450. This bill would allow the killing of dogs and cats, deemed predators, by any means necessary and criminalize the care or feeding of cats on state lands, even if they are part of a managed trap-neuter-return program designed to humanely reduce the cat population. This measure would also allow for the killing of a pet animal that may have become lost or abandoned through no fault of their own, should they wander onto or be deserted on state lands.

Further, prohibiting the feeding of cats on state lands will only serve to create more problems. The cats will not simply disappear but will slowly starve and become an ever greater nuisance. DLNR has the existing authority to remove individual animals that pose a problem in protected areas, forest reserves and other sensitive wildlife habitats. There is no need to expand this authority to allow for the destruction of cats or dogs, without regard for the method, or to penalize those who are managing colonies in appropriate areas where there are no threats to protected species. In addition, if people are prohibited from caring for cats in existing managed colonies, the animals will continue to reproduce creating an even greater issue.

We have been meeting with DLNR's Division of Forestry and Wildlife for the past few months in an attempt to reach some compromise on this measure but, unfortunately, have not yet reached any such agreement on amendments. Below is a draft of our proposal to amend existing statute so that DLNR can work more closely with local animal control contractors who have the resources and expertise to address dog/cat issues and to create a taskforce to further discuss the larger predator management issue.

Thank you for your consideration of this testimony.

#### DRAFT AMENDMENTS TO PREDATOR BILL- TASKFORCE

SECTION 1. Section 183D-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by

amending the definition of "predators" to read as follows:

""Predators" means animals destructive of wildlife by nature of

their predatory habits, including mongooses, <u>cats, dogs,</u> and [rats.] rodents."

SECTION 2. Section 183D-65, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended

to read as follows:

"\$183D-65 [Posting; destruction of predators.] Predators. (a) On any game management area, public hunting area, or forest reserve or other lands under the jurisdiction of the department, predators deemed harmful to wildlife by the department <u>through documentation</u> <u>demonstrating such harm</u>, may be destroyed in accordance <u>with standard</u> <u>and acceptable wildlife control practices</u> by any means deemed necessary by the department

(b) Where the predators are predation is occurring by dogs or cats, and the methods of destruction may endanger pets or hunting dogs, the respective county animal control contractor shall be notified regarding any management actions and all major points of entrance into the area where the predators are to be destroyed shall be posted with signs indicating that a program of predator destruction dog or cat management in the area is in progress. Any predator may be destroyed in a posted area without claim or penalty whether or not the predator is the property of some person. [L 1985, c 174, pt of §4]

(c) On all state lands, it shall be unlawful for individuals to

release, feed, water, or otherwise care for unrestrained predators

Any individual who violates this subsection shall be assessed an

administrative fine of not less than:

- (1) \$100 for a first violation;
- (2) \$500 for a second violation; or
- (3) \$1,000 for a third or subsequent violation.

This subsection shall not apply to hunters that deploy, feed, or water unrestrained dogs in the course of hunting."

<u>SECTION 3. (a) To address predation by pet animals, there is</u> established within the department of land and natural resources a predation management taskforce to develop guidelines regarding the implementation of sections 2(b) and (c). The taskforce shall consist of the following members or their designated representative; 1 representative from each agency contracted by a county to perform animal control, 1 representatives from the Department of Land and Natural Resources Division of Forestry and Wildlife, 1 representative from the Department of Agriculture, 1 member from the public, 1 veterinarian licensed in the state of Hawaii, and 1 representative from the state department of health

(b) Members of the task force shall serve without compensation, and all necessary expenses, including travel expenses, shall be paid by the agency, organization, or department to which the member belongs. No member shall be made subject to chapter 84, Hawaii Revised Statutes, solely because of that member's participation as a member of the task force.

(d) The task force shall submit a report to the legislature of its findings, recommendations, predation management plans, and any proposed legislation, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2017.

(e) The task force shall cease to exist on June 30, 2017.

SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval <u>except</u> that the effective date for sections (b) and (c) shall be contingent upon the recommendations of the taskforce noted in Section 3 that shall be presented to the legislature on or before January 1, 2017.

The Nature Conservancy of Hawai'i is a private non-profit conservation organization dedicated to the preservation of the lands and waters upon which life depends. The Conservancy has helped to protect nearly 200,000 acres of natural lands in Hawai'i. We manage 40,000 acres in 14 preserves and work in 19 coastal communities to help protect the near-shore reefs and waters of the main Hawaiian Islands. We forge partnerships with government, private parties and communities to protect Hawai'i's important watershed forests and coral reefs.

The Nature Conservancy supports S.B. 2450 which would prohibit and penalize caring for unrestrained predators on State land.

Many of Hawai'i's birds have no defenses to introduced and unrestrained predators like cats and dogs. The results can be devastating like these 'ua'u kani (wedge-tailed shearwaters) killed by two unrestrained dogs at the birds' breeding site at Mo'omomi on Moloka'i. More than 100 'ua'u were killed by these dogs over three days in June 2012. 'Ua'u are most commonly known to aid fishermen in detecting schools of fish at sea. They live most of their life at sea; only coming to land to breed.

Aloha Chairs Gabbard and Wakai, and Committee Members:

The NATIONAL TROPICAL BOTANICAL GARDEN strongly supports Senate Bill 2450 relating to the control of non-native predators on State Lands. As someone who has been deeply involved in conservation of our unique native flora and fauna for the forty years I can't tell you how important this bill is.

Predation of our native birds and insects has resulted in their dramatic decline over the past 200 years and while numerous species are responsible the issues of feral cats has become front and center over the past five years. On Kaua'i our County Council appointed a feral cat task force to research the issue and came to the conclusion on this very emotional subject that dramatic reduction of existing feral cat populations is essential to remove the threat that these predators have on ground nesting birds.

NTBG conservation staff spend significant time and resources controlling rats and cats inside our fenced enclosures managing predators and we know how challenging and difficult this job is. Listed among the most harmful invasive species globally by the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN) feral cats on islands have contributed to the extinction of 33 species and are the principle threat to 8% of critically endangered birds, mammals, and reptiles. Additionally, feral cats are recognized as the top source of direct, human-associated mortality to birds in the United States and it is estimated that feral cats kill approximately 2.4 billion birds each year!

With thousands of delegates from across the world coming to Hawaii this fall for the IUCN's World Conservation Congress now is the time to show we have the political will to deal with predators and protect the unique plants and animals that existing nowhere else on the planet.

In closing, please support DLNR by passing SB 2450 and make Hawaii a model that others can look to in how we deal with this difficult problem.

#### Testimony of American Bird Conservancy Supporting SB 2450 Relating to Predators Senate Committee on Water, Land, and Agriculture Senate Committee on Economic Development, Environment, and Technology Friday, February 12, 2016, 2:00 PM, Room 414

On behalf of American Bird Conservancy, I am writing to urge your **support for SB 2450**, which would increase protection to human health and wildlife by prohibiting individuals from releasing, feeding, watering, or otherwise caring for unrestrained predators on state lands.

This bill safeguards the public and wildlife from the negative impacts of predators such as mongooses, rodents, and cats. These predators spread diseases and kill endangered species, undermining the work of state agencies, the support of taxpayers, and state lands for recreation.

Feral cats, for example, spread the parasite that causes toxoplasmosis. Toxoplasmosis is among the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's <u>five neglected parasitic diseases</u> targeted as a priority for public health. Each cat may spread hundreds of millions of infectious eggs in its feces, contaminating the environment for years. Infection in humans can result in miscarriages, blindness, memory loss, or death and has been linked to several neurological disorders. Unfortunately, recent <u>deaths of Hawaiian monk seals</u>, <u>Nēnē</u>, and other species suggest increasing cat-caused contamination of land and water.

Feral cats are also one of the world's most harmful invasive species and have contributed to the extinction of 33 species on islands. Hawaiian birds at risk include endangered Palila, 'Alae Ke'oke'o (Hawaiian Coot), 'A'o (Newell's Shearwater), 'Ua'u (Hawaiian Petrel), and others. The Hawaii Department of Land and Natural Resources' <u>Hawaii Invasive Species Council</u> website recognizes the serious threat from feral cats to people and wildlife.

Despite the negative impacts of unrestrained predators such as feral cats, a small minority of individuals continue to release and purposely maintain these animals on state lands protected for recreation and conservation. This bill is a reasonable and appropriate step to protect the people and natural resources of Hawaii, and **we respectfully request your support for SB 2450**.

Comments: Thank you for this bill. I am testifying in support of its passage. I am President of Hawaii Marine Mammal Alliance Inc., a nonprofit Hawaii corporation that works in the support of the preservation and recovery of the Hawaiian monk seal species. Our volunteers spend thousands of hours each year protecting the Hawaiian monk seal and work to help this endemic Hawaiian species to survive despite an annual decrease in their numbers. The Hawaiian monk seal is the most endangered marine mammal in the U.S. and is Hawaii's state mammal. In the past several years, scientists are becoming increasingly concerned about the toll the disease Toxoplasmosis and the fatalities it is causing in the Hawaiian monk seal population. Toxoplasmosis is a disease that is caused by a parasite carried in the feces of cats, and feral cats are of the biggest concern because without the benefit of cat litter, feral cat feces is ultimately washed into Hawaii's shoreline waters. There it is ingested by Hawaiian monk seals, who without any natural immunity, can contract Toxoplasmosis and die a terrible and painful death. Toxoplasmosis also kills the endangered Hawaiian Crow, another federally protected species, and is a danger to humans as well. I urge you to take the step and pass this bill. It is an important step in helping us control this disease. The feeding or caring of any wild animals, such as feral cats, on State of Hawaii land should be illegal. Thank you for the opportunity to testify in this matter.

Starvation as a means of population control is inhumane and unethical. Policy should reflect reality that people will feed cats, and prohibition will only make this behavior more difficult to control and guide. Rather, communities should be encouraged to require that people feeding cats do so following guidelines to minimize nuisance and impact on wildlife and to ensure that all cats fed are sterilized (and that resources are available to make this affordable and accessible to the majority of the population). There are ample peer-reviewed published reports of effective cat management using trap-neuter-return procedures demonstrating that numbers of free roaming cats can be reduced or eliminated using this strategy. Finally, it is important to note that banning feeding is unlikely to make cats disappear. Instead, hungry cats will become more visible in their need to find food. 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Dear Sir/Ma'am,

I strongly oppose SB 2450 unless an "exemption" for Feral Cat colonies managed by dedicated caregivers be added to SB 2450, similar to exempting hunters with hunting dogs.

Rational: These feral cat colonies have undergone the Trap, Neuter, and Release (TNR) program which significantly help control the cat population. The feral cats that belong to these colonies do not roan or stray from their colonies to find a mate. These cat have been caught by caregivers and taken to private organizations for spaying and neutering with assistance from private veterinarians and non-profit organizations like Cat Friends, Hawaii. These caregivers managed the colonies with their own personal finances and received no income or financial assistance from any organization. SB 2450 will also be detrimental to Hawaii's TNR program because after these cats are trapped, neuter or spayed, they cannot be returned/released to their home colonies if an exemption is not allowed in SB 2450.

To penalize these dedicated individuals who help control the feral cat population would be an injustice for caring human beings. Other states on the mainland have been highly successful with their TNR program to help control the feral cat population. These programs are managed by private caregivers, just like concerned citizens of Hawaii.

As a descendant of a domesticated cat, feral cats are the result of being born away from human contact. Many feral cats are the offspring of a (once) pet cat that has been lost or abandoned by its human family. Because these under-socialized cats live with no human contact, most display "feral behaviors" and cannot be placed in homes. Cats that been spayed or neutered through the TNR program are identified by little notches on the tips of their ears. A notch on the right ear identifies a female and a notch on the left indicates a male.

As a voter and a concerned citizen I respectfully request that you reconsider legislation that seeks to make it illegal for cat colony caregivers to care for the abandoned and feral cat populations on state lands in Hawaii. As an animal advocate who cares about the wellbeing of our less fortunate animals in the community, I implore that the state reconsider this bill and instead offer a long-term solution to this pervasive problem. An attempt at eradication of a species by eliminating its food source is not just inhumane it is downright cruel.

I have been involved with trapping, neutering, returning and managing feral cats for over 20 years on Oahu and have seen it work in reducing numbers of feral cats. The cats at my place of employment, Punahou School, had been a source of contention between those who favoured eradication over colony management. Finally after many years the administration allowed us to operate a well-organized TNRM program comprised of a group of faculty and staff who feed and care for the cats on campus. In the past 15 years we have seen the numbers of feral cats living on our campus reduce from 40+ to under 20. We have found that a well-cared for colony will reduce the number of strays that wander onto campus and stay, and it will keep cats close to a given area since this is where their food source is. We have heard very few complaints about cats on our campus since this program has had a chance to show results.

I understand the concern for the predatory instinct cats have and their negative impact on the unique, indigenous wildlife of our islands. We all would like to see the number of feral cats decline. My opinion is that controlling the numbers of felines in the community needs to start with acknowledging that there will ALWAYS be feral cats and that by controlling their reproduction and giving them a centralized, consistent food source, their numbers will naturally decrease and they can live out their lives healthier and more safely. Irresponsible behaviour by pet owners is the principal cause of feral cat population increase in a community that fosters low-cost spaying and neutering. Please reconsider this bill as it will cause much suffering of innocent animals and the people who care for them while being marginally effective in achieving its goal of reducing the predation of endangered species in our islands.

Testimony in Opposition of S.B. 2450 February 8, 2016

S.B. 2450 is, in part, a poor attempt towards a solution to an incredibly complicated problem in Hawaii: overpopulation of cats. "It shall be unlawful for individuals to release, feed, water, or otherwise care for unrestrained predators on state lands. An individual who violates this subsection shall be... fine[d]." S.B. 2450, at 2. "'Predators' mean animals destructive of wildlife by nature of their predatory habits, including... cats." S.B. 2450, at 1. However, in the bill's brevity, the bill completely lacks consideration of the humane treatment of predatory animals, specifically cats.

Additionally and more importantly, the main focus of S.B. 2450 is to protect wildlife, but this bill would likely have the opposite effect. By banning the feeding of cats, you are encouraging hungry cats to use their predatory nature to survive. This bill would effectively increase the likelihood that cats would attack wildlife if individuals currently feeding cats on state land stopped as a result of this legislation. Sterilization, not starvation, will reduce the overpopulation of cats in a humane manner, which will ultimately protect more wildlife.

The legislature has an opportunity to take a positive step towards reducing the population of cats in the state in a humane manner, and in turn, protect the wildlife. I strongly hope that you will oppose S.B. 2450, or alternatively, rework it to actually achieve the desired result of wildlife protection while also allowing for a more humane treatment of "predators" like cats.

Comments: To whom this may concern, While I agree that releasing animals worsens the problem of animal overpopulation, I do not believe banning people from feeding free-roaming animals is an effective solution. You are advocating that people let animals starve, which may indirectly lead people to stop caring for animals and to see them as a nuisance, rather than a population that is suffering. An effective solution, however, is sterilization. In order for a person or group to sterilize an animal in a safe and humane way, a carrier is set with food, and possibly a lot of it depending how long it takes for each animal to be lured. Sterilization prevents animals, and even pets that have escaped home or been abandoned, from giving birth to more animals that will roam the community. A benefit of feeding animals in one secluded area will prevent them from having to roam to other, possibly populated, areas in search for food. Also, free-roaming cats tend to form packs and will prevent new cats from trespassing on their "territory". Assuming that a person or a group is sterilizing these cats, not only will they prevent them from having kittens, they can also make sure new un-sterilized cats do not invade the community. In short, banning the release of animals and punishing those who do can help prevent animal overpopulation. However, banning people from feeding free-roaming animals can be detrimental in two ways: teaching people not to care for the animals' wellbeing and preventing a person or group from trying to sterilizing them in a safe and humane way. 183D-65, section 2 (C) It shall be unlawful for individuals to release, feed, water, or otherwise care for unrestrained predators on state lands. An individual who violates this subsection shall be assessed an administrative fine not less than:

- (1) \$100 for a first violation;
- (2) \$500 for a second violation; or
- (3) \$1,000 for a third or subsequent violation.

This recommendation to ammend SECTION 2 of Section 183D-65 with the addition of C is irresponsible. Do not pass this bill.

My concern is that only a portion of the ACT will be enforced. I believe it is unfairly written to make feral colony caretakers and trap, neuter, release, and manage supporters take the brunt of the enforceable portion of this bill. I believe that the "release" portion will be completely overlooked by authorities as it would be much harder to prove. I also think that the "department" which claims the jurisdiction must have benchmarks (and not just advertisements by Audubon about bird species being threatened by feral cats) that would clearly and objectively state what "harmful to wildlife" means in order for the department to take "any means necessary to destroy" (also needs to be defined, inhumane culling is what immediately comes to mind.) Will each department have their own subjective standards of what "harmful to wildlife" means? Trap, neuter, release and manage programs have shown time and time again that they work, and a majority of those programs happen to take place on state lands (because that is where these abandoned former pets can find refuge.) Feral cats are still a species of DOMESTICATED animals (predatory in nature, just for survival.) I believe we need to have more evidence taken into consideration before this bill is passed. I think the types of evidence must be compatible in nature for both sides of the issue and must be given due diligence. I believe that dumping a domestic animal in public and leaving it to fend for itself is already against Hawaiian law, how many fines have there been up to this point (from the laws inception) for dumping a pet? Has it been effective? If not, why are we trying to pass another form of the pre-existing law if it is ineffective? As for the fines for the persons feeding and caring for feral domestic animals, what will become of the animals? They will become extremely harmful to wildlife, is that the purpose of this bill? I thought the overall purpose of the bill was to protect wildlife, this bill does the exact opposite and endangers it. If a feral animal loses its' main source of food, it will go elsewhere (ie: and I don't mean private lands, I mean it will find wildlife) to subsist. Why don't you introduce a bill that is less harmful to combat this problem? Hawaiian Humane Society (or other government entity) could spearhead coordinated efforts to alleviate this "perceived" problem towards wildlife. Why is eradication always our first thought. Banning all feeding would mean banning the very effective practice of trap, neuter, and return (TNR) to control and manage unowned cats on state lands. TNR doesn't make sense everywhere, but for state parks that many people use, it is the only practical way to manage cat populations and to control potentially problematic cat behavior.

Some say simply remove the cats, but in practice, this proves to be very expensive, and realistically it is impossible to accomplish. TNR relies on volunteers who do what they do to protect the aina and because they love cats. It works. Over time populations decrease, the cats become invisible, and wildlife predation is reduced by over 95% because, as studies show, fed cats kill that much less.

Banning TNR would hurt the aina because it would remove the very effective control that TNR provides in this situation. It is not likely that the state could afford to replace the hundreds of people statewide that perform TNR on a volunteer basis. It would simply be too expensive.

I oppose this bill because Haw. Rev. Stat §183D-65 has been amended to make it unlawful to release, feed, water, or otherwise care for unrestrained predators on state land unless they are hunting dogs during a hunt.

A Good Samaritan who finds an abandoned dog on State land and gives the hungry and thirsty dog food and water would be breaking the law under this bill. A Good Samaritan must now carry a leash in his pocket at all times or face a fine if caught caring for a loose dog.

The bill would also make it unlawful to care for Trap-Neuter-Release (TNR) colonies of feral cats located on State lands. Their caretakers would be breaking the law and subject to escalating fines for providing care to these colonies.

This bill does not extend any aloha to the animals living in these islands and the people who care for them. Hawaii ranked 25<sup>th</sup> in 2013 among the States in regard to animal protection laws according to the Humane Society of the United States.

My name is Cynthia Keiki. I'm a resident of 759 laukea Street, Honolulu HI 96813. I'm submitting a testimony Opposing SB 2450. I would like to state that I am a board member of Hawaii Cat Friends, but this is my personal testimony and is not on behalf of Hawaii Cat Friends.

Almost three years ago my neighborhood had a rapidly increasing amount of feral cats. Like most people, it didn't occur to me that I should do something. I just kept wondering WHEN someone was going to do something. You see, we had three cats of our own. Cats that had "adopted" us. They just moved in. We fed them, we fixed them and we felt that we had done our part.

About ten houses up the road from us, there's a house that's falling apart. There were people living there on the property and on the street and they were feeding the cats, which were rapidly breeding. We live along Kalawahine Streamside in Papakolea and there are a lot of cats in this area.

My husband, a friend and I were driving up the road when we saw some kids with a tiny kitten. I asked my husband to pull over so I could see what they planned on doing with it. They handed it over and knowing that it was starved, its ribs were broken and it was suffering, we took it to the Hawaiian Humane Society. That was the tipping point for me and that is when I realized I had to do something.

I did my research and I found Hawaii Cat Friends. Jennifer Kishimori, the President, told me that she would help me. And it was going to cost \$5.00 per cat to spay and neuter them. Less than a week later, she and I started trapping the cats. We collectively trapped and spayed and neutered 50 cats at this location. That was almost three years ago.

Out of those fifty cats, I pulled out six kittens. Two were adopted by a lady that saw my ad on Craigslist to get them a home. Four stayed here with me and since then, one of them has come up missing. I can certainly attest to the death of five of the cats. One was hit by a car, one was attacked by a dog, one I had put to sleep because it was sickly and two that I believe had been poisoned. Quite a few of the other cats came up missing, never to be seen again, and I believe those cats had also been poisoned. To date, there are 20 cats in this colony. Every evening we go up the hill and feed them. I do a head count, I have named the majority of them and I make sure each cat has a notch on its ear, because that is how I know that they are all spayed and neutered. TNRM – Trap Neuter Release Manage DOES work. I can testify to that.

Since then, I volunteer with Hawaii Cat Friends every other weekend, where large clinics are held, allowing others to spay and neuter their feral cats for \$5.00 each. There are many programs available to help aid people to do this.

Here is the problem with your proposed bill SB 2450. It is horribly cruel! It would allow dogs to attack and kill cats on state land! Have you personally witnessed anything being attacked and killed by a dog? How can you even consider this for a moment? I find this bill disgusting. Dog fighting is illegal, animal cruelty is illegal and this bill will set us back 50 years.

You want to ban feeding on State Land. Without feeding, there is no way to gain the trust or to trap the cats, in order to spay and neuter them.

I work for NOAA Fisheries Service as the Regional Marine Mammal Response Program Coordinator for the Pacific Islands Region, I am submitting private testimony as a citizen of the State of Hawaii. I am writing in strong support of SB 2450 to prevent the feeding and introduction of feral cats on State lands. Feral and unattended cats are the sole source of the presence of toxoplasmosis in the environment. Toxoplasmosis represents a significant threat to Hawaiian monk seals and other precious wildlife of Hawaii, in addition to being a threat to human health. Pregnant women and immune compromised individuals are at great risk (CDC). From my personal experience, and as a canoe club paddler, I know that some paddling club members are very concerned about their health risks due to the presence of feral cats at our canoe site on Sand Island. Toxoplasmosis is a significant threat to wildlife in Hawaii. Pets are an important part of many homes in Hawaii but feral cats, and domestic cats that are let outside unattended, kill bird life including the endangered Nene and shed disease. Feral or unattended cats are the sole source for the disease known as Toxoplasmosis which is caused by the parasite Toxoplasma gondii whose oocysts are shed into the environment that have the potential to infect and kill monk seals and more recently identified in cetaceans. Since 2001, 8 monk seals have been attributed to toxoplasmosis and this is considered a minimum estimate given cause of death investigations are not possible for seals that disappear and die undetected. Toxoplasmosis was also the cause of a recent local spinner dolphin death on the Big Island, and the disease has is becoming a growing concern for (cetaceans) whales and dolphins. Investigation into the deaths of cetaceans is being further investigated by HPU looking at past cetacean strandings. It is alarming that this parasite is now found in the marine environment out as far as cetaceans can encounter them. The feral or unattended cat issue is obviously a controversial issue and cats have the right to live in humane settings but these cats fed in the wild by well- meaning people lead a miserable life. They often suffer from ringworm, hookworm, toxoplasmosis, feline distemper, feline leukemia, and other diseases. These cats can be pass disease on to people, wildlife, and pets. Visualize for a moment, endangered species going extinct because humans introduced an invasive species, they maintained that invasive species, and it is that species that caused the extinction of endangered species. From an

environmental perspective that is the ultimate in environmental irresponsibility. As a resident of Hawaii support the following measures: • That make it illegal to introduce unwanted cats to the wild in Hawaii • The humane reduction of feral cat populations, via reduction of cat colonies, through adoption of eligible cats into homes that will only keep them inside and the humane euthanasia of unadoptable cats by a veterinarian or authorized facility. • Legislation against the formation of feeding centers or designated areas for cats on state AND private lands. • Legislation that recognize feral or unattended cats as invasive species and a threat to Hawaii's wildlife. More outreach needs to be done by the State of Hawaii to encourage cats to be kept indoors by their owners and about the true life cycle of toxoplasomis. Many cat advocates are in denial of the fact that cats are the sole source of the transmission of the disease and this message could be made clearer through PSAs. Another misconception is that trap, neuter, return (TNR) programs are keeping up with the problem. It is estimated that at least 70% of the feral population would need to be neutered in order to keep the population at level that could begin to reverse the impacts to wildlife. Another misconception is that the cats that are being fed is a humane action. Just feeding them does not treat them or cure them from the above mentioned diseases. By feeding them, in many cases, well-meaning citizens are prolonging their suffering. As an animal care expert of 27 years, 15 of that spent in marine mammal rehabilitation of sick or injured marine mammals and sea turtles, I can I can testify that they do not lead healthy or comfortable lives. It is also conceivable that if these cats are starved, they may begin to look more aggressively for food in nearby garbage cans and dumpsters causing hygiene and litter issues. 2--If cats and cat colonies are removed from these areas, the rodent population is likely to increase. Cats assist in keeping the rodent population to a minimum. 3--Sterilization and NOT starvation will reduce cats in the community humanely. The Hawaiian Humane Society has a program that supports these efforts. The Hawaiian Humane Society supports responsible Trap-Neuter-Return-Manage (TNRM), a humane and effective long-term strategy to reduce the number of cats at large and improve their quality of life. Those caring for ferals are independent caregivers and not Humane Society volunteers. Those who use the Humane Societies sterilization service are encouraged to seek landowner permission to care for cats. When people trap, neuter and then return cats to their colonies, the population stabilizes and decreases as cats live out their natural lives without reproducing. As a result, millions of unwanted kittens have been spared from life on the streets. In the last five years, we have helped more than 12,000 feral cats at a cost of over \$250,000 for needed sterilizations. This service is funded entirely by donations. In my 32 years of work for the Department of Land and Natural Resources, Division of Forestry & Wildlife as Wildlife Biologist and now as manager with the Native Ecosystems Protection and Management Program I am a qualified expert on the subject of the harmful impacts of introduced predators on Hawaiian Native biota and ecosystems.

I fully support Senate Bill 2450 in prohibiting the releasing of and or the caring for predators on all state lands. I applaud also redefining "predators" to include all rodents. Introduced predators are among the most ubiquitous and influential agents causing the decline of Hawaii's special flora and fauna. I have personally witnessed hundreds of losses of Hawaiian birds, and plants by predators – many of the species being rare or endangered Hawaiian taxa. The scope of the overall loss of life to introduced predators is immense in Hawaii.

If the predators are owned "pet animal species" like cats – these should not be allowed onto the landscape. Such fixed and neutered animals still kill. Such animals still transmit diseases to wildlife and humans alike. Finally, truly feral individuals are *not* pets but wild predators, this bill will help in addressing their removal from State lands.

Also the state should provide funding and support for increased spay-neuter programs to control cat and dog populations. A recent free spay-neuter clinic at our local humane society had at least 50 to 75 pet owners and people with captured feral animals standing in line for each of the 5 days that it was held, so at least 250 to 300+ animals were neutered or spayed preventing more than over 1000+ extra animals in the next 3 to 6 months.

Since there are many animal groups feeding, spaying, and neutering these animals, the colony sizes will remain static until the animals die or find real homes.

Going out to garage sales each weekend, we see many dogs chained with 4 foot chains to dog houses or in 4'x6' pens. Laws should be made to make a minimum chain length of at least 20' or on a runner and a minimum pen size of 8'x10'. Most of these dogs go from puppy to adult to death chained to a dog house.

There is no scientific proof that feeding bans are effective, not to mention that it's cruel. This bill is very short sighted and will not achieve what most of us desire -- fewer feral/community cats. How can we achieve this?

Abandonment laws need to be strengthened and enforced. The penalties are too weak to deter people who dump their pets or dump their neighbors' pets. I am aware of only one person ever being prosecuted in Hawaii for abandonment. A man was caught dumping kittens at Heeia State Park, where I volunteer to trap and sterilize cats. The population at Heeia State Park has <u>decreased</u> more than 25% in one year through active trap, neuter, return, manage (TNRM). TNRM is a humane approach that works. National statistics can be found through The Humane Society of the United States showing the effectiveness of TNRM.

This bill in its current form will criminalize hundreds of caretakers and starve thousands of cats with inevitable negative results. Many colonies throughout the islands have seen a significant decrease in population over the years thanks to compassionate caregivers who spend their own time, money and energy to make sure the cats are healthy and sterilized. I volunteer with a non-profit organization, Cat Friends, which has sterilized approximately 16,500 cats and rescued and found homes for more than 1,100 kittens and cats in the last five years on Oahu without any financial assistance from the City and County or the State. So much more could be accomplished to decrease the cat population with more funding for sterilization, outreach, and strict abandonment laws.

To give an idea how many births Cat Friends sterilizations prevented, I refer to a conservative projection from The University of Washington's Math Department, working with data from a study of feral cats in North Carolina. The assumptions used for the population projection: One female cat gives birth to six kittens per year. Kitten gender is 50 percent female, and only 25 percent of kittens survive to reproductive age. All surviving female kittens become adults and reproduce with the same birth and kitten mortality rates. It estimates that one female cat and her offspring could produce between 100 to 400 cats by the end of

seven years. These statistics show how much worse the cat population would be today had dedicated volunteers and groups such as Cat Friends not been actively involved in sterilizing these feral/community cats using their own time and money. And now this bill is ridiculously trying to criminalize these same people.

Cat Friends charges clients \$5 to fix a feral/community cat and subsidizes the additional balance of \$25 per cat using funds we've raised through grants and other means. If we could create a full time spay neuter clinic with financial assistance from the State and/or City and County, rather than hosting clinics only twice a month, we could make an even greater impact on reducing the feral/community cat population, and in a humane way.

I ask that you please vote AGAINST Senate Bill (SB) 2450 and consider more humane options.

Yes, Hawaii has a problem with 'feral', unrestrained predators – but again this Bill is not the ethical, humane way to deal with this problem. I urge you to think about what this Bill is truly proposing, because the statement: "Any predator may be destroyed in a posted area without claim or penalty whether or not the predator is the property of some person." is unethical, inhumane, and that action should actually be illegal.

Chairs Gabbard and Wakai, Vice Chairs Nishihara and Slom, and members of the WLA and EET Committees:

I would like to express my <u>deep personal concern</u> and <u>strong opposition</u> to not only the proposed amendments in SB2450, but also to the related statute in general.

As some of you may know, there have been teams of concerned citizens in Hawai'i that have worked assiduously to support the lives of feral animals on the islands that, through no fault of their own, were brought into this world through the gift of life. I joined a team supporting the feral cats around 'lolani Palace many moons ago, and for years helped neuter and feed these animals to ensure that they posed no threat to people or other animals in their vicinity, and that their qualities of life were as best as they could be - given their homeless circumstance.

I personally watched these feline souls grow and prosper over the years, and even took one of them home to become part of our family in Kailua (which we named "Einstein"), who today is like a son to our family, and whose deep love and appreciation for our kokua is unequivocal (photo attached with this testimony).

The remaining felines at the Palace have since passed on, but I could relate many stories where, as a result of our sustained care and nurturing, these souls were not in any sense of the word "predators", but rather members of a living community.

The language in SB2450 (and the existing statute) is truly disturbing, and clearly does not reflect the "spirit of Aloha" which underpins the fabric of our local community. The definition of "predator" is certainly askew – "animals destructive of wildlife by nature" would certainly include human beings, not to mention "hunting dogs" (which this statute tries to "protect from dogs"!). "Destroying animals deemed harmful to wildlife" using "any means deemed necessary by the department" also speaks legions to a disrespect for compassionate means to resolve whatever problems might be related to feral animals on State lands.

Furthermore, the provision that individuals who "feed, water, or otherwise care for unrestrained 'predators' (italics mine) on State lands" shall be subject to administrative fines would mean (if applied repeatedly and retroactively) that I for one would be fined at least \$5,840,000 for all the nights I spent feeding the Palace felines (the thousands of dollars spent using personal funds to support this effort notwithstanding).

#### Page 2 Testimony / Crisafulli SB2450

If you could look into the eyes of one of these community neutered/supported felines and other feral "predators" to witness the affection and appreciation that they hold for their volunteer caretakers, I think you might rethink the intent and language of this statute/legislation.

I would be happy to address any questions you may have concerning our approach to humanely manage feral wildlife on State lands, and thank you for the courtesy of considering these concerns.

Comments: To Whom It May Concern: I am outraged at the proposed SB2450, specifically the section that deals with the treatment of "unrestrained predators": (c) It shall be unlawful for individuals to release, feed, water, or otherwise care for unrestrained predators on state lands. An individual who violates this subsection shall be assessed an administrative fine not less than:  $\sim$  (1) \$100 for a first violation; ~ (2) \$500 for a second violation; or ~ (3) 1,000 for a third or subsequent violation. This subsection shall not apply to hunters that deploy, feed, or water unrestrained dogs in the course of hunting." I do agree that no one should be releasing their cats/dogs into the wild to exacerbate and already difficult battle of feral animals in Hawaii. However, I am strongly opposed to the outlawing of any feral colony caretakers. They are our ground troops, the only people who show any compassion for these animals - animals who are in the wild through human negligence. Additionally, they are currently our best, and often the only, line of defense of actually keeping these animals neutered, since the Hawaii government is apparently not poor enough for a massive rail project but too poor to help fund mobile spay and neuter clinics or new animals shelters. I understand that one is planning for our future but isn't the other also important, so we do not end up mirroring the way of Australia (i.e. recent massive culling of feral cats). The local government seeks to propose these ridiculous bills to criminalize compassion without putting forth any proposed funding for new shelters or other ways to increase our animal breeding control. Additionally, these laws circumvent other regulations that govern the ethical treatment of animals. I strongly oppose this bill and I am not alone in the community. Feeding cats and dogs that these amazing people managed to trap and neuter, which can take weeks of planning, and then penalizing them for caring and trying to keep our feral colonies under control is wrong. If the local government wishes to criminalize something, then please let them criminalize abandonment of pets. It may difficult to enforce, since many people abandoning pets are military moving off island, but it's a much more elegant solution to preventing population excess. Letting these poor animals starve as a way to control will never work, nor will it give a good PR impression once proposals like these hit the media. I am not a colony caretaker but my two cats are my family, for me and my husband, and it's not a huge leap to say that 1) I am not the only one like this in

today's society and 2) it doesn't take that much though to see that all these stray animals could have been someone's pet (and the feral ones are all traced back to lack of neutering of abandoned pets). Please do the right thing and modify the language of SB2450. Thank you for your time.

While preserving indigenous and endangered species unique to the Hawaiian Islands is important, this legislation is not the solution. Rather than target all the homeless animals in the islands, which is largely a result of cruel or irresponsible pet owners who abandon or neglect their animals, special effort should be made to plan humane solutions in targeted areas where certain bird populations are at risk. A blanket ban on feeding stray and feral animals throughout the state only serves to punish many innocent animals and criminalizes the community volunteers (rescuers and cat colony managers) who are dedicating their personal time and resources to address the problem.

This legislation presents a cruel and inhumane solution to the homeless dog and cat population on the islands, and places the people and politicians who support this legislation in the same pool as the irresponsible pet owners who abandon or do not spay or neuter their pets. We are part of a first world nation and are capable of implementing a first world solution to the problem. The suggestion to do otherwise reflects ignorance to animal welfare best practices, in particular to research and programs that demonstrate what is effective in managing feral cat colonies.

As someone who helps to maintain a cat colony in Honolulu, this legislation is quite disturbing. Firstly, I am appalled that it is even being suggested that we allow populations of animals, who are homeless by no fault of their own, face death by starvation. We are honestly no more evolved than any third world country if we allow this to happen, while criminalizing community volunteers in the process. If colony caretakers are not allowed to feed cats, the possibility of trapping for sterilization is not possible. Successful trapping takes place after a feeding routine is established so that cats can be located for trapping and are drawn to an area by an expected meal. Also, cat behavior is such that they form colonies or groups. Without established feeding areas and routines, it would be extremely difficult to identify when new and unneutered cats join a colony. Therefore, if this legislation is passed, I would expect the feral cat population to grow rather than decrease.

When feral cats are sterilized and have access to food and water, their overall health and quality of life improves. And most of this maintenance is financed by the generosity of their colony caretakers who do not receive any money for their time and for the cost of food. Folks like myself do this because we are compassionate and hope to ease the suffering in the world. I am a community volunteer NOT a criminal.

Throughout my life, I have rescued and rehomed many cats and dogs that were abandoned. I have paid for the cost of sterilization and vaccinations out of my pocket, and have taken the time to find homes for these animals if I was not in a position to care for them myself. This legislation not only targets stray cats, but also stray dogs. Again, we are talking about animals who are innocent bystanders to the cruelty and ignorance of their human caretakers. It is also extremely difficult to befriend and gain the trust of a stray dog who may have been abused, without the incentive of a meal. Criminalizing a person who is trying to help a starving and neglected animal, and agreeing to allow an animal to starve unnecessarily is absurd.

This legislation is not a humane or educated answer to the problem. Trap-Neuter-Release-Maintain programs have proven effective in other states, and I believe this proposed legislation has been drafted without consideration to current research, animal welfare best practices and consultation with the Hawaiian Humane Society and other animal welfare programs who strongly oppose this legislation.

**I oppose SB 2450,** which would prohibit individuals from releasing, feeding, watering, or otherwise caring for unrestrained predators on state lands.

#### I Oppose SB 2450

As a citizen of Hawaii, I ask that you oppose SB 2450. This bill would have a devastating impact on caregivers who are responsibly caring for cats and benefiting the community.

SB 2450 bans the feeding and release of cats on public lands. Caregivers would face heavy fines and be unable to practice Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR), the only humane and effective approach to the cat population. A release ban would prevent newly neutered cats from being returned to their outdoor homes.

Feeding bans are also cruel, ineffective, and not scientifically supported. Cats who are accustomed to a consistent feeding schedule can become dependent on their caregivers for food, and discontinuing care can lead to a cruel death. However, cats will not disappear--they will only roam further to find food and become more visible. Managed colonies and TNR prevent cats from roaming and make the community a better, safer place.

I am a member of AdvoCats, the West Hawaii group that has been promoting and practicing free TNR for community residents since 1999. As a colony feeder and trapper for the last 15 years - I have seen the difference that a managed approach makes - healthier, fewer cats and less impact on public and private property. In my experience, the only new cats I see are usually ones that have been dumped by other people. Why? Because people know that very few cats dropped off at our local humane society will be put up for adoption (most are euthanized). So thinking that they will give these cats a chance at survival - they dump them at places where other cats already live.

The long term solution is free cat (and dog) neutering for all Hawaii residents, no questions asked. Mobil clinics have been successful in other states in reaching poorer neighborhoods where cost and transportation hinder cat and dog owners who would neuter their animals if these two things weren't barriers.

Banning something without looking at all of the facets and long term solutions is not the way to go on this issue.

Countless people in Hawaii dedicate their time and money to responsibly caring for cats, which benefits the community. SB 2450 would make their efforts illegal. As a Hawaiian, I ask you to please oppose the bill. Thank you for your time and consideration.

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## Testimony in opposition to SB2450 February 12, 2016, WLA/EET Hearing

I **oppose** SB2450. It is simply a bill to halt all trap, neuter, return, and manage programs (TNRM). It may have some other minor goals but it's most disturbing result will be to either halt TNRM or penalize persons who provide this service to the State free of charge. A better plan to control the increase in feral cats would be to increase the penalties for pet abandonment as contained in SB2512 and increase funding to help people with pet cats afford spay/neutering services.

I'd also like to note that anyone who stops feeding animals they have taken the responsibility for will be in violation of **HRS §711-1109 Cruelty to animals in the second degree.** This section includes the intentional, knowing, or reckless deprivation of a pet animal of necessary sustenance or causes such deprivation. The definition of "pet animal" includes cats among many others. Violation of this section can be as high as a C felony.

I was the colony caretaker for the cat colony in the parking lot behind the Department of Health. I began taking care of these cats in the 1990s when I worked as a staffer for the Legislature. The cats were totally feral and quite fertile. After some months of effort, I managed to spay and neuter all of these cats, removed those who were not suitable for living outside (to safe homes), and found homes for the kittens. The colony is no longer there and there is no longer a group of abandoned and feral cats living in the parking lot. I was fortunate that during that time, only a very few cats were dumped in the area. In addition, there was also a well-run colony on the grounds of a nearby school. And the cats around the Palace were also well-cared for and fixed.

Why the State would want to make it a crime to spay and neuter cats and manage colonies is hard to understand. The caretakers take on the entire expense with the help of nonprofit organizations such as Hawaii CatFriends and the Hawaiian Humane Society who offer low-cost spaying and neutering for cats as well as support from the Hawaii Cat Foundation. There is no cost to the State. The goal of the caretakers is to see the colony go away due to natural attrition and adoption where possible. These are not substitutes for pet cats. I realize that one of the major issues is native bird protection but I assure you, I have never seen a native bird near the colonies I know of. I saw only doves in my colony. And for all the years it took me to see the colony disappear, I saw 1-2 dead doves and one dead mouse in the area – and those might have been from cars. I never saw a single native bird in the area.

As an aside, I find it interesting that the bill provides an exception for hunting dogs that could also be a threat to native birds, yet there is no exception for those who feed and sterilize cats. A cat that is fed and sterilized is less likely to hunt (and, of course, will not reproduce) and those colonies in areas that I know of have little or no access to native birds.

Finally, I'd like to point out that any person who cares for cats, also cares about birds – though I doubt the opposite is true as often. Cat caretakers are more than willing to work with those who want to protect birds to see if there are any areas we can agree on. Admittedly, we have tried but it's always worth another try.

IN OPPOSITION OF SB2450 - Relation to Predators. Predator Control; Natural Resources.

I, Megan Leon, thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on bill SB 2450 – Relating to Predators. Predator Control; Natural Resources.

I strongly oppose SB2450 for the following reasons:

#### 1. It is Impractical, Costly, and Will Not Work:

SB2450 is a flimsy patch, not a solution. Time and time again history shows killing programs as a method of population control does not work, and is a costly, impractical undertaking.

Kill-method is a whack-a-mole at the taxpayers expense. Once a population is removed from one area, others will move in to take their place. This "vaccuum effect" has been well documented<sup>123</sup> in several different species. New populations move in as others are taken out, rendering the kill-effort moot. Years of kill-method control shows these programs do not work.

Kill methods do not address the root issue of irresponsible breeding, and pet abandonment that is continuously contributing to a growing population of dogs and cats.

Kill-method control is costly and impractical. Consider the Marion Island study<sup>4</sup>, a review of an eradication program for a feral cat population. In this study, <u>no new cats</u> were entering the population, and it took 19 years and multiple killing methods to eliminate a population of 2,500. And I emphasize, <u>no new cats</u> entered the population during this time. Based on these results it is unreasonable to assume years of slaughter will be effective in Hawaii.

This bill also intends to fine those who "release, feed, water, or otherwise care for unrestrained predators." The costs of enforcing these fines would be insurmountable, and impractical. Enforcement dollars should not be spent on a futile effort, and harm the compassionate.

Also, curbing the feeding and watering of populations may lead to a slow, painful death for some, but the majority will find other sources of food. This source of food includes the wildlife population this bill intends to protect and invasion of garbage.

# 2. It punishes groups and individuals who contribute to Trap-Neuter-Release (TNR) and halts real progress made by these programs:

Advocats Hawaii, a non-profit with limited funds and an all-volunteer staff has spayed/neutered 17,869 cats. And this is only one TNR program's effectiveness at curtailing a population humanely. One could only imagine what the population would be today without the efforts of this program and others like it.

If this bill is passed, these volunteers will face fines and forced to halt this effective method of population control.

TNR is a program that should be encouraged and helped, not punished. TNR is shown in multiple studies to be an effective method for population control.<sup>567</sup> They stop a population's growth before it starts through spay/neuter, not ineffectively and inhumanely terminate them after they are part of the world. They also vaccinate to prevent disease in the population.

## 3. It Punishes Compassion

This bill not only punishes TNR participants, but the compassionate individual. A citizen should have the right to express their compassion without retribution by the government. Also, compassion is a trait that should be encouraged in populace, not hindered, not punished. A society that is compassionate is a society compassionate to others.

## 4. It is Inhumane and Dangerous

The language "may be destroyed by any means deemed necessary by the department" permits the destruction of these animal by inhumane methods. These animals have the capacity for pain and suffering, and should never be terminated by inhumane means.

Ambiguity in the language leaves open the use of methods (such as poisons) that could be dangerous to the human population (<u>particularly children</u>), their pets, and the wildlife this bill is trying to protect.

# 5. It Threatens Pets

Signs are not enough to prevent loved pets from possible termination by this program. Even responsible owners can have a pet escape their property. It is hard enough to recover a lost pet without the additional concern of termination because the pet was in the wrong place at the wrong time.

# 6. Killing is not the way

Killing as a society should never be the first option. We created these populations, and we need to take responsibility. These creatures are living their lives out not with the intention to be pests, but living out their lives as they are.

# Conclusion

In conclusion, controlling a population effectively and responsibly needs to be comprehensively smart not cruel, ineffective, and punish compassionate individuals and those working towards the very goal this bill intends to accomplish. As a community, we should encourage TNR programs to flourish, expand spay/neuter programs, educate the importance of spay/neuter, take responsibility for our fellow animal residents, and research more humane and effective methods of control.

SB 2450 bans the feeding and release of cats on public lands. Caregivers would face heavy fines and be unable to practice Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR), the only humane and effective approach to the cat population. A release ban would prevent newly neutered cats from being returned to their outdoor homes.

Feeding bans are also cruel (willfully or knowingly causing pain or distress) ineffective, and not scientifically supported. Starving cats is not a compassionate solution. Cats who are accustomed to a consistent feeding schedule can become dependent on their caregivers for food, and discontinuing care can lead to a cruel death. However, cats will not disappear--they will only roam further to find food and become more visible. Managed colonies and TNR prevent cats from roaming and make the community a better, safer place. Sterilization, not starvation, will reduce cats in the community humanely.

Chairs Gabbard and Wakai, Vice Chairs Nishihara and Slom, and members of the WLA and EET Committees.

I object strenuously to the provisions of SB2450 and its intent to amend SECTION 2. Section 183D-65, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

Trap, neuter, return (TNR) has proven to be an effective and humane method of controlling cat populations in several hundred locations throughout the United States, The people who engage in TNR are the same caregivers that feed and care for homeless cats. SB2450, if passed, will result in more cats exhibiting predatory behavior because they have not been fed. This bill will also result in more feral cats reproducing, as it criminalizes the act of TNR.

It is ironic that 183D-65 protects the unsportsmanlike killing of animals through the use of hunting dogs while criminalizing the act of feeding and caring for animals – many of whom have been abandoned by their thoughtless owners.

If the legislature has any interest in humanely reducing the cat population in the state then TNR is the proven method.

Funds would be better spent to educate pet owners in their responsibilities toward their pets and to assist with the cost of spaying and neutering rather than paying DLNR employees to kill – "by any means deemed necessary by the department."

However, unless we are able to create a bill that stops people from opening their car doors and pushing their unwanted animals into the streets we are going to have a feral dog/cat population.

We can't house them all. We can't destroy them fast enough to keep up with the number falling into our parks. We can't blame the animals, and sadly we can't find the people that abandoned them.

So, instead of trying to tackle these larger, more difficult issues, we are targeting the only people that we can hold "accountable". The visible group of volunteers that are consistently in our parks using their time and resources to act with compassion. I understand how watching them feed these animals may look to the everyday citizen that they are supporting the problem. I thought the same thing until I had an opportunity to meet them, to talk to them about their work. I realized I had only seen the surface of the issue and wasn't recognizing the benefit of their efforts.

Dear Hawaii State Legislature,

My name is Stefanie Hsu. I am a resident of O'ahu and an undergraduate at University of Hawaii at Manoa. I am writing in opposition to SB 2450. As an animal lover and a former volunteer at the Hawaiian Humane Society, I do not believe that a ban on the feeding of feral animals on state-owned property is a humane way to control predator populations. Since it is a large issue, I will primarily focus on the feral cat population.

If this bill is passed, where will the hundreds of feral cats on the University of Hawaii at Manoa campus be relocated to? The feral cats on the UHM campus are managed only by authorized caregivers at authorized locations registered with the university's Facilities Management Office. This program is entirely managed by volunteer caretakers without any public funding. Unauthorized feeders are in violation of university policy and City and County ordinances and are cited if caught. Despite this system, pet abandonment is still an issue on campus that contributes to the feral cat population. This is illegal according to HRS §143-2.6. Pet abandonment also occurs in other cat colony locations around the island. Rather than passing a bill to ban feeding of ferals on state property, action should be taken to enforce pet abandonment laws and actively promote public education on responsible pet ownership and pet sterilization.

I propose for expansion of a program that already exists - the Trap, Neuter, Return, and Manage program that nonprofit organizations such Hawaiian Humane Society and Hawaii CatFriends utilizes to reduce the feral cat population. Sterilization costs are paid for entirely by caregiver volunteers and the nonprofit organizations. Despite this, both organizations sterilize thousands of cats each year.

The feral cat population is an overwhelming issue which requires commitment and support from the entire island community. Turning a blind eye by simply placing a ban on feeding of feral animals is inhumane. What is necessary is enforcement of preexisting laws targeting pet abandonment, public education on pet ownership and sterilization, community awareness and support. Starvation is not the solution.

Comments: Those who provide food and water to feral animals aid in the prevention of predation on endangered birds. If these animals are provided food, they are less likely to hunt prey such as endangered birds, thus aiding in the prevention of species loss. Human feeding of feral animals also aids in socialization of the animals to humans, facilitating their capture for sterilization and vaccination. While domestic animals are routinely fed, they contribute to reducing the rodent population where they are domiciled. The hunting practices within this state leave a lot to be desired. Hunting dogs are not treated with much care or compassion, nor are they trained to hunt correctly. The measure penalizes those who provide care and feeding of lost dogs that are emaciated and abandoned by their owners. I do agree with the section of the bill that penalizes those who discard animals on public lands, but not those who attempt to mitigate the cruelty by providing food and water to discarded domestic animals. Fines and jail time need to be increased and enforced for the cruelty humans inflict. Much of this bill furthers the decrepit situation the animals have been forced to endure.

I strongly oppose this bill on the grounds that it is totally inhumane to the animals involved, many which are abandoned pets and would slowly starve to death if not cared for. Also, most of these abandoned pets are not spayed or neutered and would procreate before starving to death, thereby perpetuating the suffering. I feel strongly that this bill should be struck down and that Bill SB2512 to deter pet abandonment, along with increased funding for spay-neuter, should replace SB2450. The abandonment of pets is a major contributing factor in the growth of homeless cat colonies and to the suffering of these animals. I can personally testify to the fact that if pets are not abandoned to these colonies, and if the cats are spayed or neutered, the colonies would eventually shrink in size. I feed kitties in a small colony that is not known to a lot of people so not many pets are abandoned there. The rare time that kittens were abandoned to this colony, these kittens, including a sweet little Siamese cat, were trapped and fortunately were able to be adopted to homes. Over the approximately five to six years that I have been feeding this particular colony the size has decreased from 23 cats to only 3 cats. This is because all the cats were spayed or neutered and not many pets were abandoned there. Sadly, there are many areas where pets are abandoned faster than they can be trapped and spayed or neutered so those colonies grow. There are wonderful people who work tirelessly for the feeding, care, trapping, spaying, neutering and general wellbeing of these unfortunate creatures, but they cannot keep up with so many pets that are abandoned. Educating the public to NOT abandon their pets and increasing deterrents would, hopefully, help those who are working so hard for the humane treatment of these animals.

An individual who violates this subsection shall be assessed an administrative fine not less than: ~ (1) \$100 for a first violation; ~ (2) \$500 for a second violation; or ~ (3) \$1,000 for a third or subsequent violation. NOTICE THIS\*\*\* "This subsection shall not apply to hunters that deploy, feed, or water unrestrained dogs in the course of hunting." On any game management area, public hunting area, or forest reserve or other lands under the jurisdiction of the dept. (of land & natural resources), predator s deemed harmful to wildlife by the dept. may be destroyed by any means deemed necessary by the dept.
