In consideration of SENATE BILL 2647, SENATE DRAFT 1, HOUSE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO NATURAL RESOURCES

Senate Bill 2647, Senate Draft 1, House Draft 1 proposes to prohibit the trafficking of protected animal species, with limited exceptions. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) generally supports this measure, and offers the following comments.

The Department believes that this measure will decrease or eliminate the demand for the parts and products of protected animal species that are threatened with extinction. Around the World, many protected species such as elephants, rhinoceros, tigers and apes as well as protected marine life are killed so that body parts may be trafficked in markets around the world.

Research conducted by various conservation groups has identified Hawaii as a location with a market for animal parts such as those parts harvested for ivory. This bill aligns Hawaii's laws and rules with other bodies of state, federal and international law to protect threatened and endangered animal species from being killed needlessly for their body parts. Additionally, in many countries around the world, rangers and law enforcement officers charged with the protection of animals are killed by poachers seeking to illegally poach and kill protected wildlife. By decreasing or eliminating the market and demand of animal body parts, the lives of these wildlife rangers and law enforcement officers can result in increased safety and protection.

Additionally, while many of the species listed in this bill are not found in Hawaii, this state's status as a gateway between Asian and Unite States mainland markets creates a unique opportunity for the Hawaii State Legislature to significantly impact trade in endangered and threatened species. By making Hawaii less attractive as a channel through which these parts and products are trafficked, we can make the trade less profitable, impacting the market for these animals in their home countries and leading poachers to turn to other means of income.

The Department notes that the House Draft 1 amended the proposed Section 183D- (e) to provide certain exceptions to the extent permitted under federal law. Under the Federal Marine Mammal Protection Act

Chair Rhoads and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General understands and appreciates the objectives of this bill. We have no legal concerns with the portions of this bill that relate to land animals or land mammals.

We do raise legal concerns, however, and oppose those parts of the bill that prohibit commercial transactions of parts or products of marine mammals because they may be subject to challenge as being preempted by the Marine Mammal Protection Act (MMPA), 16 U.S.C. § 1361 *et seq.* We also propose amending the exception in the bill providing that the prohibitions in the bill do not apply to "intrastate" commercial transactions authorized by federal law or permit by broadening it to apply to all federally authorized commercial transactions.

The bill adds a new section to chapter 183D, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), which provides that no person shall sell, offer to sell, purchase, trade, possess with intent to sell, or barter for any part or product from animal species explicitly listed in the bill. With reference to marine mammals, the bill provides that no person shall sell, offer to sell, purchase, trade, possess with intent to sell, or barter for any part or product of species, subspecies, or distinct population segments of monk seals, narwhals, whales, or walruses, insofar as they are listed on appendices I or II of the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species, as endangered or critically endangered on the International Union for the Conservation of Nature red list, or as endangered under the Endangered Species Act. Page 4, lines 6–18. The bill provides that its prohibitions are subject to certain exceptions, including where "[t]he intrastate sale, offer for sale, purchase, Testimony of the Department of the Attorney General Twenty-Eighth Legislature, 2016 Page 2 of 3

trade, or barter of the covered animal species part or product is expressly authorized by federal law or permit." Page 7, lines 6–9. The bill provides for criminal penalties for violations.

First, there is a possibility that the bill could be subject to challenge on the grounds that it is preempted by the MMPA to the extent that it attempts to prohibit commercial transactions of marine mammal parts or products. Among other things, the MMPA prohibits any person from transporting, purchasing, selling, exporting, or offering to purchase, sell, or export any marine mammal or marine mammal product taken in violation of the MMPA or for any purpose other than public display, scientific research, or enhancing the survival of a species or stock, except as otherwise provided in the MMPA. 16 U.S.C. § 1372(a)(4).

The MMPA provides that no state may enforce, or attempt to enforce, any state law or regulation relating to the taking of any species of marine mammal within the state unless federal management authority has been transferred to that state. 16 U.S.C. § 1379(a). The MMPA is interpreted broadly to preempt state laws. *See UFO Chuting of Haw., Inc. v. Young*, 327 F. Supp. 2d 1220 (D. Haw. 2004), *vacated on other grounds*, 380 F. Supp. 2d 1166 (D. Haw. 2005); *People of Togiak v. United States*, 470 F. Supp. 423 (D.D.C. 1979). One federal district court struck down a state statute barring the commercial import of seals on the grounds that it was preempted by the MMPA. *Fouke Co. v. Mandel*, 386 F. Supp. 1341 (D. Md. 1974).

The preemptive effect of the MMPA is not well developed in federal case law. Nevertheless, the field is already highly regulated by the federal government, and state regulation of commercial transactions involving marine-mammal products could be subject to a potential federal challenge. We recommend deleting prohibitions relating to marine-mammal species, which, in the bill, are the monk seal, narwhal, whale, and walrus. Page 4, lines 10–12.

We are aware that this committee amended the companion to this bill, H.B. No. 2502, to provide for the prohibition on the sale, offering to sell, purchase, trade, barter, or distribution of parts or products of marine species, including marine mammals, "[u]nless otherwise authorized by the federal Marine Mammal Protection Act, 16 United States Code Chapter 31[.]" H.B. No. 2502, H.D. 2, page 4, lines 13–14. This is potentially a viable alternative to the one we propose. However, we believe that deleting prohibitions relating to marine-mammal species is the better option because courts have interpreted the MMPA's preemptive effect broadly. Furthermore, we

believe the marine mammals listed in this bill are protected because federal law already largely prohibits the objectionable activities.

Second, we recommend that the exception to the prohibitions of the bill where the "intrastate sale, offer for sale, purchase, trade, or barter of the covered species part or product is expressly authorized by federal law or permit" should be broadened by deleting the word "intrastate." Page 7, lines 6–9. Under the Endangered Species Act, a state law or regulation that applies with respect to the importation or exportation of an endangered or threatened species is void to the extent it may prohibit what is authorized pursuant to an exemption or permit. 16 U.S.C. § 1535(f). Here, while the exception in the bill is limited to intrastate commercial transactions, the rest of the bill is not. To ensure that all federally authorized activities are excepted from the prohibitions of the bill, we recommend that the word "intrastate" be deleted. Page 7, line 6.

The recommended changes herein should minimize potential legal challenges. Thank you for the opportunity to provide this testimony.

Dear Chairman Rhoads:

On behalf of the Hawaii members of the National Rifle Association, I oppose Senate Bill 2647. This bill would do nothing to promote its purported goal of addressing poaching and the illegal ivory trade, while it would impose a heavy burden on law-abiding citizens.

Illegal trade in wildlife, as well as poaching for meat and products such as horns and tusks, takes its toll on the health and viability of wildlife populations. Further, it undermines the tremendous sustainability achievements made possible by hunters and other wildlife conservationists in the United States and other parts of the world. The NRA applauds serious efforts to stop poaching and the illegal ivory trade, but SB 2647 would not materially contribute to that goal.

This bill would, however, harm those who have no part in these activities. American collectors, sportsmen, hunters, and recreational shooters have legally purchased firearms that incorporate ivory features for decades. These include some of America's most historically-significant and collectible guns. While this bill contains some limited exceptions, it still unfairly targets individuals who acquired ivory in compliance with the law at the time. By randomly setting a limit on the volume of ivory incorporated in a gun, knife or object, it would impose arbitrary distinctions on people who had acted similarly under former interpretations of the law. For example, if a person had a shotgun with an ivory bead sight, he or she would be able to sell it because of the small size of the bead. However, if another person had a handgun with ivory grips, he or she may not be able to sell it—depending on the size of the handgun—because of the twenty percent limitation. This would be true even if both persons had obtained their guns from the same dealer, on the same day, with the same understanding of then-controlling law. Moreover, as a practical matter, accurately measuring the "volume" of a complex mechanical

object such as a firearm—or of small, non-removable ivory components such as inlaid decorations—would be a daunting task.

Historically, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service maintained the position that most ivory in the U.S. has been legally imported and that its sale in the U.S. did not materially contribute to the illegal ivory trade. Nevertheless, under SB 2647 the trade, sale, purchase and barter of any ivory (defined to include mammoth ivory), ivory product, rhinoceros horn product and many other species would be prohibited. The NRA is opposed to SB 2647 because, if implemented, it would amount to the taking of property that had been acquired legally and in good faith. Needless to say, property that cannot be sold is radically diminished in value.

While the NRA stands in opposition to the illegal ivory trade and poaching, banning the trade and sale of legally owned, pre-ban ivory will not save one elephant (much less mammoths, ivory from which is covered in the bill, even though the creatures themselves are long extinct). The NRA is receptive to measures that directly target the illegal ivory trade and poaching. We do not, however, support symbolic measures that do little more than move the goalposts for law-abiding citizens and deprive them of the value of property that was originally obtained legally and in good faith.

Thank you for your consideration and I ask that you oppose this bill.

#### Re: HB2502 HDI / HB2502 and SB2647 SDI

I am writing to ask that HB2502 HDI / HB2502 and SB2647 SDI be amended to allow Lahaina Scrimshaw and other small businesses to continue to use fossilized ivory. In concept, the bills are being promoted to protect animals, but the reality of what they will accomplish is totally different. In its present form, HB2502 HDI / HB2502 and SB2647 SDI will be a disaster for people like me who have made their living in the field of scrimshaw. Politicians are always talking about helping small businesses; now is the time to prove it by supporting us and preventing this bill from going forward.

Scrimshaw has been a part of Hawaii's culture since the first whalers landed here in the 18th century. Lahaina Scrimshaw has been an iconic part of Lahaina's Front Street community since 1979 and currently employs 18 people. I have been fortunate to work for them since 1981, and am now the Production Manager/Craftsman. Tourists from all over the world visit our store, returning year after year, and they have become part of our Ohana.

Scrimshaw originally started with the whaler's carving whale teeth. In present day, the art form at Lahaina Scrimshaw has evolved to utilize prehistoric mammoth and mastodon ivory, as well as fossilized walrus ivory. Using prehistoric and fossilized material **does not threaten any living animal**. Fossilized ivory has been in the ground for hundreds to thousands of years. It has a unique look and character all its own. The thought that this material cannot be distinguished from elephant ivory is absolutely incorrect.

The only elephant ivory we currently use are <u>antique</u> piano keys, which we repurpose, and <u>antique</u> billiard and snooker balls. Antique ivory is at least 100 years old. I can understand outlawing all elephant if that's what people want, but the fossilized ivory should be exempt from any of these laws. There is no rational reason to include this material. It will not save one elephant. The only way to stop the poaching of elephants is to get China to stop utilizing elephant ivory. That is where the illegal ivory is being trafficked. The US Fish and Wildlife themselves have said that in the United States there is no significant trafficking of elephant ivory.

I understand the rush to pass this legislation is just to appease the groups involved with the World Conservation Congress, hosted by Hawaii in September 2016. This "feel good" legislation is not going to save one elephant. If all the money that is going to salaries and travel for these protection groups were spent on helping the people in Africa protect and maintain their elephant populations (which, by the way, are quite healthy in some countries), it would do a lot more good than closing small businesses in America. The individuals attending this convention will be gone in a few weeks, but the people here in Hawaii, who have voted you into office, will be left to pick-up the pieces of their lives ruined by this legislation.

If you feel this bill must go forward then at the very least I humbly ask that it be amended to take effect no sooner than 2030. This would at least give me and all the artists that work for us a chance to finish our careers and retire with dignity. This legislation does not only affect us; other small businesses will also be negatively impacted, such as the framer we do business with, the suppliers of equipment and materials that we purchase

from, thousands of collectors whose investments will be deemed worthless, as well as the knife makers and gun makers who use fossilized ivory as adornment.

I have been a taxpayer and active voter in the State of Hawaii since 1981. I should not have to look for a new career at the age of 60. With a few exceptions all the people in the scrimshaw field are close to retirement. Is this how America treats its people? I completely agree that protecting wildlife is a worthwhile endeavor, but passing HB2502 HDI / HB2502 and SB2647 SDI in its present form is not the way to go about it. <u>Please let us</u> continue to use the fossilized ivory. It is the right thing to do.

Dear Representatives, and members of the Committee,

On behalf of our 2,800 Hawaiian members and supporters, the International Fund for Animal Welfare (IFAW) submits this letter in support of SB 2647, SD1, HD1, which would restrict trafficking in a wide range of endangered species.

As stated in Section 1 of this bill, animals around the world are facing a crisis driven by increasing consumer demand for their parts and products. IFAW has long been at the leading edge of this issue, including our groundbreaking investigations into Chinese ivory markets (2008), internet sales of illegal wildlife (2008, 2012, and 2015), the links between national security and poaching (2008 and 2013), and an analysis of the United States' ivory markets and related regulatory systems (2014). This year (2016) we partnered with the Wildlife Conservation Society, Vulcan Inc., the Natural Resources Defense Council and the Humane Society International on a market survey of Hawai'i's online ivory trade of ivory. Over the course of this six-day investigation, we found approximately \$1.2 million worth of ivory and related wildlife products for sale in Hawai'i, with the vast majority of retailers (46 out of 47) failing to provide documentation that would indicate these sales are legal under federal law. The surprising number of products we cataloged (more than 4,600) signal a troubling persistence of consumer demand and market availability.

In all of these studies we have found overwhelming evidence that the legal trade in wildlife products helps to obscure and propagate a parallel market in illicit products. Interpol, the international police agency, estimates that customs officers only interdict 10% of smuggled goods. Given the large volume of trade through Hawai'i's ports and other points of entry and egress, it is likely that significant quantities of illegal wildlife products pass through border inspections undetected, to be sold openly under cover of assumed legality. (Contrary to what some retailers have said over the course of this debate, it is extremely difficult to determine the age of an ivory carving without thorough forensic analysis.)

We are currently working to support and strengthen the United States Fish & Wildlife Service's efforts to restrict domestic commerce in endangered wildlife parts, and we welcome Hawai'i's complementary efforts to enact state-level protections through SB 2647. In the event of this measure's passage, we look forward to partnering with you and with the Department of Land and Natural Resources to implement a comprehensive consumer education and awareness program, in order to alleviate any burden on state resources.

Fortunately, Hawai'i is not alone in its determination to enact state conservation measures: New York and New Jersey passed bills to regulate ivory and rhino horn trade in 2014, California passed a similar ban in 2015, and Washington State voters overwhelmingly approved a ballot initiative to restrict commerce in a broad suite of threatened and endangered species (also in 2015). Numerous other states have bills currently moving through their legislatures, and passing SB 2647 would set a tremendous example for these lawmakers, as well as giving Hawai'i the distinction of helping to change the global conversation on this critical issue.

The timing could not be better for this bill, considering the upcoming IUCN World Conservation Congress in Hawai'i later this year. IFAW, along with several other conservation groups, is hosting a panel on pangolins – one of the species that would be protected by SB 2647– at this important event. We will be bringing in pangolin experts from around the world, and we are also in discussions to cohost a pangolin-themed reception with a government member of IUCN. Lastly, IFAW is working with the coalition on a motion for a resolution on pangolin conservation that would be voted on at the Congress. Overall, SB 2647 would send an clear signal to the conservation community that Hawai'i is a valuable partner in the fight against wildlife trafficking.

IFAW believes the world is a better place when we protect our fellow creatures. By banning the sale of endangered wildlife products in Hawai'i, you can send the message to poachers, traffickers, and consumers that we value our world's creatures more than needless trinkets and ornaments. Stopping this bloody trade will reap benefits for wildlife, international security, aid anti-corruption efforts, enable more effective use of law enforcement funding here and abroad, and give our descendants the chance to share this planet with some of the planet's truly most majestic creatures.

Thank you for your attention to this important matter.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in support of SB 2647 SD 1 HD 1, a bill that takes direct aim at wildlife trafficking and the toll it takes on charismatic animals across the globe. The Wildlife Conservation Society (WCS) urges the Committee's strong support of this bill. SB 2647 SD 1 HD 1 has the potential to put in place strong trade protections for elephants, rhinos, tigers, orangutans, sea turtles and several other endangered wildlife species threatened by the burgeoning and lucrative illegal wildlife trade. In addition, as the host of the upcoming IUCN World Conservation Congress in September, Hawai'i has a unique opportunity while the world is watching to take a stand against the illegal wildlife trade and serve as a model for other key consumer countries to follow.

As one of the world's most lucrative criminal activities, the estimated \$8 to \$10 billion illegal wildlife trade ranks fourth globally in terms of value, behind the trafficking in drugs, people, and arms. Wildlife trafficking is a serious crime conducted by organized criminal syndicates, some with links to terrorist networks, that threaten some of our most iconic species with extinction. It is essential to put protections in place to ensure that the U.S. and the international community can continue to fight against trafficking to protect the remaining elephants, rhinos, tigers and other endangered species.

In the 2014 National Strategy for Combating Wildlife Trafficking, President Obama clearly outlines that reducing demand for wildlife products will be crucial in making strides against the illegal wildlife trade. He states that poachers will continue to slaughter and traffic wildlife as long as there are high potential profits and low deterrence to the crimes. The National Strategy further points out that the U.S. plays a major role in the world's markets for both legal and illegal wildlife. Within this context, Hawai'i must pass strong legislation to end wildlife trafficking and deter continued poaching.

One example of the toll taken by this devastating trade is the African Elephant. The African elephant (*Loxodonta africana*) is the largest land animal extant in the world today, and a critical part of our natural heritage. African elephants also act as ecosystem

engineers, opening pathways through the landscape, maintaining mineral-rich clearings on which gorillas and many other species depend, and maintaining the diversity of the plant community by their browsing and seed dispersal activities. In addition, they are a major part of the tourist draw to many countries in Africa, so are important for local economies and jobs.

Yet African elephants are being killed illegally at an enormous rate for their ivory. All international commercial trade in ivory has been illegal since 1989, when the African elephant was transferred from Appendix II to Appendix I under the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES). African elephants are also protected in the U.S. under the Endangered Species Act and the African Elephant Conservation Act.

Following the 1989 CITES ban, illegal killing of elephants declined and populations started to recover. In recent years, however, illegal killing and ivory trade have increased dramatically due to the rise in disposable income in East Asia, coupled with increasing global economic and transportation links, and the involvement of highly armed and organized criminal syndicates.

In 2012, some 35,000 African elephants were killed, an average of 96 elephants per day, representing the worst mass slaughter of elephants in any year since the 1989 international ban. African forest elephants (L. a. cyclotis) in particular have been devastated by poaching and have declined by about 65 percent since 2002 according to our scientists. At this rate, African forest elephants could effectively be extinct over the next 10 to 15 years.

A major challenge to halting the illegal wildlife trade and thereby the slaughter of elephants and other species is the lack of effective law enforcement controls along the trade chain from range countries through transit countries, and to the end consumer markets. Furthermore, only 10% of illegal wildlife products are seized at a country's borders. In the case of ivory, once it is inside those borders, it becomes nearly impossible to distinguish from legal ivory, especially worked ivory such as jewelry and trinkets which comprise a significant portion of the illegal ivory trade. In addition, it is extremely difficult for consumers, sellers and often law enforcement officials to visually distinguish elephant ivory from other species of ivory such as mammoth.

Within the U.S., research has shown Hawai'i to have one of the top three markets for ivory along with New York and California. While the new U.S. federal ivory ban makes it illegal to import, export and trade ivory between states with only a few exceptions, state level bans are still essential to stop the ivory trade at the point of retail sale within a state. During the last two years, New York and California passed strong ivory bans, leaving Hawai'i as the largest remaining market for ivory in the U.S. As many of our iconic species face devastating declines, Hawai'i residents and Americans are looking to the actions of this legislature to take a stand and conserve these species. Through SB 2647 SD 1 HD 1, Hawai'i has the opportunity to close the U.S.'s largest remaining ivory market and take a meaningful stand against the illegal wildlife trade while the world is watching.

Knife Rights represents America's millions of knife owners, knifemakers, scrimshaw artists, knife retailers and suppliers to knifemakers and scrimshaw artists, many of whom are your Hawaiian constituents and residents and many of whom own legally acquired ivory and Mammoth ivory or knives with components made of these materials. And, as it turns out, many also own a wide range of other items that include ivory, and so we represent these members' interests as well.

We want to alert you that the proposed, SB 2647, will not save a single living endangered or threatened animal and will have a severe negative financial impact on many of your law-abiding citizens who own items originally crafted with parts from these animals and lawfully imported and purchased. SB 2647 is simply a radical anti-hunting measure masquerading as a wildlife conservation measure. SB 2467 is the worst kind of emotionally-driven "Feel Good – Do Bad" legislation that will only hurt Hawaiians with no benefit to the endangered and threatened animals.

Knife Rights and all those we represent abhor the poaching and illegal trade of endangered and threatened species and we support science-based wildlife conservation efforts, including managed hunting, that have proven successful in posting significant gains in the majority of endangered and threatened species populations over the past few decades. For example, while elephants and rhinos are threatened in some parts of Africa, where managed hunting has been allowed the populations have flourished. We unequivocally support practical and lawful efforts to defend endangered and threatened species in the field as well as lawful enforcement activities that directly target illegal black-market trade in endangered and threatened species. SB 2647 accomplishes none of these effective and proven objectives.

While this bill would not directly prohibit hunts in Africa that are legal under international, federal and individual African country law, it would criminalize hunters returning to Hawaii with legal trophies. Worse, it steals millions of dollars in value from thousands who have previously hunted and their heirs who possess trophies from a legal hunt and hundreds of thousands more Hawaiians who own lawfully imported and purchased items produced from parts of these endangered and threatened animals and which were legally imported, typically decades ago.

This bill also bans trade in 10,000-year-old Mammoth Ivory, which just goes to show how absurd it is. Tons of Mammoth Ivory is collected every year by Native Americans in Alaska along the riverbanks and on the beaches, where the tusks fall out of the banks due to erosion. This Mammoth Ivory is one of their few sources of income. In addition, gold miners find tusks in their pursuit of gold in Alaska. No archeological sites are disturbed or "robbed." This natural material becomes exposed by nature and mining and if it is not collected it cracks, deteriorates and crumbles into gravel and soil within a few years and is lost forever. The only way to preserve this precious prehistoric material is to allow it to be collected, bought and sold. It is easily distinguishable from elephant ivory and is legal to ship all over the world.

This nation was founded on a respect for its citizen's rights, from the Declaration of Independence through the Constitution and our Bill of Rights and more than two centuries of legal precedent. The core nature of this country is that we are a country of laws, that even the unpopular have rights to be respected and that, above all, we defend individual rights and individual property rights.

However, SB 6247 ignores our widely acknowledged body of law, unfairly and unconstitutionally persecuting honest and law-abiding owners of products made from the parts of these animals who would find their investment in legally acquired objects "taken" by government edict and made worthless, their livelihood stolen from them in some cases.

This effective "taking" of the heretofore legal private property of potentially tens of thousands, if not hundreds of thousands of Hawaiians is a clear violation of the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. It is also an offense to longstanding American rights, freedoms and values of fairness and equity. Ultimately the adverse impact on Hawaii citizens and residents will be in the *millions of dollars and the state of Hawaii stands to lose millions of dollars more in lost commerce, taxes, and enforcement expense* for no appreciable positive impact on the real problem, poaching and the illegal black market trade in threatened and endangered animals.

This proposed ivory ban would also disproportionately affect Hawaii's elderly, many of them veterans, who are the original owners of much of the hundreds of thousands of tons of legal pre-ban ivory in the U.S. that was initially brought into the country in the 1950s through the 1970s. It is this decades-old ivory that forms the basis for the legal trade in ivory in the U.S. Many of these older Americans turn to their investment in ivory, in its many forms, to help sustain them in their twilight years and provide a cushion for emergencies. Robbing these elderly citizens, many of whom fought for their country and its freedoms, and often bear the scars from that service, of their lifelong investment, to no good end, is particularly unjust.

There is not a shred of factual evidence to suggest that punishing Hawaiians for their investment in perfectly legal decades-old objects made from these animals will have one iota of influence on the black market. It goes against all human experience to believe that this effort will do anything but adversely affect law-abiding Hawaiians and Hawaii.

This misguided ban is ill-conceived, offensive and most likely unconstitutional. Knife Rights urges you to vote against SB 2647.

On behalf of our 2.4 million members and activists, including more than 2,360 in Hawaii, we are writing to urge you to support Senate bill 2647 HD 1.

The international trade in wildlife is a powerful political and economic force that has driven many species to the brink of extinction and some to disappear forever.<sup>1</sup> The rarer a species becomes, the more people desire it.<sup>2</sup> This is exactly what has happened with elephant ivory and rhino horn. As demand for these products has boomed, ivory and rhino horn prices have skyrocketed. As prices have increased, so has poaching, with more than 100,000 elephants killed from 2010 through 2012<sup>3</sup> and 1,116 rhinos killed in 2014 in South Africa.<sup>4</sup>

While the public seems aware of the huge role Chinese demand for elephant ivory has played in elephant poaching, many don't realize that the United States also contributes significantly to this problem.<sup>5</sup> For example, a 2015 survey commissioned by the Natural Resources Defense Council of the Los Angeles and San Francisco ivory markets found that up to 90% of the ivory seen in Los Angeles and up to 80% of the ivory seen in San Francisco was likely illegal.<sup>6</sup>

U.S. laws on elephant ivory facilitate an illegal market in two main ways. First, it is very difficult to determine ivory age.<sup>7</sup> Therefore, sellers often sneak new ivory onto their shelves by staining it, chipping it, and using other means to make it look old.<sup>8</sup> Second, since it is extremely difficult to determine whether ivory is from an elephant or from a legal source of ivory such as a mammoth, sellers often mix legal pieces with illegal pieces in their stores and claim that illegal

elephant ivory actually comes from the legal species instead.<sup>9</sup> The mixing of ivory from illegal species like elephants and legal species like mammoth, along with bone and resin/plastic pieces, is also one of the primary ways smugglers bring poached elephant ivory *into* the United States. The shipments are labeled as "mammoth ivory and bone" or something similar to escape detection. Even the most advanced forensics laboratories have difficulty determining the exact species an ivory item came from.<sup>10</sup>

Hawaii is one of the epicenters of the U.S. ivory market, as the third largest ivory market in the country following New York and California. A 2008 ivory survey of U.S. ivory markets found 23 outlets selling 1,867 ivory items (mainly jewelry) on Oahu.<sup>11</sup> Almost 90% of the ivory items for sale in Hawaii were likely imported illegally or are of unknown origin.<sup>12</sup> Further, Hawaii has what is likely one of the largest – if not *the* largest – online ivory marketplaces in the country, with 4,661 products found in stock or for sale online – valued at more than \$1.22 million – over a six-day period.<sup>13</sup>

SB 2647 HD 1 will drastically curtail Hawaii's ivory market, curbing demand in the state and, in turn, reducing poaching in Africa. Specifically, it will ban the vast majority of commercial transactions involving the listed animals. It contains reasonable exemptions for transfers to heirs and beneficiaries, educational and scientific purposes, employees or agents of the federal or state government undertaking law enforcement activities, traditional cultural practices, and antiques and musical instruments containing a small percentage of ivory. Further, the legislation will eliminate cover for illegal ivory by banning commerce in mammoth.

President Obama recently acknowledged the many problems with federal ivory laws and regulations by making them stronger through a variety of methods. Most recently, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service attempted to close existing loopholes by proposing revisions to the Endangered Species Act 4(d) Rule for the African Elephant.<sup>14</sup> However, the federal government's initiative leaves room for intrastate trade. Therefore, states must compliment the federal government's efforts by enacting their own bans, as New York, New Jersey, and California have done by signing ivory and rhino horn ban legislation into law.<sup>15</sup>

On behalf of Born Free USA, a national nonprofit animal protection and wildlife conservation organization based in Washington, DC and the Born Free Foundation, headquartered in the UK, I would like to express my firm support for Senate Bill SB 2647 to ban the sale, offer to sell, purchase, trade, possession with intent to sell, or barter of any part or product from various animal and marine species in the state of Hawaii.

As you are aware, the elephant poaching crisis has become increasingly severe over the past several years. Approximately 96 elephants are slaughtered daily by poachers, and over 100,000 were killed between 2010-2012. Unfortunately, the U.S. is the second largest ivory market in the world, so there is a desperate and urgent need for legislative measures such as this one. New York, California, and Hawaii are our country's largest markets for ivory. New York banned the sale and trade of ivory and rhino horn in 2014 and California recently enacted a ban.

Additionally, all five rhino species are in serious danger due to poaching. Africa's rhinos are critically endangered, with a population of fewer than 5,000. There are only 3,000 one-horned rhinos remaining in India and Nepal, and Southeast Asia's Sumatran and Javan rhinos number only in the hundreds and tens, respectively. The horns, made of a substance akin to fingernails, are used in Traditional Chinese Medicine. Despite conclusive evidence that they have no curative properties, over a thousand rhinos are killed for their horns every year.

Contrary to popular belief, the most heavily illegally-traded mammal in the world is not the elephant or the rhino, but the pangolin. In the past decade, more than one million pangolins were reportedly illegally caught in the wild. While most illegally traded pangolins are destined for China and Vietnam, the U.S. is a significant importer. Records show almost 27,000 pangolins were imported into the U.S. between 2004 and 2013. Of these, 99.9% were seized.

Ending the illegal trade in wildlife parts is a core mission of Born Free USA, and I applaud the compassionate measures in SB 2647. This bill is a crucial step toward managing the growing trade in illegally trafficked wildlife products in the United States. I am hopeful that this legislation will receive overwhelming support because time is running out to save these magnificent animals.

The DSWT is pleased to hear that the bill to prohibit the sale, purchase and trade of animal parts from a variety of species, including elephants, rhinos, tigers and whales is currently under discussion.

#### Up to 40,000 elephants, on average, are killed every year.

That equates to one every 15 minutes and 96 elephants per day. If that rate were to apply continuously, it would render the species extinct within 10 years.

The passage of this bill, will help to protect elephants like tiny Barsilinga (pictured right), who at only two weeks old, was found at the side of his mother who had endured fatal gun shots to her chest

and legs. Her tragic death is a grisly reminder of the suffering attached to each piece of ivory that is sold and bought. Her end was a painful one, full of suffering, and her calf would have been a victim too had he not been one of the lucky few rescued by the David Sheldrick Wildlife Trust.

Today, the United States remains the second largest market for ivory. The ivory trafficking crisis is a complex



problem and one which requires action on multiple levels to stem the slaughter of elephants in the wild, which is why we are encouraged to witness such positive action in New Jersey, New York, Washington and California.

#### RE: STRONG SUPPORT of SB2647 SD1 HD1, relating to natural resources

Humane Society International (HSI) and The Humane Society of the United States urge the Committees' strong support of SB2647 SD1 HD1, which would protect critically imperiled species from wildlife trafficking by prohibiting the sale, offer to sell, purchase, trade, barter for, or distribute the part or product of covered animal species. The covered animal species include elephant, rhinoceros, tiger, great ape, hippopotamus, tiger, lion, cheetah, jaguar, leopard, pangolin, monk seal, shark, ray, sea turtle, narwhal, whale or walrus.

This measure is part of a growing national and global momentum to save iconic and beloved species from poaching, animal cruelty and the threat of extinction. It presents Hawaii with a unique opportunity to join the international community's collective response to combat wildlife trafficking.

\The United States is among the world's top markets for wildlife goods. In July 2013 President Obama issued an Executive Order that designated wildlife trafficking as a matter of national security concern and subsequently released a National Strategy, elevating the United States efforts and conservation leadership to address this urgent crisis. Several states, including New York, New Jersey and California have enacted laws prohibiting the sale of ivory and rhino horns. Voters in Washington State overwhelmingly approved a ballot measure last November to prohibit the sale of numerous endangered species parts and products, similar to SB2647. As the preamble of the legislation states, most recently in September 2015 President Obama and China's President Xi Jinping announced that the two countries are committed to enacting a nearly total ban on ivory import and export with a shared goal to halt the domestic commercial trade of ivory.

In July 2015 the United Nations General Assembly unanimously adopted a resolution on tackling illicit trafficking in wildlife. The 22nd Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation's (APEC) Leader Declaration in 2014 commits the APEC economies to increased efforts and steps to curtail supply of and demand for illegally traded wildlife and international cooperation on combating wildlife trafficking.

Trafficking in ivory, rhino horn, and other illegal wildlife products has become a very lucrative trade that fuels the poaching of many protected wildlife species and creates insecurity for both people and wildlife in many remote vulnerable areas. The same study also found that close to 89 percent of ivory items for sale in Hawaii could be of illegal or of unknown origin. Several recent market surveys continued to find a significant amount of illegal ivory or ivory without proper documentation for sale in Hawaii's marketplaces. Last year five Hawaiian residents associated with a jewelry store was indicted for over 20 counts illegal activities involving transnational wildlife trafficking. This is the latest evidence that Hawaii is a hotbed for the illegal wildlife trade.

This legislature has shown commendable leadership in stemming the ivory trade. In 2013, S.C.R.149 unanimously passed the Hawaii legislature, asking Hawaii residents and businesses not to buy or sell ivory of unknown origin. In 2014 and 2015, legislation prohibiting the sale of ivory and rhino horns received tremendous support in both chambers. An opinion survey conducted in January 2016 found that 85 percent of Hawaii residents support legislation prohibiting ivory and rhino horn sales.

Federal regulations and laws restrict largely the importation or interstate trade of products from endangered species, but they do not regulate intrastate sales. The patchwork of federal laws and regulations creates the potential for loopholes. In addition, federal implementation and

enforcement are limited due to a lack of sufficient resources. State measures are critical to complement the federal law for the protection of endangered animals and national security. As the endangered species capital, Hawaii already has felt the pain of losing iconic and endemic species right at home. With SB2647 Hawaii can help species from going extinct. This September Hawaii will be hosting the IUCN Conservation Congress, the first time the Congress is ever held in the United States. Heads of states and tens of thousands of the world's leading animal protection and conservation leaders will gather here to discuss the most pertinent conservation challenges. SB2647 is Hawaii's opportunity to showcase its proud tradition and legacy of wildlife conservation on the world stage.

The Humane Society of the United States urges the Committee's strong support of SB2647 which would protect critically imperiled species from wildlife trafficking by prohibiting the sale of any part or product of specific animal species, including elephants and rhinos.

Hawaii has a critical role to play in saving these imperiled animals as demonstrated by recent research regarding Hawaii's lucrative online sales market for ivory. In addition, according to a 2008 study, Hawaii was the nation's third largest market for ivory, after New York and California. Both states have shut down their in-state market for ivory in 2014 and 2015 respectively. The same study also found that close to 89 percent of ivory items for sale in Hawaii could be of illegal or of unknown origin. Several recent market surveys continued to find a significant amount of illegal ivory, and without proper documentation, for sale in Hawaii's marketplaces.

The Hawaii legislature has shown commendable leadership in attempting to stem the ivory trade. In 2013, S.C.R.149 unanimously passed the Hawaii legislature, asking Hawaii residents and businesses not to buy or sell ivory of unknown origin. In 2014, Hawaii was the first state in the nation to introduce legislation to end the ivory trade, and although that measure failed to pass its final committee. **Most recently, an opinion poll conducted in January 2016 found that 85 percent of Hawaii residents** polled support legislation prohibiting ivory and rhino horn sales.

Trafficking in ivory, rhino horn, and other illegal wildlife products has become a very lucrative trade that fuels the poaching of many protected wildlife species and creates insecurity for both people and wildlife in many remote vulnerable areas. At \$8-10 billion per year, the illegal wildlife trade ranks as the fourth most lucrative international criminal activity, behind narcotics, counterfeiting, and human trafficking. Aloha Chairpersons and Members,

My name is Tony Hunstiger. I am Secretary and Treasurer of *Nsefu Wildlife Conservation Foundation* and part owner of *Zikomo Safari*, a photo safari eco-hotel in South Luangwa, Zambia. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

I am a resident of Hawaii, having lived and worked here since 1975. <u>I strongly support</u> <u>SB 2647, SD1, HD1.</u> Please, pass this bill into law without amendment.

#### Reasons to Support SB2647 SD1:

- A state law in Hawai'i can stop the extensive black-market <u>intrastate</u> commerce in elephant ivory, rhinoceros horn, and in protected animal species parts.
  - Surveys show Hawai'i is the third largest ivory market in the U.S., and is poised to become the largest now that California, New York, New Jersey and Washington outlawed ivory trade.
  - Hawaii is uniquely poised as a gateway to the Asian markets where ivory, rhino horn, pangolin scales, and shark fin are prized.
  - Studies show nearly 90% of ivory for sale in Hawaii does not have documentation required by Federal law. Trade in legal ivory acts as a cover for the trade in illegal ivory. Law enforcement officers lack the expertise to tell the difference.

It bans the large and thriving black market ivory trade in Hawaii that fuels the demand for ivory. When the buying stops the killing can end.

<u>A BRIEF HISTORY</u>: In the <u>1980s the sale of ivory stockpiles exposed elephant</u> <u>conservation to African criminals connected to organized crime in Asia, Europe and</u> <u>America. 70,000 elephants were killed annually</u>. **Only the unequivocal international** <u>BAN agreed upon in 1989 tackled the problem and stopped the illegal killing</u>.

The cause of the current elephant slaughter is a disastrous CITES decision in 2008 that allowed for the sale of stockpiled ivory. In 2008 102 tonnes of ivory was sold to Japan and China from stockpiles in Zimbabwe, South Africa, Namibia and Botswana for US\$15.4 million. The Chinese government immediately marked up the price of ivory by 650% and withheld stocks, drawing up a plan to dribble ivory on to the market, keeping prices high.

In Africa the price for tusks skyrocketed along with poaching levels. At CITES' most intensely monitored site <u>"illegal killing increased markedly after 2008 and was correlated strongly with the local black market price and increased seizures of ivory destined for China."</u>

Legal ivory acts as a laundering mechanism for illegal ivory into an internationally authorized consumer market, a consumer market that blossomed in China along with their booming economy.

It is widely reported that **since the 2008 sale** around <u>20,000-40,000 elephants have</u> <u>been killed annually for their tusks</u>. Hundreds of people have lost their lives with fatherless families of murdered anti-poaching scouts driven into worsening poverty. There has been increased corruption and wildlife tourism has been hard hit. Allowing the sale of ivory in 2008 fueled the current crisis. Now, ivory stockpiles are being destroyed not sold and the trade in ivory is being outlawed.

#### <u>Removing ivory from the marketplace, a total ban, is the only strategy proven to</u> <u>save elephants.</u>

- Driving the largest land mammal on the planet to extinction in order to feed the market for ivory jewelry, statues, netsuke and trinkets is unconscionable. There is no reason to use ivory to produce these items. Piano keys have been made from plastic for decades.
- An average of 96 elephants are killed each day, mostly for ivory. Elephants are being slaughtered faster than they can reproduce. At this rate, elephants will soon be extinct. Without elephants, lions, leopards and other charismatic mammals to view, tourism in Africa will dwindle.

- Blood ivory funds terrorist activities and organized crime. Wildlife trafficking ranks with smuggling guns, drugs and humans as a major source of revenue for criminal organizations. Only about 10% of wildlife traffic is intercepted by law enforcement; a State law will add a much needed level of enforcement.
- Hundreds of wildlife rangers protecting wildlife habitat in Africa are killed in the line of duty. They leave wives and children behind. Without a breadwinner to support the family, impoverished families become prey to human trafficking organizations.
- Animals such as Rhinos, Sharks and Pangolins are killed needlessly to provide quack traditional medicines.
- A recent nationwide poll by HBO Real Sports and Marist Poll showed that 86% of Americans disapprove of big game hunting and 62% favor banning the practice. According to Humane Society International, in the past decade alone, American trophy hunters have killed 5,647 African lions. In 2014 alone, the trophies of roughly 85% of captive lions from South Africa's notorious canned hunting facilities were imported to the United States. There are more statues of lions than lions in the wild.

Trophy hunting is decimating wildlife populations across the globe. <u>SB 2647, SD1,</u> <u>HD1</u> will prevent the trafficking in the grizzly products of trophy hunting. Preventing wildlife trafficking can stop the hunting of rare and endangered species, as the animal parts, the trophies, will be illegal.

I travel to Africa. I see the magnificence of its wild places and of its wildlife. As part owner of a wildlife photography and wildlife viewing eco hotel in Zambia, I strive to educate and empower people so that they will work to preserve the world's wilderness and wildlife for future generations. The planet belongs to each of us. We must stand up to and stop those who would rob us of its treasures.

Thank you, for the opportunity to testify. I urge you to, please, protect and preserve endangered animals for future generations. Pass <u>SB 2647, SD1, HD1</u> into law.

Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair San Buenaventura, and Members of the Committee:

I am grateful for the opportunity to testify before you today on behalf of Vulcan, Inc. and one of our nation's most determined philanthropists and conservationists, Paul G. Allen.

At Vulcan, by marrying our technology development and storytelling capabilities with our impact-driven philanthropy, we are working to address the current threat of wildlife trafficking, while collecting data that will inform long term strategies to protect endangered species and ensure stable or thriving generations of wild animals.

I commend Speaker Souki, Chair Rhoads and lawmakers from both chambers who have carefully crafted SB 2647 in a manner that has allowed it to garner such broad support.

This measure targets the brutal wildlife trafficking trade, led by organized crime syndicates around the globe. The trafficking of animal parts, estimated to approach \$10 billion annually, does grave harm to some of the most charismatic wildlife species on our planet. In most cases, the animals that are targeted by criminal wildlife poachers are among our most cherished and endangered species. From a scientific perspective, we know that the extinction of entire species is harmful to the cycle of life and our fragile ecosystems. From a moral perspective, it is simply wrong for mankind to permit the willful extermination of entire species of animals from our planet forever.

Fortunately, elected leaders serving in this legislature are well on their way to signaling to the world that the state of Hawaii will not tolerate criminal activities that--if left unchecked--will lead

to the extinction of the many wildlife species that we treasure and seek to protect: rhinos, elephants and tigers, to name a few.

While most Hawaiian merchants have little interest in profiting from the illegal wildlife trade, a recent study conducted by four international conservation groups and funded by Vulcan, revealed a startlingly large volume of endangered animal parts being sold very overtly within the state.

According to the report, over a timespan of only six days in late 2015, investigators were able to identify 1,862 advertisements for wildlife products. A total of 4,661 products containing these endangered animal parts, valued at over \$1.2 million, were available for purchase from 47 Hawaii-based retailers and individual sellers. The figures provided in this report are conservative estimates, as many of the products aren't advertised and many more were posted online for sale without a specified price.

There is no question that Hawaii remains one of the top markets for products made with these illegal animal parts.

This legislation could not come at a more opportune time, especially as Hawaii prepares to host this fall's IUCN World Conservation Congress. As the state prepares to step into the international spotlight, passage of SB 2647 will signal Hawaii's leadership in combatting the illegal wildlife trade—a trade that mirrors the shameful trafficking of drugs, arms and people.

In light of the upcoming international gathering, we urge the committee to not delay in making this measure effective as soon as possible, if not upon enactment, certainly by the end of 2016. There is a great deal of work to be done to begin the enforcement of this new potential law. Postponing the crackdown on illegal trading serves only to permit criminal poachers and traffickers to continue their lucrative and harmful activity.

We encourage you to join with other states that have enacted similar laws and accelerate the end of these dangerous poaching operations.

In Washington state, Vulcan was the proud leader of Initiative 1401, a first-of-its-kind multi species law, which was put before voters in November 2015. Initiative 1401 banned the sale or purchase of products made from endangered species of elephants, rhinos, lions, tigers, cheetahs, leopards, pangolins, marine turtles, sharks, and rays. This common sense law is consistent with existing federal and Washington state statutes, and provides reasonable exemptions for bona fide antiques, inheritances, scientific or educational purposes, and musical instruments.

SB 2647 would accomplish the same goal in a similar manner, and will be significant in cracking down on the availability of wildlife products being sold in Hawaii. However, the language in SB

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2647 S.D. 1 H.D. 2 should be amended to further clarify and strengthen the bill. I respectfully request the following changes:

• On page 10, line 1, amend the language as follows:

SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect upon its approval; provided that there shall be no enforcement actions pursuant to this Act until December 31, 2017<u>6</u>.

On behalf of Paul Allen and the scientists, researchers and innovators at Vulcan, I express our gratitude for your leadership in carefully and thoughtfully shepherding this critical legislation into law.

Aloha. Global March for Elephants and Rhinos (GMFER) and March for Elephants (MFE) support SB 2647 SD1 HD1. GMFER is an organization that has affiliates in 130 individual cities around the world. These cities have participated in annual global marches which have been cited by experts as key to the global consensus against illegal wildlife trafficking. Earlier this year, the marches were singled out by U.S. Department of State's news platform, ShareAmerica, as one of the three big wins for elephants of 2015. They said, "According to experts, these marches keep political pressure on leaders to protect the world's largest land animal. March for Elephants - San Francisco, is an affiliate of GMFER.

Currently, Hawaii is the 3<sup>rd</sup> largest trader of ivory in the United States. The people are looking to Hawaii to pass a ban on the trade of ivory so that Hawaii will not become the largest ivory market in the nation. Now that New York and California, currently 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> largest traders of ivory in the United States have passed ivory and rhino horn bans, it is possible that Hawaii will become the largest hub for this trade. One elephant is killed every 15 minutes. Approximately 96 elephants are killed each day to make useless trinkets and statues. In addition to these senseless deaths, many rangers who are protecting elephants, rhinos and other wildlife are killed as well. Keith Swindle, a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service employee with the Division of Law Enforcement in Honolulu has stated that 130 rangers have been killed by poachers in Virunga National Park in the Democratic Republic of Congo in the past several years. This number represents more deaths than the sum of all United States Fish and Wildlife Service rangers and special service agents who have died while in service in the history of our country. Illegal wildlife trafficking is the 4<sup>th</sup> largest criminal activity after drugs, arms and human trafficking. Ivory and rhino horn trade have been directly linked to the illegal activity of these criminal syndicates. By passing SB 2647 SD1 HD1, Hawaii will become a role model for other states to pass similar bans and together, help end the horrific poaching of these endangered and magnificent beings. Unless action is taken now, we will lose these intelligent and emotionally sentient creatures forever. We urge you to pass SB 2647 SD1 HD1.

RE: Comments on SB 2647 HD1; Ivory Sales Prohibitions

These comments are submitted on behalf of WildAid, a registered US 501c3 charitable organization, its Board of Directors, and our members. WildAid focuses on addressing consumer demand for products from threatened wildlife, and has been working for the past two years to decrease demand for ivory, primarily in China.

We support measures to implement this law because:

- State legislation is necessary to regulate in-state sales and to give wildlife agents authority to enforce laws outside of federal jurisdiction.
- Any legal trade in ivory can and has extensively enabled laundering of illegal ivory from poached elephants. Without testing in a laboratory, even experts often have a difficult time distinguishing "old", pre-ban ivory from "new", smugg led African ivory. It is also difficult to distinguish one species' ivory from another. Hawaii, as the third highest ivory retailer in the United States has the opportunity to lead the way in elephant conservation and can set a precedent for California and New York by implementing an ivory ban.
- This measure closes an important loophole left by the federal law by excluding any exemptions for the import of trophy-hunted ivory. In the past, trophy hunting has masked illegal activity. Pseudo-hunts, whereby crime syndicates have paid inexperienced hunters or bystanders to obtain rhino horn, have occurred on numerous occasions in South Africa, to the point where the South African government was forced to ban the issuing of permits to Vietnamese nationals.

While we also appreciate the intent of the resolution, the state needs to act for the reasons noted above. We urge the Committees to support SB 2647 HD1, currently under consideration by the Senate.

### Sierra Club of Hawaii Testimony in support of SB 2647 by Dr. Steven Montgomery

Aloha,

My name is Dr. Steven Montgomery. I am a long time member and officer of the Oahu Group, Sierra Club of Hawaii, which has over 12,000 registered members and supporters and whose behalf I am testifying today. I thank you for this opportunity.

The Sierra Club of Hawaii **strongly supports SB 2647** to reduce the deadly cost of ivory trading in our state.

The greatest threat to wild elephant populations is poaching - driven by the demand for ivory products. Of the estimated 400,000 African elephants remaining, an estimated 35,000 are killed by poachers every year. These magnificent animals are on the fast track to extinction.

Hawaii is currently the third largest domestic market for ivory in the United States. But Governor Cuomo of New York signed a tough ivory sales ban into law 18 months ago, and Governor Brown of California did the same just four months ago. So if this bill does not pass, Hawaii will soon claim the shameful distinction of being the biggest ivory market in the nation.

The extent of ivory trading in America makes the US the second largest market in the world, after China.

According to the September 2015 National Geographic article "Tracking Ivory" by Bryan Christy; the NGTV investigation "Warlords of Ivory," broadcast on August 30<sup>th</sup> 2015 and Paul Rauber's article, "Poaching in Africa" published in the July 2013 edition of Sierra, O'ahu possessed the highest number of suspected post- 1989 trade ban items.

These investigators found that one-third of the ivory on sale in the USA appeared to have been recently carved in China, so there can be no doubt: ivory markets in Hawaii fuel African elephant poaching.

The trade in ivory surely belongs in the past, just as sales of whale teeth and shark fins.

In September of this year, Hawaii will host the World Conservation Congress for the International Union for the Conservation of Nature. Held once every four years, the WCC is the major international conservation gathering on the planet. This year it is anticipated that President Obama will give the keynote speech. How embarrassing would it be for this meeting to occur on Oahu at a time when we would be, de facto, the leading ivory market in America? We call on our State leaders to act now, before such embarrassment occurs.

With this bill Hawaii can not only reduce the poaching pressures on elephants, but raise consumer awareness of the incredibly harmful impacts of their purchases. We can also eliminate the significant enforcement challenge posed by the legal ivory trade – as was demonstrated in 2014, when the Sierra Atlantic Chapter helped New York State establish a moratorium on the sale of elephant ivory products.

There is another potential benefit to cutting ivory sales in Honolulu – impacting Islamic terrorist groups. In the aftermath of the deadly 2013 terrorist attack at the Westgate shopping mall in Nairobi, President Uhuru Kenyatta of Kenya revealed that the al-Shabbab terrorist group was receiving a major source of funding from the illegal ivory trade. As reported by the Wall Street Journal on 11 Oct 2013, President Kenyatta said, "Kenya will seek .... a global plan to end a business that endangers our wildlife and bankrolls attacks on our people." He launched a campaign calling for a global moratorium on ivory trading, while investing more in antipoaching measures, noting this illegal trade cannot be curtailed without an offensive against overseas buyers.

Hawaii has helped lead the world in recovering whale populations, it's time now that we team up with global celebrities like the former NBA star Yao Ming, Emeritus Archbishop Desmond Tutu and broadcaster David Attenborough to help stop the killing of African elephants.

In order to save the elephant population for future generations, we need to take action now. Please vote for this bill. Mahalo

To the honorable members of the Hawaiian House of Representatives,

Aloha, my name is Todd Burton, I am known in the surfing community as "Rhino". I am a United States citizen a resident of California.

The SB2647 Bill before you is extremely important on the global level. Worldwide today our planet, the only one in the known universe to foster life, it is home to some 5,000 plant and animal species that are critically endangered and facing extinction today. I'd ask that each of you contemplate what that means, the magnitude of that – these life forms may be lost forever in a universe so vast that it is literally beyond any of our comprehensive of space and time.

This bill does not go far enough but it is a much needed start another step in the right direction, rhinos are also being depleted due to demand in Asia for fictitious medical benefits. No one needs an ivory elephant tusk besides an elephant. No one. To kill one of these majestic creatures for sport or trade is truly a crime, regardless of whether the law establishes that or not. At current poaching and "sport" hunting rates the elephants of Earth cannot be sustained and face extinction in the next 5-10 years. Over 140,000 elephants have been slaughtered for their ivory. One elephant every fifteen (15) minutes is being murdered for ivory. This must stop.

Earth has lost half of its wildlife in the past 40 years, says the World Wildlife Fund <sup>(1)</sup>. This is a legacy, a heritage that we will never recover – it is quite tragic if and when we stop and contemplate this. Sadly, most will not contemplate what is happening, many are totally unaware, caught up in the hustle and bustle of "modern" day life. Humans are responsible for the extinction of 322 documented species in the last 500 years with two thirds (66%) of those extinctions occurring in the last two centuries <sup>(2)</sup>. "For the first time since the dinosaurs disappeared, humans are driving animals and plants to extinction faster than new species can evolve, one of the world's experts on biodiversity has warned. Conservation experts have already signaled that the world is in the grip of the "sixth great extinction" of species, driven by the destruction of natural habitats, hunting, the spread of alien predators and disease, and climate change." <sup>(3)</sup>

This legislation is crucial as Hawaii is a major transportation hub and gateway of Asia. It is crucial because every effort counts in this battle and it is a battle for one species though we are in a war against greed and economic powers to protect all life on Earth.

Over the last three years since I learned of the plight of the rhinos one day while Googling images for a tattoo to commemorate my nickname I discovered the grotesque horror of what is being done to the rhinos and since my

awareness and empathy has been greatly expanded to other life around our world also including human life. Let me offer an excerpt an article written almost eight (8) years ago by Julia Whitty:

"When we hear of extinction, most of us think of the plight of the rhino, tiger, panda or blue whale. But these sad sagas are only small pieces of the extinction puzzle. The overall numbers are terrifying. Of the 40,168 species that the 10,000 scientists in the World Conservation Union have assessed, one in four mammals, one in eight birds, one in three amphibians, one in three conifers and other gymnosperms are at risk of extinction. The peril faced by other classes of organisms is less thoroughly analyzed, but fully 40 per cent of the examined species of planet earth are in danger, including perhaps 51 per cent of reptiles, 52 per cent of insects, and 73 per cent of flowering plants.

By the most conservative measure - based on the last century's recorded extinctions - the current rate of extinction is 100 times the background rate. But the eminent Harvard biologist Edward O Wilson, and other scientists, estimate that the true rate is more like 1,000 to 10,000 times the background rate. The actual annual sum is only an educated guess, because no scientist believes that the tally of life ends at the 1.5 million species already discovered; estimates range as high as 100 million species on earth, with 10 million as the median guess. Bracketed between best- and worst-case scenarios, then, somewhere between 2.7 and 270 species are erased from existence every day. Including today."<sup>(4)</sup>

While todays legislation is focused on protecting the elephants I would submit the following as evident of how much worse things have gotten since 2007 when the article above was written.

In 2007 when the article was written there were thirteen (13) recorded rhinos poached. Since then we have seen the extinction of the Western Black Rhino, a subspecies, in 2013 and a 1,202% increase in recorded rhino poaching into 2014 with 1,215 rhinos poached. In 2015 that number grew by grew by more than 23% in one year to over 1,500 rhinos poached.

So, what we are asking for today is leadership. We are asking for leadership to acknowledge the issue and act to address it. Please go further, please take action pass this Bill today and amend it to include rhino horn as well. What we do to them we do to ourselves.

I have worked for Lahaina Scrimshaw since 1983 and know first hand what is used. The fossilized ivory is not easily confused with elephant tusk since all the different ivories (which there are 7 types) have very distinct features that identify them. And fossiled ivories have mineralization which is warm beiges and golden tones to dark chocolate browns which are only achieved by being buried for hundreds to thousands of years(with mammoth/mastadon ivories being over 10,000 years old). These minerals permeate into the ivories over the many years of burial and can not be duplicated by modern staining which only covers the surface. Having worked for Lahaina Scrimshaw for over 32years I know how many local artist- scrimshaw artist, fish hook carvers, custom ukulele and guitar builders that use the fossilized ivory for inlay, fret boards and nuts- residents of Hawaii would be effected by this Bill- not to mention the effect on the Alaskian Natives that dig for the for the ivory as a source of income. We are talking about a Bill that will effect residents of Hawaii- US citizens and will not have any effect on what goes on in African. We have NOT been allowed to import African Elephant ivory since 1989 (Federal Law). Elephant ivory was never a big part of the scrimshaw indurstry. There are also many collectors of scrimshaw who return to Maui year after year. They have purchased from our shop and our competitors as well. Their collections will be become worthless if this Bill passes. I know collectors that have built their collections over 50 years. Not to mention the pig hunters who use the boar ivory for knife handles and necklace. There is ivory on concert pianos, in vintage jewelry ..... the list could go on and on. Dear Members of the Committee:

I support SB2647, which prohibits the trafficking of protected animal species with exemptions. I am ashamed, frankly, of our state and its failure to do what is clearly *pono*: to help protect these magnificent creatures from human slaughter and virtual extinction.

Let's put the situation closer to home. Humpback whales are federally protected, right? But let's say that a clandestine market for humpback tail fins develops and there are poachers willing and ready to kill the animals with RPGs (or whatever) in the Hawaii sanctuaries and sell the tails to buyers in Honolulu. We would be outraged, right? We would enlist the Coast Guard, Navy, NOAA, local law enforcement, etc. to their full extents to protect these creatures from senseless depredation and we would prosecute those involved at all levels. At least I hope we would.

But this same "senseless depredation" is occurring "elsewhere" with elephants, rhinos, pangolins, and many other "exotic" animal and marine species, sustained by illegal and legal markets around the world. We need to eliminate our local market for animal body parts. We need to do what is globally right, and do it now, right here. No human being NEEDS ivory or rhino horn. Only the animals do. Period.

I trust you've seen the numbers: almost 100 elephants poached (a tidy euphemism for "murdered") <u>every day</u> for ivory that goes not only to trinkets for the wealthy, but also to fund ISIS and other terror organizations such as the vicious Lord's Resistance Army. Brave wildlife rangers risk—and all too often lose--their lives (see Virunga National Park's Wounded Ranger site if you care to learn more) so that someone in Hawaii can purchase an ivory chess set. The values are just wrong. Dead wrong. Those who sell trafficked animal parts do not have my sympathy; they can find other items to sell that do not involve wholesale slaughter. Nevertheless, the bill contains provisions for antique ivory and other specific items as well as items used in recognized cultural practices.

SB2647 is a carefully designed, broad ranging bill that addresses and corrects weaknesses in previous attempts to pass similar legislation. I hope you will have the ethical courage to do what is clearly right and will pass SB2647, thereby bringing my state, our state, in line with China, Hong Kong, California, New York, and many other large markets that have banned animal part trafficking. Hawaii, sadly, *is* considered a major market for ivory and horn, and may soon be the largest market in the United States—we must do better. And we must start doing it now, not next year, not later. This bill, this year.

If we can ban the sale of shark fins, surely we can do it for elephants, rhinos, sea turtles, etc. I want my grandchild to live in a world that has these creatures free in the wild and in the oceans, not stuffed in natural history museum dioramas. If we do not act to protect them, their murders and extinction will be on all our hands. Really.

Dear Hawai'i Legislators,

I am writing to urge--no, to beg--you to support bill SB2647. Please, please stand up to the special financial interests which aim to profit from the annihilation of some of our most sacred and beloved species; please make the moral choice which our children and descendants will thank us for; and please, do honor to the State of Hawai'i and show respect not only for our own 'āina, but to the lands where these animals have survived for millennia-- until now.

We are entering a critical phase in the fight for the survival of the world's elephants and rhinos; at current rates of slaughter, they will be extinct in the wild within roughly a decade. One may simply feel a vague sadness at this prospect, but I urge you to consider something more than vague sadness: please, feel emboldened by the urgency of this crisis to make the moral choice, and ban the sale of ivory in the state of Hawai'i. Our descendants will look back and ask us many questions about our choices, and I dearly hope that one of those questions is not "Why did you allow the complete annihilation of these species? Was profiting from the sale of trinkets and baubles--profits which fund terrorism, war crimes, the drug trade, and other appalling injustices--more important than protecting the sanctity of life on earth? Why did you not do anything? *What were you thinking*?"

You will be hearing testimony from those who profit from this slaughter. You will be hearing all manner of specious and misleading information from them. They will claim that they are motivated by concern for Indigenous peoples' rights to use traditional wildlife resources; they will claim that they are motivated by concern for "consumer rights"; they will claim that this bill is a "feel-good, do-bad" bill which will somehow have deleterious effects on the survival of the world's wildlife. However, make no mistake: these are the smokescreens deployed by people whose motives are, very simply, profit. These people aim to line their own pockets with the destruction of the world's biological patrimony. This bill in no way impedes on the rights of Indigenous people to harvest and use wildlife in culturally significant ways-- merely that there can be no industry in selling these products to outsiders around the world (and creating or sustaining a cottage industry which harms the common good is not a human right for any group). They will claim that they are able to visually distinguish antique and non-CITES-banned ivory simply by looking at it (a preposterous claim, as the only way to prove ivory's age and origin is through chemical testing; "we guess it's okay because we looked at it" is not robust monitoring on a product which is destroying critical species and ecosystems). They will claim that they are 100% certain that they do not and have never sold illegal ivory, but will readily admit that they cannot provide any proof of this. They will claim that this bill will somehow result in the seizure of privately held antiques which are not for sale.

Please, assess the claims of those who profit from wildlife trafficking with a critical eye. These are not people who are making wise, selfless, or well-reasoned decisions for the public's best interests. That job falls to you. I beg you to rise to it.

Right now, today, the action taken by you and the Hawai'i State Legislature can make a difference in the fight to protect these irreplaceable species. Do not stand idly by as we commit this genocide. Do not capitulate to those who perceive their bottom line as more important than respect for life on Earth. Please, please do the right thing and vote to support bill SB2647. Thank you.

Aloha Chair Rhoads and Committee Members:

Please accept our testimony in support of SB 2647.

It is disheartening to hear that there is any question whether SB 2647 would pass. Especially here in the Extinction Capital of the World. Much of Hawaii's extinct and endangered native plant and animal species have become extinct or endangered due to lack of knowledge in times past and the continuing effects of accidental introductions. The extinction of ivory bearing and other species identified in SB 2647 which includes Hawaii's own Green Sea Turtle and Monk Seal, if it occurs would be neither from lack of knowledge nor would it be accidental. It can be prevented.

The legislature has found that the most effective way to discourage illegal trafficking is to eliminate markets and profits. This finding acknowledges that the purpose of trafficking in ivory is profit. Ivory is used to make jewelry, trinkets and statues. Ivory does not have health benefits nor is it perceived to have health benefits. Ivory does not save lives. In fact, Ivory takes lives, not just of the animals killed for it but of dedicated park rangers who protect it. Owning Ivory may massage the ego of wealthy collectors. Ivory's only other purpose is profit, some of which supports terrorism.

Publically, Hawaii bemoans the loss of its native wildlife. Failure to pass SB 2647 would provide a clue about how Hawaii really feels about its own wildlife. How can we trust the legislature to protect our own threatened and endangered species if it does not recognize the importance of protecting others. To all concerned:

I am again writing to oppose these spurious laws from becoming active and removing another freedom from your constituents that is the owning or selling, trading or bartering of any form of ivory.

The basis for this egregious law that is being promoted is based upon false and misleading statements that cannot be verified. Those promoting this idea use exaggeration and innuendo in order to make their position sound verified when it is not. The idea that our legislators so wholeheartedly believe these comments and plan to ban the sale of all ivories in Hawai'l is deplorable.

It has always been my understanding that our legislators are supposed to protect the citizens, not punish them for something that previously was completely legal and in many cases do nothing to threaten any African elephants. Today elephant ivory is not popular due to the poaching which does occur within some countries on the African continent, though this is not true in all countries. In others the elephants are considered a nuisance which creates many problems for farmers and others living in their region thus forcing authorities to cull the herds in order to protect the properties of their citizens.

If these proposed laws go forward then Hawai'I is removing one of the sources of it's' income along with simultaneously forcing the closure of some retailers who have followed all the laws pertaining to ivory and putting artists like myself who depend upon this material as our sole source of income and in my case for the last 45 years.

When this topic first surfaced it was being promoted to help stop poaching of African elephants but over time has expanded to include ivories from both extinct and ancient ivories dug from the ground in what once was trash pits in Alaska. Blocking the sale of these ivories does nothing positive to stop poaching as anyone can fully understand. This entire approach to legislation is nothing more than punishing law abiding citizens and not succeeding in any way to stop poaching on the other side of the globe.

Today it is widely known that the real source of promoting the poaching of elephants is not America but is directly connected to China and their insatiable appetite for blood ivory. Today's poacher is motivated by greed which in America places a small value on this material and currently I is available for around \$250 a pound while in China its' value is ten times at \$2,500 per pound. There simply is no built in motivation for smugglers to choose America over China. It simply does not make sense to anyone given these facts.

In America today the populace is more disgusted with our legislators across the country and including Washington than any time in my lifetime and with potential laws such as this it is no wonder the public does not trust our legislators. These proposed laws legalize theft by our government and if left unchecked will most likely turn law abiding citizens into criminals.

I sincerely hope you will no longer support this approach to legislation for it does nothing to stop poaching but instead only punishes our citizens for a crime they did not commit and eliminates passing along to our children anything of value. This legislation negates the investments many people have made with ivory. While a small clause does allow for some exceptions if certain documents are produced unfortunately nobody who ever purchased any ivory other than those who legally imported such are simply nonexistent.

The overriding excuse for banning all ivories being that they are difficult to identify is not true and can be taught to anyone in minutes. Comments: When I first heard about this legislation I admit I laughed a bit and figured it was a pet bill of some frothy animal rights nut. After all, ivory is already illegal and regulated by many civilized national governments because everyone knows that the wild elephants and rhinos are being wiped out by the greed of poachers, merchants, and collectors. Why do we need a bill on the state level? After a bit of research, however, I am appalled that Hawaii is one of the known back-door markets for trading the body parts of these iconic animals. We are the gateway to the Asian market, where many of the buyers are. It appears that the argument to keep this trade going, and presumably the reason that Senator Roz Baker tried to kill this legislation, is that 1) a few people buy this stuff, and 2) other people want to make money by selling it. Really? Is market-based demand that all it takes to justify wiping out the wild populations of animals that are protected by international agreement? Within the US, the other two state with high rates of trade (New York and California) have already passed laws similar to the one being proposed here. The vocal opposition in Hawaii come from a few people have made a career out of selling this stuff, and from their customers who have spent a lifetime collecting it. These customers collect it because of its status as rare and therefore valuable, a value which will only increase as the wild elephants disappear. Quite a disturbing investment strategy. This rule may prompt a career change for some people in Hawaii, but it's justified in order to save animals that most of the world values for more than just their parts. For many years people have adapted to the outcome their activities have had on the planet. Atlantic Fishermen have abandoned areas their families have fished for generations when the stock collapsed. Farmers have had to shift their crops when topsoil is depleted. And here, carvers will need to find something new to carve because they chose years ago to work with a material from animals that even then were being wiped out. Sellers will need to develop new ideas for inventory. We will move on. The issue here is what leadership role Hawaii will take to protect threatened and endangered wildlife that are being poached into extinction. A small portion of ivory may be obtained legally, but if the products are indiscernible and the result of the trade is the complete wipe-out of these iconic wild populations, then the trade needs to be stopped. We must ban the sale of body parts from protected species. If a few brave Hawaii legislators pass this bill to stem the demand for poaching we can

save not only animals but people too; in the past decade over 1,000 park rangers have been killed protecting animals from poachers. The time has come to do our part.

Re: Senate Bill 2647 relating to ivory sales

Dear Mr. Kobayashi, Mr. Rhoads, Ms. Buenaventura, Mr. Say, and House members:

I ask that you make my letter in opposition to Senate Bill 2647 part of the official record. I understand that some efforts have been made to correct the bill's many defects. The bill creates a whole new level of bureaucratic problems and red-tape for Hawali owners of antique, collectible items, and family heirlooms to meet. I hope you will have to read and consider my entire letter and not only the first few sentences.

I whole-heartedly support the total elimination of poaching of both elephants and rhinoceros but for many reasons I oppose this bill.

If you really want to save elephants, I would support a \$1 per-person-per year tax on all residents of Hawaii and send it to fund anti-poaching in Africa. I understand with over a million residents this would raise over a million dollars per year. Then, this money could be ear-marked for direct-funding to the major anti-poaching efforts "on the ground" in Africa. These both government and non-government anti-poaching patrols will save more elephants in a single week than your ivory ban will in a 100 years. For example, a privately funded organization called "Pro Track" and Big Life fights poaching on the ground in the veldt. Any resources that the state would devote toward the mis-guided and indirect efforts to save elephants would yield ten-fold the results if applied in Africa. Any resources directed toward enforcing this law if passed would have ten-fold the effect if applied in Africa.

Your duty as State Legislators is to address and remedy the problems of Hawaii residents at the state level. Preservation of elephants in Africa is a most noble cause, but it is not a state-level issue. It is a federal issue which already has laws in place.

Creating a new layer of red-tape at the state level will not save a single elephant and will only make it difficult for Hawaii residents who own some kind of ivory-decorated heirloom. The fact that the bill has so many "exemptions" only illustrates how flawed it is. The need for so many "exemptions" shows the

numerous situations where it is unfair to apply the law, and there are likely to be more unfair situations that are not anticipated in the bill resulting in an unfair result.

For example, if I own an antique ivory handled straight razor from the 1940's, my father got while stationed in Germany following WWII. The ivory handle probably comprises roughly 50% of the volume. It is less than 100 years old. The value is probably three times the price of a similar non-ivory item so one would say that the value is "primary" due to its ivory content. Also, I have no documentation showing its date of origin. It does not meet any of your exemptions because it is more than 50% ivory volume, it is "primary" of value due to its ivory, it is less than 100 years old, and I have no documentation.

Despite the effort to create exemptions for ivory from legitimate sources a whole morass of red-tape is created. For example, I see some effort has been made to exempt items of historical value which contain ivory components – for example, an old piano with ivory keys, or any old backgammon or chess set with lvory parts.

The so-called exemptions draw an arbitrary line at 100-year old items, and also require the owner to provide "documentation" concerning its provenance. I ask, how many of your own family heirlooms have any kind of documentary provenance? My elderly mother cannot even find her birth certificate, does anyone really think she can find the receipt for the ivory broach her father gave her upon graduating from secretarial school?

Furthermore, the 100-year cut-off date for antique items is arbitrary and could cause many pre-ban items of deep family historical value, or monetary value, to become outright illegal.

How many items iodged at the Bishop Museum would become illegal because the "proof" of their age or chain-of-possession do not exist?

How does one determine whether or not a particular item contains "20% by volume" without destroying it or disassembling it to the point of damage.

This bill is a classic example of punishing the many for the sins of the few. I doubt that any Hawaii resident has ever poached an elephant or a rhino. However, all Hawaii residents will be subject to prosecution under this bill if they cannot pass all of the hurdles required to show that their ivory item, or ivory embellished item, meets one of the exemptions under the bill

This bill is a classic example of an effort at indirect suppression of a perceived problem by banning otherwise legitimate activities to reach the few that are not. The effect of this bill on actual poaching is so indirect and attenuated as to be nearly useless.

As another example in a different situation. In my younger days, I enjoyed going night-diving off of Diamond Head. We would park along Diamond Head Road and go down to the water with our diving gear and night-lights. Now, it is illegal to park anywhere along Diamond Head Road at night. Presumably, I have heard that this has to do with people parking and drinking. Thus, in order to address the problem, those in charge punished everyone, and banned all legitimate uses of parking on Diamond Head Road at night for the sins of the few. Moreover, those that would park-and-drink are now no doubt simply parking and drinking someplace else. Meanwhile, those who would like to night-dive or fish at Diamond Head at night cannot park anywhere else because it is too far. Who is going to enforce this law? The HPD is over-taxed as it is and cannot even put a stop to car break-ins at the major shopping centers, beach parking lots, and other. As a practical matter, how many ivory arrests do you think the Honolulu Police will make, and then how many of those would be actual poached ivory and not poorly documented family heirlooms?

Please trash this whole bill. We have enough problems for you to address here in Hawaii without the Hawaii State Legislature trying to solve the problem of poaching in Africa. This bill will create more problems for Hawaii residents, not solve any of the. Last, it will have absolutely zero documentable effect upon poaching in Africa because the connection is just too remote.

Thank you and I hope you will give my thoughts some serious consideration.

<sup>16</sup> "Now therefore, if you have acted in truth and sincerity in making Abimelech king, and if you have dealt well with Jerubbaal and his house, and have done to him as he deserves—<sup>17</sup> for my father fought for you, risked his life, and delivered you out of the hand of Midian; <sup>18</sup> but you have

risen up against my father's house this day, and killed his seventy sons on one stone, and made Abimelech, the son of his female servant, king over the men of Shechem, because he is your brother—<sup>19</sup> if then you have acted in truth and sincerity with Jerubbaal and with his house this day, *then* rejoice in Abimelech, and let him also rejoice in you.<sup>20</sup> "But if not, let fire come from Abimelech and devour the men of Shechem and Beth Millo; and let fire come from the men of Shechem and from Beth Millo and devour Abimelech!"

## TESTIMONY OF KEITH SWINDLE, RESIDENT AGENT IN CHARGE, OFFICE OF LAW ENFORCEMENT, U.S. FISH AND WILDLIFE SERVICE, DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, BEFORE THE HAWAII HOUSE, COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY, ON SB 2647 SD1 HD1 RELATING TO NATURAL RESOURCES February 25, 2016

#### Introduction

Good afternoon Chairman Rhoads and Members of the Committee. I appreciate the opportunity to testify before you today to provide an overview of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's (Service) role and efforts in addressing illegal wildlife trafficking in Hawaii, the United States and across the world. The Service is an agency within the Department of the Interior (Department). We are dedicated to the conservation, protection, and enhancement of fish, wildlife and plants, and their habitats. We are the only agency in the federal government whose primary responsibility, as directed by numerous laws, is the long term conservation of these important natural resources for the American public. The Service's Office of Law Enforcement, plays a key role in international conservation, including combatting illegal wildlife trafficking.

#### Poaching and Illegal Wildlife Trafficking

African elephants once numbered in the millions, but by 1990, uncontrolled hunting for their ivory tusks had driven the number of African elephants in the wild to fewer than 500,000 African elephants. With a ban on international ivory sales and trade in 1990, the population of African elephants began to recover in some countries. However, today a resurgence of illegal poaching of elephants in Africa is threatening this iconic species. Africa's elephants are being slaughtered for ivory at rates not seen in decades. Populations of both savannah and forest elephants have dropped precipitously, and poaching occurs across all parts of Africa.

Improved economic conditions in traditional wildlife markets such as China and other parts of East and Southeast Asia are fueling an increased demand for products derived from endangered species such as primates, big cats, pangolins and ivory producing species such as elephants and walrus. Although the primary markets are in Asia, the United States continues to play a role as a consumer and transit country for illegally traded wildlife products, including elephant ivory. As elephants decline, ivory collectors are turning to other sources such as the tusks and teeth from other species such as walrus, narwhal, several species of whales, and hippopotamus. We have seen increased pressure on some of these species in the illicit ivory market, here in Hawaii, as evidenced by some of our own recent investigations. Hawaii represents a significant marketplace for wealthy tourists from around the world and so, Hawaii must be a part of the solution.

Wildlife trafficking once was a crime of opportunity committed by individuals or small groups for subsistence. Today, it is increasingly the purview of international criminal cartels that are well structured and highly organized and capable of illegally moving orders of magnitude more in wildlife and wildlife products. This lucrative business has been tied to drug and human trafficking organizations and is a destabilizing influence in many African nations. What was once a local or regional problem has become a global crisis, as increasingly sophisticated, violent

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and ruthless criminal organizations have branched into wildlife trafficking. Organized criminal enterprises are a growing threat to wildlife, the world's economy and global security.

While it is alarming that we are reaching the point where it is uncertain if some of these iconic species will continue to exist in the wild. There are also terrible human costs associated with this issue. For example, during the past few years, hundreds of park rangers have been killed in the line of duty in Africa. In August of 2013, I had the solemn honor of hand delivering a letter of condolence from the United States Fish and Wildlife Service to the Director of the Kenya Wildlife Service for the July, 2013, murders of several Kenya Wildlife Service Rangers. The insidiousness of these killings is that each of these men leaves behind a family of women and children to face desperation in addition to their despair and a real risk of becoming destitute. They also leave behind beleaguered colleagues who themselves, face constant pressures of corruption due to the absurd economic incentives that are driven by humanity's thoughtless desire for animal parts and products.

#### **U.S. Laws and Regulations**

The United States has several laws and regulations in place that can help to address this crisis. African elephants are listed as threatened under the Endangered Species Act (ESA) and also protected under the African Elephant Conservation Act. Nations across the world regulate trade in this species under the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES). Under these U.S. laws, it is generally illegal to:

- Import or export African elephant ivory for primarily commercial purposes.
- Import or export it for other purposes without CITES documents.
- Buy or sell unlawfully imported African elephant ivory in interstate commerce.

Asian elephants are listed as endangered under the ESA. Import, export and interstate commerce in ivory and other parts and products is generally prohibited.

Though there are several laws and regulations in place to address this illegal trade, a number of loopholes exist that are exploited by illegal ivory traders. The Service is currently attempting to more effectively combat illegal ivory trade through existing legislative and regulatory authorities.

#### President's Executive Order on Wildlife Trafficking

On July 1, 2013, President Obama issued an Executive Order to enhance coordination of U.S. Government efforts to combat wildlife trafficking and assist foreign governments with capacity building. The Executive Order establishes a Presidential Task Force on Wildlife Trafficking charged with developing a National Strategy for Combating Wildlife Trafficking. The Task Force is co-chaired by the Department of the Interior, Department of Justice, and Department of State. Across the United States Government, we are working to identify new approaches to crack down on poaching and wildlife trafficking and to more efficiently coordinate our enforcement efforts across government.

The Executive Order also establishes an Advisory Council on Wildlife Trafficking comprised of individuals with relevant expertise from outside the Government to make recommendations to the Task Force. The Service, along with the co-chairing agencies, are engaging the Council's expertise in law enforcement and criminal justice, wildlife biology and conservation, finance and trade, and international relations and diplomacy to develop and advance this collective strategy.

## U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Role in Addressing the Illegal Ivory Trade

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service provides key leadership and capacity in addressing wildlife trafficking. For decades, we have worked in countries across the globe to conserve imperiled wildlife. We have a four-pronged approach to combat wildlife trafficking with our international partners, including: law enforcement; technical assistance; CITES, and reducing demand.

## Law Enforcement to Target and Stop Illicit Trade

*Overview:* The Service is the primary Federal agency responsible for enforcing U.S. laws and treaties that address international wildlife trafficking and protect U.S. and foreign species, including the species being considered today, from unsustainable trade. Working with shoestring budgets and a special agent workforce that has not grown since the late-1970s, the Service has disrupted large-scale trafficking in contraband wildlife "commodities" that range from elephant ivory and rhino horn to sturgeon caviar and sea turtle skin and shell.

Service special agents utilize both overt and covert investigative techniques to detect and document international smuggling and crimes involving the unlawful exploitation of protected native and foreign species in interstate commerce. An ivory smuggling investigation typically involves securing charges under both the Endangered Species Act (a misdemeanor statute) and the felony wildlife trafficking provisions of the Lacey Act (where the Federal felony violation is predicated on the violation of another Federal, State, foreign or tribal wildlife law). Such investigations also often document and secure felony charges for related crimes such as conspiracy, smuggling, money laundering, false statements, and wire fraud.

Since the mid-1970s, the Service has deployed a force of uniformed wildlife inspectors at major ports of entry across the nation including Honolulu International Airport to check inbound and outbound shipments for wildlife. These 130 officers, five of which are based here in Honolulu, ensure that wildlife trade complies with the CITES treaty and U.S. laws. They also conduct proactive inspections of air cargo warehouses, ocean containers, international mail packages, and international passenger flights looking for smuggled wildlife. Discoveries by wildlife inspectors at the ports may lead to full-scale criminal investigations of wildlife trafficking.

The Service operates the world's first and only full-service wildlife forensics laboratory – a lab that is globally recognized as having created the science of wildlife forensics. Guidance from the lab, for example, aid officers in the field to distinguish and identify various products derived from wildlife.

Service enforcement officers and forensic scientists have provided specialized training to wildlife enforcement counterparts in more than 65 different countries since 2000. These capacity

building efforts have included teaching criminal investigation skills to wildlife officers from Asian and sub-Sahara African countries at the International Law Enforcement Academies in Botswana and Thailand on a twice yearly basis.

Service partners in combating illegal ivory trade and other types of wildlife trafficking include enforcement staff from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Agency, Homeland Security Investigations and U.S. Customs and Border Protection; wildlife and customs enforcement agencies in other countries; regional wildlife enforcement networks (WENs) such as those in Southeast Asia, Central America, and parts of Africa; and multilateral wildlife enforcement working groups associated with the CITES Secretariat and INTERPOL. Partnerships with State wildlife agencies such as Hawaii's Division of Conservation and Resources Enforcement, can be critical for addressing interstate wildlife trafficking within the United States.

*Challenges for Enforcement:* Service investigations have proven time and again that illegal ivory *is* smuggled to and from the United States and that it enters the domestic marketplace. The Service's decades worth of experience in policing the global black market trade in illegal elephant ivory provides a basis for identifying specific challenges that recur and limit the effectiveness of investigations of ivory trafficking.

• After elephant ivory enters the domestic marketplace, it is difficult, if not impossible, from an enforcement standpoint to separate illegal ivory from legal ivory. These markets thus provide an effective way for smugglers to conceal and launder illegal ivory. It is not possible to accurately quantify the illegal ivory moving through these markets.

No national system of permits or record keeping for domestic sales exists to aid enforcement officers in making a determination of legality (i.e., determining from whom a merchant obtained their inventory or to whom it was sold). Without evidence of smuggling in hand, officers cannot readily determine that the ivory is illegal or prove it in a court of law. In cases where we can link an ivory smuggler to a merchant, there are no record keeping requirements that would produce evidence proving the smuggler's relationship with the merchant or documenting how much ivory the smuggler sold to the merchant.

- No simple way exists to determine the age of ivory. Appearances, such as carving style and staining, are regularly faked. Available scientific testing often yields only a range of dates; is expensive (\$500-\$1,000 per test); can take months to provide results; and requires destructive sampling. This last drawback, in particular, limits the utility of age testing since officers generally cannot walk into a store and take a chunk out of an ivory carving for testing for regulatory purposes.
- Most States do not regulate the trade in elephant ivory.
- Weak penalties can also be a hurdle for law enforcement. Strong penalties provide a deterrent and assist the Government in unraveling complex conspiracies and combating trafficking. Offenders facing significant penalties are more likely to become key cooperating defendants than those facing a light penalty.

Technical Assistance and Grants to Build In-Country Capacity

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The Service has a long-standing history in elephant conservation, including through providing technical assistance and grants to build in-country capacity in Africa and Asia. Through the African Elephant Conservation Fund, the Service annually supports African elephant range states with financial assistance for essential protection activities, especially anti-poaching. In 2013, this involved awarding 26 new grants and three modifications to existing grants totaling \$1,922,777, which was matched by \$4,531,077 in leveraged funds. These funds are now supporting field projects at 23 sites in twelve countries in Africa, as well as one project involving all 37 African elephant range states and two projects in consumer countries.

In 2013, the Service awarded 29 grants from the Asian Elephant Conservation Fund to support conservation, capacity building, law enforcement, education, and elephant health projects in eight Asian elephant range countries. The Service award amount totaled \$1,647,363 (and two modifications for \$32,870) with a non-Federal match of \$2,463,729.

Through the Wildlife Without Borders – Africa Program, the Service in 2013 is supporting 31 new grants and two amendments to existing grants totaling \$8,247,751 and matched by \$10,808,046 in leveraged funds. Many of these projects are geared towards building in-country capacity and providing technical assistance to reduce the impact of poaching for elephants. This includes the work of the Last Great Ape Organization (LAGA), based in Cameroon, which was founded in 2003 to use innovative methods to fight wildlife crime. LAGA works directly with the Cameroonian Government to improve investigations, arrest operations, legal follow-up and media activities. LAGA brought about the first ever wildlife prosecution for the whole of West and Central Africa through fighting corruption. It is credited in shifting Cameroon from a decade long baseline of zero wildlife prosecutions to an arrest and prosecution of a major wildlife dealer at a rate of one per week. This rate was kept stable for the last eight years. After proving the success of the innovative and cost-effective LAGA model, in 2013, LAGA's founder, Ofir Drori, founded the EAGLE network (Eco Activists for Governance & Law Enforcement). Based in Yaounde, the EAGLE network aims to coordinate and strengthen the activities of LAGA replicates. Currently operating in six countries, it has brought about more than 900 arrests and subsequent prosecutions and imprisonments of major wildlife traffickers and has been instrumental in clamping down on criminal syndicates and kingpins in Central and West Africa. The Service has been supporting LAGA since its inception and is now also supporting replicates in Gabon, the Republic of Congo and Togo, all of which have made great strides in clamping down on ivory trafficking.

#### CITES and Elephant Ivory Trade

CITES is an international agreement signed by 179 nations designed to control and regulate global trade in certain wild animals and plants that are or may become threatened with extinction due to commercial trade. More than 35,000 species currently benefit from CITES protection. International trade in plants and animals, whether taken from the wild or bred in captivity, can pose serious risks to wildlife species. Without regulation, international trade can deplete wild populations, leading to extinction. The goal of CITES is to facilitate legal, biologically sustainable trade, whenever possible. But, in some cases, no level of commercial trade can be supported.

In 1989, at the seventh meeting of the Conference of the Parties (CoP7) to CITES, African elephants were granted the highest level of protection under CITES—an Appendix-I listing—and joined Asian elephants, listed in Appendix I since 1975. This Appendix-I listing, which became effective on January 18, 1990, is often referred to as an ivory "ban" or "moratorium". While there is truth to these statements, they can also be misleading.

After the Appendix-I listing was instituted, and largely as a result of the listing, some populations began to recover and were subsequently transferred to Appendix II, beginning in 1997. The populations were transferred to Appendix II with strict limitations on trade in ivory, but allowed certain other activities. As such, the CITES "ban" on ivory trade has several limitations:

- 1. It only applies to international trade. CITES provisions apply to the import, export, and re-export of listed species. Domestic markets for ivory are governed by national or local laws.
- 2. It only applies to ivory acquired after elephants were listed under CITES. Ivory acquired prior to the species being listed under CITES is considered pre-Convention. With proper CITES documentation, pre-Convention ivory can be imported, exported, or re-exported, unless stricter domestic laws prohibit such action. (Note: In the United States, the Endangered Species Act and African Elephant Conservation Act provide for stricter regulation on import, export, and re-export.)
- 3. Exceptions can be granted for non-commercial purposes, such as science or education. With proper CITES documentation, trade can be allowed as long as its purpose is not primarily commercial.
- 4. Hunting trophies may be imported/exported. Some elephant range countries have an annual export quota for hunting trophies taken for non-commercial purposes. With proper CITES documentation, hunting trophies, including ivory tusks, can be imported, exported, and re-exported.

Though a long-standing priority for CITES Parties, the focus on combating elephant poaching and illegal ivory trade is more intense than ever before. In March 2013, at the most recent meeting of the Conference of the Parties (CoP16), eight countries—China, Kenya, Malaysia, the Philippines, Tanzania, Thailand, Uganda, and Viet Nam—identified as significant source, transit, or destination points for illegal ivory trade agreed to develop time-bound action plans to actively address illegal ivory trade.

Also at CoP16, the CITES Parties recognized the importance of the entire crime chain by adopting several decisions to ensure that modern forensic and investigative techniques are applied to the illegal trade in ivory. The CITES Parties agreed to provide more effective control of domestic ivory markets and government-held stockpiles, and to promote public awareness campaigns, including supply and demand reduction strategies.

The decisions agreed upon at CoP16 to address the elephant poaching crisis were a significant step in the right direction. The United States played a major role in the development of all of these decisions and actions, and is committed to playing a significant role in their implementation, including ensuring that countries are held accountable for failure to do so.

#### Reducing Consumer Demand for Illegal Wildlife Products

The growing international market for ivory, particularly from Asia, is the major driver of poaching and illegal international trade from Africa. Most Service conservation activities have focused on on-the-ground protection of habitat and populations and enforcement efforts, with the Service providing approximately \$10 million annually to enhance and support wildlife conservation throughout Africa and Asia. In addition, the Service supports government and non-government partners in consumer nations in Asia in awareness and demand reduction campaigns.

Using our extensive network and diverse experience, we are developing a strategy going forward for the Service's role in addressing consumer demand. This includes working with the private sector and governments in key consumer countries; building public awareness about the impacts of illegal trade on wild populations; improving statutory, enforcement and prosecutorial infrastructure to address illegal trade and increase awareness of the repercussions of engaging in such activities; and taking other actions to encourage attitudinal and behavioral shifts, leading to measurable reductions in demand for illegal wildlife products.

#### **U.S. Ivory Crush**

As part of our efforts to combat illegal ivory trafficking, on November 14, 2013, the United States destroyed its six-ton stock of confiscated elephant ivory, sending a clear message that the nation will not tolerate wildlife crime that threatens to wipe out the African elephant and a host of other species around the globe. The destruction of this ivory, which took place near the Service's National Wildlife Property Repository on the Rocky Mountain Arsenal National Wildlife Refuge near Denver, Colorado, was witnessed by representatives of African nations and other countries, dozens of leading conservationists, and international media representatives.

This ivory crush sparked a new sense of possibility and collaboration—that we can work together effectively to halt this crisis before it is too late. We are now are in a much better position to work with the international community to push for a reduction of ivory stockpiles worldwide, and to crack down on poaching and illegal trade. The ivory crush signaled the United States' commitment to combating wildlife trafficking and one of the goals was to encourage other nations to do the same. On January 6, 2014, the People's Republic of China destroyed more than six tons of illegal elephant ivory in the city of Guangzhou, Guangdong Province. China joined the United States, Kenya, Gabon and the Philippines, which have destroyed their illegal ivory, in this fight to save African elephants from poachers and the illegal ivory trade. France also plans to destroy its illegal elephant ivory this year.

#### Conclusion

We salute your fallen officers for the courage and commitment they brought to their work. We offer our sincere condolences and those of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to their families, friends, and Nation in the face of this heinous crime.

# British pilot killed by poachers in Tanzania; 3 arrested

JOHANNESBURG – Elephant poachers in Tanzania fired on a helicopter on an anti-poaching mission and killed the British pilot, and authorities said Sunday that they have arrested three suspects.

Roger Gower was shot Friday while flying on a joint operation with Tanzanian wildlife authorities who were tracking the poachers, the Friedkin Conservation Fund, which oversees some wildlife areas in Tanzania, said on its website.

"This tragic event again highlights the appalling risk and cost of protecting Tanzania s wildlife," the Texas-based group said.

Three suspects were arrested, said Jumanne Maghembe, Tanzania's minister for tourism and natural resources. The minister pledged that any other suspects will be arrested in security operations after the attack in Maswa wildlife reserve, near Serengeti National Park.

Lazaro Nyalandu, a former minister of tourism and natural resources, wrote on Twitter that Gower was killed by AK-47 assault rifle fire.

"You loved our country and I knew you on many flights we took together," Nyalandu wrote.

A co-pilot survived with injuries, Tanzanian authorities said.

Britain's Foreign Office confirmed the death of a Briton in Tanzania and said it was "providing assistance to the family at this difficult time."

Rangers discovered the carcasses of three elephants that were killed by the same group of poachers that fired on the helicopter, said Paschal Shelutete, spokesman for Tanzania's parks service.

Maswa, the park where Gower was operating, lies on the southwest boundary of Serengeti. The region's massive wildebeest migration passes through Maswa in January and February, according to the Friedkin Conservation Fund. The park's rangers encounter poachers on a regular basis, it said.

Tanzania has been identified as a key hotspot for elephant poachers. The elephant population declined by 60 percent to about 40,000 since 2009, according to a census announced last year. on Friday while flying on a joint operation with Tanzanian wildlife authorities who were trying to track and arrest the poachers.

The Texas-based group, which oversees a number of wildlife areas in Tanzania, says Gower's death highlights the "appalling risk" of protecting wildlife in a country whose elephant population has been slaughtered in large numbers.

Lazaro Nyalandu, a former Tanzanian minister of tourism and natural resources, wrote on Twitter that Gower managed to land the helicopter despite his fatal wound. He says the shooting happened in Maswa wildlife reserve, near Serengeti park.
