## Testimony in SUPPORT of SB2690 SD1

## **RELATING TO CHAPTER 245, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES**

SENATOR JILL N TOKUDA, CHAIR SENATE COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS Hearing Date: February 25, 2016 Room Number: 211

Fiscal Implications: SB2690 SD1 proposes to increase the excise tax on cigarettes and little cigars sold on or after July 1, 2016 to twenty cents per cigarette or little cigar. The increased taxes collected will be designated to various funds, including four cents to the Hawaii Cancer Research Special Fund, and two cents to the Department Of Health, Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion Division (CDPHPD) for smoking cessation programs and education in Hawaii.

Department Testimony: DOH supports SB2690 SD1, which proposes to increase the excise
tax on tobacco products to twenty cents per cigarette or little cigar. The Department also
supports the designation of the tax revenues collected to various funds, including four cents to
the Hawaii Cancer Research Special Fund and two cents to the DOH CDPHPD for smoking
cessation programs and education in Hawaii. The DOH defers to the Department of Taxation on
matters relating to taxation and administration.

Tobacco use continues to be the single most preventable cause of disease, disability and death in the United States and in Hawaii.<sup>1</sup> Despite the successful enactment of smoke-free workplace and public place laws and other strong tobacco control policies that protect Hawaii's people and communities, there is evidence that smoking continues to exact an enormous health toll and is a significant economic burden for Hawaii: "Health effects associated with smoking

include heart disease, cancer, pulmonary disease, adverse reproductive outcomes, and the
exacerbation of multiple chronic health conditions.<sup>2</sup> Smoking claims 1,400 adult lives each
year and contributes to 21,000 premature deaths from tobacco among youth under 18. It adds
\$526 million in annual health care expenditures and \$387.3 million in lost productivity costs to
the State.<sup>3</sup>

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends increasing the price
of tobacco products as the "single most effective way to prevent initiation among nonsmokers
and to reduce consumption.<sup>4</sup> Hawaii has not increased the excise tax on cigarettes since 2012.
Raising the excise tax to twenty cents per cigarette or little cigar would "lead to reductions in the
prevalence of smoking and its intensity among youth and young adults."<sup>5</sup>

11 SB2690 SD1 also proposes to designate a portion of the tax revenues collected to DOH 12 CDPHPD, for smoking cessation programs and education. These funds would be used for ongoing efforts to support smoke-free policies and social norms, promote cessation, assist 13 tobacco users to quit; and prevent initiation of tobacco use. Funding would also be used to 14 15 enhance educational campaigns, enforce recently enacted laws, and increase prevention efforts in communities still experiencing higher tobacco use rates. Most importantly, SB2690 SD1 16 significantly increases the excise taxes on tobacco products and is part of the Department's 17 comprehensive approach to tobacco control to prevent the initiation of youth smokers and 18 promote cessation among current smokers. Such an increase can produce significant long-term 19 improvements in health, and make further progress towards a Hawaii that is free from the burden 20 21 of tobacco. S.B. 2690, S.D.1, amends the Cigarette and Tobacco Tax Law by raising the tax on cigarettes and little cigars from \$0.16 per cigarette or little cigar to \$0.20 per cigarette or little cigar. S.B. 2690, S.D. 1 also amends how the tax collected on cigarettes and little cigars is allocated. S.B. 2690, S.D. 1 is effective July 1, 2016.

The Senate Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health made the Department's suggested amendments to S.B. 2690. The Department appreciates the consideration of its comments and notes that it can administer S.B. 2690, S.D. 1, as currently drafted.

The Department defers to the Department of Health with respect to the effect raising the tax on cigarettes and little cigars would have on the State's health and wellness.

SB 2690 SD1 - RELATING TO CHAPTER 245, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES

Chair Tokuda, Vice Chair Dela Cruz, and Members of the Committee:

The University of Hawai'i Cancer Center strongly supports this bill.

The UH Cancer Center is one of only 69 institutions in the United States that hold the prestigious National Cancer Institute (NCI) designation, and is the only NCI-designated center in the Pacific. The NCI designation provides cancer researchers in Hawai'i with greater access to federal funding and research opportunities. More importantly, it gives the people of Hawai'i and the Pacific region access to many innovative and potentially life-saving clinical trials without the necessity of traveling to the mainland.

Our passion at the UH Cancer Center is to be a world leader in eliminating cancer through research, education, and improved patient care. Because tobacco consumption is a leading preventable cause of cancer, we take all issues related to tobacco in Hawai'i very seriously. Whereas the UH Cancer Center always has supported strong tobacco control measures in Hawai'i, the recent emergence of electronic smoking devices (e-cigarettes) presents new challenges for tobacco control and tobacco-related legislation. To address these challenges, UH Cancer Center researchers have been actively involved in conducting studies about cigarette smoking and e-cigarette use among adolescents in Hawai'i, a vulnerable population for initiation of both cigarette smoking and e-cigarette use.

The bill addresses a serious concern among health professionals that addictive tobacco products other than cigarettes – including snuff, chewing tobacco, and loose roll-your-own tobacco – are attracting a new generation of tobacco users. While the dangers of smoking are well known, national research also tells us there is no safe form of tobacco use, and tobacco use continues to be a problem in Hawaii.

Since the cigarette tax increases were imposed beginning in 2006, there have been steadily decreasing sales, which may indicate that the higher cost to consumers has created the intended disincentive to cigarette use. A further increase in the taxes would

serve as a greater economic disincentive to tobacco use and decrease the number of individuals who smoke.

We appreciate the Committee's allocation of a portion of the additional tax revenues to the Hawai'i Cancer Research Special Fund. The additional revenue generated by this bill will allow the UH Cancer Center to continue to provide new knowledge about prevention of adolescent smoking, continue to provide innovative clinical trials in Hawai'i to help prevent and treat cancer, and continue its research into natural products from organisms found only in Hawai'i that may be used to treat cancer. Several patents on promising products have already been filed.

The incidence of cancer is increasing significantly and may double during the next twenty years, according to recent estimates by the International Agency for Cancer. It is imperative that the UH Cancer Center maintain its NCI designation to foster research relevant to those in Hawai'i and to provide our state's residents with access to the most innovative clinical trials here in Hawai'i, in order to reduce the incidence of cancer in Hawai'i and eliminate the need for our cancer patients to travel to the mainland for access to novel therapies.

We respectfully urge you to pass this bill.

SUBJECT: TOBACCO, Increase Tobacco Tax Rate on Cigarettes and Little Cigars

BILL NUMBER: SB 2690, SD-1

INTRODUCED BY: Senate Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: This is a 25% tax increase beginning on 7/1/16 on cigarettes and little cigars. The increased taxes are having an effect on consumption, which means the tax cannot be expected to produce stable funding. Lawmakers may want to consider direct appropriations to programs now being supported by earmarks from this tax.

BRIEF SUMMARY: Amends HRS 245-3 to increase the tax on cigarettes and little cigars to 20 cents per unit sold, used, or possessed by the wholesaler or dealer on and after 7/1/16.

Amends HRS section 245-15 to provide that the revenue generated under the rate increase shall be distributed as follows:

- 4.0 cents per unit to the Hawaii cancer research special fund (2 cents more than current law);
- 1.125 cents per unit, but not more than \$7,400,000 in a fiscal year, to the trauma system special fund (same as current law);
- 1.25 cents per unit, but not more than \$8,800,000 in a fiscal year, to the community health centers special fund (same as current law);
- 1.25 cents per unit, but not more than \$8,800,000 in a fiscal year, to the emergency medical services special fund (same as current law);
- 2.0 cents per unit to the department of health chronic disease prevention and health promotion division, for smoking cessation programs and education in Hawaii (new); and
- Any excess goes to the general fund.

#### EFFECTIVE DATE: July 1, 2016.

STAFF COMMENTS: This measure is clearly a tax hike. Previous increases have begun to have an effect on collections not only locally but also nationally. Collections have fallen below their previous levels, and the increase in the legal smoking age from 18 to 21 also is anticipated to have a negative effect on consumption. For whatever reason, the rise in rate has jeopardized this source of revenue. If nothing else, lawmakers need to make up their minds whether or not they see this tax as a source of revenue or a means by which to deter consumption.

#### Testimony in SUPPORT of SB 2690, SD1 "Relating to Chapter 245, Hawaii Revised Statutes"

The American Heart Association strongly supports SB 2690, SD1.

A one-time sizeable cigarette tax increase would have a greater impact on reducing smoking rates in Hawaii, especially on the lower income and youth markets, which are more price sensitive, and which are the most highly targeted by tobacco industry marketing and advertising. The AHA also strongly recommends that a portion of the increased revenue be earmarked to support State-funded tobacco prevention, education and cessation programs.

Because smoking levels are highest among people with low incomes, the cigarette companies will try to argue that cigarette tax increases are regressive taxes that fall disproportionately hard on lower-income families and communities. But this argument turns reality upside down. These are the same companies that have been preying on low-income and poor communities for decades. The cigarette companies have no problem with levying new charges on low-income smokers when it increased their own profits. They only oppose the new charges when someone else (like a state government) gets the new revenues, instead. In fact, when the federal government implemented a new increase on cigarette taxes the cigarette companies wasted no time immediately after the law passed hiking the prices on their products to profiteer on the increase during the interim period between passage of the law and its implementation.

The fact that smoking rates are highest among lower-income groups means that lowerincome families and communities currently suffer the most from smoking and will, consequently, benefit the most from any effective new measures to reduce smoking, including increased state cigarette taxes. Their health problems caused by tobacco use also disproportionally affect Medicaid costs to the state.

Smokers who do not reduce their smoking because of a cigarette tax increase will also still benefit economically, along with every other state taxpayer. In Hawai'i alone, tobacco use claims 1,200 lives each year and creates \$526 million in annual health care costs directly caused by smoking. \$147 million of that is covered by the state Medicaid program. Hawaii residents' state & federal tax burden from smoking-caused government expenditures is \$835 per household. Hawaii's estimated tobacco tax and license revenue, estimated to be almost \$130 million does not come close to offsetting the losses to the state caused by tobacco use. Smoking declines caused by state cigarette tax increases directly reduce these smoking-caused tax burdens for all taxpayers.

Those who stop smoking in response to cigarette tax increases will greatly improve their own health, which could also significantly reduce their healthcare costs. Because of their higher rate of illness and disability, smokers have substantially higher annual and lifetime healthcare costs than nonsmokers or former smokers (despite living shorter lives).







Those who guit smoking as a result of a tax increase would also then have additional money to spend on taxable products that don't result in over a \$500 million in healthcare costs to the state. The money doesn't go up in smoke; instead it will likely be spent on more productive things that can benefit the smokers' families and our state.

The AHA particularly supports the allocation of additional cigarette tax revenue to prevention and control programs. Low-income smokers and their communities disproportionately benefit when the new revenues from cigarette tax increases are directed to programs to help people guit smoking and prevent kids from starting – both because smoking is more prevalent among low-income persons and because they may have much less access or exposure to any such programs than people with higher incomes.

The Hawaii legislature last increased Hawaii's cigarette tax in 2006. Since that time, inflation of 17.6% has decreased the value of the cigarette tax to 85 cents on the dollar. While Hawaii's adult smoking rate has dropped to among the lowest levels in the country, there remain broad disparities in smoking rates within our communities. Smoking rates remain significantly higher in lower socioeconomic and lower educated populations leading to disparately higher levels of chronic diseases in that population. An article published in Sept. 2015 in the Honolulu Star-Advertiser reported that in fiscal years 2014 and 2015. The Queen's Medical Center's two hospitals treated 3.441 patients who were homeless. Nine out of ten cases were treated in Queen's emergency rooms. And many of them involved patients who made more than one visit. Over the past two fiscal years, Queen's has cared for an unsheltered patient 12,271 times at a price tag of more than \$5 million a year. Other Hawaii hospitals reported similar experiences. More community funding is needed to address tobacco prevention, control and cessation in those hard-to-reach populations to reduce their smoking rates to levels comparable to Hawaii's broader adult population. An increase in Hawaii's cigarette tax would help to provide the needed funding to address one of the leading major health risks among Hawaii's most vulnerable populations.

The American Heart Association urges your support of SB 2690, SD1.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide written comments in support of SB 2690, which increases the excise tax on cigarettes and little cigars sold on or after July 1, 2016, to twenty cents per each cigarette or little cigar sold.

The American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN) is the nation's leading cancer advocacy organization. ACS CAN works with federal, state, and local government bodies to support evidence-based policy and legislative solutions designed to eliminate cancer as a major health problem.

Regular, significant increases in the retail price of cigarettes reduce the number of people who begin smoking and increase the number of smokers who quit.

- Significant increases in the price of cigarettes leads to a reduction in overall cigarette consumption and a reduction in youth consumption.
- Low-income adults, youth, and pregnant women are especially likely to quit or reduce their smoking when the price increases.
- Lower smoking rates translate into fewer smoking-related cancers and premature deaths, reduced spending on smoking-related health problems, and more productive workers.

Small tax increase amounts do not produce significant public health benefits or cost savings because tobacco companies can easily offset the beneficial impact of such small increases with temporary price cuts, coupons, and other promotional discounting. Increasing the tax rate with inflation will also help to ensure that the public health and revenue benefits of the tax increase do not diminish as quickly over time.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in <u>STRONG SUPPORT</u> of SB 2690, SD1, which proposes to increase the tobacco tax on cigarettes and little cigars by four cents per each cigarette or little cigar sold and dedicates a portion of the revenue to the Department of Health Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion Division, for smoking cessation programs and education.

The Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawai'i (Coalition) is a program of the Hawai'i Public Health Institute (HIPHI) that is dedicated to reducing tobacco use through education, policy, and advocacy. With nearly two decades of history in Hawai'i, the Coalition has led several campaigns on enacting smoke-free environments, including being the first state in the nation to prohibit the sale of tobacco and electronic smoking devices to purchasers under 21 years of age.

Majority of registered Hawai'i voters support an increase in cigarette taxes (74%) and nearly nine in ten registered voters (87%) feel that it is important for the State to dedicate part of its revenue to tobacco prevention and cessation programs<sup>i</sup>. The Coalition appreciates that SB2690, SD1 dedicates a portion of the proposed revenue to the Department of Health for tobacco cessation programs and education. **Previously, no money from tobacco taxes has been allocated towards tobacco prevention and control**, and passing this bill will have a direct public health impact. Populations at risk that continue to experience higher rates of smoking would be the primary beneficiaries of these education and cessation activities, helping to provide them with the resources needed to quit smoking.

According to the United Nations Global Tobacco Epidemic 2015 report, one person dies from a tobacco-related disease approximately every six seconds, which is equivalent to about 6 million people per year. In Hawai'i alone, 1.3 million packs of cigarettes are bought or smoked by kids each year<sup>ii</sup>. There has <u>not</u> been an increase in taxes on cigarettes and little cigars for the last

**five years.** Raising taxes has been a proven strategy to reduce consumption on tobacco products that harm our residents and children.

Tobacco use is still the number one preventable cause of death and costs our State \$526 million annually. According to the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, an estimated 21,000 kids under the age of 18 in Hawai'i will die prematurely as a result of smoking<sup>iii</sup>. President Obama in his 2014 and 2015 federal budgets proposed an additional 94 cent increase per pack to help reduce the number of premature deaths due to smoking. It is time for Hawai'i to raise its taxes on tobacco and help reduce unnecessary hospitalizations and costs for the State.

Raising tobacco taxes encourages people to quit smoking and helps to prevent youth and young adults from starting. Hawai'i has been leading the way in tobacco control, and this bill will continue to champion our efforts in reducing smoking rates across the state.

The Coalition strongly supports SB 2690, SD1 and respectfully asks you to pass this out of committee.

I also work in the Hawaii DOE Schools and am familiar with the migration of Micronesians to our Hawaii community.

As you know, the UH Cancer Center is a nationally recognized research center. Along with its many research projects much of the center's work focuses on Pacific Islander health, specifically Micronesians. The following are just some of the research projects that assist in understanding Micronesian health:

The UH Cancer Center and the University of Guam are collaborating to develop stronger cancer programs aimed at understanding the reasons behind cancer disparities among racial and ethnic minority and socio-economically disadvantaged populations. -The University of Guam and UH Cancer Center Partnership is one of only 13 Comprehensive Partnerships to Advance Cancer Health Equity (CPACHE), a program funded by the National Cancer Institute (NCI). The UOG/UHCC Partnership is the only partnership within NCI's CPACHE program that serves Pacific Islanders, specifically Micronesians.

The \$5.5 million (U54) five-year grant was awarded to the UH Cancer Center and addresses cancer health disparities among Pacific Islanders in Hawaii, Guam and neighboring U.S. Associated Pacific Island.

Research projects funded for the new 5-year cycle (2015-2020) include a health communications study designed to increase **cervical cancer screening among Micronesian women in Hawai'i and Guam.** 

A betel nut intervention in Guam is being initiated. The first of its kind; and **a study to** identify molecular components of the Areca (betel) nut that promotes chronic inflammation in the immune system. Betel nut chewing is practiced by many Pacific Island populations in the Western Pacific region. According to UH Cancer Center researchers chewing betel nut causes oral lesions and skin changes in the mouth that can lead to the development of esophageal and oral cancers as well as other diseases. The UH Cancer Center's betel nut research is of global and regional importance as study findings could inform future public health interventions and clinical recommendations for betel nut users in the Pacific region and worldwide.

Consider your first call being to the Clinical Trials Office at the UH Cancer Center- (808) 564-5994. It is the central hub for all clinical trials and studies taking place in Hawaii. At present, there are some 120 active clinical trials and studies of new treatments and technologies for adults and children taking place in our state. The Center coordinates the screening, safety, and quality data of trials for partner hospitals and clinics. These trials will impact not just the participants but, like pebbles in a pond, ever widening circles of patients who will benefit. People of Hawaii may well not need to travel elsewhere at great expense and loss of familial support to access potentially life-saving treatments.

The UH Cancer Center founded in 1971, is now headquartered in a premier new building in Kakaako. The Center is National Cancer Institute designated cancer research center, one of only 69 out of more than 1600 cancer centers in the U.S. Its grants ensure us top researchers who are focused on Hawaii's unique racial/ethnic in types, incidence and mortality of cancer. This designation was hard won and prized, bringing millions of dollars into Hawaii and must not be lost. Our unique population has specific needs and weaknesses. I am the interim director for the Cancer Prevention and Control Program in the University of Hawaii Cancer Center. The comments presented here are my personal testimony and do not necessarily reflect the views of the National Institutes of Health or the University of Hawaii Cancer Center.

SB2690 would increase the excise tax on cigarettes and little cigars and would allocate part of the tax to the UH Cancer Center.

**I strongly support this legislation** because our research indicates that use of electronic smoking devices (hereafter, e-cigarettes) is quite prevalent among adolescents in Hawaii. Our publication in the journal Pediatrics reported that 29% of 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grade students in six Hawaii high schools have used e-cigarettes at least once and 18% use them regularly. This rate of e-cigarette use by adolescents in Hawaii it is considerably higher than what is found in current studies of adolescents in other areas of the US. Moreover, our study showed <u>that 12% of this sample of adolescents used both e-cigarettes and cigarettes.</u>

In addition to the Pediatrics article, our recent publications in the journal Tobacco Control have provided valuable new knowledge about adolescent smoking. For example we have shown that using e-cigarettes makes adolescents more interested in smoking and that adolescent nonsmokers who use e-cigarettes are more likely to start smoking 1 year later. That is, e-cigarette use increases smoking initiation among adolescents. This has public health implications because aa factor that increases adolescent smoking will have negative effects on public health. Our research conducted in Hawaii has shown that e-cigarette use increases smoking uptake and our results have been confirmed by four other studies conducted in different parts of the mainland.

Our findings indicate that more action is necessary to reduce the rate of cigarette smoking among adolescents. Taxation has previously been shown effective for reducing rates of adolescent cigarette smoking. Thus there is a justification for increasing the tax on cigarettes as a means for protecting the health of the people of Hawaii.

Our research, which followed a sample of 2,300 adolescents over time, would not have been possible without the research infrastructure provided by the UH Cancer Center. Our research is funded by Federal grants that we compete for, hence does not cost the State money, but conducting this research requires the kind of scientific environment that is only available through the NCI Cancer Center designation. For these reasons, I request that part of the revenue from the increased excise tax be allocated to the University of Hawaii Cancer Center, to help support the infrastructure that has made our research possible.

Our research programs, in addition to helping to prevent adolescent smoking and increasing scientific visibility for Hawaii, bring money to the Islands that provides jobs for local young people, both students and community residents. Supporting the mission of the UH Cancer Center will help these important activities continue. **I strongly support SB2690** for these reasons.

Not only are lowerincome earners more likely to smoke, they also smoke more frequently. They bear more of the tax burden than higher-income earners, in absolute terms and as a percentage of income. 2. They are an unreliable and unsustainable source of revenue and don't structurally fix budget deficits. Many states rely on these revenues to balance their budgets, year in and year out. More than 20 states are considering tax hikes to fill current budget holes. But tobacco tax hikes don't address what's causing the holes in the first place. 3. They are a discriminatory tax on a minority of the population. The smoking public represents only about 18 percent of the population, and there has been a general decline in smoking for decades. Tobacco taxes are part of the "divide and conquer" approach implemented by big-spending legislators who find it easier to tax small groups of the population one at a time to avoid widespread constituency backlash. 4. They hurt local businesses and the overall economy. Hav-A-Tampa cigar closed its factory in Florida and laid off about 495 employees this summer due to the federal excise tax hike on tobacco products signed earlier this year by President Barack Obama. Many people travel outside the state to buy their tobacco products, and they are likely to make other purchases out of state as well, thereby hurting local businesses. 5. They encourage cross-border, black market, and Internet purchases. As tobacco taxes have risen, so has tax evasion. The Mackinac Center reports tax-induced smuggling has become so widespread that it "undermines both the revenue and health goals of higher cigarette taxes, while producing unintended consequences for individual states and American society as a whole." 6. They help keep government spending up. As policymakers adopt new and expanded programs that rely on tobacco tax revenues, other taxes will inevitably go up when the tobacco tax revenues fall short of the programs' funding needs. 7. They kick the real fiscal problems down the road and distract from meaningful spending reforms. Instead of raising taxes on tobacco or anything else, policymakers should consider enacting sensible tax and expenditure limits, reforming the state workforce, and performance auditing. Budget deficits are not a revenue problem, but a spending problem. 8. Smokers are not the only ones harmed by tobacco taxes, which do not prevent further tax hikes. A National Taxpayers Union study found, "Taxpayers face a seven out of 10 chance of seeing another net annual

tax hike within two years of a tobacco tax hike." There is a strong correlation between states that have high tobacco taxes and those that have high overall tax burdens. 9. Tobacco taxes are already high, and states are beginning to experience diminishing returns. According to the Center for Policy Research of New Jersey, the Garden State experienced a net loss of nearly \$24 million in tobacco tax revenue during the two years following a 17.5 cent tax increase. 10. Projections for tobacco tax revenue are frequently over-estimated.
